Lord Crew's Reply to Government's Quest for Information as to Waterways Treaty.

OTTAWA, March 8.—(Special.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier to-day tabled the correspondence between Earl Grey and the imperial government relative to the delay in submitting the waterways treaty to the Canadian parliament. On Jan. 29 Earl Grey cabled: "Following sent to Bryce 'International boundary waters treaty. No copy received here. When can I expect copy for my ministers? Unfavorable comment in Canadian house of commons because no copy available, the treaty is before United States senate."

HE WAS IN A HURRY.

EMERSON, Man. (Special.)—An exasperated settler from Indiana, W. J. Vetch, bound to Saskatchewan with a car of horses and settlers' effects, was unloaded at the quarantine yards, and was delayed for hours by the crew and the quarantine regulation to a point of exasperation. Then he took command of the Canadian Northern line with a revolver and held up Engineer Sinclair of the switch to get the car spotted. He was up before Magistrate Whitman and Mayor Hamilton this morning and pleaded "guilty" to the hold up, stating that persuasion had failed and he was in desperate straits, having only \$25 and the family on the road to meet him. He had to do something desperate to get what he wanted. The magistrate said the gun would be confiscated, agreeing that the quarantine regulation and other such delays were somewhat exasperating.

MISS HAYES' RECITAL

Conservatory Hall was practically filled last night to hear Miss Norah Hayes' violin recital. She was assisted by George Dixon, (tenor), and Mrs. Gerard Barton, (accompanist), and all three acquitted themselves in a thoroughly masterly manner. Miss Hayes, it may be said at once, is a young violinist, charmingly girlish in presence, who has a very promising future before her. She came very near virtuosity last night in her playing of Wieniawski's second concerto, for violin and piano. If her tone lacked a little mellowness, this was due not to her bowing, but to her instrument. Her chromatic runs in the allegro moderato (first movement), were smooth and clear, and in the andante non troppo her interpretation was poetic, while her tone took on a genuine singing quality. Miss Hayes was again effective in Orndale's serenade for violin and piano, and in Paganini's Solfarella, where she showed skilful command of technique, especially in the staccato passages. She was cheered repeatedly, and was the recipient three times of beautiful bouquets.

EFFORT MADE TO ADOPT SALARY SCALE FOR 1909

Proposal Was Lost on Close Vote—Fear of "Pull" in This Year's Increases.

A determined but unavailing effort to have city salary scale come into effect this year, so as to avoid complications with the increases for 1909, was made in the city council yesterday. On Controller Ward introducing the by-law, to grade civic salaries, Ald. Foster moved to strike out the clause which made an exception of salaries included in the schedule. This clause, that all appointments, promotions and increases of salaries were to be made by the board of control on the recommendation of the board of appointment and approved by the council. Ald. Keeler argued that the effect of this would be to destroy the schedule. Only 210 votes were cast for the amendment. The alderman then proposed that the salary schedule be adopted for 1909, instead of Jan. 1, 1909. He declared there was danger that some of the salary increases this year might exceed the maximum provided in the schedule. There were rumors that this would be done in one or two cases. Controller Hocken admitted it was likely some increases recommended this year would be in excess of the prescribed annual increments, but said that if the schedule went into effect this year it would be unfair to some civic employees. The board had, however, no power to increase any salary beyond the maximum in the scale. Ald. R. E. Graham objected that there was nothing to prevent the controllers from raising salaries this year to the maximum, which might not otherwise be reached for five years. This way was open for employees to get "pulled" with the controllers and get unreasonably large increases. Ald. Foster consented to amend his motion so as to have the schedule become effective on Jan. 1, 1909. This narrowly escaped carrying, being lost on a close vote as follows: For—Ald. Keeler, R. H. Graham, Foster, Hocken, McWhinney, McMillan, Chisholm, J. J. Graham, Bengough, Breidin and Maguire—11. Against—The Mayor, Controllers Ward, Hocken, Keeler, R. E. Graham, Ald. McGhie, Church, Adams, McMurrich, Vaughan and O'Neill—11. The vote was taken in the committee stage. Later, in considering the by-law in council, Ald. Foster pressed his motion. It was defeated by 13 to 9, Ald. J. J. Graham and Maguire joining the other side.

