first at the age. Our age is pre-eminently

with our own. Gibbon tells us that the
slave population of the Roman Empire was
equal to the free, or 60,000,000. In Athens
were only \$4,000 citizens and 400,000 slaves.
Many of these slaves were of the same
blood as their masters; often famous captives. Plato was sold by Dionysius into
slavery, and Aesop, Terence and Epictetus
were slaves. The Roman Colosseum was
built by 12,000 captive Jews, taken to
Rome. Their lives nung solely upon the
will of their masters. On one occasion, Emperor Augustus, dining at the house of Vedius Pollio, a slave carrying a crystal goblet, slipped and broke it. Vedius, in a rage,
ordered him seized at once and cast into a
fish pond as food for fishes. To-day the
people are the rulers, and kings and emperors are their servants. The fact of our time,
which overshadows all others, is the arrival
of democracy, based on a great ethical

But again, ours is an age of widely diffused intelligence. The printing press, facilities for travel and numerous inventions have wrought marvels. The masses in our age talk familiarly of evolution, higher criticism and the rights of man. Woe to the leaders in pulpit, on platform, or with pen, who fail to keep abreast with the advanced thought of the age! An Age of Catholicity.

But again, ours is an age of broad Catholicity; of liberty, not license. The denominational battle axes have been buried. A marked feature of the age is the outreaching of Christian hands to grasp other hands. while the lips ask, not "Is your creed as my creed?" but "is your heart as my heart? if so, give me your hand!" This catholic spirit is evidenced in the Parliament of Religions, the utterances of Cardinal Satolli and Bishop Ireland, the National Council of Women and the Knights of Labor.

But, again, ours is an age of woman; yes, the new woman. "The new woman," says a friend of woman's progress and of the workingman, "is but the old woman developed by the necessities of the times. She has come into her kingl im, and has come to stay. A weapon of offence and defence more powerful than dynamite will soon be given to woman at large. She should have it, for it was her birthright from time immemorial. If she can not make better use of it than men do sometimes she must be idlotic, indeed." Two hundred vocations previously closed to her are now open. Few universities bar their doors against her, as did Oxford and Cambridge. Nothing, perhaps, more strikingly proves woman's advance than her actual participation in govaps, more strikingly proves woman's ad ance than her actual participation in gov ernment.

I speak to-day to our leaders in the greatest of reforms. What are the characteristics needed in such times as I have just pictured, that the hearts of the people may safely rest in us, as in Hczekiah, the king?

1. Unselfishness-self-sacrifice. The self-seeking spirit brings its own destruction.

Luther's sacrifice makes the Reformation possible. The fire kindled about Savonarola filled all Europe with light.

The latest and most profound message of evolution is this: "From the very beginnings of life we have not only the struggle for existence—the survival of the fittest—but also the struggle for others, or altruism."

2. A second characteristic for leadership in our age must be a profound sense of the dignity of man—intense loyalty to the common people. Such an enthusiasm as the Earl of Shaftesbury manifested, when talking to Frances Power Cobbe of the wrong of young girls, tears came to his eyes, his voice trembled, and he said: "When I feet how old I am, and know I must soon die. I hope it is not wrong, but I feel I cannot bear to go and leave the world with all the misery in it."

3. A third essential for leadership in our age is spiritual vision—a vision of God—the life "hid with Christ in God," dally communion.

the life "hid with Christ in God," dally communion.

In a chapel of the Church of Santa Croce in Florence, is a wonderful picture by Giotto of the death of St. Francis. Eleven brothers of his order kneel beside the bed. This vision of God implies surrender to the Holy Spirit, the indwelling Christ as comforter, guide—not merely to be born of the spirit, but filled and anointed for special service.

We should utilize it, and stick to this, our point of advantage. Let the steamers go where they choose at either end of the voyage, after landing mails and passengers. If it takes five steamers to do the work thus entailed on them, mistead of three, how is that going to hurt Canada or the Canadians? 
