### Turks Owe Their Victory to Greeks.

HALF OF THE LATTER ARMY TURNED BOLSHEVİK.

LONDON, September 18.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Famagusta, Island of Cyprus, quoted Smyrna refugees arriving there to-day as declaring that Mustafa Kemal Pasha, the Turkish Nationalist leader, owes his victory over the Greeks in Asia Minor to the fact that half the Greek Army turned Bolshevik and rebelled. Immediately the Turkish attack against Atina-Karabehir was begun. The rebels, according to the refugees, stole army funds and looted wherever possible, shouting "Long live Lenin and Trotsky."

The refugees state the rebels burned towns and abandoned their artillery, which was in perfect order, although the Greek generals and clergymen vainly attempted to bring them to reason.

## Britain Will Not Stand Any Nonsense.

Freedom of Straits Must be Maintained  
--- Turkey Demands Large Slices of Territory --- France For Policy of Pacification.

**WILL GO IT ALONE IF NECESSARY**  
LONDON, Sept. 19. The British Cabinet takes the attitude that Great Britain will undertake military action alone if necessary, independent of France and Italy to protect the freedom of the Dardanelles. It was authoritatively stated after the forenoon's protracted Cabinet meeting.

**THE TURKS' DEMAND.**  
PARIS, Sept. 19. Bloodless settlement of the crisis in the Near East was predicted by Ahmed Ferid Bey, principal spokesman for Mustafa Kemal Pasha in a statement to-day, Tuesday. He believes the British will soon allow the Allies to the European side of the Straits. He says the Turks will occupy all Asia Minor up to the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles, including Chanak, where the British are said to be firing on the Turks, the responsibility for the warfare will be on their shoulders. He says the Turk is willing to occupy Chanak jointly with the British but are determined to drive the Greeks completely out of Asia Minor. He demands all Asia Minor and Constantinople for the Sultan, as well as all Eastern Thrace and Macedonia, but will make no move upon European Turkey, providing the powers arrange a peace treaty with them, and pending the outcome of same, will recognise the small neutral zone from Constantinople to the Bosphorus and not advance beyond that line as a condition of no designs on Constantinople. He welcomes International control of the Straits, providing Turkey has equal voice with the Powers.

**ITALY WITHDRAWS SOLDIERS**  
ROME, Sept. 19. The Messaggero asserts Italy has decided to send back to Constantinople the small Italian contingent sent with British troops to the neutral zone around the Dardanelles.

**FRANCE'S PACIFIC POLICY.**  
PARIS, Sept. 19. The French Cabinet to-day unanimously approved of what is characterized as the Pacific Policy of Premier Poincaré in the Near East, and the withdrawal of all French troops from Asia Minor to the French side of the Dardanelles. The centre of Allied deliberations on the Near East problem shifted to this city to-day, with the arrival here of Lord Curzon, the British Foreign Secretary, and the Jugo-Slavia Premier Nincichich. Curzon's task is to convince the French that the British have no selfish motive in their policy concerning the Dardanelles, but that the whole future of the Balkans and the relations of Soviet Russia, with the Near East depend upon safeguarding Constantinople from Turkish occupation.

**NEWFOUNDLAND'S OFFER.**  
LONDON, Sept. 19. Premier Lloyd George received from the acting Premier of Newfoundland a message expressing appreciation and full sympathy for the position taken by the British Government and promising Newfoundland will offer any assistance available.

**CANADA CONSIDERING.**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 19. "Such information as we have is of a wholly reassuring nature, Premier King informed the Press at the conclusion of the Cabinet meeting, dealing with the Near East situation last night. The Cabinet sat until midnight discussing the information at hand."

