### CITY ORGANISED FOR MR. GRAHAM

Over 200 Attend Great Organization Meeting in Conservative Club Rooms Last Night—Conservatives and Liberals Unite to Put an End to Present Regime in West Hastings

Over two hundred of the city's leading business and professional men, working men and manufacturers greeted Mr. R. J. Graham at his initial organization meeting in his committee rooms on Front street last evening. It was indeed a grand and fitting reception to the new Union candidate for West Hastings inasmuch as the majority present were staunch and influential Conservatives, with a representative assemblage of prominent Liberals from Belleville and the county.

Mr. Anderson was the chairman by unanimous choice for the meeting, and Mr. Bowen as secretary. Mr. Anderson stated his stand in most emphatic manner and then called upon Mr. Graham to speak to those present.

#### The Candidate

Mr. Graham made a very forceful address that was filled with optimism and good suggestions for the carrying on of the campaign. To a successful conclusion he dwelt at length on the many reasons why he believed his candidature was the best for the city. He stated that the election at this critical period and it was quite evident that his hearers were with him to a man. Mr. Graham was repeatedly cheered and applauded during his address, particularly was this so, when he made the statement that there were over 700 men from this constituency on active service in France and he was going to put his aims clearly before them, even if he had to cable them personally.

A truly union convention, Mr. Graham stated had not been held in West Hastings and he considered himself the real and only "union" candidate inasmuch as he was being supported on all sides by the most prominent and influential Liberals and Conservatives.

Mr. Graham pointed out in no uncertain manner his idea of conducting a clean and honest election campaign and stated that he would absolutely refuse to step down from

those ideals, no matter what was done by the opposing forces.

#### Mr. Abbott Out for Graham

Mr. A. Abbott, barrister, a former resident of Trenton and a man who keeps closely in touch with public feeling in that town, made a few encouraging remarks regarding the outlook in that section of the county. He had no doubt as to the final count if the campaign was conducted in a fair and square manner. Mr. Abbott said that he and all others with whom he had been in conversation had absolute confidence in Mr. Graham.

#### Liberals Join Forces

At this juncture of the proceedings a large delegation of the city's leading Liberals joined the assembly and Mr. D. V. Stewart when called upon to say a few words, said he and the entire Liberal organization were heartily in accord with Mr. Graham's stand and platform. Mr. Sinclair referred to Mr. Graham as one of Belleville's "first citizens" and hadn't the slightest doubt that if elected, he would make a first class representative for West Hastings. And furthermore, with Mr. Graham's organizing ability, his ability as a successful business man and by conducting the campaign to a fair and honest end, he had no doubt in his mind but what the result would spell success.

#### Mr. W. B. Deacon

Mr. W. B. Deacon said he had no hesitation whatever in stating in his lot with a man of such high character and ability. Mr. Deacon touched on various subjects regarding a successful election campaign and his ideas were indeed well worthy of the favorable consideration they received. Mr. Deacon created great enthusiasm when he announced that Victory Loan was now nearing the \$900,000 mark.

After several other short and pointed speeches the organization of the various committees was proceeded with. While organization was not completed in every detail, very favorable headway was made. The committee will be completed at the next meeting to be held on Thursday evening of this week.

Three hearty cheers for Mr. Graham and the singing of "God Save the King" brought the initial meeting to a close.

#### Campaign Notes

Mr. Graham's central committee rooms are situated in the East Rob-

ertson block in the rooms known as the West Hastings Conservative Auxiliary. They will be open every night from now until the election day.

Mr. Graham, Mr. W. B. Deacon, Mr. S. Burrows will speak in Trenton tonight. They will take the Belleville band up with them. For all who desire to go to Trenton tonight, there will be carriages supplied at the committee rooms at 7 o'clock.

Mr. Sanford Burrows has taken over the duties of organizing Marmora and district in Mr. Graham's interests.

### MR. THOMPSON NOT RETIRING

False Rumor Spread in Belleville Last Night—Will Stay in Fight Until End.

Rumor was rife on the streets of Belleville last night that the election situation in East Hastings had been simplified by the retirement of one of the candidates. The report was that Mr. Thomas H. Thompson, who carried the Conservative convention at Madoc on Thursday last, was withdrawing from the field.

This morning Mr. Thompson emphatically denied he had any intention of withdrawing from the contest, and stated that there was not a word of truth in the rumor. He is in the field to stay, he repeated, until the last ballot is counted on the night of December 11th. Mr. Thompson is completing his registration.

#### PTE. BUNTON WOUNDED

Mr. Benj. Bunton, 41 Pine St. has received word that his son, Pte. Benj. Chas. Bunton had been admitted to the general hospital at Galters on Nov. 8th suffering from gas poisoning.

Pte. Bunton enlisted in 1915 when he was not yet seventeen years old. He went overseas with the 6th mounted rifles of Kingston and has been in France nearly two years. This is the first time his name has appeared on the casualty list.

A brother, Signaller Wm. Thos. Bunton went overseas with the 156th and is now on active duty at the front.

### HASTINGS WILL PASS MILLION DOLLAR MARK BY SATURDAY

Everyone Get Ready to Celebrate—Big Parade and Public Meeting to be Held in Belleville.

