





ONE SIGNIFICANT PHRASE IN AS-OUITH'S SPEECH.

He said it was possible that this amount would increase and added that advances to our Allies might also grow, as adhesions to our cause of those States, which did not take part in the war in its early stages, came forward. 

Their Hereditary Foes

Great War will for the next few months be directed to the Balkans to watch what Roumania, Bulgaria and Greece intend to do in the premises. Outside of the efforts of the L'ntente Allies to bring them and cf the Teutons to keep them out, there are two factors which will govern their course. The first is the adjustment of territory among themselves. After the Balkan war with Turkey, Servia Bulgaria and Greece quarreled among themselves about the spoils, and Roumania took a hand in making demands for herself although she was not a member of the Balkan League which had waged war against Tur-key, and Bulgaria had to surrender territory to her as well as part of the spoils to Servia and Greece. This is a sore which has not yet healed and it is on this Germany and Austria are working, and this is the main difficulty which the Entente Allies have to overcome. Roumania has already taken a stand in stopping munition supplies passing from the Huns to the Turks through her territory, and Greece has already by popular vote returned the Liberal party by a strong majority to Parliament, and Venizelos has resumed the leadership of the Liberal party. The meeting of Parliament has been deferred until the later part of August, when Venizelos and the later part of August and the later par izelos will declare the policy of his party and will doubtless obtain the Government. His previous declara-tions have been in favour of interention. The other factor which is aterial is the harvest. The staple industry of these countries is agricultural and horticultural. Roumania is the only country among them which has a large export outside of these, and this consists of petroleum. Italy's Kitchener.

tories of General Luigi Cadorno. The son of a famous soldier, General Raphael Cadorno, who fought for his country in her great struggles of 1848-9 and earned the reputation of being one of Italy's military leaders, General Luigi Cadorno, Commander of the First Italian Army, has proved himself a military genius in every sense of the term. For he is not only a great soldier, but is a recognized authority on the wars of the past four decades, and a fine strategist and tactician, his war treatises and manuals being the guide books of every Italian officer.

The Austrians are well aware that they have fighting against them a man who knows every inch of the north and north-east frontiers of Italy, and one whose lightning strategy is proverbial in military circles throughout Europe. General Cadorno's thoroughness is illustrated by the fact that for six years he tramped the passes of the Carinthian and Tyrolese Alps, notebook in hand, marking a vantage point here and a death-trap there. And it was the knowledge thus gained which enabled him at ultimate manœuvres to outgeneral everybody and led to rapid

It is related that in the manœuvres of 1911 he set himself to play the part of a defeated general. Orders miscarried, reinforcements came late. general confusion set in and Cadorno's troops were surrounded. Then he set himself to extrivate them, and carried out a retreat which was the marvel of the Italian tacticians. One great advantage General Cadorno possesses is his prodigious memory. He never wants a map, and there is scarcely a path or village, however small, on the Italian frontier with which he is unacquainted.

Since he was a boy of ten-he is low sixty-five years of age-General Cadorno has been learning soldiering, and he is rather fond of saying that he has scarcely passed the elementary stages. A silent martinet, he never forgives incompetence in his officers. At the same time he is the friend of every man, for he loves them all, and is ever considerate of their welfare. In 1881 General Cadorno married, and he has a son and three daughters,

TWELVE MEN KILLED IN PIT CAGE ACCIDENT.

A pit cage accident, in which 12 men were killed and seven injured. took place at Bentinck Colliery, Kirkby, near Mansfield, Nottinghamshire,

on June 30th. Two hundred yards from the surface a descending cage, in which were fourteen men, collided violently with an ascending cage containing five men. Part of the floor of the descending cage fell out, and ten men fell 600 feet to the bottom of the shaft and were dashed to pieces. Two other men who were in the cage were killed. One of them was hanging by his clothes to a piece of broken iron, and he called to the survivors: "Take me off; I can't hold." They lifted him down, but he died immediately.

One of the men was saved through his clothes catching on a piece of iron. He swung for some time and then caught hold of an iron rail at the bottom of the cage and pulled himself up. The other survivors escaped by clinging to the sides of the cage.

