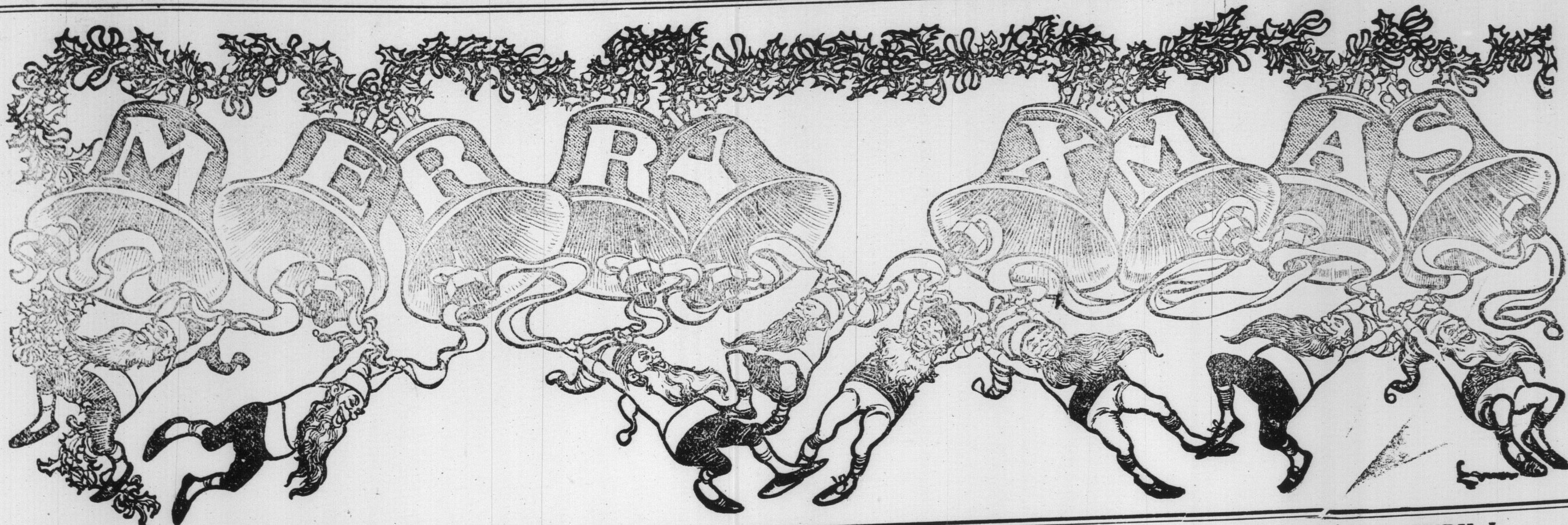

To the Clergy of the Diocese of Nova Scotia:

My Dear Brethren
The primate of all Canada has transmitted to me a copy of the following cable from the Archbishop of Canterbury:

"Appeal is being made by Archbishop together with Free Church Leaders, and contemporaneous appeal by the Pope, for collections on Innocent's Day, December 28th, for relief of famine stricken areas, especially children. Appeal is being published here November 24th. Will you do the like?"

The primate asks all to fall into line and take up the collection.

It is a heartrending thought that at the bright Christmas Season so large a number of people should be suffering all the horrors of famine and sickness and especially that thousands of little children should be starving to death.

I rejoice in the whole effort being made by the whole Christian Body of Europe, and that, too, in face of the fact that they are themselves impoverished by the war. I hope the well-to-do people of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will do something to show their sympathy.

At any rate you can give everyone the opportunity by taking up a collection on The Innocent's Day, December 28th next. Send the amount received as soon as possible to Rev. Cannon Harris. Wishing you all a very Happy Christmas

SCHOONER IN DISTRESS

Crew Sick or Injured and Vessel Leaking

(Boston Post)

Somewhere at sea, several hundred miles to the eastward of Boston, the British schooner St. Claire Theriault is in distress and in need of immediate assistance. A wireless message was picked up at the navy yard radio station from the Americas steamer Prusa telling of the schooner's plight.

