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


"I ought to ask your pardon for trespassing, my lord," said Cyril Burne, "and would do so, but that this lady has absolved me."



The Roumanian Campaign.

The news from Roumania has lately alternated so frequently between good and bad that it is well to be a little sceptical of the latest to hand, which happens to be good. With the enemy firmly established in at least five passes on the Transylvanian border and holding the whole of Dobruja as far north as Hirsova, one may be forgiven for doubting that he has been "definitely halted" or for thinking that in any case it is high time he was. But the particular mention of the locale of the late Roumanian victories gives the impression that there may be something in them after all. The situation at Predal and Kampulung has been, and still is, a serious menace not merely to Bucharest but to the whole of Roumania. These places are very near the great artery of Roumania, the railway line running north to Russia and paralleling the border. Possession of Buzeu and Ploesti by the Germans would be almost a death blow to Roumania, and they are both on this railway line. It is therefore heartening to hear that the attack has been held up in this district and turned back into several of the valleys nearby. Nothing further is reported from Dobruja where, despite the extent of the invaders' gains, the operations are less important.

There may be truth in the report from Rome that Russia is preparing a tremendous offensive in Galicia and Poland, but the lateness of the season would seem to discount its probability. Winter will soon set in there, whereas there remain several weeks yet of fighting weather in Roumania, given normal conditions. Such measures as Russia may adopt of this nature will probably be designed to assist Roumania by a diversion. This is quite feasible, and we should not be surprised if the present recovery of the Roumanians were due in great measure to the French victory at Verdun. The various fronts are now interrelated and interdependent as never before, and the fact constitutes Germany's peril. The coup against Roumania must go all the way or proclaim itself a failure, and failure to achieve the utmost will mean eventual if not immediate disaster. Verdun comes appropriately into prominence at this moment to warn Germany of this truth, for there is not a little resemblance between the two adventures. That the sequel will be the same and the result as evident in Transylvania as to-day at Dousamont we have every hope and not a little reason to expect.

At Cochrane Street Centennial Church

At Cochrane Street Centennial Church yesterday the Rev. Dr. Bond conducted the opening exercises in connection with the morning service, the prayer being offered by the Rev. Dr. Penwick, Superintendent of the Newfoundland Missions. Rev. Dr. Whyte, Superintendent of Missions for British Columbia was the preacher, who told of the great resources of British Columbia, its immense area and its people, and the work being done in the cause of God and Christian Missions. Dr. Whyte gave an illustrated lecture, this evening, in Gower Street Church, and to-morrow evening in Cochrane Street School Room on a "Summer Visit to the Yukon." Silver collection for missions.

At the evening service the Rev. Dr. Bond occupied the pulpit. The Roll of Honour was read by the Pastor, after the singing of "Lead Kindly Light," by the choir. The pastor then announced his text, "I will make a man more precious than fine gold," and preached a masterly sermon on Character. We cannot lose our identity in the crowd, the individual conscience gives the true revelation of duty. If your conscience says not to do that, which is wrong don't do it for any one. Individual character is the finest thing in God's Universe. Be yourself and make your influence felt in Church and State. We all have a personal responsibility and must give an account of our stewardship. We are all God's children. He has redeemed us and we must fit ourselves to live as His-Children. Quite a large congregation was present including a number of visitors now in the city.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFENSIVE CHECKED.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 29.
The offensive which was opened by the Austro-German forces on the Russo-Romanian lines near the junction of the frontiers of Bukovina, Transylvania and Roumania have been checked, the war office announced to-day. The hostile attacks delivered in the region of Negri, south of Dorna Watra were repelled by the fire of the defenders.

ROMANIANS SUCCESSFUL.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 29.
Roumanian troops on the Muldavi frontier won another success over the Austro-German forces, the war office announced to-day. In Trotus valley they recaptured Piscol, from the vicinity of which the Teutonic troops are fleeing in disorder, the statement declares. In Usual Valley a Roumanian attack was also successful, ten officers and 300 men, together with five machine guns and a large quantity of war material being captured by our forces. In Jull valley the Austro-Germans, which had advanced to the west were defeated, leaving 1,000 dead on the battlefield, besides losing 450 prisoners and six machine guns. The Austro-Germans right wing in the region of Dragostavele, to the northeast of Campolung, was repulsed by Roumanian counter attacks, losing five machine guns, two trench mortars, besides two hundred men prisoners.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, Oct. 29.
On the Somme front we scored some progress in Sally Sailles and Blachecourt. North of Verdun artillery activity without any infantry action. Eastern Army.—On the left bank of the Struma the British troops repelled a Bulgarian counter attack. In Ormanli region, on the Cerna, the Serbs scored further progress. In a brilliant engagement the French troops captured Cardilovo village. Further to the left, between Kenal and the Cerna, one of our regiments captured a system of enemy trenches. To our left artillery action continues very active. Our batteries caused an explosion in a munition depot near Valasina.