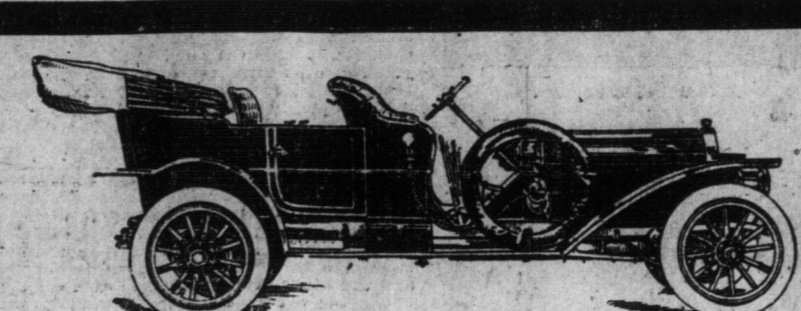

KEEP THE ROAD OPEN.

A deputation will wait on the government to-morrow to press upon the authorities the importance of keeping communication open between Charlton and Gowanda during the awkward interval between the thawing out of the sleigh roads and the hardening of the snow under the warmth of the season.

The government have already given assurance of their sympathy with the prospectors and miners to whom this road is really a vital necessity. There is no store of supplies sufficient to tide over an interval of some weeks. Should communication prove impossible for some time it might mean the starvation of many at outlying points in the new silver land. The government will be fully justified in doing everything that can be suggested in reason to secure a continuous transport service over the road until some more permanent way is decided upon. By proper repairs several weeks may be added to the life of the sleigh road, and the world understands that this is being kept in view. No effort that can contribute to the efficiency of the silver land should be overlooked, and doubtless the deputation will have a number of suggestions to make deserving of attention.

GLASGOW AND FREE TRADE.

Until the introduction of the vexed question of home rule, Glasgow was one of the most solidly Liberal constituencies in the United Kingdom. Even in the days when it returned three members, while each elector had only two votes, separately exercised, the Liberal element was strong enough to return an undivided representation.

Under the later distribution and after the home rule disruption, the central division has no doubt been consistently Unionist by varying majorities, although it succumbed to the wave of revolt that sustained the administration of the late Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman. This, however, only makes the result of the recent election more significant.

Free traders have always maintained that the final issue was so predominant in the United Kingdom that it swamped all other issues. Scotland especially, along with the north of England, has always been regarded as the stronghold of free trade, and the central division of Glasgow is emphatically the business centre of that great commercial city. The Irish vote in it has been put at 1200, and after his pledge it went solidly for the Liberal candidate, Mr. Gibson Bowles. It was supposed to hold the balance between the straight political parties, but notwithstanding this, a fiscal reformer, who put the fiscal issue in the forefront of his campaign, has carried the seat by more than 2000 majority. The significance of this cannot be minimized.

Nor can it be properly said that the unemployed were a factor in the contest. The central division of Glasgow is not a district where they are enrolled. No division is more representative of the business interests that have made the commercial metropolis of Scotland the great city that it admittedly is, and from any standpoint the result of this by-election is of more than ordinary importance. Mr. Scott Dickson, K.C., who was lord advocate in Mr. Balfour's time, was returned by a record majority, in the business centre of a city and a country more than any other supposed to be firm in its support of free trade. Nothing can explain this away, not even the excuse that other questions bulked more largely with the electorate. For that reduces free trade to the level of other

political issues, a humiliation which, not so long ago, none of its advocates would have acknowledged to be within the bounds of possibility.

THINK THIS OVER.

Relatively to the population in no other country of the world can so many people able to read and write be found as in Canada. In no other country of the world can so many people earnestly endeavoring to advance themselves morally, intelligently and financially be found as in Canada.

