



ECLIPSES IN 1846.

There will be but two Eclipses this year, and both of the Sun.

I. April 25, an Annular Eclipse visible at Halifax, as follows:

But a small portion of the Sun's disk will be obscured, about $\frac{1}{2}$ digits. This Eclipse will be visible in the United States, Great Britain, Sweden, France, Italy, &c.

II. October 20, an Annular Eclipse Oh. 32m. morning, invisible in the British Provinces of North America, but central in the interior of Africa.

WEATHER TABLE.

The following Table (ascribed to Dr. Herschel, and revised by Dr. Adam Clarke), constructed upon philosophical considerations of the attraction of the Sun and Moon, in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by experience of many years' actual observation, furnishes the observer, without further trouble, with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding, and that so near the truth, that in very few instances will it be found to fail.

Explanation.—It will be seen from the above, 1st. That the nearer the time of the Moon's change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter, is to *Midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following; the space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2dly. That the nearer to *Midday*, or *Noon*, these phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet the weather may be expected during the next seven days; the space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon, to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to summer, though they effect spring and autumn to a considerable extent.

3rdly. That the Moon's Change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter, happening during the six afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as it is noted in the Table.

Though the weather is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring; yet in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

The two following observations are from the ingenious Dr. Kirwan:

1. When there has been no particular storm about the time of the Spring equinox (March 21), if a storm arise in the East on or before that day, or if a storm from any point of the compass arise near a week after the equinox, then, in either of these cases, the succeeding summer is generally *dry*, four times in five.

2. But if a storm arise from the S. W. or W. S. W. on or just before the Spring equinox, then the summer following is generally *wet*, five times in six.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

LEFT HAND PAGE.

COLUMN, 1st and 2d, contain the days of the month and of the week.
3d and 4th. The rising and setting in mean time, of the highest point, or of the *upper limb* of the sun, corrected for refraction.

5th. Days length in hours and minutes.

6th. The Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is *slow* or *fast* of the clock) at noon, *apparent* time (not mean) at Greenwich, or at a quarter before eight in the morning at Halifax.

7th. The Sun's declination, for the same as the Equation, 6th column.

8th The rising or setting of the Moon. The setting being given from the New Moon to Full, and her rising from Full to New Moon.

9th. The place of the Moon in the Ecliptic.

10th. The time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian.

11th. Days increase or decrease in hours and minutes.

The top of the columns of each month shows the moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the sun.

The FARMER'S CALENDAR is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

RIGHT HAND PAGE.

1. Contains the days of the month.
2. Sundays, Phenomena, Anniversaries, &c.
3. Time of High Water at Halifax.
4. Annapolis.
5. Charlotte Town, P. E. Island.
6. Windsor, and St. John, N. B.

of that tide which immediately precedes the southing of the moon. These four columns being computed on the supposition, that the time of High Water on the days of New and Full Moon (*L'établissement du port*) is at Halifax, 7h. 15m.—at Annapolis, 10h. 45m.—at Charlotte Town, 10h. 15m.—and at Windsor, and St. John, N. B. 11h. 45m. All the calculations in this Almanack are made to *mean* solar time, a mode of computation now in general use, and which will very soon supersede the old mode of reckoning. *Mean* time can be converted into *apparent* time, by subtracting the quantity in the sixth column of the left hand calendar pages, when the Sun is *slow* of clock, and adding it when *fast*.

Manure is the wealth of the farmer. This proposition cannot be too often repeated and enforced, for on its full belief, and a corresponding practice, the success of a farmer mainly depends. Manure, wherever it may be found on the farm, is beneficial, but it never does all the good it might, unless it is properly and judiciously applied. Most farmers are content if they are able to empty their yards once in two or three years of the accumulated piles of straw and cattle manure, at a loss of nearly one half its efficient qualities. Compost, or a mixture of earth with common manure, kept in a pile until the union and decomposition is perfect is undoubtedly the best application that can be made to land. The efficient power is also greatly increased, as the earths employed in making the pile absorb the gases produced by the decomposition of the vegetable and animal matter, and becomes

nearly of equal value. The mud which accumulates in swamps and low lands, where it lies useless and unproductive, may in this manner be converted into one of the most active restorers of exhausted soils. The yarding of cattle is to be preferred where practicable, to suffering them to run at large, and the additional quantity of manure made by stabling will, independent of the saving in fodder, nearly pay the expense of erecting stables for their accommodation. Common sense would teach a farmer that the sooner manure, when applied to the soil, can be put under the surface, the better the effect will be, and the less of its fertilizing qualities will be lost. Spread over the surface it certainly does good, but in a much less degree than when put under the surface. Root Culture is one of the best gifts which modern improvement has bestowed upon husbandry. It gives the most animal food with the least labour; it is, under good management the most certain in its returns; it gives the most manure; it best ameliorates the soil, and fits it for dry crops; and it affords an important link in the chain of alternation.