A TURKISH DEFEAT.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 29.
The development of a Turkish offensive movement in Hamaden sector, Persia, was reported in to-day's Russian official, regarding operations on the Caucasus front. The Turks who advanced in considerable force were

Incandescent Gas Lighting.

Possibly, the feature of incandescent gas lighting most frequently noted by casual observers is the great ease with which tasks, ordinarily arduous under artificial light may be performed, under the Weisbach gas mantle. The light has a peculiarly "soft" quality, difficult to describe, but which is readily recognized by those who have had experience with the gas mantle lamp. In its general effect upon bodily health and comfort, the use of incandescent gas lighting is decidedly favorable. The currents of air set up by the burning gas improves ventilation, tending to expel the air vitiated by respiration and draw in fresh air to replace it. Harmful or dangerous disease germs are instantly destroyed in the flame. The extent to which this effect takes place may be verified by placing a gas lamp close to a ceiling without any provision for interfering with the up-rushing air currents. The charred particles which collect immediately above the lamp are the remains of dust particles which before passing through the flames were laden with germs and microbes. Actual experiments have shown that the burning of gas lamps in rooms previously containing bacteria, resulted in absolute sterilization of the air. Contrary to the popular notion the temperature of rooms lighted by incandescent gas lamps is seldom markedly greater than under incandescent electric light, even under unfavorable conditions of ventilation, while in rooms provided with the ventilating facilities required by the demands of hygiene, the temperature in gas-lighted rooms is frequently lower.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
The British official issued last night says: This morning we carried out successfully a local operation to the northeast of Les Bouets, where we captured several important enemy trenches. Our artillery bombardment was very effective, and the enemy when driven from their positions was caught by our rifle fire. We took prisoners two officers and one hundred and thirty-one men. During the day the enemy shelled the neighbourhood of Eaucourt La Baye, and Martinghich, while our artillery directed its fire against the enemy front in the Messines, Armentieres, Guinchy, Commercourt areas.

TEUTONIC TROOPS RETIRE.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
An announcement is made that the retirement of the Teutonic troops has been forced in one sector north of Campolung, in the Jull valley, where two howitzer batteries have been captured by the Roumanians.

SERBIAN OFFICIAL.

SALONIKA, Oct. 29.
An official statement issued at the Serbian headquarters to-day reads: Yesterday, Friday, morning we had

several local engagements. We advanced in places and repulsed enemy counter-attacks, taking a number of machine guns and some scores of prisoners.

GERMAN DESTROYERS IN CHANNEL.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
Ten German torpedo boat destroyers attempted to raid British cross-Channel transports last night, but the attempt failed says an official statement to-day. Two of the German destroyers succeeded in sinking one empty transport, the Queen. All the members of the crew were saved.

VIOLENT BOMBARDMENT.

PARIS, Oct. 29.
The Germans violently bombarded Douaumont positions to-day, says a bulletin issued by the war office to-night. Nothing noteworthy occurred on any other front.

ON THE STRUMA FRONT.

SALONIKA, Oct. 29.
On the Struma front, strong hostile patrols were driven back by our advanced troops in the neighborhood of Kalendra, says to-day's British official regarding operations in Macedonia.

CONSCRIPTION ELECTION.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
The first returns of balloting on the question of compulsory military service, according to a Melbourne correspondent, showed a considerable majority voted to conscription. The incomplete vote was: Yes, 637,000; No, 723,000. Affirmative majorities were counted in Victoria, West Australia and Tasmania; Negative majorities in New South Wales and Queensland. The attitude of South Australia is not yet determined.

MORE VESSELS SUNK.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
The sinking of four more steamers and one sailing vessel is announced at Lloyd's. Three of the steamers were Norwegian, one Swedish and one British. The neutral vessels sunk were the Norwegian steamers Han and Oan, the Norwegian sailing vessel Kathrinika, and the Swedish steamer Jonkoping. The sinking of the British steamer Sparta was attended with the loss of four members of the crew. The safe arrival at Archangel of the Norwegian steamer Garibaldi, previously reported sunk, is announced by the shipping agency.

THE 'CHICAGO' UN-DAMAGED.

FAYAL, Azores, Oct. 29.
The firemen succeeded in extinguishing the flame in the hold of the French line steamer Chicago. The vessel itself was not damaged.

