## First School Fair A Success

Douglstown Pupils Hold Exhibition of Products of School Garden and Plots

Douglstown's first school fair was held in the school house yesterday, and was a grand success. There were 74 pupils with exhibits, making a very creditable showing. For purposes of comparison, a few vegetables of superior quality, were sent from the Miramichi Lumber Company's farm and by Charles Johnston. The school as a whole, showed excellent specimens of flax, red clover, (second crop this year) and alfalfa (third crop this year) raised in the school garden. The raising of alfalfa first sown last year, has been demonstrated a success.

## T. J. L. Discuss Conscription of Wealth

Demand Cheaper Food.—Public Ownership Suggested.—Potato Committee to meet.—Scott Act Repeal

The regular meeting of the Newcastle Town Improvement League was held in the Police Court Room last Tuesday night Sept 25th, presided James M. Troy in the chair. Others present were Revs. P. W. Dixon and C. W. Squires and Messrs. J. Ander, C. E. Fish, F. E. Locke, A. McCabe and the Secretary, H. H. Stuart.

The first item of discussion was the resolution on Conscription held over from last meeting. Since that time the first section of the resolution, which favored Selective Conscription without a referendum, has been passed by parliament leaving section 2 to be dealt with, and reading as follows: "2—Further, being thoroughly convinced that the war cannot be successfully prosecuted without an abundance of money and material, this League also expresses its conviction that wealth, labor and every national utility should be placed at the disposal of the government, in this crisis, so that all the country's resources, whether of wealth or manhood may be made to contribute to the successful conclusion of this devastating war."

This section was again moved by Rev. Dr. Squires and in the absence of the original seconder, Rev. S. Gray, was seconded by Andrew McCabe.

It brought out a most spirited discussion, in which nearly all participated.

H. H. Stuart asked the mover to define just what was meant by conscription of wealth, as the term, as used by the public had different meanings.

Rev. Dr. Squires said that not very much had been done re. conscription of wealth, the using of national resources for the prosecution of the war. There was a food controller who is asking housewives to economize. This is all very good in its way, but something more radical is needed. The controller evidently needs more power, should be more like Mr. Hoover of the U. S. A., or, perhaps, Lord Rhonda of Britain.

Dr. Squires, continuing, said he was hardly in a position to exactly define what is meant by Conscription of Wealth. The big men should be willing, or should be compelled, to give up their wealth to win the war. The surplus profits should be taken. It was not of much use to ask people to save. Something more radical should be done.

Rev. Father Dixon said that the food controller has done nothing but give good advice. Heads of families doubtless see the necessity of economy but boarders and strangers may not look at it in that way.

It is very extraordinary, continued Rev. Father Dixon, that butter costs 45 to 50 cents a pound at this time of year, and seems likely to rise to 70 cents. Cold storage companies have representatives around buying up produce in order to corner the market.

Ex Mayor C. E. Fish said that this was a very large question of which he had often thought. He was as deeply impressed as was Rev. Father Dixon over the little progress made on this question. If people couldn't get prices reduced, they would have to force up prices of everything they had to dispose of.

Rev. Dr. Squires pointed out that some articles were made in Germany and the war had boosted the prices. Rev. Father Dixon replied that butter and eggs should be produced as cheaply in Canada now as five years ago.

Rev. Father Dixon said there should be a market in town, and farmers not taxed for coming in with produce from a distance.

Mr. Fish and Mr. McCabe strongly supported the suggestion of a market. Rev. Dr. Squires wondered how things could be set straight. There were many farmers, all of whom voted, who might resent the lowering of food prices.

Rev. Father Dixon said that it was not the farmers, but the combines, who were making money. All things should be lowered in price equally.

H. H. Stuart said that the remedy for the high cost of living did not lie in the Income Tax, as it exists at present for the man whose income is taxed is, as a manufacturer, merchant or landlord, is able to make someone else pay his income tax for

him; it does not lie in the mere fixing of maximum prices, as such action does not guard against decreasing of the wages of their employees by those who lose by the fixing of prices; it does not lie in any action that leaves the public utilities of the country in private hands. So long as there is private ownership of such public utilities as railways and ships, on which all have to travel, of coal, which all have to use; of land which the owner cannot cultivate without hired help; of houses not inhabited by the owners, there will be undue private gain at the expense of either employees or consumers or both. Let there be public ownership and operation of all public utilities, as demanded by the Independent Labor Party, which represents the organized workmen of the country.

Let the public, represented by the government of the day, employ the workmen and pay them the full value of their labor and sell the product to the customer at the actual cost of production and distribution, everyone connected with the transaction receiving the full value of his or her work, all profit over and above such full value of the work performed being done away with. This remedy which is being acknowledged by an ever increasing proportion of the people of every country, is the only one for the improper prices and conditions complained of.

