Strychnine is one of the most common forms of poisoning and very often proves fatal despite every effort.

Symptoms: There is uneasiness, an anxious appearance, and panting, followed by acute muscular spasms at intervals which affect The whole body, stiffening the limbs and causing the animal to fell to the ground. The jaws are locked, the lips drawn back producing a characteristic sardonic grin, the spine is arched or curved, breathing very eyes prominent and the heart action tumultuous. After convulzion the muscles relax, and there is an interval of quiescence until another paroxysm occurs. Death comes during one of the spasms, and is due to asphyxia.

Antidote: Give an emetic as in Arsenic. Follow with from two teaspoons to one tablespoonful of the





### Here and There

Under the joint Canadian-British Government scheme, 3,000 families are being brought to Alberta this year and the first party of families will arrive in April. They will first be guaranteed employment and later will take up their own land.

Henry E. Suckling, Treasurer of the Canadian Pacific Railway since 1908, died recently at Atlantic City after an illness of several months. He was born at Gibraltar in 1851 and had been associated with rail-ways in a treasury capacity since his early manhood.

J. C. Mitchell, of Dahinda, Sask., known as the "world's champion wheat grower" returned home recently from a lecture tour of the British Isles. "Go West, young man, go West," is his advice to all who wish to try their fortunes in the Dominion.

Speaking at Toronto, Hon. Charles McCrea, Minister of Mines for Ontario, said that the estimated output of the mines of the province this year will be around \$75,000,000. In regard to gold he stated that by 1928 Ontario was expected to top the total production of the United States.

A new Silver Trophy donated by the English Football Association to the Dominion of Canada Football Association for annual competition among Canadian clubs has arrived in Canada and will be on exhibition at Canadian Pacific stations at Mont-real, Toronto, Winnipeg and right across the West.

An expedition which will try to climb Mount Logan (19.359 feet) in the Yukon, the loftiest peak in Canada, is to leave Vancouver in April. It will be headed by A. H. McCarthy and Col. W. E. Foster, of Vancouver, and six other gentlemen, including a representative of the English Alpine Club, will complete the party. plete the party.

Agricultural products in the Province of Manitoba during the year 1924 reached a total estimated value of \$164,312.857, according to figures issued by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. This amount is nearly double that of the previous year and is accounted for largely by the big upturn in the price of wheat.

The shield which was taken from the gates of Old Quebec when the city was captured by General Wolfe, and now in the possession of the town of Hastings, will be returned to the Ancient Capital. The Hastings Council have decided to return the shield which was presented to them by General Wolfe Murray, a descendant of the famous soldier.

Miss Ethel Loginska, temperamental pianist, gave another taste of her quality when she lectured a socially prominent audience for coughing in the middle of a concert at Englewood, N.J. "If you can't control yourselves, please don't stay here," she remarked. About fifteen disgruntled members of the audience left the hall indignantly.

Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies have developed the idea of using snow shoes for horses over the heavy snow tracks of that region. In this way great quantities of supplies are brought considerable distances across trails that would otherwise be impassable to heavy loads. Trail Orders are helding their second great Pow-Wow early in August next.

Devising a new kind of motion picture camera with a built-in motor that is almost noiseless in operation, Burton S. Moore, proprietor of the Nictau Camps in New Brunswick, has succeeded in taking about 4,000 feet of film of wild life in action which will be shown in due course on Canadian and United States screens. He has been particularly successful in depicting every motion in that special phenomenon by partridges known as drumming.

### TAX \$7'500 FER DAY ON **ALL RACE TRACKS**

Ontario to Get \$175,000 More Revenue, says Hon. W. H.

Legislation to secure to the Prorince an additional \$175,000 in rev enue was introduced into the Ontario House yesterday in the form of a bill o increase the daily tax upon all race tracks, mile and half mile alike, to \$7,500 per day. Hon. Mr. Price. Provincial Treasurer, was sponsor for the measure, which received the customary first reading.