**KEMAL WANTS THRACE.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 19. Mustafa Kemal, leader of the Turks, has requested the Allies to permit his army to occupy Thrace, stating that the Dardanelles question can be discussed later with all the Black Sea countries participating. He said it was necessary that he occupy this territory in order to liberate the Moslem population, which he said were oppressed by the Greeks. At the same time the Turkish representative here informed the British with Constantinople that the Ankara Government cannot accept the invitation of the Powers for a Conference summoned to the discussion of the Dardanelles question, unless delegates from Russia and Ukraine are allowed to participate.

**CANADA WAITING REPLY.**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 19. The Cabinet Council was again in session throughout the day on the Near East crisis, but so far as can be ascertained it is not in receipt of any reply to the messages sent to the British Government and to the Canadian representatives at the League of Nations asking if the crisis is sufficiently serious to require Canadian participation.

**NOTHING FURTHER.**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 19. No further information was received from Great Britain, with respect to the Near East situation up to the finish of the Cabinet session this afternoon. It will meet again this evening for the transaction of considerable domestic business.

**REMOVING CHRISTIAN REFUGEES FROM SYRIA.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 19. Permission to send vessels to Smyrna to take of Christian refugees has been granted by the Turks to the Allied Powers, the United States and Greece. All except males between 15 and 45 will be allowed to depart. The latter are thought to be held for military purposes. Armenians and Greeks are dying by scores from respiratory and typhoid, according to reports reaching here. Twenty-two thousand French and Italian were evacuated yesterday.

**ADOPTED AT LAST.**  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 19. Final legislative action on the Tariff Act of 1922 was taken to-day with the adoption of the Conference report by the Senate. The measure now goes on to President Harding and becomes effective the day after he signs it. The Senate vote was 43 to 28 and came exactly one year, eight months and thirteen days after the work started on what will be the first Republican Protective Tariff Law in nearly ten years.

**THE WAR IN IRELAND.**  
BELFAST, Sept. 19. Ten Republicans and six Nationalists were shot dead in Erris County Mayo, when the Republicans, retiring from Ballina, were attacked by government troops. A massed attack by Republicans on Rathkeale, Limerick, resulted in the capture of the Court House which was set on fire by the garrison.

**NEW YORK CENTRAL SETTLES WITH STRIKERS.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 19. Officials of the New York Central Lines announced this Tuesday evening that a settlement on the basis of the Baltimore agreement had been reached with the striking shopmen throughout the entire system.

**TURKS WANT ATROCITY CHARGE INVESTIGATED.**  
GENEVA, Sept. 19. A request that the League of Nations send a neutral commission to investigate alleged atrocities of Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor was presented to the League Assembly to-day by the Persian Delegation on behalf of the Turkish National Parliament.

**WILHELM'S WEDDING IN NOVEMBER.**  
BERLIN, Sept. 19. The marriage of former Emperor William to widow Princess Hermine von Schoenbach-Carslath will probably take place in November next. It was announced after a family council of the House of Hohenzollern held here.

**ROYAL FUSILIERS LEAVE.**  
BELFAST, Sept. 19. The Royal Fusilier Regiment will leave Belfast tonight for England, and is believed to be destined for the Near East.

### 300 slid Into The Sea

WHEN THE STEAMER HARMONIA REACHED A 70 PER CENT LIST.

Only Englishman Aboard Was the Hero.


Gibraltar, Sept. 12.—Thirty women and children, drowned when two small boats, capsized, are believed here to represent the total loss of life among the passengers of the ill-fated Harmonia, which sank on Saturday, of Vigo, Spain.

More than three hundred passengers slid feet first into the sea when the ill-fated steamer reached a seventy per cent list. This was just half an hour before it took its fatal plunge. The passengers and crew, who had been waiting since noon for the heavy seas to abate so as to give them the chance to take to the boats, found themselves at this critical moment a wild and scrambling heap of humanity struggling amongst the violent waves amid pieces of wreckage, boat gear and deck equipment.