According to the message two of the crew are suffering from broken legs having apparently been injured during tough weather, and two others are sick with fever. The supply of provisions had dwindled alarmingly, and the Prusa's commander gave the nearby sailors as much as he could spare from his stock.

The position of the Theriault was given as latitude 41.22 north, longitude 34.40 west at 8.57 o'clock in the morning.

The St. Claire Theriault is bound from Canary Islands for Yarmouth, N. S., and has been at sea for nearly three months buffeted about by continuous storms. She was spoken a week ago by the steamer Democracy and at that time was short of provisions and leaking badly.

ARANMORE BEACHED

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 16—Captain MacDonald and forty three officers and men of the crew of the D. G. S. Aranmore, which stranded at Wolf Cove, Gulf of St. Lawrence, on December 4, while en route to the Strait Belle Isle, arrived here this morning from Sydney, where they were landed by D. G. S. Montcalm.

All but two officers of the ship returned, Chief Engineer Fullerton and Second Engineer Harris, remaining, on the ship to lay her up.

The Montcalm is proceeding to Belle Isle, to bring the lighthouse keepers back to the mainland.

The Aranmore is now beached at Wolf Cove, and will be brought to Halifax in the spring for repairs.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES

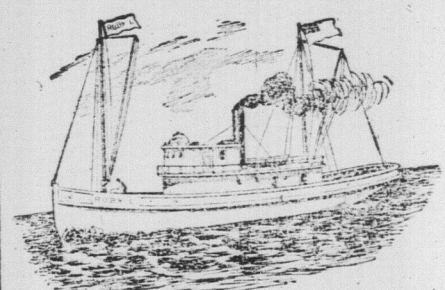

S. S. RUBY L. GUTTED BY FIRE

Blaze Started While Thawing Out Heating

Fire, which broke out in the hold of the steamer Ruby L. Tuesday night, practically destroyed the interior woodwork of the vessel. The steamer was moored at Thorne's wharf, St. John, and at 7.50 p. m. one of the crew notified Policeman Fred Gaudet of the fire and the officer immediately rang in an alarm from box 5. The fire

department were quickly on the scene and soon had several streams of water playing on the interior of the vessel.

Vast quantities of smoke were pouring from the after hold and the men had a difficult task ahead of them. After two hours' hard work in zero weather the blaze was finally subdued. The blaze was a hard one to fight as the fire had worked in back of the sheathing of the hold.

Captain Clair Baker, master of the steamer, reported that the heater in the after hold had become frozen, and that while efforts were being made to thaw it out, it was thought that in some manner the fire was started. It had burned back of the sheathing up to the deck before it was noticed.

The Ruby L. is a steamer of fifty one tons, and is owned by the Bay of Fundy and Minas Basin Steamship Company, with head office at Margareville (N. S.) She had been employed in the bay service.

The steamer was quite badly damaged but it is partially insured with a Halifax concern for \$8,000.

MILL FEEDS VERSUS STANDARD MEALS

(Experimental Farms Note)

An old proverb runs to the effect that in a fruit famine the hawk is welcome. With oats touching the dollar mark, corn around \$1.70, bran at \$15.00, linseed meal at \$90.00, and so on ad infinitum, the stockman is prone to have his charges unwillingly investigate the proverbial hawk.

By "Mill Feeds" is meant mill or commercial mixtures. Standard meals, for example, refers to such feeds as oat, linseed meal, cottonseed meal, etc. While there are several excellent mixed meals on the market, the wise buyer should look upon the ready mixed and appetizingly named feed or concentrate, with suspicion. It is guilty until proven innocent.