The great point in all is to produce the most marketable flesh from a given quantity of food. A good pig is judged therefore, by the same criterion as neat stock. The profits of crops, as well as of cattle, depend mainly upon the return they make for the food and labour bestowed upon them. The man who grows a hundred bushels of corn, or makes a hundred pounds of meat, with the same means and labour that his neighbour expends to obtain fifty bushels, or fifty pounds, has a manifest advantage; and while the latter merely lives, the former, if prudent, must grow rich. He gains the entire value of the fifty bushels or fifty pounds. This disparity in the profits of agricultural labour and expenditure is not a visionary speculation, it is a matter of fact which is seen verified in many parts of the country. We see one farmer raise 80 bushels of corn on an acre of land, with the same labour, but with more foresight in keeping

his land in good tilth, and feeding better his crop, that his neighbour employs upon an acre, and who does not get 40 or even 30 bushels. This difference results from the manner of feeding and tending the crop. Dung is the basis of all good husbandry. *Dung feeds the crops; crops feed the cattle; cattle make dung.* This is truly the farmer's endless chain—not a link of it should be broken, or be suffered to corrode, by indolence or want of use—once broken, and the power it imparts is lost—preserved, and kept bright by use, it becomes changed into gold. The man who wastes the means of perpetuating fertility in his soil, may be likened to the unfortunate sons of opulence, who waste, in habits of indolence and dissipation, the hard earned patrimony of their fathers. Put in early farm crops, as Barley, Oats and Spring Wheat; a few days delay sometimes makes a loss equal to all the nett profits.

No more, however, being required of the farmer, than that he shall make the most of his situation, the principle applies equally to all; and, in like manner, is equally correct and beneficial in all situations and circumstances. These three fundamental principles hang or fall together, but when they are all acted upon; when the land is kept dry, clean, and in good heart, the farmer may expect a suitable reward for the trouble and expense bestowed upon its cultivation. Draw out all your manure; Corn will bear plenty of it, and it will bear plenty of Corn--every load will tell.

Universal experience has proved, that to sow wheat a second time upon the same land, without an intermediate crop, is exhausting the soil, and if pursued for any length of time, eventually unprofitable to the farmer. Clover has been called the "Mother of Wheat," and the ley is justly a favorite preparation of the crop; but it ought not to be repeated more than once in eight years, and it should only be sown when the ground is in such a state of cleanliness, and so well manured (upon a previous crop) as to ensure the production of an abundant sward of grass; for, if this be not obtained, the wheat will invariably be found proportionably deficient. On good lands, which do not

require a second year in grass, it will also be found most advisable to break it up after the first year's crops have been taken off; in which case the wheat may be sown upon a single ploughing, and thus a very considerable expense will be saved in the tillage of the ground. The tilled crops which ought to precede wheat, and which should receive the long manure, are Indian Corn, Peas, Potatoes, and all other root crops, and, upon a manured old grass ley, it may follow Oats, or Oats and Peas. It should be preceded by no other small grain. The culture of spring wheat in Lower Canada, &c. has almost superseded winter wheat upon fresh cleared lands. Although it gives ordinarily a less product than winter-varieties, and though the grain be somewhat inferior, yet the crop is more certain. More seed is required of spring wheat, than of wheat sown in the autumn.

In Great Britain, agriculture has received the fostering care of the goverment, in her agricultural surveys, premiums, and protecting duties; and she is indebted to this branch of her industry more, probably, than to her commerce or manufactures singly, for her unprecedented state of prosperity. No country has made greater strides in agricultural improvement during the last fifty years, than Scotland, under the stimulating influence of her agricultural societies, and the thousands of pounds she has annually distributed in premiums. Contrast with that of England, the social and pecuniary condition of Spain, where agriculture has received no encouragement from the government.

Sheep are much like birds, requiring a clear air for respiration, much exercise, frequent change of place, dry, clean lodging, and nutritious aromatic feed. Sheep in good weather uniformly select the dryest and most elevated bed for nightly repose; severe winds greatly annoy them, and drive them into the placid valley—sheep shut up in a pen soon die. The pasture for sheep should be high, dry, warm land, the more disposed to the production of aromatic plants, the better—some high lands are springy and wet, which is deadly and ruinous to sheep. Sheep when confined in common pastures, are continually roving and traversing it, which

soon renders the unconsumed grass foul, and impedes its growth, from their social habits, having selected their lodging, they are exceeding tenacious of their resting place, which soon become offensive and unhealthy; they should therefore always be changed from one enclosure to another, as often as once a week, or at most once a fortnight, that the grass may be washed by rains and dews, and the sheep be furnished with clean lodging—in the interim the grass can grow undisturbed and is fresh, sheep should be fed at regular periods in the winter, and likewise have regular gentle exercise to circulate the blood, invigorate the system, so as to enable them to resist the cold. It gives them an appetite, and facilitates the digestion of the food—being a ruminating animal, they should be allowed quiet for this office. Lambs should be separated from the old sheep, feeble and old sheep separated from the rugged.