"It was like skidding into eternity," declared Baroness Krumfeldt, a merry little passenger, but whose gaiety was darkened since the wreck, especially after she was notified that her husband had not yet reached here. She was comforted, however, when she later learned that he was aboard another vessel which had reached Vigo. After the listing movement of the vessel, the struggling multitude in the water kept about about the ship and its boats until they were picked up by the life-raft of the Kinfauns Castle.

The hero of this scene was W. H. Judd, of Gravesend, England, the only Englishman aboard, who was returning to Mexico on business. He threw off his outer garments and leaped into the water and immediately proceeded to pick up those who were sinking. He personally saved seven women and children and helped the German officers to enforce the rule of women and children first. He did not leave the scene of the disaster until the German Captain and his faithful nineteen volunteers who stayed behind in a desperate effort to keep the ship afloat by manning the pumps, departed.

### Dry Garden Dodges.

**RIGHT WAY TO WATER PLANTS.**

Do you know how to water a flower bed? Most amateur gardeners don't. Using a can fitted with a sprinkler, they splash enough water about the beds to make the soil loak as if there had been a shower of rain, and think then that the plants have had enough moisture to go on with for a day or so—which is all wrong.

The right way to water is to use a can without a sprinkler, to hold it so that the spout is no more than an inch from the ground, and to keep on pouring till the ground is soaked, allowing a good two pints for every plant of any size and a pint apiece for the little things. It is the roots that want the water far more than the foliage.

Another good scheme is to spread a thick layer of grass, mowings or straw on the ground over the roots of your roses, fruit trees, creepers and other big plants, and to water that. The "muck," as it is called, prevents the moisture from being drawn up by the sun.

If there is a water famine in your district and garden watering is prohibited, you can quite safely use bath water, soapy or otherwise.

During a very dry spell practically no few falls at night. Experienced gardeners, therefore, now and again create artificial dew for the benefit of the plants. In other words, they sprinkle the plants, particularly sweet peas, roses, scarlet runner beans and ferns, with water which has been

stood in the sun for some hours. Water from the tap must never be used in this way.

### Devoted Nurse.

**DYING THOUGHT FOR BABY'S SAFETY.**

"Her one thought was for the child," said Mrs. Ruggles-Brise, of Hyde Park W., at the inquest at Chelmsford recently on Evelyn Taylor, 20, formerly in her service, who received fatal injuries through burns while she was holding Mrs. Ruggles-Brise's child in her arms.

While the family were staying at a house at Wickham Bishop, Essex, the girl was preparing some food for the baby, which she held in one arm, while she stirred the food in a saucepan which was being heated over a spirit lamp. A bottle of methylated spirit was broken and burst into flames, setting fire to the girl's dress. Immediately she handed the child to her mistress, who was in the nursery, and it was swiftly carried beyond reach of danger.

Before she died she said, "Is the baby all right?"

Life For Her Son.

Her motherly instinct prompted her to be blind to her own danger in her heroic effort to save her child, said the coroner at an inquest yesterday at Sutton, near Ely, on Mrs. Agnes Cattell, 55, wife of an hotel manager. It was stated that the family were on holiday. The father was fishing from a wooden bridge, and as their 6-

years-old son ran to him one of the horses of a farm wagon took fright. Mrs. Cattell rushed to the child, but was crushed between the wagon and the bridge and died a few hours later. A verdict of Death by Misadventure was recorded.

### Why He Went.

## Enquiry Into Manuel's Tragedy.

WILLIAM HIBBS, (Sworn).—I reside at Portugal Cove and am Local Constable at that place. I remember Saturday August 19th last. I was at Portugal Cove on that day. It was a fine day overhead and a little blowy. The wind was from South to S.S.W. There were boats out fishing from Portugal Cove all that day. A south wind blows pretty well out of Portugal Cove. The fishermen go off fishing in the Bay about four miles or four and a half miles. The first I heard of the accident was at about 7.30 on Sunday morning August 20th, when Captain Robertson of the S.S. Pawnee knocked me up and told me two men were astray all night and when I went down on the wharf with Captain Robertson a man named Isaac LeDrew of Kelligrews, who was on the Pawnee, had found the boat. The boat was found in a place they call the gut. I examined the boat and found she was twelve feet long, four feet eight inches wide and sixteen inches deep, spar twelve feet long, gaff twelve feet long and boom twelve feet long. The rudder was