What brought this condition about? The public schools? Yes, in part. But even more the newspapers and magazines.

What makes the issue of these publications possible? Advertising. Without advertising the great majority of newspapers and magazines would go out of business entirely; the remainder would be forced to eliminate their most expensive and, therefore, most valuable features. Some one has said that the modern advertiser has ended literature and art. Whoever said it spoke wisely, for the statement is true.

Some day some wise man will say "strong and healthy imagination will compute the amount spent in newspapers and periodicals, in bill boards, street cars, banners, paintings, novelties, exhibitions of all kinds—and his figures will astound the world."

Great is advertising, but it must appear in the best medium.

FAVOR MORLEY AVE. SITE WITH SLUDGE REMOVAL.

Sewage Experts Think Residents Needn't Object—Extend Outfall 1500 Feet Further.

That the city's septic tanks be located on the Morley-avenue site, but that the sludge be pumped to the west end of Ashbridge's marsh is recommended in the report of experts John D. Watson and Rudolph Herring presented to the city council yesterday afternoon. The report was referred to the works committee.

T. Aird Murray, the engineer who has been acting for the Beach Association, said last night that the removal of the sludge was largely the object sought by the opponents of the Morley-avenue site, but it is not unlikely that the case ends will yet apply for an injunction to prevent the site being utilized.

The experts say that if ordinary care be exercised no offensive odor will be perceptible more than a short distance from the site of deposition.

It is suggested that an electric fan be used for ventilating the tanks, that the outfall sewer be carried 1500 feet further out into the lake, that the intercepting sewers be constructed of cement, having the invert line with a single curve, hard, sharp-edged vitrified brick.

The sewage could thus be disposed of without fouling the shore. While the sewage before reaching the tanks will have undergone septic action, it is deemed advisable to cleanse each pocket of the tank daily by utilizing electric current to pump the solids to the marsh. Heavy sludge wouldn't undergo atmospheric exposure until it reached the western end of Ashbridge's Bay, where it would mix with the dry refuse and spoil used to fill up the marsh.

Residents in the neighborhood of the tanks will experience no odor from them, and if the tanks are covered with earth and planted with shrubs and flowers, the site would be rendered pleasantly attractive," says the report.

The tanks should be located close to the shore line south of Eastern-avenue. The extension of the outfall sewer would cause discharge into deeper water and more satisfactory disposal of the effluent, which would be in liquid form. To facilitate dilution, the effluent should be discharged from a number of small openings extending over a length of several hundred feet. The water supply would not be injuriously affected.

The experts consider water filtration "both advisable and necessary," preventing any possible pollution from the sewage disposal works.

Reference is made to the report of the royal commission as saying that such case should be considered on its own merits. In this case due weight has been given local circumstances.

City Engineer Rust is fairly well satisfied with the report. He says that the pumping of sludge to the marsh will not entail much extra expense, and that it removes the objections of residents. He still believes, however, that the best plan would be the pouring of crude sewage into Lake Ontario.

Under the will of Dicks, for \$5000 each, the insurance money upon her death was payable to the assured's "surviving children, share and share alike. She died on March 2, 1908, and by her will, dated Dec. 10, 1884, she appointed her husband trustee to receive all the moneys payable under the two policies and other, describing them, and after declaring them to be for the benefit of her children directed that her husband should hold the insurance moneys and the other proceeds of her estate upon trusts set out in the will, the same not to be payable until all her children attained the age of 21 years. The application is made by Ferdinand Dicks, a son, for an order directing that the sum of \$1000 now in the hands of the Trust Company, being his share of the balance on hand, should be paid out to him, notwithstanding that all the children of the testatrix have not yet attained 21 years of age. It is contended that applicant had a vested interest, and that the provisions of the will were beyond the power of testatrix under the law in force at her death. I think the authorities clearly establish that at the date of the will in this case the law did not permit the testatrix by will to confer an appointment of assets and the apportionment of the insurance moneys among those for whose benefit it was effected, while in this case she has gone further and sought to vary the apportionment by converting an absolute into a contingent interest, and by apportioning the share of any child who should die before the period fixed for distribution among her grandchildren.

