## EDITORIAL NOTES.

There is cold comfort for our Nova Scotian heads of famili s in MI. Victor Meunior's recent sugges'ions on the servant question. This eminent naturalist thinks tince indifleront domestic servants aro becuming moro provalent, that anthropoed apes might bo ciptured and given a thorough course of training in househo d works. ML. Mounior climes to have trained several of tho an:mals saccossfully, and cites many incidents in which they have been found skilful and apt servito s It occurs to us, however, that if the same pationt traning were given to our raw country girls there wi.l be no need for us to resort to introducing grimacing quadrupeds among our startled families.

The Indians and ha f breods on botin sides of the boundary line seem to have breathed in from some unknown source a desire to g.t ahead of those much-sufforing individua's who constitute the travelling public. Rolin huntors aro frequently induced by them to purchaso very modern antiquitifs In an Indian store near bismarck a regular stock of relics is kept on hand-Nevajo blankets (from Massachusetis) Indian pipes (from Connecicut) tom-ioms (made of Government cheese-boxes covered with sheep-skin) and most profitable of all the historic bows and arrows which have tigured in Indian uprisugs. The A paches, who longago discarded spears, are now supplying the trado with them, while the purchasers aro given thoir choice, so to speak, of any intoresting legend which they care to connect with their now possession.

We aro glad to note that henceforward the after-dinnor toast of "The Colonies" is to bo given at all public banquets in Eagland. This recogaition sbou'd long ago have been given them by tho foastful Britons. But wo wonder what definto vision will arise bofure tho speakers ejo whon he calls the toast-will the icy mountans and the coral strand appear simultaneously before his inner vision, tho whooping Indian or the dovoted misaionary, tho crafty Hindoo cr the bushman of Austraha. All the types aro represented in the Colonies, and too often the ordinary Briton thinks of the colonial dependencis as a vast combination of dissimisar peop.es. What is ranted is a carotut recognition of each co ony by tho proper ufficials. Maps indicatiog climato, soil, products, prices and popuation should bo placed in all echools, railway sations and pub.ic buidinge. Emigration being thus intolligent!y promoted, fewer mistakes moa.d be mado by sottlers, and when such a stato of affiars oxists tho toast of "The Colonies" whli be drunk with a propor undorstanding.

A littlo matter has como up betreen Australa and Great Britain which is of particular interest to Canadians. The Australians complain that the Fronch Islands in tho Nort Hobrados, which are used as penal sottloments,
are hurlful to the whole group of islands. Moro than that theso Fronch outcasts are vory carelossly lookod after, as they ofton oscape and make thoir homes in Australia. The grievance is so great that the Australians suggest that if Great Britain will purchass tho islands thoy will agreo to tho confederation of the Australian colonies. Doubtloss in Australia thoro are special reasuns for keoping out a modern goneration of criminals, but in Canada, too, wo fool not a littlo annoyance from the noarness of the Fronch possessions of St. Pierro and Miquelon, to say nothing of the dobatablo French coast of Newfoundland, and if Great Britain is to buy French land why should sho not inciude this troublesome tersitory in her purchaso. It is by no moans improbablo that Nowfoundland would entor amicably into confederation if the is'and and coast difficulties could be peaceably solved. Tho policy of lirance regarding the salos is not as yet known. It is the fashion of the French Congress at present to boast of her possossions in foreign lands. Tho offering of zuoney as purchasing powor would probably be construed as an insult from the "nation of shop-kcepers." But an exchange of land for land might bo eatisfactory to all partics concerned Our chief interest in the ovent is for the wolfare of Canada and for Nowfoundland, and we rould wolcome a policy which would lead to the adoption of "th' tio that binds."

The Presidential olection shortly to be bogun in the United States is not the only national contest of tho month The genoral I:alian olections are set for a date a fers diss later, and a hot struggle is likely to ensuo between the Government of the present Promier, Giolitti, and the ex-Premier Crispi. The chof difficuity in the administration of any modern Italian Goverment has boon the disposition of the State Revenues, which have beoninadequate to mett the deruande mado ufun them. The oxpenso of maintaining a largo army and navy has criphted all elfurts to dovelop the natural rosure is of the country. The roads, ralways and telegraphs aro all maintained at the expense of tax-payers. Crispi, if electod, promises to cheapon the mothod of liovernmont by removing somo hundreds of inofficiont and unnocessiry Governmont employoes, and to mako a stand against the common practico of diverting public money into privato channels. Crispi is without doubt tho popular candidato with tho less well-to do portion of the peop'o, and as the franchiso is a liberal one, giving votes to a'l citizans wh are over twontyone years of age, who are able to read and write, who pay taxes to the amount of $£ 3.75$ per year, he will doubtloss poll a large vote, while on the other hand the present Premier has a fino opportunity of using boodlo in the campaign. The elections are not wholly d cided by tho majority vote, as each duputy needs not only to be elocted in his own district. but must also be abie to claim one-fourth of the whole onrolled vote. Second district olections are very usual, and naturally they reault as a ru'e in the support of the members of the saccessful party in the national contest. In fact the 13 th of Aluvember promises to bo as exciting a day in the classic country as the 8 th of November will te to the peop.e of the United States.

