



AGREEMENT WITH MINERS

OPERATORS AND WORKERS TO SETTLE THEIR DIFFERENCES.

Basis of an Understanding Which May be Reached Without Reference to the Commission.

Scranto, Pa., Nov. 22.-The mine workers, through their representatives, have agreed with the mine owners to attempt to adjust the differences existing between them, outside of the anthracite coal strike commission. The proposition was made on a compromise basis, and negotiations, it is expected, will be at once entered upon with a reasonable hope of settlement with the aid of the arbitrators. The rough proposition, which is to form the basis of the negotiations, is a 10 per cent. increase in wages, a nine-hour day and trade agreements etween the miners and the respective companies by whom they are employed. The only one of the four demands not touched upon is that of the weighing of understood, from which a settlement is to be effected. It is possible that the foundation already laid may be wrecked by eight party holding out too strong. the whole matter in the hands of the commissioners, who in the meantime will act as a sort of board of conciliation rather than as a board of arbitration. Few persons were aware that an attempt would be made at an outside settlement until it was practically intimated by Judge Gray, Chairman of the commission, who read a carefully-preparel announcement. The move, one of the most important in the whole history of the coal strike, created a mild sensation when it became known. The surprise was all the greater when it is remembered that numerous persons, from the President of the United States down, and many organizations, from the National Civic Federation to the small boards of trade of the mining towns, failed to bring the two parties together. It is said it was all brought about by both sides seeing that the proceedings before the commission would be inter-minable, and that in the intermingling of the lawyers of both sides the outside agreement proposition was broached and

FIVE THOUSAND VICTIMS.

TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE IN GUATEMALA.

Coffee Plantations Forty Miles From Santa Maria Destroyed by the

San Francisco, Nov. 22 .- W. J. Campbell, who has just arrived from Guatemala, brings additional details of the damage caused by the recent volcanio

disturbance. He said :-"There is no clear idea yet of the loss of life resulting from the eruption of Santa Maria, but I believe that 5,000 natives have been killed. There was some talk at San Jose, too, of some refugees having been waylaid by rob-bers, but I saw no instance of this. I took the first means of getting back to this country, having been impoverished. At San Jose it was said President Cabrera was trying to suppress the news, but evidence of ruin was apparent to

everybody. "Some of the coffee fincas that have been nearly ruined were worth more than \$1,000,000. The plantation of Albert James, which was wiped out, had machinery upon it worth \$300,000, all of which is destroyed. Some months ago James refused an offer of \$1,500,000. Adolfo Meyer's finca, worth \$75,000,000. 000 in gold, was ruined. Both of these places lay from twenty to forty miles west of the volcano.

Mr. Jenner also owns 50 acres of the Canada Co. land

in the oil belt. "I bought the 50 acres of Canada Co. land that I own about 30 years ago," said Mr. Jenner. "My deed mentions minerals and oil, but doesn't say anything about white pine. I don't remember that the representative said anything about the oil reservation in the deeds they gave. "Yes," was the response of the pioneer of Raleigh Township, "it was all woods around here in those days. Before the Gravel road was out through the settlers along the Middle road used to have a difficult time going to Chatham. The Indian trail to the town led from here and followed along the high lands. EXPERT'S COMMENT.

Christopher McKenzie and son ames, of Petrolea, were among the first to reach Raleigh after Gurd's Gusher was struck. In an interview with The Planet this morning Mr. McKenzie said, 'I have been for near ly three weeks driving up and down every concession and side road in Raleigh. From what I can learn and from indications I think that the oil territory in Raleigh runs southwest by north-east. O' course you can only theorize on this, but the indications are that way. Our first endeavor was to find where sompstone had been discovered in the sink ng of wells in Raleigh. Then welocated where shale had been discovered, where gas and where dry holes had been put down. The dry holes were the best sign. We found that the possibilities were that the oil field was nearly as wide as it was long and covered an area of some 30 square miles. We have leas ed land on all sides of the oil well but have no Canada Co. land. There is bound to be trouble over that land and I didn't want it.

