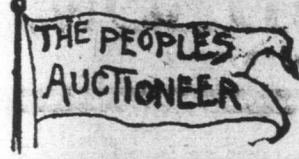

"Have I the Right to Vote?"

Dr. Robertson Emphasizes the Sacredness of the Franchise.

"Have I the right to vote?" was the theme of the discourse delivered by Rev. Dr. Andrew Robertson to a large congregation at St. James' Presbyterian Church last night.

"I make no apology for considering this subject in the pulpit," said the reverend gentleman. "The right to vote is a religious right, and there is no religious right that ought not to be considered in the quiet and unperverted atmosphere of the church."

"The right to vote should be rooted in your knowledge of the past," proceeded Dr. Robertson. "No man can be a decent citizen who does not know something of the human agony of divine wisdom and grace."

"Then again, your right should be rooted in your knowledge of the law of national life. I am not asking that the average citizen should blossom into a philosophic politician, but what I do urge is that every citizen who dares to lift his voice in connection with national affairs ought to have some acquaintance with the law of which nations will find their life."

Concluding, Dr. Robertson said he had tried to give them principles. The right of the franchise was not theirs, because of age; not because they were caught in the toils of party, but by virtue of their acknowledgement of the Book, and their sense of the sacred responsibility to which it kept them in pledge.—Toronto Telegram.

College Men as Stokers

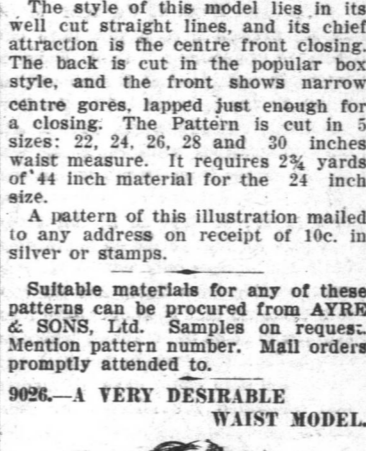
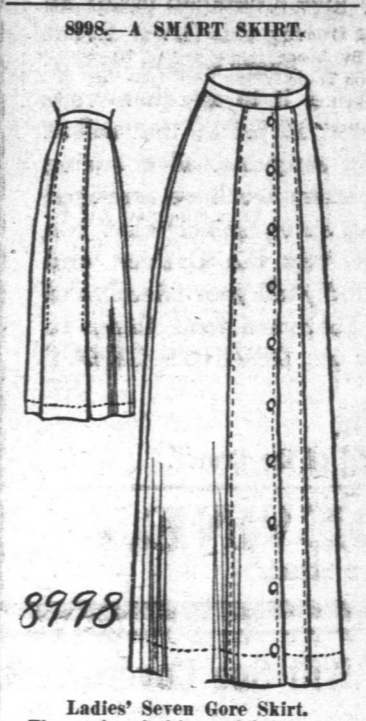
One Travelled 3,000 Miles in Europe on \$140 and Bicycle.

RHODES SCHOLARSHIP, 1912.

The Qualifying Examination for this Scholarship will be held in the Colonial Building, on Tuesday, October 17th, and Wednesday, October 18th, next.

Candidates for Examination are requested to have their applications lodged with the undersigned not later than Saturday, the 14th of October. The accompanying extract from a letter received from Dr. Parkin of the Rhodes Trust is published for the information of intending candidates.

"By a recent decree of Oxford University it is now possible for a candidate who may have passed the Rhodes Qualifying Examination in Latin and Mathematics, but not in Greek, to remove the Greek 'condition' by passing in that language at some subsequent Rhodes Qualifying Examination.

For example, a candidate who may have passed in Latin and Mathematics in October, 1909, may offer himself at the Examination of October 1910 for Examination in Greek only; and, if he pass, will not be required to pass in Responsions Greek at Oxford."

Strike Ended.

On Saturday we announced that the strike was practically settled, but that the endorsement of the terms of the agreement would be taken up by the Longshoremen's Protective Union on Saturday night. We are glad to find that the amicable arrangement has been finalized, and that the strong commotion of those concerned has not only prevented the terms of the agreement from being broken at Eston-geher. The many others who were not parties to the original dispute, but who have found means to surmount the original difficulty. We congratulate the parties to the settlement on the spirit of conciliation which has enabled them to come to an understanding with one another.

Cordelia Sold.

We learn to-day that the Cordelia, the well known barque owned by Bowring Bros., has been sold to a Norwegian firm. The transfer was made two weeks ago and three of her crew arrived here by the Mongolian Saturday night. The Cordelia is a vessel of large dimensions and has large carrying capacity. It is built of iron, and though old is of fine substantial construction. Speaking to Mr. Munn to-day he said that he believes the ship will be replaced by another vessel, possibly of larger size, and that in addition to canvas as a means of propulsion she will also be fitted with either kerosene or gasoline motors.

At Gower-st. Church.

