**WEIGHED AND NOT FOUND "WANTING."**

We need not here repeat again the story of the charge made by Mr. Ryan, who has taken such a fancy to the Surveyor Generalship, against Hon. Michael Adams. An outline of the inquisitorial process that sprang up out of that base and malicious charge has already been given in the STAR, so we shall not now bore our readers with a repetition. But here is the report of the committee who was charged by the Legislature with the task of searching out the fraud and neglect, if fraud and neglect existed. Be it remembered this report, too, was read and endorsed by Mr. A. G. Blair, Arch Persecutor in the base transaction:

The Committee to whom was referred all papers and letters laid upon the table of the House on the 24th March last by the Honorable the Surveyor General, of lumber cut in Gloucester County in the years 1877-78 and 1878-79 and of all lumbers seized in the same County during the year 1880, beg to report—  
 That they have carefully examined the said papers laid before them and examined under oath several scales and officers of the department, also persons engaged in lumber operations in said County during these years, and from these papers and the evidence adduced, they find that the department has exercised proper vigilance in protecting the rights of the Province and collecting the stumpage on lumber from the Government lands and no special favors had been accorded to any persons.

 This is the report of four conscientious and intelligent men, but being of such a character it did not suit the depraved tastes of Mr. Blair. He took the sympathy of the House by storm when he asked Messrs Blair and Ryan if they were not satisfied, they had now gone far enough in trying to blacken his name and plunder his reputation. Did not, he asked, a legal investigation of the most searching kind, satisfy their greed for his character? Would they now, finding the proof they courted had failed to convict him, rise higher still in their malice, and override practice and precedent, by placing upon the journals what was intended to attribute a guilt to him, that investigation could not prove? Mr. Adams' speech was manly and touching, and there was not a member present to whom good name was a prize that did not despise the persecutors, and sympathize with the innocent accused.

The affair ended, but conformably with justice and usage. The malicious theories and absurd deductions were cast into oblivion, and the Surveyor General came

out as we anticipated he would come, bright as gold proven in the furnace. But the execrable malice that the persecutors tried to foist upon the House is not lost. It is sent to its congenial receptacle the St. John Sun, that hack of dishonor and every thing that is low and unmanly. Let it come: in the columns of the Sun is the only place for such baseness!

**THOU SHALT NOT BEAR FALSE WITNESS, ETC.**

We have been talking in this strain to our neighbors for some time past, but it has come to our own turn now to make reparation for bearing false witness against our neighbors. Some days ago it was reported up and down the town, and all over the Province, that Mr. Lawlor of Chatham had refused to accept the contract for putting up the Parliament Buildings—the same buildings by the way that little Robbie Ritchie wanted down in St. John—at the figures first named by him. We immediately wrote an article on the subject, considering the rumours of a reliable character, and also believing an exposition of facts to be our duty as a public journalist. We pointed out to the Government how it was necessary it should take some means to protect itself against building rings, by insisting on tender deposits as a guarantee of good faith. We pointed out that this would be unnecessary were not unscrupulous men like Mr. Killam abroad ready to form rings at any moment, to cheat the country, and delude the Government. The latter theory we still as firmly believe as we do any article of faith.

But to the point. We have met Mr. Lawlor, and the meeting was a little bit stormy. Mr. Lawlor felt aggrieved we should have published the article, and assures us he never had any intention of repudiating the contract. We are glad to know this is the case, and readily take Mr. Lawlor's word for the fact; and infer from the statement that he would be above leaving himself with ren like Mr. Killam.  
 Meanwhile let Mr. Lawlor bear in mind that we live in an age now when it is not assumed all men are innocent till the contrary appears, but quite the reverse. Every man is now assumed to be a rogue till it appears he is honest. So that Mr. Lawlor will see even had we published the article out of whole cloth it was only in the fashion of the public good. Meanwhile we regret the rumors ever got afloat, while we from henceforth and till the contrary appears shall put implicit faith in Mr. Lawlor.

**SOMETHING QUITE VILE.**

A few days ago the Provincial Secretary was seized with sudden illness, and was taken to his bed. It happened to be two days before the resolution fixing \$75,000 for a building in Fredericton was brought down. The next day's Sun with characteristic brutality insinuated that Mr. Wedderburn was only "playing sick," thus closing its infamous paragraph:

We don't suppose that the Secretary's indisposition affects his responsibility to his constituents in this connection.  
 At the time the base editor penned the above, Mr. Wedderburn was lying very ill of a burning fever, and gentlemen of every political class were hastening to see him.  
 It is a base man that will carry political feeling into the private circle, and in the opposition ranks, John Livingstone stood alone in this despicable insinuation. The most active of Mr. Wedderburn's political foes were among the first to run to his bedside to learn of his illness, and it was alone left to the low editor of the Sun, to act the ghoul, and sneer over the sick man couch. In the history of newspaper degradation we have only one other such example, and that is Mr. D. G. **TAKING SHANK'S MARE.**



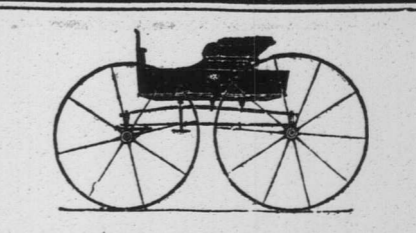