In explaining the bill, the Treasurer stated that it had a proviso whereby should the betting at any track for a seven-day period fall below \$1. 

### Many Distant Stars Hotter Than The Sun

Times the Heat of the Sun Lately Observed.

Estimating the diameters of ten of the brighter stars by separating their heat into a long spectrum and measuring the heat of the different colors and then calculating the probable temperatures of each of these heavenly bodies, was a work of Dr. C. G. Abbot, director of the Astrophyscal Observatory of the Smithsonian Institution, during a recent series of field experiments whose results have just been made public.

A star, having nearly three times the heat of the sun, was among those observed by Dr. Abbot. This was Beta Rigel, having an estimated absolute temperature o 16,000 egrees centigrade, compared with the sun's 6,000 degrees centigrade. Other stars observed with a greater temperature thin the sun were: Vega, absolute temperature, 14,000 degrees centigrade; Sirius, the brightest star in the heavens 11,000; Procyon, 8,000. The other stars were Capella, Hope to Exterminate Tuber-5,850; Aldebaran, 3,000; Beta Pegasi, 2,850; Betelgeuse 2,600, and Alpha Herculis. The last two have an estimated diameter 500 times greater than that of the sun.

Dr. Abbot used in this work radio-meter, constructed under the direction of Dr. E. Nichols, pioneer in measuring the heat of the stars. Utilizing the giant telescope at the Mount Wilson Observatory in California, with its, 100-inch reflecting lens, Dr. Abbot was enabled to obtain fairly accurate measurements of the different colors, even far into infrared. Curves were drawn, indicating the spectral distriwhite, yellow and red stars, and estimates of their prcbable temperatures were made.

### Vast Strides For Medical Science Now

culosis in 25 Years From British Dominions.

Twenty five years hence tuberculosis will be extermnated in the British dominions, or be as uncommon as ieprosy is today, Dr. C. W. Saleeby, spokesman for the London Medical Institute, has declared. He predicts that the greatest advance in medical science will be the successsul combating of tuberculosis and cancer, and the reduction of infant mortality o almost nothing.

The last twenty-five years Dr. Saleeby says, has seen medical science develope more than in centuries before, but bution in the radiation of blue he points out that this has been brought about by very limited numbers of medical men and scientists: drawn largely from Germany, Austria and the United States. He believes that to-day all the medical men of the world are vitally interested in perfecting the science of national health and that the result of this international ambition will be a perfect system of combating disease.

> The latest methods used 'o ready provided for a gradual decline in the number of tuberculosis victims for the future and, once health officers have been able to stop the spread of the disease, Dr. Saleeby believes it will rapidly disappear.

> The attack on cancer presents greater difficulties, and only the most elementary steps have been made so far toward combating it, but Dr. Saleeby predicts that another ten years will find science in a a position to begin an international movement to eradicate cancer.

Dr. Saleeby, who has been the leading exponent of the campaign to lower infant mortality in England, has figures to show that the ratio in England and Wales has decreased from one in seven in 1900 to one in 14 in 1923. He asserts that the ratio will be about one in 22 when the present methods of handling natal cases are in common

The new organization will be allied with the Bathurts Company, Limited. Proposat are to replace the rails on the Northern New Brunswick Seaboard Railway, the line leading from a connection with the Canadian National Railways near Bathurst to the Gloucester iron mines, and the petition sets forth the route to be followed by the railway as from near Austin Brook along the Nepisiguit River to 40 mile brook and thence west to a point on the Tobique river near Plaster Rock. The petition pointed out that the object of this railway is to "open up the vast hardwood area" and authority is asked to operate the railway by either steam or electricity.

The Nepisiguit Railway Company will have its headquarters in Fredericton and will hold its annual meetings here each April 15 it will have an authorized capitalization of \$1,000,000, and will have authority to issue 6 per cent bonds up to an amount equal to \$25,000 per mile Peter J. Hughes, K. C., of this city is solictor for the new company and he and two of his office clerks are the nominal incorporators.