ATTEMPT ON THE LIFE OF AUSTRALIAN PREMIER.

MELBOURNE, Oct. 29.
An attempt was made recently to assassinate William Morris Hughes, the Australian Premier, at his home in New Victoria, according to a Reuter despatch from Sydney, which says the information was obtained from close friends of the Prime Minister. A man is said to have forced a revolver shot into the Premier's bedroom. The bullet did not take effect. A policeman then appeared, but the would-be assassin escaped.

ON THE MACEDONIAN FRONT.

PARIS, Oct. 29.
Further ground was gained by the French and Serbian forces on the Macedonian front, in the vicinity of Monastir, the war office announced to-day. In the vicinity of Ceran the French captured the village of Gardilovo and a system of Bulgarian trenches between Kenall and Ceran.

TROOP SHIP TORPEDOED.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
The steamer Angelika, conveying volunteers to Salonika, has been torpedoed at Fieros (?) says a Reuter des-

patch from Athens to-day. No steamer of this name is listed in available shipping records. It is probable the volunteers mentioned were recruits for the forces being gathered by the Provisional Government recently formed in Crete for the furtherance of what is now characterized as an anti-Bulgarian movement by the Greek subjects working in co-operation with the Entente Allies.

COUNTING THE BALLOTS.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
Only half the votes cast in yesterday's balloting in Australia on the question of compulsory military service, have been that far counted, says a Melbourne correspondent, timed noon, Sunday. The expectation is that 2,000,000 votes will be found to have been polled. Additional returns from West Australia, adds the correspondent, have reduced the majority of the opponents of conscription to 7,500.

CONSTANTINE'S AGREEMENT.

ATHENS, Oct. 29.
The Greek Government officially made known to-day: Following the recent series of visits by the Entente ministers to the Royal Palace, King Constantine has undertaken to further dispel the Entente suspicions of his sincerity, by ordering what he had previously refused to grant on the insistence of the French military attaché, that is the transfer of the third and fourth army corps from Thessaly and the sixteenth division from Epirus to Peloponnus, on the southern Greek peninsula. In both districts only a force sufficient to maintain order is to be kept. The transfer will begin Nov. 3rd. Such evidence of good-will on the part of the Sovereign is taken in usually well-informed circles here to indicate a non far distant agreement for the co-operation of Greece with the Allies.

STRIKE OVER.

ATHENS, Oct. 29.
The strike on the Larissa railway has been ended, and the withdrawal of Greek troops from Thessaly will begin promptly.

AVIATOR KILLED.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
Capt. Boelke, the famous aviator, during an air fight on Saturday, came into collision with another aeroplane and was killed, according to a Berlin despatch received by Reuter's by way

A brisk artillery duel continues in the region of Douaumont. On the Somme front there was intermittent artillery bombardment.

RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE EXPECTED.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
A telegram received in Rome from German sources reports that there are indications of the beginning of a tremendous new Russian offensive in Galicia and Poland, says a despatch from the Italian capital received by the wireless press.

HEAVY ENEMY LOSSES.

LONDON, Oct. 28.
The Teutonic pressure against the Roumanians and Russians in Transylvania appears to have been stopped definitely, says a telegram from Bucharest. The Roumanians and Russians, according to the message, are taking the initiative in the operations in this field. It is estimated by Roumanian officials that the losses of the Austro-Germans in Transylvania have reached a total of eighty thousand.

RUSSIAN DEFEAT.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 28.
The Austro-German forces launched a series of violent attacks against the Russian and Roumanian positions on both banks of the River Bystritsa, in the region of Dorna Futra yesterday, says an official statement, compelling the Russian advanced posts to abandon two heights.

ENEMY ARTILLERY ACTIVE.

LONDON, Oct. 29.
An official statement issued by the British war office says the enemy's artillery was active during the night in the neighbourhood of Les Bouets. Otherwise there is nothing to report.

The Rumanians Hold.

Falkenhayn has been halted and, at the moment, is being pushed back. Maybe he will recover and in turn push the Rumanians back, and they in turn will gain some advantage over him; it makes little difference. The eastern drive, the last offensive, failed the moment Falkenhayn and Mackensen were checked at all.

Hindenburg, who has always believed that the great effort must be made in the east, tried to make it as soon as he took command. He undertook to repeat the great smashes by which the Germans won their astounding successes for the first year and a half of the war. While the west front offered only a defense, the aggressive was to be in the east; there was to be another of these sudden and terrific avalanches of men upon a weak spot, hurling armies out of its path, irresistible until it had reached its goal. "That was the history of the Russian and Serbian campaigns of 1915, and the history of the French campaign of 1914 until the avalanche was stopped at the Marne.

