Seoul. Dec. 17.-Harrowing details f their treatment by the police were told by the defendants examined at ne resumption of the trial of the 106

ker resumption of the trial of the 106 Koreans charged with conspiring against Count Terauchi, Japanese Governor General of Corea.

The prisoners have now outlined almost every torture 'conceivable, and many which are unspeakable and almost incredible. For instance, one prisoner said he had been hung by his hair, which pulled off his scalp. His head now showed no signs of having been injured.

According to the prisoners, the ingenuity of the police in administering torture reached the highest refinement of brutality.

As the close of the prisoners' statements approaches their stories increase in horror. The chief judge tells each prisoner deliberately to relate his story of the tortures and gives to all the widest latitude. his story of the tortures and gives to all the widest latitude.

The prisoners assert that the police endeavored especially to obtain the incrimination of foreigners. One man who was educated in America and who returned to Korea in 1908, to-day dwelt on this feature.

Many of the prisoners have named witnesses to prove an alibi. Up to the present nearly all of them have included the names of Dr. Samuel A. Mofett, president of the Theological Seminary at Pyén Yang; the Rev. George S. McCune, head of the Presbyterian Mission School, St. Syen Chun; Dr. A. N. Sharrocks, head of the hospital at Syen hun, and Dr. J. Hunter Wells, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who, they said, could prove their innocence.

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












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