First, let it be understood, no purchaser need accept a food stuff on the oral guarantee of the seller. The Commercial Feeding Stuffs Act specifically states that the vendor of any brand of feed must furnish a guarantee as to protein, fat and fibre. Unfortunately, the Act in question, aside from the question of rigid enforcement, has too much latitude. Then, too, many feeders have not a sufficiently keen appreciation of the meaning and significance of guaranteed analysis. Price is the all-too-important factor. There is too much tendency to purchase mixtures, the main virtue of which is an excellent advertising campaign, and a perfect delineation of the art of camouflage, and to lose sight of the fact that the component parts supposed to be present in such feeds may be purchased in standard quality, mixed at home, and obtained at frequently a lesser price than the ready-mixed article.

If one has not, then, the knowledge to interpret the significance of analysis, (for which there should be no excuse, nowadays), there is a word of advice—stick to the Standard product and mix at home.

There are three mechanical factors which the feed manufacturer may cleverly utilize in compounding a feed, so that it may appear that which it is not—fine grinding (super-line nowadays), change of colour and flavour, and thorough mixing. The first needs comment none other than congratulatory to the man who invented a machine capable of reducing hulls to dust; the second refers to the use of such supplements as low-grade molasses, salt etc., additions to a ration, of which, will frequently cause delighted comment as to the manner in which it is cleaned up (the milk pail is no heavier); the third, to the thorough mechanical mixture of the finely ground component parts,—like whitewash, covering a multitude of sins and sinners.

Aside from the basic or standard parts of the mixed feed, by which parts are meant for example, corn, oats, barley, peas, shorts, bran, etc., etc., what may be added to obtain bulk and profit? Answering in an Irish way—why do the manufacturers of rolled oats for example, in nearly all cases, market stock foods as well? Hulls, small oats and mill refuse,—the market for them in the straight form is limited. And the fact that the most reputable firms as mentioned, manufacture a side line of, in several cases, excellent merit for the sole purpose of unostentatiously palming off a trouble-some by-product, is an indication of what may be expected from the fly-by-night concerns. When offered barley-feed, or oat feed, or corn feed, from any but a reliable firm, stop, look, and listen. There is a reason.

Besides the addition of excess fibre in the form of hulls, there has been, more particularly of late, a more insidious form of adulteration to many commercial mixtures. The by-product of the Western elevators, known as screenings, has, where of standard content (re-cleaned screenings) a very high value in the feeding of certain kinds of stock. Such has been definitely and conclusively proven by the Experimental Farms System. The latter institution together with many private individuals has, however, had proof, conclusive and unfortunate, that this product has not always been standard. Further, it would appear that the reuse by-

product of this material to which the manufacturer may have access, with the upshot that there are mixtures on the market today which aside from merely including a percentage of screenings, actually make use of the by-product as a basis. The combination of screening offal, oat hulls, chaff, sweepings, and molasses, with what the chemist terms, when in doubt, a "trace" of flour, bran, corn and flax, is a fearful and wonderful, though accomplished fact.

There can be no objection to the use of standard re-cleaned screenings in a commercial feed mixture provided the price is equitable. It is good feed, though it may darken and therefore render less attractive the finished product. Certain of the weed seeds contained in uncleaned screenings or in screening offal have been shown to be actually poisonous to stock. True, they may be bitter, but, then, molasses is a faithful corrective. To sum up, the purchaser pays a stiff price for the possibility of a low grade, non-productive feed that has the further potentialities of polluting his farm and injuring or destroying the health of his stock. The adoption of, and rigid adherence to, a high standard of elevator screenings will render procurable a most desirable feed, comparable to the standard meals to which reference has already been made. The undesirable second by-product should be controlled absolutely and placed where it cannot be of temptation to the unscrupulous manufacturer in Canada.

Reject barely, frosted wheat, musty corn, damaged grain generally, may all find their way into the commercial mixture, attractively priced as compared with the standard meals. In fact, the third degree applied to the past-master of the art of commercial meal mixing, would possibly reveal truths stranger than fiction.

