

Palestine is groaning under prices five or six times higher than before the war. Now, while there may be some excusa for an increase of 200 per cent. or 300 per cent, over the pre-war prices. there certainly does not seem to be any valid reason for so niratical anincrease. It shows as was notited out by a Jewish member of the advisory council recently, that the profiteering is not confined to agents and middlemen, but also to cultivators. The people who pay these prices are the Europeans, Jews and non-Jews. The fellah who grows the vegetables and churns the butter can dispense with many of our necessities, which are to him luxuries. His diet is wholesome. Bread of a questionable appearance and taste and some vegetables constitute the fellah's meal. It is the Jew, especially the European Jew as well as the European generally, who must have his accustomed died of meat, dairy and vegetable products. He pays for it in one of the highest currency, the Egyptian plaster, which, at the normal rate of ex-

change is equivalent to 5 cents. Palestine is saddled with a very high customs duty. The 8 per cent. ad valorem duty established for all parts of Turkey in 1861-2 was raised by agreement with the powers to 11 per cent. in 1907, by independent action of the Ottoman Government to 15. per cent. in 1914, and to 30 per cent. in 1915. The British army of occupation in its maintenance of the 'status quo' revived the 11 per cent. rate.

Out of the meagre sources of re-

venue of Palestine a large sum has to be paid every year on the interest and sinking fund of the Ottoman national debt before the war. Three per cent, of the custom duties have to be devoted to that purpose. And yet the government found it possible to grant. loans to individual agriculturalists to the amount of over a million dollars, which is more than the Ottoman Agricultural bank loaned. Palestine, however, will not be rebuilt by virtue of the unquestioned good fatth of the government, nor by the implicit confidence of the people in the government. These are highly essential factors, but no country can be rebuilt on good-will alone. This must ultimately be left to the constructive will and resources of the Jewish people operating through the Zionist organization. The Zionist ideal is responsible for the operation of overforty Jewish agricultural settlements, -sixteen in Judea, eight in Samaria, and sixteen in Galilee. Zionist energy, based upon social justice, has created some twenty-five co-operative agricultural settlements, where workmen cultivate nationally-owned land. It must be left, now that Zionism is an internationally sanctioned undertaking, to the Zionists to supply the capital, the labor and the intelligent direction to make Palestine a place fit to. house the Jewish people.-Acadian Recorder.

### **Old Salt Brings Burning Vessel to Port**

With her cabin bulkheads, mainshaft, halyards, gaff, boom and nearly, all the spokes of the wheel burned, the fishing schooner Ryse crawled into port at Pictou, N.S., recently under her foresail and two jibs. Only the coolness of Captain B. C. Heinwell, 69 years of age, saved the lives of the crew and the vessel from complete. destruction. 



NORTH IRELAND ELECTIONS.

BELFAST, May 26. H. M. Pollock, prospective Ulster chancellor of the Exchequer, was elected on a second count in South Belfast, as was Sir Crawford McCullaugh former Lord Mayor, in East Belfast. Sir Dawson Bates, who is likely to be Home Secretary in the new parliament, and Capt. Dixon, a friend of Sir James Craig, Premier designate for Ulster, were elected on the first count! Mrs. Julia Mcmerdie, widow of a former Lord Mayor of Belfast, also was elected in South Belfast. Joseph Devlin; Nationalist member of the British House of Commons, was elected with three Unionists in the West division known as the cockpit of Belfast politics. Devin also is running strongly in county

