KAISER AS A PEACEMAKER

Rumors of Early Peace Negotiations in London Take on More Definite Form.

KRUGER HAS SANCTIONED THE MOVE

Something Apparently is on Foot Whether Emperor William is in it or Not.

London, July 25.—The rumor as to early peace negotiations, which has pervaded the House of Commons for some days, says the Daily Express, "has taken the concrete form that Emperor William is soon to assume the role of peacemaker. Mr. Kruger and his advisers are represented as having empowered the Kaiser to act for the Boers, and he is considered willing to take the initiative in order to popularize his relations with the German people, who disapprove his retention in Great Britain. Something apparently is on foot, whether Emperor William is in it or not."

KRUGER AT THE HAGUE

The Hague, July 25.—Mr. Kruger arrived here this afternoon and proceeded to the residence of Mr. Wolmarans, one of the Boer envoys at Scheveningen, a watering place on the North Sea.

CANDIDATES NOMINATED

G. N. Kidd in Carleton and D. MacPherson in Glengarry. Ottawa, July 25.—G. N. Kidd, M.L.A., was chosen to-day at Stittsville to again represent Carleton in the next provincial election. The choice was unanimous and no other candidate was mentioned. The convention was attended by Conservatives from all parts of the riding. Much enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. J. P. Whitney was expected, but he was unable to attend.

D. MacPherson in Glengarry. Alexandria, Ont., July 25.—A convention was held here to-day by the Liberals of Glengarry County for the selection of a candidate for the coming provincial election. All but seven of the thirty-one polling divisions were represented. D. MacPherson of Lancaster, who represented the county in the Patrons' interest from 1894 to 1898, and who was unsuccessful in 1898, received the majority of the votes cast.

TRACKMEN RECEIVE AID

Financial Support Coming in From Many Labor Unions. The striking Canadian Pacific Railway trackmen are receiving a great deal of financial support from labor unions, and other associations throughout the Dominion. Reports go to show that nearly all of the strikers are now working, many being employed by farmers, receiving from \$35 to \$40 per month. In Toronto a number of the men have been engaged by the Street Railway Company. Donald Wilkinson, chairman of the Toronto Strike Committee, was in Peterboro last night, where he addressed a meeting of trackmen.

SERIOUS FIRE IN DAVENPORT

One Hundred Families Homeless and \$750,000 Lost. Davenport, Iowa, July 25.—Fire had laid waste an area of sawmill and residence property here this evening equal to 30 blocks, causing a loss of \$750,000. The flames started in a pile of kindling-wood, and, with a brisk breeze blowing, were carried into the lumber yards of Meyerhauser Denkmann, which was totally destroyed. The fire was caused by a spark from a train to desert the yards. The fire then pushed its way into the residence district. Over 50 houses were destroyed, 100 families being rendered homeless. At 10 o'clock the fire was under control. It is believed there were no fatalities.

LARGEST EVER MADE

Mr. Clarke Contracts for 219,000 Cords of Hardwood. Montreal, July 25.—(Special)—Mr. F. H. Clarke has signed a contract with Mr. H. R. McNeil of St. John, N.B., which is the largest of its kind ever entered into in America, and means that Mr. McNeil has undertaken to cut and skid 300 cords of hardwood per day for two years.

SAILOR HAD BUBONIC

East Indian Taken to Hospital and the Ship Disinfected. New York, July 25.—Health Officer Doty and his staff, while examining the crew of the German steamship Hochstetler, which arrived on Monday morning, 45 days from India, discovered that a stoker, an Indian seaman named Babynay, was afflicted with bubonic plague.

MADE IT \$10,000

Ottawa, July 25.—The City Council decided to-night to increase its grant for the reception of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall from \$2500 to \$10,000.

THOUSANDS LEFT HOMELESS

Great Distress in Yangtze Valley—Court's Present Headquarters. Shanghai, July 25.—The floods in the Yangtze Valley are causing great distress. Two of the main embankments have broken above Wuhu and flooded a thickly populated district for 40 or 50 miles. Tens of thousands of people have been rendered homeless, and the crops are destroyed.