So Mackensen leaped at Rumania's back in the Dobruja, while Falkenhayn launched his masses at her throat in Transylvania. The inexperienced and overconfident Rumanian troops ran like the Union Army at Bull Run, but the panic lasted only long enough to extort from King Ferdinand that terrified cry which proved his unfitness to his grim and dauntless old comrade, Peter of Serbia. The Rumanian army, green as war as it was, is credited with having as good stuff as any in Europe, and is beginning to show that it has. It stopped Mackensen, and now it has stopped Falkenhayn.

Whether Falkenhayn inflicts the next defeat or whether the Rumanians inflict it does not matter much. The drive has been stopped. A smash that does not smash all the way through becomes a deadlock. That is what happened at the Marne, and it is the best the Germans can hope for now. There are temporary successes in a

deadlock, but a smash that fails cannot become a smash again. On the other hand, the Rumanians can hope for something better than a deadlock; they can hope, with constant reinforcement, to turn the Germans back and become Brusiloffs on a smaller scale.
 Not only to the courage and good stuff of the momentarily panic-stricken Rumanians, but to the prompt and effective assistance of the Russians, is the check due. For once the Allies were not too late. Promptness was never before considered one of the Russian military virtues, and it was on the lack of it that those wonderful German psychologists built so confidently in their expectation of ending the war in 1914. Race psychology will have to go into the discard before this war is over; the slow Russian was prompt in the Balkans, where the nimble French and the awakened British had been too tardy to save Serbia. The Russians, however, would not have been the only troops to come to Rumania's aid if it had not been for the deadly threat in the rear that has held Sarrail's army motionless and clogged his steps when he did begin to move. That threat is Greece, and it explains the summary acts which the Allies have at last begun to commit in that country. If Rumania had fallen, it would have been Greece that destroyed her; Greece, by holding her

rescuers back, Greece by breaking her treaty with Serbia, did what she could to destroy that ally of hers, but she could not have saved her in any case her part in the destruction of Rumania would have been effective and decisive. No wonder King Ferdinand begged the Allies to be less susceptible of Greece's feelings and to think more of Rumania, who had ventured her life in their cause.—N. Y. Times, Oct. 20.

NORWEGIAN SHIP DESTROYED.

LONDON, To-day. The Norwegian sailing ship Regina of Siden was set on fire by the German submarine U-34 while the ship was on her way from Norway to England. Two of the crew were drowned according to a Reuter despatch from Ymuiden, Holland, to-day. This news was brought to Ymuiden, according to the despatch, by the Dutch steamer Hector, which arrived at that port with the captain and ten members of the crew of the Regina aboard. These sailors were taken aboard the U-34 from which they were transferred to the Hector.

STILL IN LONDON.

ATHENS, To-day. The recent report that Prince George, of Greece, brother of King Constantine, was to return to Athens from London, where he has been for some time representing the views of

the Greek Court, is untrue. Prince Nicholas, military governor of the interior zone, is expected in Athens within a few days.

FIGHTING ON WHOLE FRONT.

SALONIKA, To-day. An official to-day reads: Yesterday there was fighting of moderate intensity favorable to us along the whole front. We captured some enemy trenches, one trench mortar and prisoners.

FINE PREY!

LONDON, To-day. Lloyd's announce the Danish steamer SLE, 165 tons gross, and the Russian three-masted schooner Ingersoll, 239 tons, sunk.

FIGHTING FOR DEMOCRACY.

NEW YORK, To-day. Speaking yesterday morning at the old St. John Street Church, known as "Mother Methodism," on the occasion of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the founding of Methodism in this city, Rev. Dr. Chown, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, dwelt eloquently on the part that Britain and Canada are playing in the European war. After likening the Kaiser to King George and the third English and Canadian fighting trench to the American troops in the revolutionary war, he said, "We are fighting to-day for the same things as your ancestors fought for in your

war for independence and in your civil war; we are fighting to maintain the principles of Democracy and to make sure that government of the people by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

FINANCIAL HELP TO VENIZELOS.

LONDON, To-day. The Entente Allies have decided to lend the Salonika Government 400,000 pounds sterling, according to an Athens despatch to the Observer. The Government of Athens, the despatch adds, has agreed to place no obstacle in the way of reinforcing the National Army at Salonika, recognizing the Salonika movement as solely an anti-Bulgarian army. The Salonika Government is headed by the former Premier Venizelos and other Greek leaders as favoring Greece's participation in the war. Recent despatches from Greece reported that the followers of Venizelos were forming an army.