The sad illness and death of Mrs. Farrison at the present political juncturo has caused much hoart-folt sympathy for tho Ropublican candida'e for the Presidoncy of the United Statos. Mrs. Harrison has been an able help-mato to her husband, togetieer they bave struggled in obscurity, with empty purees, and her husband attributes not a little of his success to ber ever ready interest in his affairs. The President and his wife have been a typical Amorican couple. At the timo of their marriage they could not afford a home of thoir own, and the young wifo was installed with his family at the Harrison homestead until the youthful husband had become a full-lledged lavyor. After tho first child was born the young couplo flitiod into a home of their own - a tiny three-roomed cottage mith a lean-to kı:chon. The humble home was a happy one-the husband and wifo boing Wi ling to accopt privation for the sake of boing together. The Presidont shared in the daily labors, cutting the wood, or filling tho water pails beforo office hours, and it was not until 1860 that prosperity dawnod upsn tho dovoted pair. Then Mr Harrison teas appointed reportor of the Supreme Court, and, with the comfurtablo salary attached, it was no longer necossary to keep up a perpetual warfare with tho wo $f$ at the door. With her great natural tact Mrs. Harrison was as much at home in the stately White House as in her first cottage. Hor aspectness of mind and disposition nadeared her to all who comd in conizet with hor. Her high moral charactor mon the appruval of those who difforod with her husband on political grounds. Tho cru. aed heads of Europe, the Pupe and others high in worldly rank, hare sunt messages of sympathy to tho strickon husband. Cloroland, too, has sont a manly word of condolence, and pcople of all classes in the nation aro united in thoir praises of tho doad woman. And jet we cannot but turn from the grave with an appreciative thought for the will powor of tho man and woman who carvod their way so pationtly and steadi'y to the highest pesition which tho Amorican Republic affords.

Some speculators in Bombsy mean to erect a novel Oriental booth at the World's Fair, Fhere exhibitions of suttee, oremation, jugglery, pautch, and wreatling, will be given, where elephants may be mounted by means of step-ladders and led through the fair grounds. Even a plaiu untitled Nova Scotlan would be privileged to ride "in howdah with mahout," and for refreshment at the end of his journey be surved a genuine cup of Ceylon tea at en cents a cup.

There la perhaps no more remarkably named town in the world than the little settlemens of Oklahoma, W. S., which proudly boars the title of Tipperualaem. It appears that the Mayor of the town desired to clariston it with the scriptural name of Jerusalem, while the Sheriff being an ardent Irishman would hear of nothing but Tipporary. After a mild civil war had been indulged in a compromise was effected and tho euphonious cognomen of Tipperusalem was agreed upon. The name is indeed rich in historic assoclations of a videly differing character.

The Emperor of Germany has shown himself to look askance at international union as typified by the marriages of his nobles with the daughters of wealthy Americans. The craze was a popular one, both with the nonfitled but by no meaps penniless maidens and the aristocratic but impoverished noblemen. If a prohibition is put on this form of reciprocity, the Republican titles of irrs. Colonel $\quad$, Mrs. Judge —, will be more in demand, while the flaxen-headed frauleins of the falher-land will doubtless be accorded the privilego of assuming the ancestral tilles, jewels and mortgages.

The famous Pall Blall Gaxette has again changed hands, Mr. Yates Thompson, the proprietor, has tired of his expensive toy and has sold it at a fancy figure to an Austrian Hebrew, Loenteld by neme, who is well known as a stock speculator and as the proprietor of a famoue temperance drlnk. Mr. Stead, of the Revievo of Revierrs, has been most anxious to oblain this powerful paper, but the fancy price at which it sold kept out all those who were not likewise gifted with fancy purses. The future policy of the Gazette is unknown as yet. Now that it is in the bands of an illiterate man it may even become a mere vehicle for advertisements.

Mr. Biddulph, one of the most recent explorers in Asia, has discovered an immense salt district in Persia, seventy miles south of Teheran. The great salt valley extended for eight miles between the neighboring bills. It glistened in the sun llke glass. On closer inspection it was found to be surrounded by a kind of salt bag, from which srose the solid surface of the salt rock. Camels, hories and mules travelled over the incrustation by the common ronte. The allt was found to be of the purest variety, but the specimens which the explorers endeavored to take away with thom opeedily lost both their pure color and their solldarity oring to the action of the atmosphere.

The German residents in Africa who have been siding with the Dahomegans in their recent revolt against Freach anthority, have decidedly bad the worst of it. Although they supplied the Dahomeyans with arms and ammunition and sent experts to assist in the fortification of the native torna, the uprising was promptly put down. The natives of Dahomes are a degraded and fickle-minded people whe hate both German and French authority. The only motive which the German setllers can have bad in assisiling them was the hope of thwarting the extension of French trade in Africa, the selish yet rrotective policy of France being the imposition of heav.r dutics on all goods but her own which are imported into the colonies.