OLDEST WOMAN IN ONTARIO

LORD MINTO AT HALIFAX

Received by a Guard of Honor and Prominent Nova Scotians, Halifax, July 25.—His Excellency the Governor-General, on landing from the steamer Minto this afternoon, was received by a guard of honor from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He was accompanied by Mr. J. G. Jones, others of the army, navy, militia, the Mayor and aldermen and other prominent persons were at the landing. His Excellency was driven to the House of Assembly, where Lieut-Gov. Jones and Chief Justice MacDonald were sworn in as members of the Privy Council. At 5 o'clock Lord and Lady Minto attended a garden party given by Admiral Bedford this evening. They dined with Lieut-Gov. and Mrs. Jones. Their Excellencies also attended a patriotic concert in the public gardens to-night, which was attended by 8000.

PEACE MISSION FAILED

Pittsburg, Pa., July 25.—The peace mission of M. M. Garland, who went to New York on behalf of the conservative element in the Amalgamated Association has failed. Mr. Garland was unable to secure from the steel manufacturers any terms on which a settlement could be reached. They would not concede an inch from the attitude they have taken, holding that the workers' leaders precipitated the fight and peace negotiations are off. At the same time, a more powerful influence is being sought to carry the olive branch to J. F. Morgan.

VISITED HOLT IN JAIL

Wife No. 1 Entertains No Ill-Feeling Against Eriess Spouse. London, July 25.—James Holt, jun., of Rochester, who was brought back from Saginaw, Mich., after eloping last week with a 16-year-old girl, was visited in jail this morning by his wife and pretty little girl. Mrs. Holt had a 15-minute interview with her erring spouse. She evidently nurtures no feelings of revenge for his desertion and unfaithfulness, for on going away she tearfully asked Governor Boston if "they had been treating him well down there." On being assured that Holt would receive good treatment she went away satisfied.

COOL SPELL WON'T LAST LONG

Weather Continues Rather Warm in Other Parts of Canada. The weather man in the Queen's Park reports the present cool spell as having developed in Ontario, and while there is no extreme heat in other sections of the atmosphere cooled off rapidly in Ontario and Manitoba, but in Eastern Canada there is some warm weather. A heavy rain in the Upper Lake region on Sunday and a high temperature marked in Toronto was 70. Detroit recorded a maximum of 86, and in the Western States there is very little relief in some localities 112 and 104 having been recorded.

FOUND BODY IN A MINE

Pittsburg, Pa., July 25.—When the miners resumed work in the Archbold mine this morning they found the body of John Hart, who has been missing for a week, lying under a pile of huge boulders.

CAUGHT DISEASE FROM COW

Almonte, July 25.—Mrs. D. Sheppard, who died here a few days ago, is supposed to have contracted consumption from a diseased cow, which, when slaughtered, was found to be lungless. She was 39 years of age.

WANTS LYCHERS FOUND

Rome, July 25.—Singer Prinetti, Minister of Foreign Affairs, in acknowledging the note from Washington regarding the lynching of two Italians at Erwin, Miss., declared his conviction that the search for the guilty parties should be instituted by the proper authorities so that the crime might not go unpunished as in previous cases.

SHAFER IN STAGE DISGUISE

Visits Wellsville in Theatrical Make-Up to Make Observations of the Strike Situation.

SUFFERING FROM MENTAL STRAIN

Amalgamated Leader Turns Over Work to Other Officials—Prospects of Long Struggle.

Pittsburg, July 25.—President Shaffer of the Amalgamated Association is known to be in Wellsville, Ohio, directing the strikers and gathering information concerning the fight in a curious theatrical make-up. He arrived in Wellsville dressed in his rolling mill attire and carried an oil carpet bag and a cotton umbrella. Over one eye was a black patch and he wore a profuse false beard. He had been carefully prepared by the make-up man of a Pittsburg theatre. When he got off the train he was subjected to jeers from the striking steel workers, but he assured them that he was not going to work. The identity of Mr. Shaffer was disclosed at the station as he was about to take the train for Pittsburg. He is at the Amalgamated club.