GOING AHEAD AT LES BOUEFS.

LONDON, To-day. A bulletin from the British headquarters in France issued to-day reads: "We made a further advance this morning northeast of Les Bouefs and captured another trench. The enemy shelled heavily various parts of our front south of the Ancre, elsewhere beyond intermitted shelling and trench mortar activity there is nothing to report. Yesterday despite a strong adverse wind much useful reconnaissance work was done by our aeroplanes; one machine is missing."

INVASION NOT IMPOSSIBLE.

LONDON, To-day. Field-Marshal Viscount French, Commander-in-Chief of the armies of the United Kingdom, addressing volunteers at Derby to-day said, "An invasion of the British Isles was not a mere supposition but a possibility. This we must be prepared to meet."

WAR REVIEW.

LONDON, To-day. Aside from the continued progress of the Teutonic Allies in the Dobruja region in Roumania and fresh gains by the French and British in the Somme region in France, there is little if any change in the situation in any of the various theatres of war. The Roumanians and British in Dobruja are still retreating before the German-Bulgarian-Turkish army, and are now endeavoring to make their way across the Danube at various points on pontoon bridges, according to the Sofia war office. On the Transylvania front the Roumanians and Roumanians are apparently operating successfully against the Teutonic Allies. Near the junction of Bukovina, Transylvania and Roumania and to the south near Campolung and the Jull Valley they have gained successes over them. Fighting in the Jull Valley the Roumanians are declared by Bucharest to have captured two howitzer batteries, which later were turned against the Austro-Germans. According to Berlin the Teutons have made additional gains south of Kronstadt and in the direction of Campolung. Following up their advance of Saturday the British captured another German trench on Sunday, northeast of Les Bouefs in the Somme region, while the French made fresh advances near Sully Salliesel and Biches. Heavy artillery activity against the British positions is being carried out by the Germans in the Les Bouefs sector and elsewhere. Again, according to Berlin, another heavy Russian offensive against the Germans in the along the Stokhod River in Volhynia, has been put down by the German curtain of fire. Petrograd reports successful reconnaissance by the Russians along the River Statok, a tributary of the Stokhod. The Macedonia theatre is still the scene of somewhat vigorous fighting, especially at the bend of the Cerna River, both sides claiming victories in manoeuvres in this region. Except for bombardments bad weather on the Austro-Italian front is keeping down operations.

STEAMER EXPLODES MINES.

GULFPORT, Minn., To-day. The British steamer Danubio, reaching here to-day from England, came into port with a mounted gun aft in charge of two gunners from naval reserve. While passing through the submarine zone, the crew reported a mine was exploded by one of the gunners. The mine was connected with a chain of mines they said, and all of them were exploded. The explosion caused the steamer to swing and tremble, the crew said, and added that they had fears for the safety of the Danubio.

A BLOCKADE OF NORWAY.

LONDON, To-day. Norwegian ship masters who have come into the east coast ports tell exciting tales of the blockade, says "The News of the World." They say it is well known in Scandinavia that Germany almost since the war began has concentrated her ship building resources on submarine construction. The Germans in order more rapidly to man the new boats work the vessels at sea with double crews, five officers and an experienced crew to work the boat and another crew on board being put through a course of training. The Imperial German naval ensign is flying daily off Norway from submarines attended frequently by Zeppelins and while the Norwegian merchant marine is suffering, the Germans are more eager to destroy the traffic from Britain to Russia.

NOS HAVE IT SO FAR.

MELBOURNE, To-day. The latest returns in the referendum on compulsory military service show the following results, although incomplete. For conscription, 738,000; against conscription, 887,000.

GERMANY AND NORWAY.

LONDON, To-day. Much space is devoted in the morning newspapers to a discussion of Germany's submarine war on Norwegian trade. It is pointed out that Norway now has lost about one-seventh of her total merchant ships. The percentage of tonnage lost inflicted upon Norway is declared to be

proportionately four per cent. more than that suffered by Great Britain. Concerning this subject the Times says editorially: "There is no possible excuse for this wanton and savage attack on the shipping of a neutral power. Germany pretends that the reason for the campaign is Norway's decree prohibiting belligerent submarines from entering Norwegian waters. But this decree was practically identical with the regulations already a long time in force in Holland and Sweden, which were unchallenged by Germany. A larger and more sinister purpose of the German onslaught is that Germany aims imperially at the destruction of tonnage during the war with the intention of supplying its place from German shipyards hereafter."