A very warm discussion has been going on in British Army circles over the appointment of a Commander-In-Chief for India. Lord Roberts is soon to be recalled, and the coveted position is already being vigorously canvassed for. Among the aspirants are the Doke of Connanght, who will, howerer, be pacified if awarded the Governorship of Malla, General Sir George Greaves, who is a popular Bombay commander, and Sir Evelyn Wood, a gentleman highly eateemed in the war-world of Britain. The sppointment of elther Greaves or Wood will be a popular one, there being not a little well-earned projudice against the custom of giving responsible and exalted positions to ecions of the Royal family, whose abilities do not, $2 s$ a rule, compare fith those of practical milltary men.

The school boys of Montreal seem to be very like those of our opn city. When the marble, the base ball, or the foot ball fever begins, there is no remedy but to let the disease take its course, and in truth the disease in itself is only the natural outcome of the high spirits which should characterise boyhood. During the recent foot ball fever the window glass of the Montreal schoolhouses suffered so severely, that a proposal was made to adopt the Chinese system of making each family responsibie for the misdecas of any member, by levping a damage fund tax on each pupil attending echool. Lackily some astute member of the school board bethought bim of his own boyish proclivities, and saw the fallacy of the proposition. He pointed out that trait of boy-nature which demands a quid pro que, adding that the boys, instead of bocoming more careful at their play, frould feel a certain responsibility about getiling back their moncy's Forth in damages to school property. Happily his reasoning carricd the
, and the individual glass-breaker will atill be held responsible for damages to school property. A little practical knowledge of boy-nature is very necessary to school commissioners.

The Government of New Zealard is taklog a most paternal intercat in developing the ir 'ustries of the country. Tho exportation of frozen meat has been found a cost profitable business, and by aid of special legislatlon it is hoped that commercial enterprise will be encouraged. Agents are to be appointed to inspect and grade all produce leaving the colony, and it is also proposed to place an expert inspector in London to report on the condition of the produce at the end of the journcy, and to give exporters the benefit of his advice as to methods of packing and ventllating. The result of the Government interest would uvdoubtedly be a firm market for such thoroughly warranted merchandiso. If our Canadinn apples had the same inspection given them it would be bighly advantageous to both the appla. growers and to the consumers

The dangers attendant on the "castamays" at sea are becoming every day less in number. The ocean is no longer trackless, vessels sailing between America and India for iastance are constantly following each other orer the watery route. The cantaways, if they can but keep to the track of their veasel, will be sure to be picked up within a few hours. Countless vessels and steamers are following the beaten track, and the adventures of Robiason Crusoe would be almost impossible in the prezent state of ocean-navigation. We trust that within a few years the awfol spectacle of the sailor

## Afloat in an opon boat, Upon an open sea,",

half.crazed with the torturing thirst and the blinding glare of the sun apon the waters may be almost an impossibility.

Many of our Canadian genuises are brinful of inventive power, but not being in a position to know where their sersices are really needed, their skill is too often wastod. There are namberiess machines and conveniences that are as yet but half invented. The bicycle, for instance, can be much improved apon in the present clumsy method of connecting tho crank shsft and drive wheel. The anciont oar for propeling hte and pleasure boats should be superseded by some more modern form of power-some sort of screrr-propeller perhaps, A great field for inventors lies in mahiog convenieaces for use in domestic life-adjustable, packable furniture being in great demand for flats and apartment houses. Food products presented in new forms and under new names take remarkably well, and all sorts of pocket conveniences, "notions," or toys, have been found to be of the greatest advantage to the ride-arvake inventor.

Now that red-cheeked apples are to be found in every homo, a few words as to their medicinal properties may not be out of place. There is more phosphorus in apples than in any other fruit or vegetable, and phosphorus, as is well known, is a grand nerve food. The acid juices of arples are of great benefit in quickening the action of sluggish livers, and so cleansing the system from matter which, if retained, might cause headache, jaundice, skin eruptions, and several allied troubles. The apple, when baked or stewed, acts quickly on the digestive organs, and custom and the laws of health both sanction the use of apple sauce with roast pork, roast goose, and otner dainties notoriously trying to weak digestions. The gods of old held the apple in high repate, though they were probably indifferent to its effect on humen beings, and ge who are blossed with the ruddy fruit, cheap, choice and plenty, remembering its medicinal value, should cast a very lenient ege on the apple bill of tac fruit merchant.

Mruch is said and written now-a-days of the superiority of the woman of the later part over the woman of the early part of the nineteenth century. Perhaps a intlle reflection on the varied cares of our grand dames will explain why it was impossible that their brains should be as highly dereloped as they are in the case of the women of vur orn day. Everg energy and resource must have been taxed to the utmost in the days mhen household labor of all kinds devolved on the housekeeper. Spinning, weaving and knitting, cooking, nursing, butter and cheese-making, sewing and mending -no cooking or other household convenience invented, soda even being unattainable except after a tronblesome procesa-and withal a plentifal number of olive branches sbour the family table to be trained in the ways of thrift and righteousness. Let ns be thankful indeed that the day of such heavy labor has passed away, but let as do justice to oor sturdy predecessors, who were unable to take their place in the intellectual rorld because every porier of their being had need to be concentrated on the necessity of "keeping the pot boiling."