Antrim. Unionists have done better in the elections than they anticipated: Sinn Feiners worse than their prospects predicted, and Nationalists no more than they looked for. Unionists are therefore the only party in Ulster to-day not disappointed. All however are celebrating, Unionists because they have won, Nationalists and Sinn Feiners because they have made their protest against the partition of Ireland, and believe their protest will have its. effect on the minds of the people of the world. Unionists expected to win 35 of 52 seats, including those for the University, which will be decided Saturday. They will probably get nearer 40 seats. Daniel McCan, Chief Lieutenant in Belfast of Joseph Devlin, lationalist Leader, had hoped for 14 seats, but did not really believe that more than 12 Nationalists and Sinn Feiners could be returned, and he oved a good prophet. The counting f ballotts will not be completed probably until the end of the week, but so ar as figures go they show that Unnists made their greatest gains in Belfast, where it is expected they will ave fifteen or sixteen seats. Joseph Devlin is the culy Nationalist or Sinn Feiner who will have a seat for Belfast in the new parliament, if he derides to sit there, and even he was heaten in his own stronghold for first place on the poll by his Unionist opponent, T. P. Burns. His colleague, Alderman Byrne, was at the bottom of the list with only 133 votes or 10,000 lewer than his leader. This was due to Nationalists giving all their first votes to Devlin. Sinn Feiners did better than Byrne, but on the first ballot they were well behind Unionists, and as apparently neither Nationalists nor Sinn Feiners kept their pact to give their second votes for each others candidates, there was little hope for them in the second ballot. Socialists here, as in other constituencies, lost their deposit, which they have to forfeit if they do not receive a certain number of votes. In Antrim things are going about as expected, Unionists this evening being pretty certain of six of sevn seats, others going to Devlin. Louis Walsh, Sinn Feiner, who was allowed out of detention camp to take part in he election, and who headed the poll the County Council election, is now learer the bottom of poll although there are a large number of Sinn Feinrs in North Aptrim and the Glens of Antrim. Unionist barbour headed the list with some 7000, as compared with Walsh who has less than 5000. #### Daniel.

The name "Daniel" means "God is

Daniel, one of the best known of the world's heroes was chosen, with three other Jewish youths, Hananiah, Mischael and Azariah, of noble family, by Nebuchadnezzar, from among the Jewish exiles in Babylon for Royal

For three years they received a special training and education in the language and learning of the Chaldeans and as was probably the custom with those set apart for the King's. service, Daniel received a new name -Beiteshazzar.

At the end of the three years the King found that the four Jewish boys were superior to all of his astrologers and magicians, Daniel in particular being distinguished from the rest by his power of interpreting visions and

Nebuchadnezzar, the greatest of the kings of Babylon and the founder of the Babylonian Empire, ascended his throne in 625 B.C. He is remembered also as the creator of the hanging gardens of Babylon, which were built to please Nitocris, his bride.

One morning Nebuchadnezzar being much troubled by a dream, the substance of which he had forgotten, called together the wise men and ordered them to tell him first the dream itself and then the interpretation of it, promising them large rewards, if they succeeded and death for failure.

Their reply naturally enough, was that if the King would tell them the dream they would try to interpret it, but that it was impossible for any magician, however skilled in science, to tell the King the dream itself.

But the king persisted in his demands, alleging that he had forgotten the dream, and adding that unless they obeyed within a stipulated time, they should be put to death.

The poor magicians were in despair when Daniel came to their rescue by undertaking to discover the dream and its interpretation.

After earnest prayer in which his three friends joined. Daniel went before the King and told him both the dream and its meaning. As a reward, Nebuchadnezzar appointed him chief of the wise men and ruler of the whole province of Babylon, and his three companions were also promoted to positions of high honor.





#### Home Rule All Round.

The text has been issued of the Home Rule All Round Bill to "Provide to the other wise men by reading and for the relief of the Parliament of the United Kingdom by establishing subordinate Parliaments in England, Scotland, and Wales, by making provision with regard to the exercise of executive or judicial authority, and for other matters relating thereto." It is presented by Mr. Murray Macdonald, and supported, amongst others, by Mr Acland, Sir Ryland Adkins, Mr. C. R. Thomas, Mr. Neville Chamberlain, Mr. John Wilson, Mr. Clynes and Mr. Tyson Wilson.

The measure seeks to provide that, on and after the appointed day—to be fixed by Order-in-Council, being not less than six nor more than eight months after the day on which the Act is passed -- there shall be established in England, Scotland, and Wales local national Parliaments, consisting in each case of the King and two Chambers, subject to the supreme authority of the Parliament of the

United Kingdom. These Parliaments shall have power make laws for the peace, order and good government of England, Scotland and Wales, respectively, subject to the limitations that they shall not have power to do so except in respect of natters exclusively relating to the portion of the United Kingdom within their jurisdiction, and that shall not have power in respect of the following among other matters:

The Crown or Succession; The making of peace or war; The Navy, Army, Air Force, Territorial Force, or Defence of the