Hastings County passed its objective of \$805,000 for the Victory Loan last night, and is now on the way to hit the Million Dollar mark. Just how soon that will be accomplished it is impossible to say, but it's a safe bet that the mark will be passed long before Saturday night. However, as some particular time must be specified for the big celebration, the publicity committee has decided on Saturday night. Therefore, let every citizen of Belleville save his or her voice until Saturday night and then cut loose. Get a top-horn rattle or some device for the making of noise, if your voice is weak. It is everyone's duty to whoop it up for the Million Dollar Victory Loan. Every automobile owner within a radius of fifty miles should be in town on Saturday night and get into the parade. Lay in a good stock of confetti. The red fire will be supplied by the committee. We want noise and noise and more noise to show that the good old County of Hastings has thrown a million silver bullets at the Kaiser. Front St. should look like Surf Ave. Canal Island, at Canal St. New Orleans during the Mardi Gras. Just wait until Saturday night.

Stirling yesterday was the scene of the most interesting happening that has come to the notice of the committee. Mr. Robt. Roy, who is a veteran of the fall in 1866, bought his Victory Bond, however, that is not all. Mr. Roy was recently granted \$1000 for his services on that occasion, but with true patriotic spirit he returned his \$1000 to the Government as a contribution to his country's need, and besides has bought a Victory Bond out of his own hard savings. The country has too few of this type of citizen, and Stirling is to be congratulated upon another evidence of disinterested patriotism which has become the rule from this loyal town.

Yesterday the famous British tank which came from the battle-field of France and has taken part in the Liberty Loan celebration in New York and the Victory Loan celebration in Montreal, passed through Belleville on its way to the big Victory Loan parade to be held today in Toronto. The original crew accompanied this terror of the land forces, also some American armoured cars were upon the same train. Trenton has taken hold in good shape the past couple of days and if the good work keeps up should pass their objective in a day or two. The employees of the Chemical works, and of the C. N. R. are subscribing liberally.

While Belleville is on the way to triple their objective, there is a large amount still unaccounted for this good old town, i. e. the Grand Trunk. So far these subscriptions have been going in to Montreal, but Mr. Evans is going after the central committee to give Belleville credit for these amounts, which will greatly swell the total. This is also the case with the Steel Co., and the other two railways. Belleville will have a showing, the like of which it is doubtful will be reached by any other city of Canada, per capita when these things are counted.

Keep your eye on the clock. It will tell you as the time goes how goes Hastings County and the Victory Loan.

Wotten of the publicity committee is responsible for this. He is to be congratulated upon the success of his efforts, as the comments heard on every side are most complimentary.

### FIRE AT HAVELOCK

Store, Houses and a Garage Burned in Early Morning Blaze.

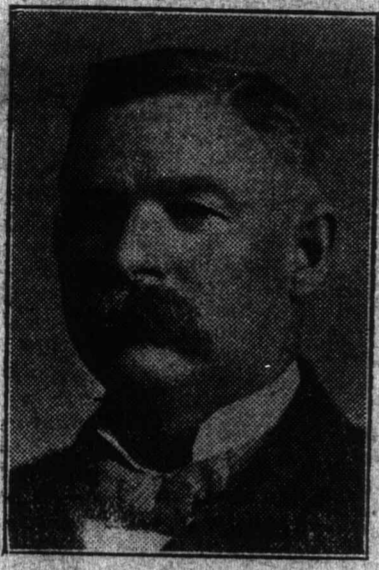

"DISGRACEFUL ELECTIONEERING TACTICS; LIE NAILED"

In Response to a Scurrilous Attack in Last Night's Intelligence headed "Disgraceful Electioneering Tactics," Mr. W. Herbert Finkle has addressed the following letter to that journal.

Belleville, Nov. 16, 1917

To the Editor of the Intelligence:

Having read in yesterday's issue of the Intelligence paragraph headed "Disgraceful Electioneering Tactics," I beg that you will kindly give me space in your valuable paper to answer the statements made by the "Prominent Conservatives" referred to, which I consider a malicious attack with intent to injure upon my character. I fully concur with the Intelligence that such a manner of conducting a campaign as outlined in the first paragraph would be mean and contemptible doing more harm than good but, Sir, I have never stooped to methods of that kind, which, any sane man would consider the work of a fool, to offer any arguments of that kind in a community where I have spent my whole life and where all the fellows know, as well as I do, that they are not facts. I flatly deny having made any one of the four statements as worded in the paragraph or any other set of words intended to convey the sentiment expressed in those lines. I did not even know that Dr. Gibson was Mr. Porter's physician until I saw it in yesterday's paper, but I did say however "first that had been informed that on account of illness, Mr. Porter had only spent a few days at Parliament during the

last session; that it was feared by some of his friends that this might occur again, leaving us as at last session without a representative in the House at a critical time and we hoped that at Marmora, Mr. Porter would see the advisability of withdrawing from the contest, allowing Mr. Graham an acclamation thus saving the country the expense of an election." That Mr. Graham was going to the Convention to tell the electors he thought in the interest of the country that the two Parties should have conferred and brought out a union candidate, but as such a proposal had thus far been turned down, he was offering himself as a "Union Win the War" candidate and as such if necessary, he would oppose Mr. Porter at the polls. "That a view of the foregoing facts, and that Mr. Porter had served us for 17 years, I thought it was time he had passed the honors on and in Mr. Graham, whom I have known since I was a boy. We had a man of moral conviction, who had all times been principal before "party" politics and always had the courage of his convictions and with that argument, I am pleased to say that out of 48 Conservatives canvassed, I was voluntarily given the signatures of 39. Now Mr. Editor, I wish to say, this is not the first time that some so called "prominent men" have made such attempts on my character which I hereby repudiate as not only unfair but either a misunderstanding or entirely beneath the dignity of a gentleman and in anticipation of a fairness to all concerned, you will give this the space it deserves, I am, Respectfully yours, W.
