





### Monument to Bible Translator.

There is at Vilvorde, near Brussels monument to William Tyudale, translator of the Bible. On its low flat base are inscriptions in English and Flemish.

Tyndale was a native of Glou ter, England, but his sympathy with the new learning aroused suspiction and he removed to London. 



### British Ex-Officers

NXIOUS TO LIVE AS SOLDIERS

Hundreds of British ex-officers are eeking new fields in which to fight. British soldiers of fortune promise to o be as common on the continent as they were in the days of the Thirty Years' War.

Russia at the present holds out the greatest attractions for the adventurers. After north Russia come Esthonia, Poland and Czecho-Slovakia. All foreign governments engaged in small wars or in licking their armies into shape are offering posts to demohilized British officers.

on the books of the Rusian E 100 officers who have volunteered to serve. The demand is for those with technical knowledge who can act as instructors. At the moment the only front to which the Russian Government is sending officers is to north Russian, so recently evacuated by British forces.

Shipping facilities are surrounded with difficulties, but they are being obtained. On that northern front, before the British left, the Bolshevists sought to lure British officers to their rvice A namphlet was issued offering them large salaries.

Russian authorities are still considering the matter of pay. As the matter is arranged at present British officers, excepting in case of flying officers, will receive the Russian pay of their rank, which in most cases is several officers to conduct aerial operations and their pay is even higher than in the British air forces.




### Rougemont the Fakir.







TREACHEROUS DIPLOMACY.

LONDON, Feb. 9. Germany has been trying to detach ne of the Allies from the extradition demand by offering to conclude a treaty with that Power, according to a statement attributed to Mathias Erzberger, German Vice-Premier and Minister of Finance, by the Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent.

### DIVORCEES MAY RE-MARRY.

VIENNA, Feb. 9. The marriage of divorcees will be nstituted in Austrian Catholic Churches this month, by an announcement authorized by the Pope. Fears have been entertained here recently that Catholic divorcees would leave the church altogether, because at present priests are directing them to re-marry efore registrars.

### AGREEING TO TREATY TERMS.

BERLIN, Feb. 9. Philip Scheidemann, former Secretary of Foreign Affairs, writing in the National Zeitung, says that since the Government, with the approbation of Parliament, had signed the Peace Treaty, it had tried to fulfill the conditions imposed, but since June last it had seen that fulfilment was impossible. Herr Auer, former Minister of the Interior, says he is well disposed towards the Allies and will place no difficulties in the way of the German Government handing over the persons

### FIRE'S HOLOCAUST.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9. At least 25 are dead, with some persons still missing, and thirty injured, some seriously, was the toll taken by a fire which early this morning swept through the Berkshire Apartment Hotel here.

### THOMAS PREDICTS CRASH.

LONDON, Feb. 9. J. H. Thomas, the railway workers leader, says that the state of the world is such that unless something is done speedily a crash will come, when nobody will suffer more than the workers. Official despatches, received here to-day, said a force of 2,000 Koreans armed principally with equipment him. furnished by the Bolsheviki, crossed into Northern Korea from Kirin, Manchuris, and attacked the Japanese post of seven hundred men, killing three hundred and routing the remainder. According to these despatches the attack was the initiation of an active rebellion in Korea.


