

# **Famous Pioneer** Made Many Records.

Yesterday Hon. C. S. Rolls added laurels to his many triumphs by his flight from from Dover to Calais and back without alighting on the journey. He used a Wright biplane, and made his 21 miles journey to France in the St. John's. extraordinary short time of 20 minutes.

When we contrast this time with the 37 minutes when Bleriot took to make his pioneer flight from Calais to Dover we realize how much Rolls has cut down the time.

Hon. C. S. Rolls had a rival in this attempt. About a fortnight ago M Jacques de Lesseps attempted to fly across the Channel and back. He succeeded in making the trip from Calais to Dover, but was unable to make

the return journey. Both men were competing for a prize of £540 offered by M. M. Pere et Files of Rheims. The conditions of the competition allowed competitors to alight when the Channel was crossed to make preparations for the return journey and to renew the supply of petrol. Rolls did not avail of this condition but made the double journey qtls. to date. without alighting. This record will salve the English pride of pioneering by establishing an English and a world record at the same time. The macross in a British machine. Baron

Rolls has the sporting instinct in his blood. He is the third son of a talion; at Cambridge he represented

his 'Varsity as cyclist and was captain of the University bicycle team. He graduated in the Engineering School, taking his B.A. in 1898 and his M. A. in 1902 Whilst at the University he was the hero of the Red Flag incident.

Berlin, Paris to Vienna, Paris to Madrid races. In 1905 he represented England in Gordon Bennett race. In 1906 he broke the Monte Carlo-London record. In the same year he won the International Tourist Trophy at the great meet in the Isle of Man.


But his prowess is not confined to cycling and motor driving. He is a great athlete, holds a Marine Engineer's certificate, and is a certified aeronaut. He owns three balloons, and has made over 130 ascents.

In 1906 he won the French Aero Club's medal for the longest balloon journey of the year. His balloon flight was made from Paris to Norfolk. He is also a well known writer and lecturer on all kinds of road traction. In the Army he is captain of the London section of the Army Motor Reserve; and in the business world, he is the Technical Managing Director of Rolls-Royce, Ltd., British Motor Car Manufacturers, London and Derby. He was also founder of the Royal Automobile Club, and also of the Aero Club

of the United Kingdom. So long as a Peer can bring up a son of such grit as Charles Stewart Rolls, Englishmen will continue to love a lord.
