When, therefore, the Nationalist members realized that Sir William Harcourt was about to force his pet veto project upon Parliament in order to discharge the Ministerial obligations to the tectotal party, they took definite action in order to restrain him. It has been intimated to the Ministerial whips by more than a dozen Nationalists that while they were willing to assist the Government with Welsh disestablishment and with the promised resolution about the Hous eof Lords, they declined to aid the passage of the Veto bilf. This intimation, coupled with the possibility of nine Redmondites going insto the lobby against Sir William Harcourt's measure, and the certainty that many Liberal members interested in the liquor traffic in England and Scotland will also desert the Government, if they, do not actually join the Opposition, seriously jeopardi

Grip Still Epidemic.

The Sun's London cable says: The influenza epidemic does not subside as raspidly as was hoped. The official figuration of the mortality will show an increase in the death-rate in London. The number of deaths from influenza in the last two weeks is 769. This exceeds the total of the entire year of 1894. The stranga winter pestilence is by no means confined to the metropolis. Even in Scotland the death-rate in February was the highest ever known and 45 per cent land the death-rate in February was the highest ever known and 45 per cent above any previous February since records were kept. The influenza is peculiarly malignant in certain places. Thresisters died of the disease at Rochester this week, and it was necessary to post pone the funeral because all the mourner were prostrated by the same malady. 


