The Queen prorogued Parliament in person on the 27th Augt. Her Majesty read the following speech in an elegant and emphatic style:

It has afforded me the sincerest pleasure to have been able to assist in effecting a reconciliat on between France and Mexico. Intent upon preserving for sy subjects the blessings of peace, I am highly gratified when I can avail myself of an opportunity of removing misunderstandings between other powers.

I have recently concluded with the King of the French a convention calculated to put an end to differences which have arisen of late years between the fishermen of Great Britain and of France:—This convention, by removing causes of dispute w I tend to cement that union between the two countries which is an advantageous to both, and so conductive to the general interests of Europe.

I shall continue to pursue with perseverance the negociations 'a which I am engaged, to persuade all powers of Christendom to unite magnetic accuse which the textinction of the slave trade, and I trust that, with the blessings of Providence, my efforts in so righteous a cause will be rewarded with suecess.

"I have observed with much approbation the attention which you have bestowed upon the internal state and condition of the country.