"The man isn't born yet who can tell where the oil is or isn't. The only way to discover this is to put down test wells. We have let the contract for six wells to be started immediately and we expect that the first well will be sunk next week. We will put our first well down on Peter Jenner's farm on the Middle He has bored several times for water but has had little success getting more gas than water. We will also bore as soon as possible on the farms of Geo. Jenner, Middle read, Thos. Early, 11th concession, Mr. Thorpe, 12th concession, Geo. Bennett, 12th concession and Mr. Pardo, lot 14, 12th concession. We will put a test well down on each of these

farms. "The Petrolea field is from two to four miles wide and 28 miles long. This field is wider but is not so long. From what I can gather from the residents, there are springs all over this part of Raleigh from which gas comes. These spots are mostly outside the oil territory. The best indication, as I said before, is the scarcity of water. Then you generally get oil where there is an abundance of scapstone. In from a week to ten days there will be from ten to fifteen drilling rigs in opera-

Will Deliver No More Coal to the Boston Co.

Company, said to-day that all shipments of coal from the Dominion Coal Company to the New England Gas & Coke Company of Boston, in virtue of the contract entered into some years ago, were stopped to-day and the contract broken. The main reason why the coal company decided to break the contract is that it was entered into at a time when labor was much cheaper than it is at the present time, and the conditions of the coal company such that the con tract might prove a good one for a certain length of time. At the present time, however, a much greater price could be obtained for run of mine coal, and, besides, if the coke company were to increase the number of their oven very rapidly, there would not be suffici-ent run of mine coal, and in order to carry out the contract coal would have to be supplied at the same figure. The result of to-day's action of the direc tors of the coal company in breaking the contract by stopping all shipments of coal will be, it is generally understood, that the Gas & Coke Company will bring an action for the damages sus-tained by the coal company adopting such a course. The general opinion among the shareholders of the coal com-pany is that their directors have de-cided on the proper course, because, no matter what damages the coke company could prove it had sustained by the con-tract being broken, they would not come to anything like the amount the coal company would lose if it carried out the contract.

BANQTET TO DELEGATES.

BRITISHER DECLARES HIMSELF FOR A PREFERENCE.

Mr. Faithfl Begg's Strong Speech in Toronto-Mr. Tarte's For Higher

Toronto, Nov. 22.-A banquet was given in this city last night in honor of the delegates from the London Chamber of Commerce by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. Although the speaking commenced at a late hour, an unusually large number of interesting and important addresses were given. Mr. Faithfull Begg strongly favored the granting by Great Britain of a preference to the colonies, and said that if he were again running for the Imperial Parliament he would not hesitate to make a colonial preference the foremost plank in his platform. Sir Albert Rollit eulogized Canada's re-sources, and made the suggestion that the British warships should be employed in transporting enigrants from England to her colonies. He also promised the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce in obtaining relief from insur-ance discrimination against the St. Lawrence route. Hon. Geo. W. Ross, in a speech of unusual eloquence, suggested as a means of improving the trade relations of Great Britain and Canada that British manufacturers should establish branches in Canada in the same man-ner as the American harvester makers and other establishments have done. Mr. Tarte, who rose long after midnight, repeated his arguments in favor of increased transportation facilities for Can-ada and a higher protective tariff, declaring that he believed more than ever in the motto, "Business is business."

A FORGERY CHARGE IN THE SUF-TON WILL CASE.

CHAMBERLAIN'S HANDLING OF BOER CASE.

NINTH LANCERS' CASE SUBJECT

LORD HAMILTON'S ABLE DE-FENCE OF THE VICEROY.

London, Nov. 22.-Mr. Chamberlain had an easy case in taking up the ill-judged appeal of the Boer generals to the civilized world, and he naturally presented the British side with lucidity and force. His correspondence with Gen. Botha, published in detail in a Parliamentary paper issued yesterday, presents evidence of the humane treatment of the Boer families in the concentration camps and magnanimity in dealing with the vanquished enemy. He naturally resented the misleading statements made by the Boer generals in the anti-British appeal to foreigners.

rather than apologetic, and did not break the force of Mr. Chamberlain's powerful, if temperate, presentation of the case. The correspondence shows that the Boer generals welcomed the announcement of Mr. Chamberlain's mission to South Africa, and offered to co-operate with him in effecting the

reconciliation of the races.