THE OLDEST VESSEL AFLOAT.

Some discussion has recently taken place as to which is the oldest vessel afloat. The Ceres, built in 1811, is said to be the oldest British steamer. She is still sailing in and about the Bristol Channel. But the Jenny, which was built 128 years ago, with timbers of the old wooden wall type, i.e., British oak, is regar-1ed as the oldest steamer trading under the Board of Trade regulations. Her certificate of registry shows that she was built at Nevin, Carnarvonshire, in 1787. This ancient craft has weathered many a storm. More than once she has been driven ashore, but she is so stoutly built that she never ustained serious damage.



I must say we are having a pretty good time here just at present. Since I wrote you last we have been in the trenches twice and we have done some pretty severe fighting. 

Ge mans Despair of Zeppelin War.

Selgium Now Cleared of Count Zeppelin's Aerial Craft and the Enemy Are Panie-Stricken by Triumphs of British Airlighters.

London, July 15 .- The Daily Chroncle prints an article which, it says in an editorial note, contains "inner knowledge of the change which has come over the German disposition with regard to Zeppelins. It is stated definitely that since the triumphs of Lieutenant Warneford, V.C., and the destruction of the air shed near Brussels, Belgium has been cleared of Zeppelins and the ascendancy of Britain's aerial armadas is connoted by the suspension of Zeppelin raids on the east coast."

The article says that over a month has passed since the Lz-38 was destroyed in its shed at Evere, and the Lz-37 was brought to the ground by Lieutenant Warneford. The writer

in, in short, has been broken. I do not pretend that there will be no more raids while the war lasts. To suppose that argues a very poor under standing of German determination Yet it does ren ain a remarkable fact that just at the time of the year when, according to experts, weather conditions are most favorable for aerial activity, the enemy has been paralyzed by the discovery that he has now to face a new British war organization. only recently established yet marvelously efficient, as already proved by the inflicting on Germany of the most absolute check she has experienced for ten months.

"Information which has reached me from divers sources in Belgium, and upon which I have complete reliance, not a single Zeppelin has been left in Belgium save one, which was so seriously damaged on June 7, and which the Germans are trying to re-

pair as best they can at Namur. "All the giant steel and concrete sheds built at great pains and great expense within the occupied territory to shelter Count Zeppelin's famed air fleet are now empty. Some of them are vast enough to accommodate three of these huge destructive engines. They are now mere deserted halls. The fright-sheer, blanched fright-that followed the drama of the Lz-37 and the Lz-38 sent the wave of aerial invasion recoiling into Ger-

"It would be quite impossible to exaggerate the panic accompanied by the fall of the blazing carcass of the Zeppelin destroyed by Lieutenant Warneford and the blowing up of the Evere hangar and its contents. What perhaps most affected the morale of Lieutenant Warneford's victim, was a brand new Zeppelin, which was undergoing its first tests and had on board several of Count Zeppelin's chief

The Lz-38, according to the Chronicle's correspondent, was the most famous of all the Zeppelins. It was the Lz-38 which bombarded Ramsgate and Southend and part of the London area. He adds: "It had therefore a pretty busy lease of life before it blew up in the shed at Evere on June 7. Then

fifty men were burned to death. "Naturally the Germans have done their utmost to belittle and confuse the news of its destruction and have started a report that it was a Parseval and not this famous Zeppelin that was in the shed at Evere. Nothing can be further from the truth. I have talked with folk from Brussels who saw the Lz-38 come from its shed at 8.30 p.m. on June 7 and re-enter it, never to come out again, at 9.30 p.m., after a brief flight.

"There is no room for doubt, taking into account the Zeppelins destroyed by British bombs or by accidents of all kinds on the one hand, and on the other those that have been recently built under more or less secrecy, that we are justified in concluding that the German air fleet at this moment cannot possess more than fifteen Zeppelins capable of taking the air. This calculation is supplied by expert authority."

TO SHAVING-£ 2,000,000