A form of superannation insurance for railroad employees has been suggested by Theodore Voorkees, of the New York Central. Some attempts have been made to provide for disabled workmen, and to give assistance, in case of the employee's death, to his widorr and orphans, but for the most part any help thas given has been the gift of the fellow-employees, and its value qas dependent upon the state of their own pockets. Mr. Voorkees believes that British precedent should be followed, and that the insurance against saperannualion, injury ir death, which is provided for the employees on most $c^{r}$ the British lineg, should be \&dopted in America. Each man entering the esrvice should pay a small sum weekly towards a fund to be used for his futare benefit. This positive form of insurance is attractive to the old:nary morkman, who bees in it not only a provision for himself and family in case of accident, but also a solid protection between himself and the nceds of his old age. The fund, if kept in the hands of the Company, would bind the interests of cmployers and employed firmly together, and the fact of its cxistence would do much to put down incipient strakes.

The Belfast Tournament had its conclusion fitly marked by a grand display of Mr. Blackburno's marvellous blindfold powers. Labt Saturdas without sight of boards or men that colobrity ongagod simultancously Mr. James Neill, the President of the Belfast Chess Club, and beven other very strong players. From his seat on the platform at one ond of the Contral Hall (Rosemary street) Mr. Blactbarne, with his back tarned to the camp of hie oppenente, cuaid hape had, oven in his mind's ogo, but faint parception of the vast concourse of shess vutarles that bad assemh'ad, or of the fascination wrought upon them by the coruscations of bis chese gadias in its dark chamber. Yet there be sat-however sustained or whatover the source of his inepiration-from five o'clock till seven, and again from half past sevon to ele- n o'clock with out the slightest signs of mental fatigue or discomfiture. There he sat, visualizing in never falling rote. tion the ever-varying positions of the elght batllefields-and dictating, according to the exigencles and with mastorly strategy, the best moves at his command.
Mr. S. C. Gunning, J.P., of Cooks-town-himeelf a Elindfold performer -Mrr. Pasker Dunscombe, of Dublin, and many other well-known oxperts were amongst the chess notabilities present. Shortly after the first hour's play one of the elght (No. 3) had a mate-in-three annoanced egainst him by the blindfold player, who dolighted the spectators around by giving a full and clear description of the position as It atood-of the modus operandz of the mate, and of all the variatious possible.

Rallway carried from Shubenacadie Station $1,399,950 \mathrm{lbs}$. of milk, or estimating ebout 23 lbs . to the quart, 559,980 quaris of milk at three cents por quart, valued at 8 r6,799.40. The export so far this season shows an increase, the average so far being 112.115 lbs. per month. To this may properly be added the milk carried from the Hewis platform, about a mile from Shubenacadie Station, which would add about 50 cans per day or 500 quarts. This milk is brought to Halifsx and here distributed by the milkmen to their customers.

A now wort recently publiehed by Messra. Portor \& Coatos of Philadelphis, is entitled "Alaskana." This work on "Alaska Legends" is tho first one of its style yet published which deals oxclusively with the legends, othnology, customs and sconery of Alaska. Although the rbythm is in conformity with that of "Hiawatha" and "The Kalovala," this book claime distinction in that each chapter is complote in i:self, no ono depending upon another for either subject or conclusion. The descriptions of scenery ars taken from the author's note book, which was his constant companion while travelling in the Torritory, thoreforo their roality is assured. Tho writer, Professor Busbrod W. James, is a physician and has givon not a little study to the peculiar customs and stronge manners of the "Shamans" or "Medicine Mon," as well as of the people in general who inhabit Alaska. The fourteon sonnets on Egypt are oxquisitoly wrought, and tho volume oloses with tho well-known "IIymn to the Morning."

Lovers of good litoraturo will hail with delight tho nowly edited edition of Thorosu's Jounal ontutled "Autumn." Tho book has long been a favorito rith naturslists, both for its keen insight into plant and animal lifo and for the perfect pen protures of phases of foreet life. i uaint aphorisms brighten theeo observations. The romark that "the frosts come to ripon the days like fruits," hes a touch of tondor humor. Or porbaps the rador loarns to take a broad view of the sconery of autumn in this description-" tho ircreasing ecarlot and yellow unts around the meadowa and river romind mo of tao opening of a vaet flowor bud. Thoy aro the potals of its corolla, which aro of the width of the ralleys. It is the flower of autumn, whoso oxpanding bud just begins to blush," Or anon, ons is given a "glimpso of a muskrat home or of the frizzled tail of a red equirrol with a chostnut in its mouth hiding in a whito pine." 'l'ao eouthward travelling of tho wild birds is carofully noted, and the death of early frost-nipped wild flowers is faithfully recorded. Moro than tbis the book ts a biography of one of the simplest, most sincero of men, who flod to nature because he folt his human nature not strong onoogh for tho battlos of overyday life. The wild blood which tingles yet in all of us will pulso heattily through the veing of theso who enter the forest bermitago. Publishors, Houghton, Miftin \& Co., Boston and Now York.