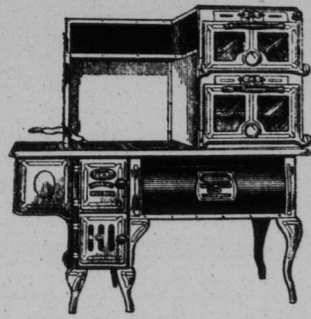
Rev. Dr. Squires said that the ideal state spoken of by Mr. Stuart was one we look forward to as we look forward to the millennium. We hope to have a Socialist State, but it will take time. The question is, what shall we do now to better our conditions?

Rev. Father Dixon said that all public utilities such as railways should be run by the government. Promoters had got railway franchises and assistance for nothing, had made all the money they could, and let the roads run down.

The resolution was carried unanimously. Rev. Father Dixon asked what about the potatoes that had been hoarded by a committee of the T. J. L. and Town Council.

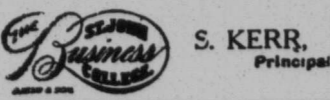

### School Exhibitions Are Held

The Canham School Exhibition was held in the Grammar School Assembly Room Friday afternoon. The entries were very numerous and made a most creditable showing. Among the exhibits were many samples of each of the following: Potatoes, turnips, carrots, parsnips, beets, pumpkins, corn, onions, tomatoes, beans, etc.; cultivated flowers; mounted plants; drawings from nature; collection of weed seeds and wild flowers; furniture made by pupils in the manual training department; preserves and pickles; collection of native furs; collection of native feathers; plain and fancy sewing and knitted goods; etc.

There were 193 Exhibitors, all pupils. Mr. Geo. E. Fisher, proprietor of the Woodburn farm, sent a model exhibit of all the ordinary vegetables, along with samples of Leeks, summer savory, thyme, peppers, mint, etc. all raised on his own farm. Among them were onions weighing two pounds apiece. He donated the whole exhibit to the Red Cross.

The judges of the pupils' exhibits were: Vegetables and grain—Geo. Fisher, James Brammer. Fancy Work—Mrs. Charles Cassidy, and Mrs. F. H. McNaught. Manual work—R. W. S. Manzer. Educational Exhibit (Drawing, etc.) and flowers—Miss Ida Lynch and Mr. F. A. Dixon.

The judging was done in the forenoon, and the exhibition was thrown open to the public at 2 o'clock, when a very large number of citizens and quite a few outsiders came to inspect the work. All were delighted at the evidences of thrift and ability displayed.

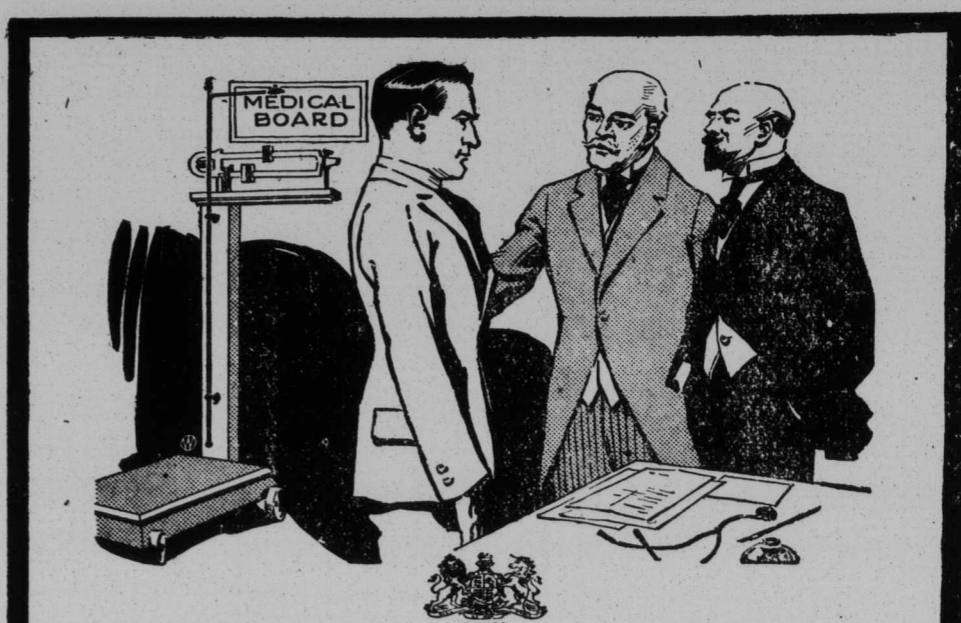

Remember that the first class to be called includes only men between the ages of 20 and 34, both inclusive, who are unmarried or widowers without children, those married after July 6, 1917, being deemed single for the purposes of the Act.  
Medical Boards are now being established throughout Canada. These Boards will examine, free of charge and obligation, all men who wish to be examined as to their physical fitness for military service. They will tell you in a very short time whether your physical condition absolves you from the call or makes you liable for selection.  
It is important that you obtain this information as soon as possible. A certificate of unfitness from a Medical Board will secure for you freedom from responsibility under the Military Service Act from any Exemption Tribunal. A certificate of fitness will not preclude an appeal for exemption on any ground.  
In order that you may be able to plan your future with certainty, visit a Medical Board as soon as possible and find out if you are liable to be selected. Your family and your employer are interested as well as yourself.

