addresses on methods of institute work. The session opened with a paper by Franklin Dye of Trenton, NJ., on "Training for Institute Work." The speaker touched on the personal ap-pearance of the workers-they should be gentlemanly, not foppish nor sloven-ly. No sarcasm should be used in auswering a farmer's beneat evention Inland N

ly. No sarcasm should be used in answering a farmer's honest question. He looked toward the time when the institute work would be graded into classes. There were three classes of speakers—the practical man, sometimes uncouth in his language; the trained speaker, who sometimes had danger-ously little knowledge, and the scien-tist. Sometimes, but rarely, the three characteristics were combined in one man — more often it would be found necessary to have a corps of workers who, combined, would cover the entire course of the work. The scientist who aimed to become an effi-cient institute worker should acquire cient institute worker should acquire the thought and expression current among the agricultural class. There was a large field for elevation in the condition of farm work and farm life. Instructors Must Be Practical.

Discussion on the paper was led by A. L. Martin of Harrisburg, Pa. Not every man who was first in agricultural science and knowledge, he said, was first as an institute worker. There must be the suble gift to impart in-struction so that the hearers will carry it into practice on their farms. The instructor must have practical experi-ence, otherwise his instruction would be taken with several grains of allow-