When buying commercial mixture then, deal with the reputable firm. They sell under inspection and analysis and tell the truth, if not necessarily all of it. INSPECTS FISH INDUSTRY HERE

Lord Leverhulme Amazed at Proportions

(Boston Herald)

Following a detailed inspection of Boston's water front, particularly parts relating to the fishing industry, Lord Leverhulme, recent British guest of the Chamber of Commerce, has made interesting comparisons between Boston and England. The English visitor asserts that Great Britain lays great stress upon its fishing industry but that it cannot be compared with that of Boston.

He expressed absolute amazement when showed figures proving that the Bay State Fishing Company alone handled more than 75,000,000 pounds of fresh fish in a year and made a detailed inspection of methods employed in such a large business on New street, East Boston, and declared it was far superior to anything of a like nature in England. Lord Leverhulme intimated strongly, during the course of his inspection, that he would make an attempt to introduce Boston methods in English fishing.

RETAIL MEN'S CONFERENCE

Helpful Address by Successful Small Town Merchant

Retail store men in conference recently heard one of their number who had built up a big business in a small western town tell in a most convincing way of the secrets of his success.

His name was Mann—just a plain, common sense, hard headed business man and merchant. He told how he started in a grocery business as a boy with \$1,600 capital, and the first week he opened up he had a fair sized advertisement in a local paper; "and I believe there has never been an issue of the paper from that time to this that our firm's name has not been advertised in," he said. Now the store he heads does a business of half a million dollars a year at a retail and he advertises more than ever, and says that with advertising he believes they can make the business run a million.

Some of the advice gave the assembled business men was: "First have something in the newspaper all the time. You say it is too much trouble to write the advertisement's yes, but if you spend a little time even till midnight, to prepare some good advertising you will find it the biggest money maker you ever had. Have your salesmen talk advertising, study it, back it up. Have your jobbers help you prepare advertisements. Take some jobbers' finely written and displayed advertising and apply it to your own business. Get them to print extra copies of their circulars and folders with your name on and send them out." And then he went on to impress those business men with the danger of not advertising, saying that the big mail order houses have lists of names by the millions; they know exactly in what communities they have the competition, and they go after the business in those places where the business men do not advertise. And mark this further statement: "Eighty four per cent. of the business failures are of non-advertisers. I beg of you to spend at least two per cent of your gross sales in advertising, and back up this advertising properly and you will see wonderful results."

Is there not a business person in this man's observations, since he is not connected in any way with newspapering, but has grown rich as he has grown good in the mercantile business, and is counted one of the greatest business successes in the Northland.

HISTORICAL SITES IN NOVA SCOTIA

More Spots Consecrated by Blood and Heroic Effort Than Any Other Part of Canada

The Dominion Government has created a board to look after the historic sites and monuments in Canada. Nova Scotia contains more spots consecrated by blood and heroic effort than any part of Canada—and probably any similar portion of America. The tide of battle swept around the coasts of this province a hundred years before Ontario was heard of except by Jesuit Fathers, whose matchless courage and self-sacrifice as bearers of the Cross first led them to penetrate these western wilds. This is a late day to commemorate by permanent monuments so much that is worthy and that indicates high ideals of national duty, but that the work has been determined upon will be received with gratification.

Louisbourg, Fitzroy (Windsor) Fort Cumberland and Annapolis Royal will be to some extent restored and will be under perpetual care. The remains of La Tour's old fort, DeRazilly's grave at Fort Point, Canso with its long history, the wonderful exploit planned by DeRamesay against Nolle's command at Grand Pre, the episode at Bloody Creek near Bridgetown are only a few of many places in this province that will no doubt come under the purview of the board.

The Quebec battlefields commission has spent some three millions of dollars in making a national park of the place where Wolf and Montcalm fought out the decay of his continent and work is now nearing an end. It is not too soon that other parts of Canada were receiving attention.

The board is honorary and advisory. Its members are General Craik, bank Dr. Benjamin Sulte, historian and ex-president of the Royal Society Dr. Coyne, of St. Thomas historian and member of Senate of Toronto University; W. C. Milner, Dominion archivist of the Eastern section of Canada. The Dominion is represented on the board by J. B. Harkness, of the Park's Commission, and Mr. Williamson of the same board who acts as secretary.