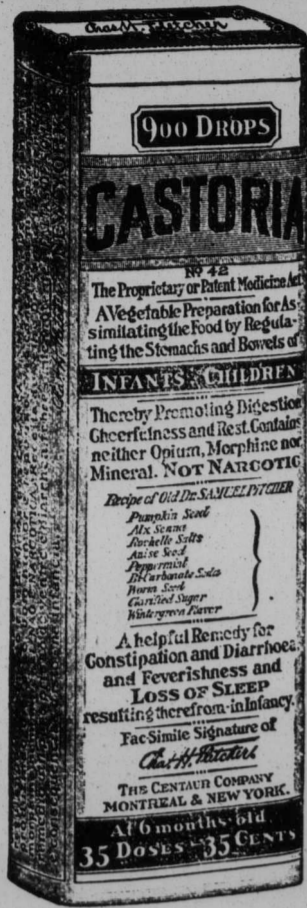

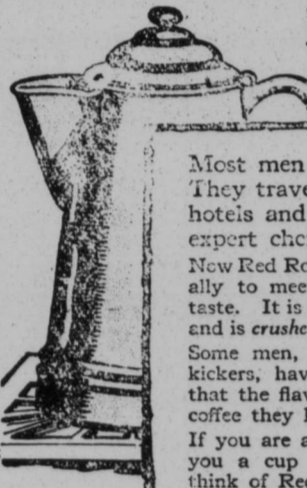

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held on the 20th, Mayor Morrissy in the chair. Aldermen present: Doyle, Durick, Kingston, Ritchie, J. Russell, P. Russell, Sargeant and Troy.  
A telegram was read from the Secretary of the N. B. Union of Municipalities stating that the Convention has been postponed till some time next month.  
Notice was filed, and Ald. Durick, the Mayor and Ald. Ritchie were appointed delegates to the Convention.  
A letter was read from the Canadian Allis-Chalmers Ltd. in which they offered the town a motor-driven Turbine pump similar to the one ordered last year, which they had been unable to supply, and  
It was resolved, on motion of Ald. J. Russell and Sargeant, "That the Town of Newcastle purchase the motor-driven pump offered by the Canadian Allis-Chalmers Ltd. in their letter of Sept. 7th, provided that the price is the same as that of the pump offered last year (\$2135.00) and that the Company guarantee the pump to give satisfactory operation on a thirty days' test, and that the conditions be the same as laid down in contract.  
A request from a number of employees at the Power House for an increase of wages of twenty-five cents a day each was read and on motion of Ald. Durick and Ritchie was received and referred to the Light & Water Committee for a recommendation at next meeting.

**THE WAR**

The war situation in Russia and Roumania is brighter for the Allies the last few days. The Germans have, since their capture of Riga, also captured the whole right bank of the Duna river for a considerable distance above Riga, but they have not advanced any great distance eastward from that river for the Russians are resisting strongly in that region. The German advance in Roumania has made little or no headway for some time.

In Russia there are revolutions and counter-revolutions, yet the government of Kerensky seems to hold power with a fair degree of security.

On the western front the British armies, the past week, advanced a mile along an eight mile front, gaining eight square miles from the enemy and holding it. The Canadians and Australians continue to distinguish themselves in every contest.

The German submarines, always a terrible menace, appear to be doing less damage the last few weeks than formerly.

China has decided to send 24,000 soldiers to Europe, and, if transportation can be procured, is reported willing to send 300,000.

Argentina, a South American State, with some seven or eight million people, nearly all White, appears to be on the brink of making war on Germany.

Germany and Austria have answered the Pope's peace terms, practically accepting the suggestions of His Holiness that the warring nations agree to a return to pre-war conditions, the final status of Poland, Alsace-Lorraine and Italian Austria and the amount of indemnity for Belgium and Serbia to be settled by negotiation. The Allies replied to the Pope's proposals some time ago insisting that negotiations were impossible with the present German government.

"In reply I would state that this petition will receive attention just as soon as the Bill in its final amended form" (the bill to authorize the Government to suspend the Scott Act by a declaration) "is received from the King's Printer. The Act is at present available only in the form in which it was passed by the House of Commons, but some amendments were made in the Senate. These amendments do not, I believe, affect the section dealing with the suspension of the Act without a vote. You may rest assured that the matter will be attended to at the earliest opportunity."

## FIRST MEN TO BE CALLED TO COLORS

Ottawa, Sept. 22—Class "A" men only will be called to the colors when the first proclamation is issued under the terms of the Military Service Act. In this class are men fit, from the medical point of view, for actual combatant service. The call for reinforcements from General Currie is for fighting men, and the first drafts will be for such a need. Men in the lower medical classification will not be required to go on active service perhaps for some considerable time, even if at all. There is, of course no guarantee that "B" men will never be called to the colors. Future developments will depend on the war situation and military requirements.
