

## Sound Island Notes.

A Lunenburg banker, Capt. Cook. came here Saturday looking for bait. Squid were fairly plentiful and he had no trouble in getting all he wanted. He left again Wednesday morning for the Banks. Capt. Cook has 3.300 qtls. of fish landed. His first two baitings were from herring caught in this bay last winter.

Mr. D. H. Murray went to Burin in his motor launch last week. He arrived back Sunday after a very en joyable trip.

The Intercontinental Trading Co. sent their first shipment of fish, 150 barrels, by last Argyle. Mr. Parsons went along to see that the barrels were in good condition.

Mr. Steenman, of the Intercontinen tal Trading Co., went to St. John's last Friday.