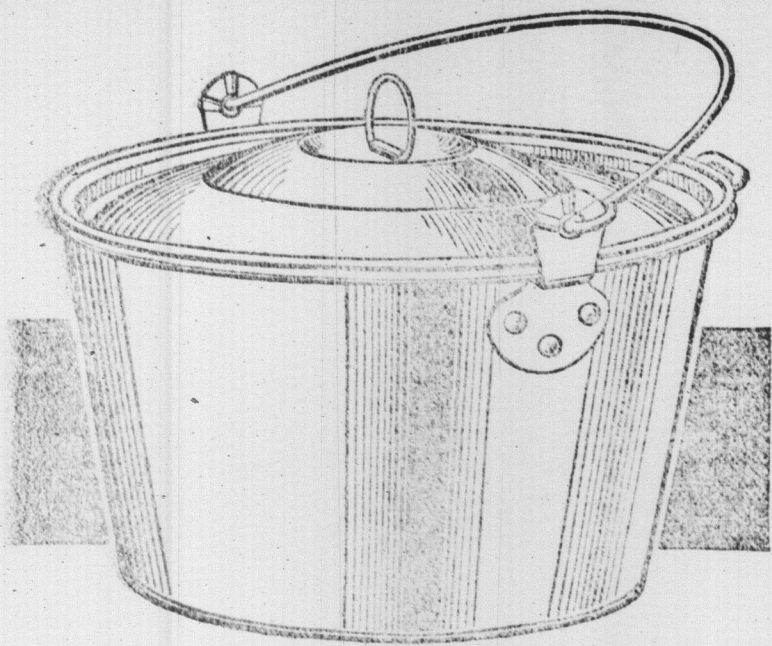

Marine News



The schooner St. Clair Theriault loaded with salt and bound for Yarmouth, Capt. L. Pothier in charge, twice reported in distress the past week, was reported again Tuesday afternoon off Cape Negro on the South Shore. Attempts have been made by the owners, P. A. Theriault & Co., of DeL'Isle's Cove to send a tow-boat to go to their rescue. Two men are reported sick and two others have broken legs. The vessel is reported to be making badly.

The Canadian government steamer "Montcalm" which was dispatched last week from Port Hastings, in the Strait of Canso, to the aid of the C. G. S. Aramora, whose near Harrington on the North Shore, succeeded in floating the stranded vessel. The Aramora is making water, and will be towed to a sheltered harbor along the coast where she will go into winter quarters. In the spring she will be taken to Halifax for repairs.

The Gateway Fish Co's schr. Loran B. Snow, which was in Yarmouth on Friday, landed her fare of 12,250 pounds of fish on Saturday. It was purchased by A. E. Nickerson and was shipped by the D. A. R. fast freight on Saturday evening, destined to the Upper Canada markets. W. D. Sweeten's schr. Buena arrived at Yarmouth on Saturday with a fare of 10,000 pounds of fresh fish, which was also purchased by A. E. Nickerson and shipped Monday to Portland Me.

Annapolis Spectator: The fine new 2 mast schooner W. S. Macdonald, 382 tons net register, Duffy master arrived here Tuesday from Meteghan on her maiden voyage to port 400,000 feet spruce and pine boards for Barbadoes to be shipped by Norman Hardy. She was towed here by the tug Wasson, 30 tons, Capt. Lipsitt, which docked her at the King's wharf where her cargo has been accumulating for some time and the tug at once left for St. John.

Fidel's Yarmouth Telegram: The D. G. S. Aberdeen brought to Yarmouth today two buoys, one of which was the well buoy which went adrift about a year ago from Gannet Dry Ledge and has since been anchored in Public Harbor. The other was the gas and whistling buoy that took the place of the Lucher lightship while she was in port and went adrift during the heavy blow of Wednesday and Thursday. The Aberdeen picked it up Friday morning near Murder Island.