attached owing to being fastened with a piece of wire. The sail was split into two and the remainder of it split in two and the remainder of it was up when we found the boat, the reason of that being because the boat was upside down when we found her and when we righted her the centre board dropped back. I saw a belt in the boat and it was in the well of the centre board, and could have been placed there by any person in the boat and after the boat turned over it remained in its place being caught. The boat was a wooden one and copper fastened. There was no mark to show that the boat got any hard usage. The tiller was in place but I do not know whether the sheet was made fast or not. The halyards that held the sail up formed the back stays and there were no other. In my opinion it would not be very suitable for a boat of that kind to be out in the Conception Bay with the wind that was blowing that day. All the boats fishing out of Portugal Cove got home safely from fishing on the 19th. Assuming the boat met with an

accident a mile to the southward of Kelly's Island I cannot understand how the boat drove into Portugal Cove with the way the wind was blowing on that day. The wind, in my opinion, was not favourable enough to carry the boat towards Portugal Cove. The wind would have to be west by south to bring her into the Cove. A south wind blows clean out of Portugal Cove and a north west wind blows straight in. The opinion of the fishermen that day is that the tide was running from the southwest. The only way I can account for the boat being found in Portugal Cove is that it might be possible for one of the occupants of the boat to have steered her in there. It could have happened that the boat swamped and did not turn over. The men would be able to navigate the boat down the shore by the rudder and the small bit of the sail that was left. I was in the boat when she was full of water and turned mouth up and she could cloths burst in the sail but not gone altogether. The sail was stung together and it could be planked across after the sail had burst that the reef point had been tied down the second time. I should say that after the sail was reefed there were about seven yards of shirting left. There was a boom and a gaff on the sail. The boom was fastened with a goose neck and the sheet was a single one and ran through a block and tackle made fast to a boom and received through two blocks on the thwart. The gaff was fastened through the iron that ran up and down the spar. There was a sheave in the top of the spar and the halyards that hoist the sail ran through the sheave and was made fast by one end to the gaff and came down to the thwart forming a back stay. The spar was stepped forward, about 6 inches aft of the stem of the boat. There was one pintle in place on the rudder and one was broken off. There was a screw went through the rudder with a piece of wire fastened to the staple and it was quite evident that this pintle was broken before the boat left that morning and was perfectly safe as the rudder could not come up. In my opinion it was perfectly safe for the ordinary fishing boat to go out from Portugal Cove to Kelligrews, and there would be no danger getting back. The boats from Portugal Cove were out all day going back and forth and I was around Portugal Cove all day and I saw no top or wind sufficient to prevent the ordinary fishing boat from going out any time that day. A good search was made at Portugal Cove and vicinity for the bodies without result. Owing to the live rocks and boulders on the bottom the search was not as good as might be. I was often out in Conception Bay in a fishing boat with much wind and a top as there was that day. There would not be too much to go out in a two handed punt.

But unfortunately he was talking to someone who had never owned a car, and who was just waiting for encouragement to take the plunge. People in that state of mind always cut such statements—and then have a sudden indignation afterwards.

Someone who did own a car was listening in and asked L. if he reckoned on a certain car. "Oh," he said. "Yes, never do. And yet if one buys a car for one price and sells it for another, the difference must surely be considered as a part of the running expenses. It certainly isn't a gift from God. Anyone can testify to that. Repairs Less Than Nothing. Then he asked if he reckoned on insuring it. He did. Forty-two dollars cov-

ered his insurance. That left \$102 a year for gas, oil and any repairs. Times he did not count because he turned the car in before getting a new set. Of course they made the depreciation larger but he wasn't bothering with that.