September is the month in which the great staple crop is put in the ground. Experience has shown, that unless in extraordinary cases, wheat sown in this month succeeds better than in any other. August is generally too hot—the ground is dry, the dews which aid the young wheat so materially, fall sparingly, and the germination and first growth is imperfect and comparatively feeble. If sown much later, unless very late, it does not get rooted sufficiently to endure the winter well, and frequently suffers much from freezing out. Where it is intended to sow wheat after corn, this crop should be cut up and removed from the ground as early as its maturity will admit. If the ground is well manured for the corn, as it always should be, and well cultivated a crop of wheat

may properly follow corn, and but comparatively little labour in ploughing is required to get in the seed. The quantity of seed on such land should be about a bushel and a half per acre, and it should be well harrowed in; do not fear harrowing too much after the seed is sown, and a heavy harrow is better than a light one, unless the soil itself is very light. Passing the roller over the new sown grain is an improvement, as it ensures germination, and leaves the surface in a suitable state for gathering the grain. Prepare your seed by liming and brining it—you may not fear smut, but the young plant will be sufficiently benefitted by the process, to reward the trouble; above all things use clean seed. trust no man's word that his seed is perfectly clean, unless a few hands full spread on the table and examined thoroughly, show that it is free from every thing but pure wheat.

Farm tools and implements should be substantially made, of good pattern, kept in good order for use, and when not in use, protected from the weather—a slight made implement is likely to break, and occasion a loss of time in getting it repaired—a bad pattern is always dearer in the end, whatever be its price, than a good one. "It will do well enough for the present," should never satisfy you. The loss in putting implements in order, at the moment they are wanted, often causes serious delay, besides they can be put in order at leisure times or during stormy weather. Exposure to the weather soon impairs the value of the best tools,

It is better to spend ten minutes to carry a tool to its place, than to spend an hour, as is often the case, in looking for it when it is out of its place. There is nothing more vexing than to have to send through a neighbourhood for one's tools when we are in immediate want of them. A good farmer will seldom borrow—a bad one will seldom buy, as long as he can borrow. Of the tools not in common use on a farm, we commend to you particularly to the hay or straw cutter—it will enable you to save one quarter of your fodder. The cultivator will soon save its cost in the economy of labour it effects, in drilled or hoed crops, and in most cases, is a better implement in this culture than the plough. A revolving horse-rake will earn its cost in a season; and a roller is indispensable in good farming. The drill-barrow, the corn sheller, and the potatoe hook are also useful and economical.

be a further saving in the wear and tear of waggons and carts, and in delays and accidents incident to bad roads. The business of road making has attracted very little of the public attention. Although the construction of roads is as much an art as common trades and as much of a science as other branches of civil engineering where good roads are the order of the day ; yet with us the superintendance of their construction and repair is entrusted to all professions - to farmers, mechanics, lawyers, &c. who seldom understand much of the art, and know nothing of the science, and who are too often guided by self interest, or caprice, and often rather mar than mend the work of their predecessors. Look out for fire wood ; frost seasons wood rapidly, and if you cut and split it now, the trouble of drawing tons of water to your wood-house may be avoided. Nothing can justify scolding in a woman, but a smoking house, and a fire of green wood.

Late Letters will be received on payment of sixpence each, from the time of the arrival of the Steamer from Boston until the final closing of the Mail, which will be two hours previous to the time fixed for her departure. Should the Steamer not have arrived by 9, A. M. on the 3d and 18th, Letters for England may be posted *without fee*, until her arrival; after that period, the fee will be required until the time for closing the Mail.

Postmaster no longer despatch or receive correspondence *free*. Addresses to Her Majesty *pass free*; with these exceptions all Inland and British Letters or Packets are subject to the following rate of postage.

Newspapers forwarded to the United Kingdom, or to any British Colony by way of the United Kingdom, when conveyed by Her Majesty's Packets, will not be liable to any Inland or Packet Postage.

Colonial Newspaper not exceeding *two ounces* in weight, when sent by Post to any Town in Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, Canada or Prince Edward Island pay *one halfpenny per sheet*; To any Foreign Country, the United States excepted, whether intended to pass through the United Kingdom or not, pay as above. To the United States, by the land mail via St Andrews or Woodstock, *one penny*. This inland postage, except on such Newspaper as are addressed to Towns in Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, Prince Edward Island or Canada, must be *prepaid* by the Senders or they cannot be forwarded. The limitation as to weight does not apply to Newspapers addressed the United Kingdom: but any Colonial Newspaper sent by Post to any other place, and exceeding the weight of *two ounces*, will be liable to postage as a pamphlet.