The correspondence is read here with satisfaction. The British people have felt that they have never had sufficient credit for conducting the war with a degree of humanity unparalleled in history, and in making the most generous The Boer Generals. peace ever known. The Boer Generals, or, rather, Dr. Leyds, who misled them, have enabled Mr. Chamberlain to em-

phasize these facts. The energies of the House of Com-mons were yesterday devoted to the consideration of the case of the 9th Lancers, an affair which has been for days past the sole topic in the military clubs. It will be remembered that a native cook was found near the lines of the Laneers at Sialkot, in India, dy-ing from injuries inflicted by unknown assailants, whom the victim declared to be men of the regiment. Inquiries zon became interested in the case, with the result that the regiment, which is one of the crack corps of the British army, was publicly branded for having concealed the criminals, while all the

leave of officers and men was stopped. Lord George Hamilton had a difficult task in justifying the action of the Indian Viceroy, but he rose most adequately to the demands of the occasion, and when he sat down the sympathy of the House was almost entirely with the Government. Lord Curzon, he pointed out, had, from the time he took up office in India, exercised the whole of his great power and influence in impressing upon his countrymen, that it was their duty to investigate outrages of this kind with the utmost promptitude and with as just and sincere a desire to bring home to justice the culprits as if a white man had been assaulted.





SENTENCED BY POLICE MAGIS-TRATE ON TWO CHARGES.

Convicted of Making American and Canadian Silver Currency - His Own Statement the Only Defence

Toronto, Nov. 22 .- Joseph Genalias Salvatore Clementi, appeared in the Police Court yesterday on the charges of counterieiting laid against him. Contrary to the Crown's expectations, Mr. Robinette, K.C., announced his intention of proeceding with the trial, and the charge of making United States coin was 'n vestigated. Detective Davis was the first witness called. He told of Gentile's arrest, when, in company with United States Officers Murphy and Flynn, taey walked in on the prisoner, surprising him in the very act of making counter-feit coin. The detectives said that they had watched the store at 353 Spadina avenue from 10 o'clock that morning

until 4 in the afternoon. They had seen another man, for whom they had no warrant, entering the store. In the afternoon they saw this man leave the store, and Detective Murphy was sent in to make a small purchase, and to discover if the man they wanted was there He was found, as expected, and the sig nal was given to the two waiting offi-cers. They hurried in and found him at work. The detective identified all the tools, the half-finished money, and the metal which was being used. He found a crucible on the fire, containing molten metal, and a number of coins, the heat which showed their recent manufac-

ture, in moulds on the table. The plan I had in view would be as follows: The city to make a special tax or license of 82 a year on bicycles and \$5 a year on every horse owned or kept within the bicycles and about 1,000 horses in the city. At the above rate this would not about \$6,000 a year. I would also suggest that all milkmen and others doing a regular business in the city and living outside the corporation be asked to pay their quoto to the scheme, and that the noney so raised be applied to pay half the costs of the pavements and the other half paid by the property owners on the street so paved. first thought some may think that this would be a rather high tax on a certain class of citizens, but if they will take a second thought and consider the advantages derived they will find it a good investment. In speaking with a few of the heads of firms that this would effect most, I found that they were all in favor of some such plan if the desired end could be attained. 



Chicago, Nov. 16. - The duty of Christian laymen to present the gospel invitation to people who have not yet accepted it is enjoined in this sermon by Rev. Frank De Witt Talmage on the text Luke xiv, 23, "Go into the highways and hedges

and compel them to come in." Christ was comparing the kingdom of heaven to a great banquet which God had prepared for his invited guests, who would not come. The Earl of Leicester made great preparations to receive Elizabeth, the "Virgin Queen of England," when she visited the castle halls of old Kenilworth. Not only was his banquet hall brilliant with many lights, no sooner did the royal guest step upon the drawbridge which led into the castle than a rait, made as a floating island, came into view. Upthis floating island sat beautiful Woman. She was

surrounded by her water nymphs. she came, as queen of the lake, to bend the knee in homage to the visiting queen. At night while the banquet went on the heavens were aflame with the illuminations of fireworks. "Such," wrote the clerk of Queen Elizabeth's council chamber, "was the blaze of burning darts, the gleam of stars coruscant, streams and hail of fiery sparks, lightnings of wildfire and flight shot of thunderbolts, with continuance terror and vehemency, that the heavens thundered, the waters surged and the earth shook, and for my part, hardy as I am, it made me vengeably afraid," But though the queen lovr made great and wonderful preparations to receive his royal guest in the gorgeous banquet hall of old Kenilworth, he made no such prepartions as God had made in the parable to receive his heavenly guests who would not come.