Tho Novembor number of St. Nict:olas is brimful of interest and of promire of good things for the coming jear. Two now continued stories catoh the eyos of young readers, and tho lasses will soon learn to love "Polly Oliver," whoso love for childron and distaste for boarding-house kooping are at present difficult to reconcile. The boys too have special attention paid to them by Wm. O. Stoddard, who has began a thrilling story of bush-lifo in Australia, entitled "Tho White Ca7e." "Winter at the $2{ }^{2 \prime \prime} 18$ another well-illusisated story calculated to captivate all young peoplo. "Jack Dilloway's Schema" is a fonny story of two lads who undertook to run a refreshment-stall at a circus with a most unwelcome dead head customer in the ahape of an clophant. "Our Norghbor John" gives a fine idea of the habits and appearance of Young John Chinaman. The last poem sent to the St. Nicholas by tho dead post Whittior is publishod in the opening pages. Several short jingles and verses are found along with many comic features. Carefal directions are given for the manufacture of a most grotesquo but practicable wish-bono per-wiper, and the excollent number closes with bright letters and riddles.

Teo Novembor Neso Eny! and Mfagazine is largely a Whittier number. The frontispiece is a fine rare pıcture of Whittier, taken about 1855, while he was in the full maturity of his intollectual porvor, and in the full vigor of life. The initial article of the number is "In Whittier's Lsnd," by William Sloane Kennedy, who has writton much and well about Whittier and Whitman. He gots over the scenes associated with Whittier's best Fork in a very interesting mannor. Miss Frances C. Sparbaspk deale with Whitlier as the Poet and tho Man, and Edwin D. Moad in his Editor's tablo considers Whittier in his relation to New England thought, history and lifo. Allen Eistman Cross contributes a fine poem, "The Passing of Whittier," and A. L. Carlton recalls Whittier in a poom, "On Salisbury Beach." The most inportant and suggestive article at this time in the number is "Private Armies,-Past and Present," by Thomas B. Preston, a very ablo writor, and a member of the New York Herald staff. Miss Louiso Manning Hodgkive writes an account of Wellesley Collego, which will attract those intorested in women's roork. Walter Blackburn Larte contributes the secsnd paper on "The Lhilosopbical Isisis of liction." Iifing Berdiae Litchman in writing of "The Home of Black Hawk," contributes a very valuable chapter to American history, and thrums a now light upon some Indian chiefs. The stories are intereating and the poetry good. It $1 s$ altugother aa esceileat namber.

The entire novel cuntained in Lippincolis for Novomber is from the pen of Marron Harland, and is entitled "More Than Kin." The plot of the story is simple but strikiog-the universal devotion of a loving wifo to a most untrorthy husband, her willingness to las dorpn hor life if necessary that the man's professsional honor and skill should be nodoubted-forming the bsois of the romance. The rest of the contents are of varied interest. In "Form in Driving" wo regrot to seo the check roins and the docked tails portrayed as exsmples of proper style. Tho skeich of "Cricket in the United States" is full of intorest to lovers of the game. Sany will smile at the double-barrelled chargo from the little "Story Without a Noral." Some sketches of prominont men of the day are gived, and sucoral poums appear. Publishod by J. B. Lippincott \& Co., Philadolphia.
"A Modern Quixote" is the titlo of a recont novel by S. C. McKay, pub.ished by Messre. Morrill \& Higsins, of Ciucago, in the Idyipild Suries. This pretty littlo story, ploasingly writton and very interosting, treats of Southera difo in the days of slavery, and tho reader inatinctivoly teels dramn toward the dear old "Unclo Ben" and "Auat Viney," who su faikhfally guard the interests of theur muthorloss young mistress Laarie. Laurie's lovo story is very pathetic, and one's fali sympathy is onlisted in tho trying ordoals tbroagh ahich she and hot haddsumo young lover pass. Inurever it all ends voiy happily, and the hero and heroino are after many trials speading on their rredding journoy when the fiuss is reached:

Taking up tho Nopomber Pupuiur Scithuc Muntivis, one is atruck by the many phases of actual human life, in distinction from the ideal life of fiction and poetry, which this magazino roroals. Two Thanksgiving stories from the able pens of Mary E. Wilkins and Josiah Allen's Wife give a gay fictional element to the number. Tine various departmests are full of interest-Margaret Bottome in her "Heart to Heart" talka being oven more winning than usual. Dainty receipts abound. The summer baby is by no mesns neglected, but suggestions aro given as to his caro, his food and dress. ## COMMERCIAL.

Tho woathor with whioh wo havo boon favored during tho past moek has been of just tho kind to permit farmers to well advanco tho work that bas uften to bo delaged till spring. This is a rery satisfactory and befeful featuro. Fet promoditicns of wintor in tho stape of colder a ghte and moro chilly winds with occesional rains aro not wanting.
liemittances continue to bo good, and roputo from the country are quito onconraging in all lines of trade.

The Muntary Times, Toronlo, which is undoubtedly the loading trade juurcal of Capada, has issued a epecial fall odition which is bofore ua ard is a pery creditsblo issue. The Times containe fall trado news frum every part of the Dominion, ond ite editorial commeais on curront buoiness matters of in'orest display thought and skill.

