# FRENCH CAPTURE 1,000 PRISONERS AND RÉPEL 3 COUNTER ASSAULTS

THE WAR SITUATION

ANOTHER THOUSAND PRISONERS

The German armies In France are slowly yielding ground before the reientless pressure exercised by Generals Haig and Nivelle, and the vital question is as to whether their morale can be maintained under terrific pounding, to which they are subjected day and night. Apparently the Allied commanders have abandoned the policy of sudden thrusts at chosen points, and are relying on a constant hammering over a wide front in the belief that sooner or later the Iron German ring must either break or that sooner or later the iron German ring must either break or crack.

While there is little immediate prospect of sensational developments in the battle area, the political situation remains fraught with many possibilities. The later the state of the

ments in the battle area, the political situation remains fraught with many possibilities. The latest news from Russla indicates that the crisis in that country continues acute, and the menace that Russia may either withdraw from the Entente or be plunged into chaos still throws its shadow over the future. The Russian radicals are apparently as determined as ever to reject the war program of Britain and France, but they show almost as much reluctance as Berlin to define their precise aims. A conference is projected, at which the coalition government will be asked for a frank statement as to its position, and there are uncomfortable rumors that the Russian radicals intend to attempt to force a repudiation of Russia's treatles with the other members of the Entente.

On the credit of the account is the rising tide of indignation against Germany in Scandinavia and Spain. The anti-German faction in Sweden has been powerfully reinforced by the action of the Germans in sinking three Swedish grain ships, in violation of their own agreement to respect the safety of the vessels. Spain is still awaiting a reply to her protest over the sinking of the Spanish steamer Patricio, also destroyed while sailing under a German guarantee, and the tone of the Spanish press is increasingly preemptory in its demand that Cermany be compelled to respect Spanish rights.

What effect the course of events is having on the German people remains a practically sealed book. The German censorship is stricter than ever, and the little news that trickles across the frontier of the central powers offers events. On the credit of the account is

Germans Suffer Heavy Losses In Attempts To Regain Positions Lost on Monday in Champagne and Fail to Obtain Any Result

Paris, May 22-Noon.—Three separate counter-attacks by the Germans on positions captured yesterday by the French were repulsed last night, according to an official statement issued by the French war office this morning. The number of prisoners taken by the French yesterday was 1,000.

The statement follows: 'In the Champagne the enemy, after bombarding the positions which we captured yesterday north of Mont Carnillet and at the Casque and the Teton, made an infantry attack against these three sectors. He was repulsed everywhere and suffered considerable loss without obtaining any result. The number of unwounded prisoners taken by us in the operations of yesterday reached 1,000, of whom 28 are officers.

'There was intermittent artillery fighting on the remainder of the front. On the Vauclerc plateau the artillery fighting was violent.

Enemy surprise attacks at various points were repulsed. In the course of raids on the German lines we took 15 prisoners.

### LIFE POLICY IT IS MORE READILY UNDERSTOOD-FEW PEOPLE CARRY ENOUGH LIFE INSURANCE. For the average prospect the ordinary life policy is more desirable than the limited payment life or endowment policy, says a bulletin of the Mutual Life of New York, and outlines the following reasons why. In the first place there are very few people indeed who carry enough life insurance to protect their families adequately. This should be the first consideration in selecting the form of policy, but the right amount of insurance will cost too much for most prospects if limited payment life or endowment is chosen. Herein is the first distinct advantage of the ordinary life.

EFFECT OF PAID-UP ADDITIONS. Many a man dislikes an ordinary life policy because under the impression that he will have to pay premiums "all his life." This is not necessarily the case. If he allows his dividends to remain with the policy in the form of paidup additions the policy will become paid up before he is old, or before many years. These paid-up additions increase the cash value of his insurance, and after some years the cash value will be equal to the face amount of the policy In this way even an ordinary life policy affords considerable protection for

man's advanced years.

When a man who is carrying his insurance on the ordinary life plan feels that he has sufficient protection and, being able to pay more for that protection, wants to change it to limited payment life or endowment he can do so regardless of the state of his health. This is not only an advantage to the insured and his beneficiary, but also to the agent, as it enables the latter to do more business with the insured.

