The Piedmontese Gazette of the 5th instant contains a letter from Civita Vecchia, of the 2nd inst., which states that the Pope had yielded to the persuasions of the Austrian Ministers.

A report prevailing in Paris yesterday, that the Pope, repudiating his late hostility to Austria, had revoked his declaration of war.