Rhorles Journal of Banking has tho following, which we commend to our bank managors:-"The valuo of publicity in banking operations has nowbero boon more forcibly illustrated than in the caso of tho London joint slock banks. About twolvo months age, actiog on tho suggestion of Mr. Goschon, the Chancollor of the Exchequer, the banks montioned began to make monthly statemonts of their condition. The suggestion was made soon aftor the Baring failure, and was intonded as a moans of counteracting the dangerously small reserves that were then kept by the banks. Tbe effect of this publicity, bocause of the desire to stand woll bofore tho public, has bcen a grajual increase ir, the amount of the stock reserves held. In June, 1890 the lowest reserve held by any one of the banks was 62 per ceni. and the Lighest 15.4 per cent., the average was 10.3 per cent. of liabilities to tho public. In June, 1892, there was no one of the banke that held less than 104 per cent., the biphest reservo held being 155 , and the averago 12.1 per cent. of liabilities. Now, there is no law requiring the ee banke to koop any percentage of reservo whatever. Their managers aro left to their best judgment as experienced bankors. The point to be especirlly marked is, that the law of publio opinion evoked by the regularly publieher reporte of the condition of the banks, acte as fornib'y as a regularly enscted act of parliament conld do. Moreover, it leaves the bank managers more free to use their resources in accordance wi'h the laws of domand and suprly, and at the same time to fix the minimum reserve necersary to be kept to secure safety by a kind of common agreement. Publicity of banking operations has long been the rule in this country, and many fortures of the business now rogulated by arbitrary lars, can be beneficially left to the law of public opinion enforced by publighed reports."

An ordinance passed sume iitlle time since ty the City Cuanci!, has a further reach than we think was intended. Having been reforred to the Governor in Council and baving remained there for the period of thisty daye without being vetood, it has gone into operation and has the ferce of law. We refer to the ordinanco recuaring all bawbere, pedlars, ard othere who retail produce, atc., in this city, and who do not pay rates and taxes to the city, to take out licenses and to pay $\$ 25$ per year for doing ${ }^{\text {a }}$. We agree with this regulation 80 far $n$ a it affects parties who go about the streets with teams peddling produce, meat, etc., from door to door, to the irjary of the r:galar retailers who bave to pay rents, rates and taxos But it is irtended to enforce it also against vessels laden with pioduca, e03l, eic., that come from the outports and from P. E. Island. This morks an injustice to the poor man who Las always beon acejustomed to lay in his win'or's stock of coal, potatoes, turnips, cabbsges, sourbraut and whit net at the wharves direct from the vessels. We think this ordinsnce could wise!y be amended.

Dry Goods.--The past week has beon a quiet one fith wholesalers in some lines, but general trado bas been good. Tho demand has indeed been brisk in all but the heaviest wcolien goods. Buyors continus to be cautious and wary but staple lines are bolng bought in farly large quantitios. Huhdag nopeities ara beigg taiked up in an deaiers ald pickiog iop ieaders fur their holidag trade. Mony dines aro boing shown, but must uf the whulo ealers hape not as get receipail full lines of this chaes of gouds. Dress twoeds are Dut selling as freeiy as befure, but the great domand is hum on biack and Lavy serges. The old stand-bpa hape suid woil thie aeasun in ail varioties and at present stocks are generaily yaity com. Aithuagh mhubsaiers mero prepared for a muderato demand, they dud nut antivipate su great a reaction In thoir favor as has been met with. Muat uf tho thavoïora luff un the A slight increses of cold in tho roather may and doubliess will cause a apeoig change in this aituation. Thuagh a caajuraty of the travelitsa are carrying samples of spriag guods it io got two eariy tu gaugo the tosl fucling of the trade regarding thuse lines.

Breadstupfs, -There is a fair local movement in floar, and figares are nominaliy unchanged, but the feeling 15 weak and consideratioshading would be done from quotations to effect eales of round lots. Cornmeai and oatmeal, feed ond bran are very quite prith only a small and languld consumptive demand. In Chicago wheat and corn have remained pracucalig unchanged so far as official quotatious go, but as immense quantines are steadily coming " in eight" and tho Europoan markots are not oncouraging thero is no strongth in cereals in the West. Tho English markot is reportod to bo lower than ever, owing to the darge quanticits of cursigred Luar guiog cror from the United States.

prices aro atcady. Receipts of drossed hoge at this markot are smaller 80 far this season than usual, as killore are waiting for coldor wasthor than wo havo had bofore slaughtoring in largo numbors. Creamery could bo moved at 23c. for lato made, but holders ask le. moro, Which 18 quite suffictent to blocts business. Tho same with dairy, which is soleable at 18 c . to 14 c . for fioo to choice Western, ond at 20c. to 2lc. for Townships in round lots, but sollers ast more money, and so tho trado in export account is almost nin. Cablo advices from Eigland are not as oncouraging as those by mall, ond shippers say they can do no business at the limits sent out. A farr local demand is oxperionced at abont last weok's prices, although dealers hero say this is boing in.arfored wilh by farmers and factorymen going direct to tho grocors and poddling their goods from store to store." A London correspondent writes:-" Buyers, dirgusted at the continuance of tho boom in butter, baro boen holding off to a groat extoat this week; but thear abeoces has not beon felt, as supplios continue to come in decreased quantity, our chief depondenco, Denmark, turaigg out less overy wook, the early setting in of tho low outpat poriod boing accountod for oy tho eoarcity of grass throughout Dedmark, stablefeeding having to be resorted to, which decreases buth qualitg and quantity. The beat Danish has been disposed of at 132s. easily, whilo forward aalos are making at 130 s., with no ctoar signs that this will be the baltiog spot unlegs Australastan comes to the rescue of the purchaser. Angthing belorp the best bas, however, not been easy to sell, ond secoudary descriptiona havo quitted below 1203 . Howover, tho demand for choico largo apples is good, and beltor rosults may bo oxpected whon tho Canadion fill fruit ceases to arrive. Boston Baldwins as a rulo show satisfactory quality, but at presont they bhase in the general depression of values. Many lots of Now York Bald. wins aro of small siza and dirty color. Some ferr Maino Baldwins received this Feek looked well, and givo promiso of good quality this season." Pattioulars of the recent auction sales of fall apples in Liverpool havo been recelred, which fully confiem formor cablo roports. ## The Annand Mine Transformed.