On the other hand, if he began with limited payment life or endowment insurance and is able after a while to pay for more insurance he has not only had insufficient protection in the past, but also he will have insufficient protection in the future unless the state of his health permits him to get more insurance. If he cannot get the additional insurance it is not only unfortunate for him and his beneficiary, but also for the agent, since the latter has lost his chance to do more business with the insured. Even if the insured can get this additional insurance, he may place it with some other company and again the agent's chance is gone.

### LESS LIKELY TO BE TWISTED.

Another advantage of the ordinary life policy, both to the insured and the agent, is the smaller opportunity for the twister to get in his work. It is easier for the twister to induce a man to drop his limited payment life, or his endowment policy, and take an ordinary life contract than to induce him to drop the ordinary life policy and take a limited payment life or endowment at a highe

Again, many prospects and insured people do not understand the difference between a limited payment life policy and an endowment. Even after the agent thinks he has made clear to the prospect which form of contract he is getting, the prospect will often forget the explanation in after years. Persons whose ideas concerning these two forms of contract are confused, afford a fertile field of operation for the twister

The ordinary life contract is more readily understood by the average man by reason of its simplicity.-Monetary Times.

Patriotism, real natriotism is not ive consistently and agreeably under the law of the country and abide by its rulings, to co-operate with the requests of its regularly constituted authori the betterment of the commonwealth and the enhanced comfort and edifica

Under stress of the prospective great food shortage throughout the world our governments urge us to produce more, and it is the duty of every patriotic citizen to do his or her part, either by self or proxy, to produce more foodstuffs during the present year than will be necessary for the sustenance of himself and those dependent upon him. Some time ago we were confronted with an appeal for Red Cross and patriotic funds, and a figure set for London givings at \$300 000. Many there were, who claimed it was absurd to think of London's population giving anything like that amount, yet over \$360,000 was subscribed. Now, the call is to produce, not to pay, but to produce, for the safety of ourselves and to help our brothers in foreign lands less able to produce, during abnormal conditional conditions. tions, and if we have not the land, our duty, plainly, is to go out and help those

Intelligently directed economy is absolutely necessary now, that we may have to give to laudable objects, and also to invest in war securities from time to time. Since Great Britain's war expenditure has reached the enormous sum of \$37, 250,000 per day, it is not possible that such enormous disbursement by th motherland may continue without our being called upon for not only what we can part with without inconvenience, but as well that which will entail sacrifice. Canada has done nobly, both in men and money, but it is a question whether we have as yet made any great sacrifice of money in "doing our bit." Also whether our people, as a whole, have given enough serious thought to the conditions with which the Empire, of which we are a dependable, unit, is confronted. must learn to save as we have never done before, in order to be in a position t buy our country's securities as they may be enforcedly placed before us fi digestion. President Wilson in a public statement covered this necessity strong words when he said, "This is the time for America to correct her un pardonable fault of wastefulness and extravagance. Let every man and ever woman assume the duty of careful, provident use and expenditure as a public duty, as a dictate of patriotism, which no one can now expect ever to be ex cused or forgiven for ignoring."

### INVEST MORE MONEY IN YOUR OWN SECURITIES.





Philo Hughes, aged 85, a well-to-do

retired farmer, was strangled to death at his home at Birr yesterday afternoon under exceptionally pathetic circumstances. Overcome by paralysis while out in a driveshed feeding some chickens, he staggered to a buggy near by, and tried to hold nimself up, but in his weakened condition fell across the gearing and axie and choked to death. His body was found entangled in the buggy about 5 o'clock by little Daisy Hall, who went to find out how Mr. Hughes and his sick wife were.

Two years ago last March Mrs. Hughes was stricken with paralysis. Night and day ever since that time the aged man has been at her bedside tending to her every want. On Sunday night as he was sitting on the bed talking to his helpless wife, he was suddenly stricken with paralysis. This was about 10 o'clock. He fell to the floor and rolled under the bed, where he lay helpless until early Monday morning, when he was discovered by a neighbor, R. H. Hobbs, who came over to call. Mr. Hobbs called Dr. McNeill of Arva, who attended Mr. Hughes. The old man rallied considerably, and after remaining in bed for several hours said he felt strong enough to get up.