Apparently someone must have paid him for the privilege of making repairs, for the gas alone to have travelled those 12,000 miles would have cost him \$128 (allowing him 20 miles to the gallon) and that alone was \$62 in excess of his reckoning.

Make Them Financially Responsible. Someday the man who listened so eagerly to those delightful figures will look back and say: "What was the man talking about?" But at the time he was ready to fight anyone who questioned the accuracy of his informant.

I've been through the same experience myself and I know, you see. Yes, I really think it would be fine if we could pass a law making people who make these wild statements financially responsible for some of the losses of the people who act on them. Let's all write our senators.

### Newfoundland Memorial at Amiens.

TRIBUTES TO ISLAND DOMINION'S SOLDIERS.

At Amiens Cathedral, on Sunday, August 27th, 1922, commemorating the Newfoundland soldiers who fell in the first Battle of the Somme, was presented by Sir Richard Squires, Prime Minister of Newfoundland, and unveiled by M. M. Dormand, representing the Prefect of the Somme. In making the presentation, Sir Richard Squires said:—

"It is most appropriate that this, the first occasion of the formal presentation of a war memorial by Newfoundland to France should be at Amiens. Your capital city of the Somme has many historic associations with Newfoundland. From the shores of Northern France many sturdy seamen went to the shores and banks of Newfoundland. The bank fisheries are still prosecuted by French fishermen, and you have the French possessions of St. Pierre and Miquelon off our Southern coast. The names of many of the towns and fishing villages are of French origin, and on the south coast there are still a number of French fishing and farming families who retain their own language and customs. Amiens has been specially identified with Newfoundland because of the Anglo-French treaty of 1802, which bears the name of this city. Under that treaty, certain outstanding disputes between England, France and other countries were adjusted, and Newfoundland as a British Colony and fishing rights along our shores were particularly affected thereby.

"Our people were a unit in a great fight for a common cause, one in reverse and one in victory, one in the mutual agony of war. Our Newfoundland soldier boys appreciated the valor and friendliness of their French comrades in arms. They will never forget the courtesy, consideration, and the care of the people of the Somme, with whose lives, sufferings and deaths they were identified.

"On behalf of the people of Newfoundland, I consequently ask you to accept for your Cathedral this War Memorial and the Flag of our Island. The boys who have returned, the relatives and friends of those who have not returned, our whole people join with me in greeting you in this historic and sacred edifice," M. Dormand; in his reply said:—

"We have long known this race that our fishermen have met on the shores of Newfoundland, according to the Treaties of Paris, Versailles and Amiens. In yonder places we learned to know and appreciate them and to love them more than a century ago. Therefore, we are not surprised when we see them hastening from overseas to our battlefields (more especially Beaumont-Hamel and Guedecourt) fighting there like lions for the defence of right and civilisation. One can indeed say that they have died for France, and their self-sacrifice commands us to keep a debt of piety gratitude toward them. We feel for them, even as for our own dead, a deep fondness and gratefulness. Officers and soldiers from Newfoundland, you shall live in the glorious immortality of those who rest under the ground of our beloved Fatherland, which is given to the gallant defenders of honour and the world's freedom."

Among those present, in addition to the Prime Minister, were the Hon. W. R. Warren, Attorney-General and Minister of Justice of Newfoundland; Col. Nangle of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment; Lt.-Col. G. O'N. Conroy; Captain Victor Gordon, acting High Commissioner for Newfoundland; Messrs. J. O. Murphy and W. Hutchings, representing the Great War Veterans Association of Newfoundland.

The memorial is in the form of a marble tablet, bearing the Carillon head of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, and the following inscription (in English and French): "To the glory of God, to the honor of the Island, and to the enduring memory of those of the Newfoundland Contingent who fell in the first Battle of the Somme. Behold this stone shall be a witness unto us." Joshua, 24-27.—Canada.