Resulld of Six Wecks Work, directed by Alfred Woodholloc, F. G. S., and Alanager Boyel of the Nota Scotia Gold Mfincs, Limitert.
Friday last was a perfect day for an outing, and we dotermined to drise to Montagu and anspect the work done at tho Annand mino sinco its trans. for-some six weoks ago-to Mr. Alfred Woudhouso, the Director of .ho Nova Scotia Gold Mines, Limi'ed.

In company with Mr. G. F. Monckion, of Shorbrooko, wo loft Datt. mouth behnad one of Greon's trutters shortly after noun, and an huri's drive through charming lake and woodland cuantry bruught us to the n.ice.

On every hand wo noted signs of activity, a ad that many improvomesis had been introduced, all tending to save expense in handling tho oro an liw tho consequont increaso of profite. Not a dollar was being mis-spent in costly buildings or expensivo machinery, but, utilizing the material on hand with some nocessary additions, the mino was boing rapidly put in conditios for deep and continuous miniog on an extensive scale. On our previos visit we noticed that the shafts had been sunk on the dips of the lead, that the ore fins raised to the surfaco in tubs, dumped and then loadel os bullock carts and hauled some distance to the crusher, where it was brectes by hand and fed to tho batteries.

Now wo noted that in six short weok a most substantisl head goar 1.3$]^{\prime}$ been erected over No. 5 shaft, and that a high trestle had beon nearly cue. pleted connecting tho new deck head with the upper part of the mill Later, on inspection, wo found that the work of converting No. 5 inclic? shaft into a threo compartment vertical main shaft was progressing rapidls, that the mino was being placed in ordoz for overhead stoping. and that the ore cars as loaded in the mine rould soon be delivering their load to thy ore bin at tho crusher without breaking bulk.

All this work is nearing completion bosides many other improvoment, which wo shall treat of in their order, and yet the regular work of the misa has beon so littlo interferrod with that in the six weeks since the compat took control the mino bas yiolded in folld sume eighteen thousand dillart. Mr. Woodhouse, Managor Boyd and the stalf of sub-managers aro to te congratulated for this magnificent showing, which all goes to provo thi Nova Scotian gold mines, well managed, can bo made as productivo as ajp in the rorld.

We havo beon tempted into this slight digression to picturo the mino 4 it was before the present company took it ovor and as it lookod at the tiea of our visit, so that some idea of the work dono by the now managem:: might bo arrived at. Wo will now proceed with tho account of our vis hesdequaters.

Passing a nctics conspicuously posled on tho roadsido forbidde admittance, tre drove to the Company's headquarters, the modest Ek: coltage, where Mr. Woodhouro and Mr. Busd revide. Joth were entre? but Mr. Woodhouso suun appeared, and un hearing uur orrand a: us agreed to show us orer tho mino.

First wo inspected tho headquarters, which used to bo a shop s:i dwelling combined. The shop is now an oflico, and on the counter min, pilo of quartz, every pieco showing coarso gold. Opening a small safel. Woodhouso produced a saucer cunlamang sume small bars of gold atas: chips to the value of several hundred dollars. All this and much beits had been obtained from refuse stuff, which Mr. Woolhouso treats in manner pecular io himself. Off tho offics a plan room is boing fitt.1-

Tho ton stamp mill is in a suitablo building, and is of Matheson's make. It is hero that Mr. Woodhouso is particularly at home. and it is to saving gold ho turne his keonost attontion.

As tho tailings pass the screens from the battorios they aro recoived upor a plato with tho outer ecigo turued up. This roverses tho flow to tho back of tho plato, where through a narrow opening thoy drop upon threo or four narrow p'ates arranged atop-liko, and then flow over largo plates to a trough which conducla thom to the Australian percussion tables. Vory little froo gold escapes beyond the drip-plates, and tho systom is must satisfactory. Mr. Woodhouse has paid much attention th cuncuntration and whth farly astonishing results. Two Australian percussion tabies, built at an oxponse of only $\$ 15$ each, traat tho tailinge, nad have waved of an average per ton of tailings treated $1 \frac{1}{2}$ ozs. quicksilvor, 7 dwta. juld ama'ram and 6001 lbs . concentrates worth $\$ 40$ per ton onough to pay part at least of the expenses of manng and milling the ore. These are simple lacts and pruve that in the past au monenso amount of gold has boon lost in the syatem of milaing herotufure 10 vogue in this Provinco. Some tons uf tailints, refuse that had been treated threo tines oser, havo boou treated by Mir. Whodlouse on these percussion tables and have paid well for the troublo.

