TO ERADICATE CADLOCK FROM

The Montreal Star of a late date has the following letter from Prof. Trueman of the N.S.A.C. that is interesting and may be useful to many of our farmer readers: this Nova Scotia Professor says:

Numerous reports from Great Bri-

tain have stated that powdered Kainite has been found useful in destroying wild radish, the weed known in Graduate of University of Maryland Nova Scotia as "Cadlock". During the past Summer the Nova Scotia Agricultural College tested this material in a small way. A quantity of Kainite was on ground to powder in a ball-mill and applied on a small area badly infested with cadlock. The Kainite was used at the rate of about 400 lbs, per acre and applied with a hand blower The results were quite satisfactory as practically all the growing cadlock was killed.