That Gower St. Church has been wise in its choice of the Rev. Dr. Rogers as pastor was fully evidenced last night, when he took for his text 1 Kings 22: 48—"Jehoshaphat made ships of Tarshish to go to Ophir for gold, but they went not, for the ships were broken at Ezion-geber." The rev. preacher went on to show man's purposes, his failures and their cause. His sermon was punctuated by illustrations that no one present could fail to see the points which the rev. gentleman wished to bring out. From the start to the finish of his discourse the rev. pastor held the undivided attention of the large congregation present.

Killed by Dogs.

This morning when Mr. Peter Casey went to his field on Pleasant Street he was shocked to find that six fine sheep had been killed by dogs during the night. They were left out grazing and these brutes, which came from all directions, dug under the pickets with their paws and entered the place. Mr. Casey loses \$50 by this, and the loss is a serious one for him. These hungry and ferocious brutes should once and for all be destroyed.

ANOTHER STORM APPROACHING

—To-day No. 3 storm signal has been ordered up along the coast from St. John's to Burin, indicating the probability of a gale which will blow in an easterly direction and will likely be accompanied by more rain.

Will Sue Government.

Capt. Geo. Hann of the schr. Merle Perks, arrived here a few days ago from St. Lawrence. Capt. Hann is intensely indignant at the manner in which he has been treated by the Government. Two of his men were stricken with smallpox while the vessel was on her voyage from Sydney with a coal cargo for St. John's and the vessel was delayed for 55 days in St. Lawrence and held for that period on quarantine. A doctor he says only visited the ship once, coming from Burin and the captain contends that he should have been allowed to come to St. John's where he could place the men in hospital and where his ship could have disinfected and fumigated and allowed to discharge her cargo in a few days. He was kept in St. Lawrence for 55 days though the disease was of the mild type which prevailed here last spring. We learn that Capt. Hann will sue the Government for \$25,000 for loss sustained in the unnecessary delay imposed on him.

Blood Poisoning.

We learn from passengers who came from Harbor Grace by train to-day that Master Fred Buckingham, whose case is referred to in another column, is not likely to recover. Rev. Fr. Finn attended him last night and prepared him for death. He was taken ill about a week ago and developed blood poisoning through no visible cause. He is only 8 years of age.

mother who has most to do with bringing up the children and forming their character. The great salutes of the Church all had good mothers. The great men who made the impress of their lives on the world for its betterment, were almost invariably the sons of good mothers. It is of course possible that a good mother and a good father may rear up a bad child, but the general rule is that a good mother will rear up virtuous children who will never forget the example and the teaching of their mother in early childhood. Mothers, then, had a great responsibility. The crowds of young people under the age of 16—boys and girls—who frequent the streets of this city every night, and considering the conduct and the language of some of them one could not but tremble for their future. Their parents—especially their mothers—should beware before it is too late; they should know the company that they keep and the places they frequent before it is too late and before they are downfallen and shed bitter tears over the downfall of their children. The schools of the city are now open and in spite of this hundreds of children are to be seen on the streets every day during school

hours. This is a terrible injustice to the boys, especially when they are kept home by their parents on the grounds that their help is needed in the household. The Monsignor made a special appeal to the parents to make a sacrifice and give the children the advantage of an education. He appealed to mothers to keep a strict watch over the young girls and not allow them such liberty as may lead to their ruin, especially as regards their going abroad on the streets at night time and attending places of amusement. A public meeting was held in the schoolroom Wednesday night to decide where to build a public wharf. A great many sites were proposed but none accepted, and the meeting was given up as a failure. The amount allocated by the Government for the wharf is \$350, and it seems there would be a small lot of that left after a site would be bought to place a wharf on. Anyway, there is no need of a coastal wharf here. The Argyle calls at A. H. Murray's wharf and also at the Intercontinental Trading Co.'s, and any freight landed on either of these wharves is taken care of till the owners come after it.

LONDON, Sept. 17. The Times' correspondent at Peking says that the Ministry of War is taking a less gloomy view of the revolutionary outbreak, believing that should the Sze-Chuan rebellion continue it will easily be suppressed when the foreign drilled troops, advancing from Ichang, and other reinforcements, arrive there. The rebels are armed mainly with old match lock guns. The Government further believes that the Imperial edict, issued on Monday, and which should by now have arrived at Sze-Chuan, will have a quieting effect. No anti-foreign incident has been recorded as yet, but it is feared that unless order is soon restored similar outbreaks may occur at Hupah, Si-man and Canton. One certain effect of the rising will be the abandonment of military movements in Tibet and near the Assam and Burmah borders.

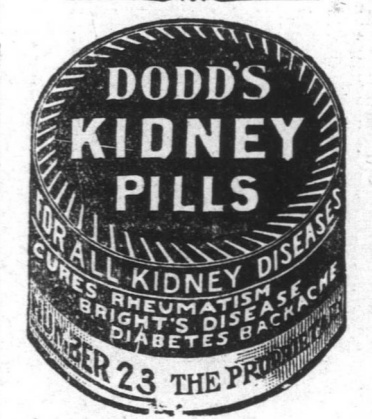
Two Men Killed From Ambush.