A Wiswoll Mill for grinding tho tailings is being put up in a shed stlached to the mill, and Mr. Woodhouso states he has no hesitation in declaring that ho will prove its capability of successfully doing its work.

Taking a pan of tailings he duftly washed tho matorial soun, showing a quantity of concontrates, and then demonstrated his mothod of saving tho quicksilver by washing a handful of tailings on a shovel-shaped shivored plate upon which soveral globules of yuivinalver remained.

A minor improvemont is a preparation fur application to tho cams of the baltery, which makes them smooth as glass, and does away with the danger of oil or greaso.

We spont an interesting hour in the mill, and then strolled over to tho masin or No. 5 shaft, passing on the way a large steel boiler that has just been set up. This boiler and the now machinery has been sneored at as eccond hand, while in fact it was purchasei from the Gould Concentrating Compiny and was quito now. It is rofreshing, howover, to hear au English Company accusod of parsimony, as in tho past English Companies bero have all beon ruined by extravagau! outlay on surface plant.

At the pit head wo net manager lioyd busily superintending the construction of tho throo cumpartm nut shaft, and descend the ladder way, admining the substartial charactis of the work as far as the laddore, had been placed. Two of the compartments aro fur hoisting ore, and the third is for tho pumping gear and the ladders. Tho founda tion for tho pump has been buit up from the bed rock and is capped with Scotch granite. The material was all on hand and the work has been done at tho lowest possiblo cost.

The framosork of the hoisting apparatus is most substantial, and is all completed but not housed in. We asconded to the level of tho high dump on a line with the top of the tressol, and noted that there was spice for dumping an immense amount of refuse rock bofore the tressel had been filled in solid.

A narrow stairmay with a railing on one side and a sheor fall on the other led to the top of the framing, and from hore a fine viow spas cibtaned orer the tholo mining camp and way beyond.

When the tressol work is comploted thero will be a saving of 25 cents Per ton ou all the ore deliverod at the mill.

After luncheon wo again visited tho mill, which was not running preFiously, and saw Mr. Woodhouso's pistout tup and buttom amaljamator in peration. It is simp!e and wo should judge inexponsive, and was attached to tho lorer plates. It consists of tro corrugated plates placed one above Ghe other with just enough space nut to impedo the thow of the sand. Wo bro not sumiciontly postod to speak of its work, but Mr. J. C. Mcluarrio, fs goed an amalgamator as oxists, seemed very much pleased with tho results Then it was examined after half an hour's run.
of Timo fairly flows so interesting did overything prove, and wo had to lepart without visiting tho mine underground, reserving that for another day. As we were bidding good-byo the assajer came in with a lump of bold weighing 31 ozs., all obtainod as a result of a day's work on refuse pailings, and it seemed as though Mr. Woolhouse is turning overything to torer hos into gold.
1 . ilo good work go on, as the assured success of tho Nova Scotia Folu iu.ies, Limited, means unliunted capital for the gold mines of Nova Scotia. Vorily tho "dosort shall blussom sike a roso" and the barrens of thas prevince-and there are milos of them-shail y reld untud woath.

Solubitity of Good in Putassium Cyanide．－That motallic gold is soluse in cyanido of potassium has long boen known as a sciontific fact．Faradr pointed out that gold－leaf immersed in tho solution becamo so thin that transmittod green light．Princo Bagration observed（J．pr．Chom．xxxi， $36 i$ that the very firely divided gold obtained by precipitating a solution of 5 chloride with ferrons solphate may bo dissolved by this reagent．E＇p， showed，howoror，（J．pr．Cham．xxxvii，333，）that tho presonce of oxygai） required for the solution of the golds．A solution is obtsined which， evaporation，yiolds colorlees nctahodral cryatals of the emposition KAuC） （suro－potassic cyanido）which may be looked upon as a double cyanide： sold and potassium（KCy．AvCy．）The resotion which occurs may，therfi． probably bo represented by the tollowing equation：

Thero are two interesting points indicated by the sbovo cquation of： it is well to bear in mind in conjunction with tho application of potass： cyanide as a solvent for gold on a commercial scale．

1．That the quantity of cyenido theoretically necessary to dissolvo a gir Weight of gold is infloitesimal in comparison with the weight actoin required in practice．Taking $\mathrm{Au}=196.8, \mathrm{~K}=39.04$ ，and $\mathrm{Cy}=235$ wo see that 130.04 parts by weight of potassium cyanide should be c3pis of dissolving 196.8 parts of gold，or，approximately，tivo patts of cyanide should disbolve three parts of gold．The minimum actual sumption in treating free milling ore，assaying，let us ssy， 10 dwts part is absut 3 lbs．per oz．of gold recovered－roughly， 40 parts by weight cyanido for I part of gold．In the leaching tanks alone a pound of cyst is generally consumed per ton of material treated．