The Annapolis Royal schr. A. W. Longmire was in Yarmouth Tuesday morning with 5,000 pounds of fish. When going up the harbor one of her propellers struck a submerged log with such force as to put the engine out of commission. She hauled into the Consumers dock to ascertain at low water the extent of the damage. The schr. Dorothy M. Smart and Lucille M. were also in Yarmouth that morning the former with 4,000 pounds of fish and the latter with 3,000 which was purchased by A. E. Nickerson.

The Assessment Board dealing with the claims of the Atlantic Salvage Company in connection with the refloating of the steamer Joazeiro, lately ashore at Grace Bay has awarded the wreckers \$200,716.70. Claims of a couple of other steamers which assisted are yet to be heard. The tug Maggie M. of North Sydney, was awarded \$500. The Joazeiro sustained practically no damage during her recent mishap at Grace Bay. She is coalled and ready to sail when these claims are completed. The value of

the Joazeiro together with cargo, was estimated by the Board of Assessment to be \$1,400,000.

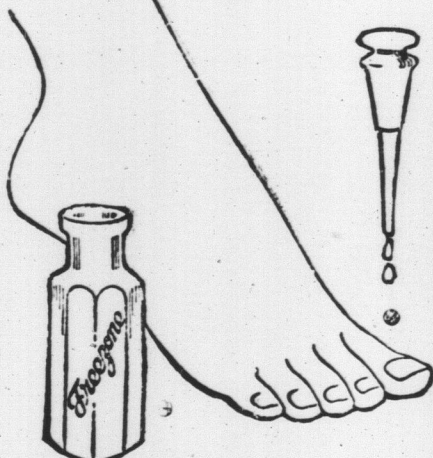
One of the longest trips on record from Nova Scotia terminated at Boston last Saturday when the British schooner Eskimo reached East Boston to unload a cargo of piling. The vessel left Clementsport Oct. 14, and lay at anchor in the cove for 17 days before she finally got away. Meantime the captain, Leffer and Mat. Burrell took command. From the outset the passage was rough with gales and heavy seas. The forecast was blown to pieces, and some other slight damage sustained. The schooner was forced to seek shelter in half dozen ports along the Maine coast and at Portland, Boothbay and North Haven she was delayed several days.

Dr. McNutt And Amberst Man Have New Invention

Amberst Daily News:—A citizen of Amberst, Dr. Hedley Hillecoat, is accredited with an invention that will probably revolutionize the lighting system that is now in effect on modern motor cars. Previously it was thought impossible to have a focused light that would keep the road in sight, while turning a corner. His son in law, Dr. C. H. McNutt, of New Glasgow, having nearly come to grief on a long trip, through the straight beam lights, turned his car over to Dr. Hillecoat, knowing his proclivities for conquering the impossible. He asked him to turn his mind to a movable light of practical use on the roads.

Last evening Dr. McNutt and Chief Pickern called for the Newsman, and took us for a demonstrating spin through the country. Neither of them mentioned the new lights to us, but as Dr. McNutt swung around a corner we noticed that the rays of the lamp were always falling directly ahead of the car. Immediately we commented upon the fact, and Dr. McNutt stated that it was a new invention effected by Dr. Hillecoat. The lamps are placed upon pedestals attached to the front axle, and necessarily must swing with every turn of the steering wheel. It has been claimed that such lights would not stand rough driving, but the Doctor took us all over the back roads in the country side, and the lamps certainly stood the test. Continually the lights played directly in front of the car.

Not only do the lights swing on the axle but dimmers are unnecessary, because the lights can be kept at the driving axle or when a car approaches a slight touch on the lever and the lamps are turned down at an angle where the light is thrown about ten feet ahead of the car—an excellent idea for city driving, or when passing an approaching car on the road. Both parts of the invention are serviceable.

Hundreds of accidents have resulted on slippery roads, or in a fog, for the simple reason, that the road was lost to sight, when turning a corner. This invention of Dr. Hillecoat keeps the road in the driver's eye, continuously and naturally will lessen the number of accidents, resulting through the above mentioned causes. Patents have been taken out and it is expected that the new lights will be manufactured at an early date.