How shall we reach the masses for Christ? How shall we give the gospel evitation to those sinners who are out in the highways and the hedges?' e bluntly answered his questioners, 'Go after them." But how are we to go after them? First, as Christ's disciples, we should begin our personal work among individuals by presenting the gospel of Jesus to those who are closest to us. We should present Christ first to our fathers and mothers, to our husbands and children, to our dear friends and to all who are bound to us by the ties of blood and love. We should do just the same as Andrew, the brother of Philip, did when he was con-verted. No sooner did he see the face of Christ than he practically said to himself: "Why, I must immediately go and hunt up my dear brother Philip. How happy I can make him! We have been side by side in all our joys and sorrows from the time we were born. He must share to-day in my new hope." It is upon this action of Andrew, who at once went and carried the gospel invitation to his brother, that the great "Brotherhood of Andrew and Philip" has been established.

But, though the eternal salvation of our unrepentent loved ones ought to be a perpetual cause of anxiety for us day in and day out, yet there are thousands and hundreds of thousands of church members who never think it obligatory for them to present the love of a living Christ to those who ought to be as dear to them as a Jonathan was to a David, a Damon to a Pythias or the memory of a murdered king of Denmark was to an avenging son. These church members are ready to invite those friends to their homes, but they are not willing to personally invite them to sit at the holiest of all tables—the table of the blessed communion. They are ready to talk with their friends upon politics or business, but they are not ready to discuss with them the greatest of all questions. "What shall it profit a man if he should gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" They are ready to sound the praises of their friends to their other friends, but they are not ready to sound forth to their earthly friends the praises of their Heavenly Father. They are always ready to introduce one earthly friend to another, but hey are not anxious to make their earthly companions acquainted with that Divine Companion who is ever willing to be our helper and guide along the troubled journey of life. The gospel invitation should be their friends and to the strangers wherever they may be found, because the vast majority of sinners never enter the church at all. Therefore, if they do not have Christ presented to them on the street, in the office, in the railroad trains and even in the kitchen, they will never be invited at all. Mr. Beecher once powerfully said, "The longer I live the more confidence I have in those sermons preached where one man is a minister and one man is the congregation, where there is no question as to who is meant when the preacher says,
'Thou art the man!' 'I believe Mr.
Beecher was right when he made that
statement, but I believe he was right
even in a larger sense. The longer I live the more confidence I have in those sermons that are preached where one man is a minister and one man is a congregation, because such a gospel service can be held everywhere. It can use the mechanic's bench for a pulpit; it can have the iceman's cart for a moving taber-nacle, it can carry the Bread of Life to the sinner who would otherwise never be willing to receive that bread over the pulpit desk. Besides the minister in such a case does not have to be an ordained theological student, but need be simply an earnest consecrated layman pleading for Christ with the sinner who is standing by his side in the village store. If all church members were to become earnest and consecrated evan-

gelists, it would not take very



for this whole sinful world to see the sunrise burst of the millernial dawn Surely it wo ld not be too much to expect that one such evangelist as Mr. Beecher described should at least win one soul a year for Christ, yet Dr. William Morley Punshon, the great English Methodist, once made the startling statement: "If every disciple to day were to call one person to Ch ist each year and that one were to call one other, how swiftly the world would be converted, for are to-day millions of true believers in the world. But if there were only 100 see how quickly the work would grow. In less than twenty-five years toe world would be converted, for this would double the number of disciples each year." After such an impressive statement, will any one say that the gospel invitation which car be given daffy by the church members would amount to but little in the salvation of a sinful world?

To show the importance of a Chris tian layman's work I cannot do better in closing this sermon than illustrations two the personal experience of H. Clay Trumbull, the well-known editor of The Sunday School Times. Trumbull's early life was spent vival sweat the town, and many of the companions of his youth joined the church, among whom was a young man who was one of his most intimate friends. For many years these two as boys and young men lived near each other, but his Christian friend never spoke to him about religion. After awile they separated, Mr. Trumbull became an engineer in Hartford; his Christian friend went to Yale, but during his last year at college he sent a letter to his old chum pleading with him to become a Christian. That letter was the means of saving H. Clay Trumbull's soul. In his engine room, upon the receipt of it, he then and there gave his heart to God.