The order will therefore be that the applicant is now entitled to be paid the sum of his share. Costs of all parties out of the trust fund.

STURGEON LAKE GOLD FIELDS

Big Preparations to Handle Rush of Prospectors.

PORT ARTHUR, March 8.—(Special.)—A steamer a hundred feet in length is being built by James Whalen for use on Sturgeon Lake, handling business in connection with gold mining this season. The boat is half finished and will be ready when the ice breaks up.

J. L. McLaren intends putting on a boat for the trade and there will also be several gasoline boats of smaller size. Major Wilson, for a syndicate of United States people, has taken an option on the Chicamore stone claim at \$30,000, and experts are going in to examine it and report as to the advisability of exercising the option. Many samples of ore, some showing free gold in large quantities, are being brought into Port Arthur from Sturgeon Lake district, and merchants of this city are making special preparations to supply prospectors and others who have started a rush to the gold fields. Seventy cars of settlers' effects passed thru here yesterday for Winnipeg and the west, from Eastern Ontario. A large proportion were from Bruce County.

FIFTEEN PER CENT.
Dividend on Crown Reserve for the Quarter.

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GOWGANDA—Freight Traffic to New Camps is Congested—ELK CITY

ENGINE PASSES THRU ELKFOOD FOR GOWGANDA FOR MINES AT GOWGANDA DURING THE SUMMER

Was Largest Seen in New Country and Attracted Much Attention—Visit to the Camp.

“Gowganda, without doubt, is destined to rank with Cobalt as one of the greatest of the world's silver camps. It is a gentleman who has just returned from an inspection of the northern silver camps.

“What impresses me most at Gowganda is the area over which the surface outcroppings are to be found. There are a dozen strong surface leads already uncovered over an area of five miles from north to south. It is a remarkable fact, indicating an eruptive movement of great force and eliminating the possibility of any of the discoveries being isolated deposits. The extent and character of the veins carries the conviction that there is depth and permanency to the rich discoveries that have already been made in a camp that is yet been only superficially prospected.

“A careful examination of two silver veins on the Bartlett south group convinces me that the deposits there are eruptive and could not be the result of overflow in view of the geological evidences to be found in that portion of the Gowganda silver belt.

“The silver leads on the Bartlett lie between well defined walls of diabase and the wall rock is shot deep under the mineral, indicating the tremendous forces that were at work at the time of the upheaval. The congestion of the silver, which is practically pure, is also an indication of great depth. On the Bartlett I saw this pure silver vein and followed it for several hundred feet. A second vein, several hundred yards from the first, contains silver in nugget form, the vein matter having been disintegrated and decomposed near the surface by the action of rain and water, which has run down the natural drain that had been formed between the walls of rock.

“Taking these veins as typical, the Bartlett is a very rich silver vein. It is duplicated just north of the Bartlett on the Welsh claims. Again, farther north on the Reeve-Dobie, and farther north again on the Armstrong, Mann-Ryan and Boyd-Gordon. It is said that there are in addition to these 24 less notable silver surface discoveries, many of which will be developed with development. To the north there are several wide calcite veins, including one on the North Bartlett group, 24 inches wide and traced for 1200 feet. This vein may be said to be the speculative marvel of the camp. This is a big race against time going on, but it looks as though the Bartlett people were going to win out.

MACHINERY ON THE ROAD FOR CAMP GOWGANDA

Representative of O'Kelley Mines Says the Government Should Send Commissioner.

A representative of the O'Kelley Mines has just returned from a week's visit to Gowganda and has given the following interesting information to The World: He left Toronto on Monday night and arrived at Gowganda on Wednesday. The roads going in were firm, but a series of low holes, snow on each turn out places so far apart made it very difficult for the many teams to pass on the road.

The number of teams going in and coming out is enormous and from the top of one hill forty sleigh loads of freight were seen coming up that same hill.
