GOVERNMENT ABLE TO DOIT Attorney General of United States Says Privilege is Constitutional-Courts However Can Arbitrate. Washington, May 6 .- In a long opinion on the question of railroad charges given in response to a request by Senator Stephen B. Elkins, chairman of the senate committee on interstate commerce, Attorney-General Moody con-siders the governmental power to reg-ulate the operation of railroads, espe-cially in the respect of fixing rates for transportation. by whom that power, so far as its exists in the national gov-ernment, may be exercised constitu-tionally, and what limits to the power, if any, are prescribed by the constitu-tion. The opinion, which is exhaustive, cites many cases dealing with railroad regulation from the time the matter was first tested, and quotes at length from the decisions of state and federal courts. Summing up, the attorney-general arrives at the following con-clusions: merce, Attorney-General Moody con

There is a governmental power to fix maximum future charges of car-riers by failroad, vested in the legisla-tures of the States with regard to transportation exclusively within the States, and vested in congress with re-gard to all other transportation. 2. Aitho legislative power, properly speaking, cannot be delegated, the law-making body having enacted into hav the standard of charges which shall control, may intrust to an administra-tive body not exercising in the true sense judicial power the duty to fix rates in conformity with that standard. 3. The rate-making power is not a judicial function and cannot be con-ferred constitutionally upon the courts of the United States, either by way of original or appellate jurisdiction. 4. The courts, however, have the power to investigate any rate or rates fixed by legislative authority and to determine whether they are such as would be confiscatory of the property of the carrier, and if they are judi-cially found to be confiscatory in their effect, to restrain their enforcement. 5. Any law which attempts to deprive the courts of this power is unconsti-tutional.