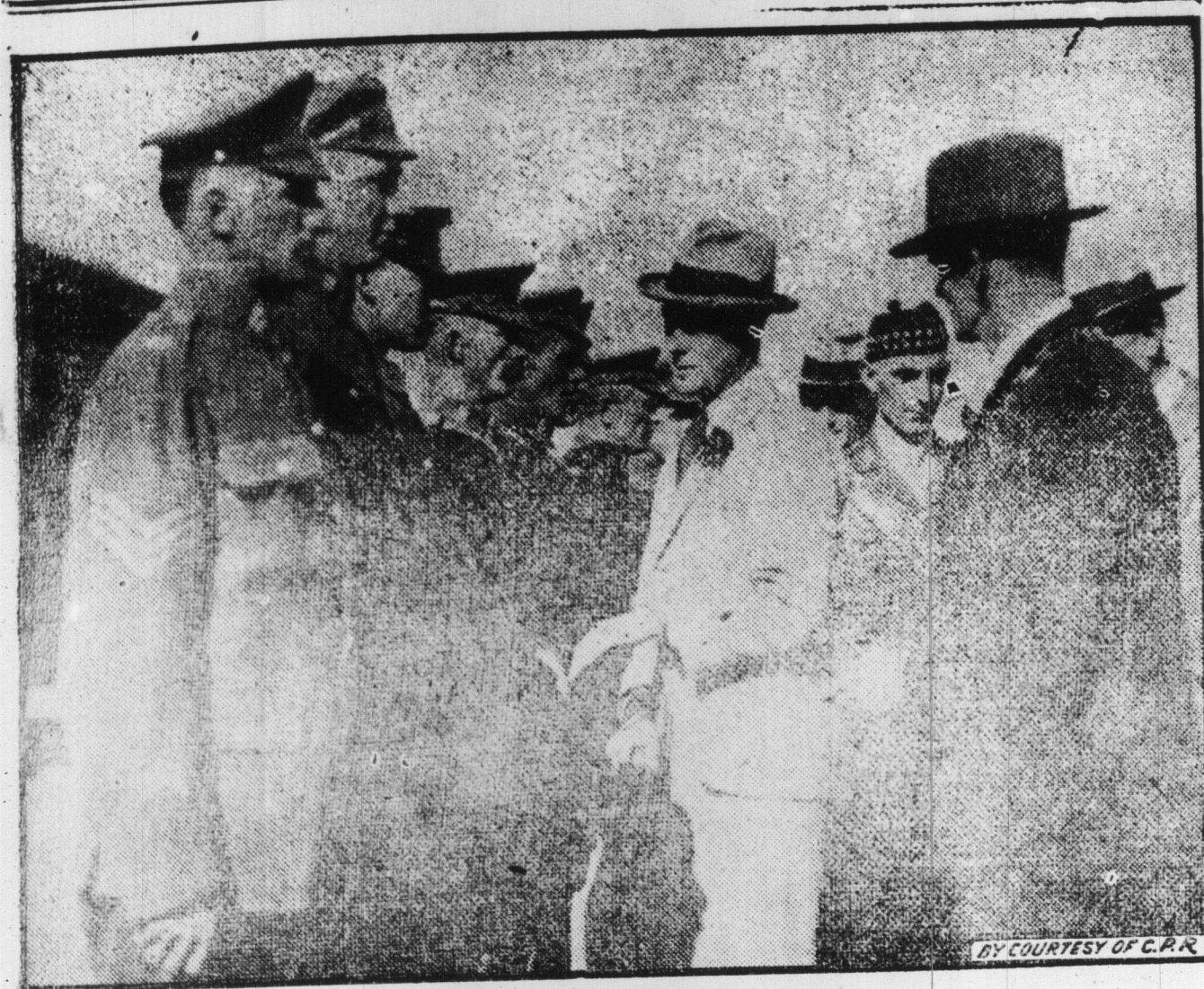