He immediately said to himself, "If the personal work of a layman can do so much in the salvation of an immortal soul, I will never make the mistake my friend made with me by postponing for so long a personal invitation to another." So, the same night on which he was converted, Mr. Trumbull went to one of his fellow workmen and told him he had been converted. He urged his friend also to accept Christ. This friend turned to him and said: "Trumbull, your words cut me to the heart. You little know how they rebuke me. I have long been a professed follower of Christ, and you have never suspected this, although we have been in close association in house and office for years. May God forgive me for my lack of faithfulness." may God to-day forgive us all, min-isters and laymen alike, if we have shown the same negligence as these two young men who came into H. Clay Trumbull's life. May God teach us, one and all, the power of personal testimony for Christ. And may we one and all be willing to make the resolution D. L. Moody made a short time after his conversion-"I here and now promise that no day hereafter shall pass unless I have personally presented my Saviour to at least one immortal soul. So help me, Jesus, in my vow! Amen!"

NEPIGON FISHERIES.

NEW COMPANY FORMED TO CON-TROL THE LAKE.

THEY WILL BUILD 40 MILES OF RAILWAY.

and important concession granted by the Ontario Government yesterday, involving a large fishing enterprise, which will yield a handsome revenue to the Province. The concessionaires are the Canada Fish Company, whose incorporation with \$1,000,000 capital, and head office in Toronto, was announced only a few days ago. The waters affected are those of Lake Nepigon, that fine body lying to the north of Lake Superior, a little east of Port Arthur. Full details of the agree-Port Arthur. Full details of the agree-ment were not made public yesterday, but some of the main features were announced. The company secure an exclusive privilege for net fishing for a term of twenty years, but they are for-bidden to take bass or speckled trout, two game varieties for which the re-gion is famous, and the rights of every-one to angle are not to be interfered one to angle are not to be interfered

In return for this privilege the company will pay a bonus on a graduated scale, ranging from \$2,000 to \$20,000 a year, in addition to the usual license fee, based on the amount of apparatus or plant in use, and they undertake to build a railway connecting the Canadian Pa-cific, which crosses Nepigon River close cific, which crosses Nepigon River close to Lake Superior, northward to the shores of Lake Nepigon, a distance of about forty miles. It is provided that no nets shall be set on spawning grounds nor within a mile of the mouth of any river or stream, nor within a mile of the outlet of the lake into the Nepigon lives. The action of the lake into the Nepigon lives. River. The catch of fish is limited to 500 tons a year for the first three years, and 1,000 tons a year for each subsequent year of the term. The company acquire no territorial rights, and the location of any fishing station is to be subject to the permission of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and they are to be liable for all damages from fire resulting from their operations.

The fishery wealth of Lake Nepigon has long been considered important, but its commercial value has been practically nothing, owing to the lack of rail-way facilities. SUICIDE FROM JEALOUSY

G. A. DARLINGTON, SOUTH AFRI-CAN VETERAN, THE VICTIM.

First Shot His Sweetheart, Miss Bertha Sheldon-At Ann Arbor-His Home at Strathcona, Alberta.

Windsor, Nov. 22 .- Frenzied with ealousy because his sweetheart, Miss Bertha Sheldon, permitted attentions from another man, George A. Darlington, a student in the music department of the University of Michigan, shot the young lady, and then turning the weapon upon himself put a bullet through his neck, dying almost instantly. Miss Sheldon received only a comparatively slight flesh wound. The affair took place at Ann Arbor shortly after noon. Darlington had been keeping company with Miss Sheldon up to a month ago. He claimed that he was engaged to marry her, but that it had been broken off. He was infatuated with the young lady, and last night when he saw an other young man accompany her home his feelings of jealousy were aroused. Yesterday he awaited her as she was going to work and threatened her with violence unless she took a walk with him and explained why she was accom-panied to her home by the young man mentioned. They had proceeded but a short distance when Darlington became suddenly enraged, and, drawing a revolver, fired one shot at his companion at close range. The bullet struck Miss Sheldon in the arm, inflicting only a slight flesh wound. The girl fled screaming down the street, and Dar-lington, thinking apparently that his shot had mortally wounded her, fired a bullet into his neck, dying within a few moments. That the suicide at least was premeditated was shown by the following note found in the suicide's room, dat-

ed to-day:—
"Notice—Please do not send my body home. Give it to the doctors of the University Hospital. My musical in-struments are to go to G. F. Gordon. My books are to be given to the Young Men's Christian Association. My clothing and other belongings are to be taken by Edward Kleinschmidt. My gold locket and gold watch to go home. I am insane as ever a man was, and eternally lost. To all friends and dear ones, good-

bye. Love to my darling mother."
