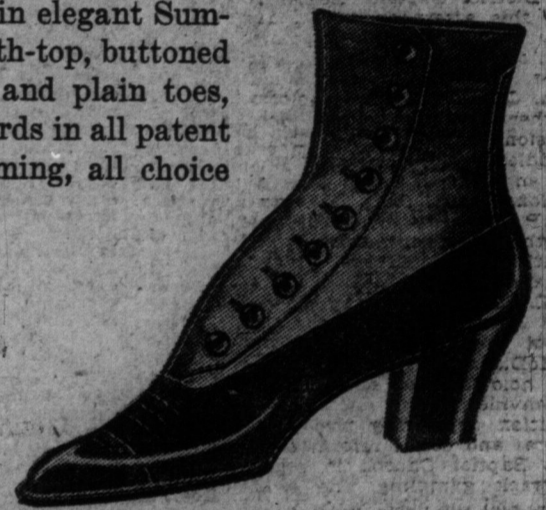

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Realty and Building

The particulars of the tenders for the disposal of the present government house property at King and Simcoe-streets will probably be announced by the government to-day. It is understood that both the C. P. R. and U. T. R. are bidders for the entire site, while different portions of it are being sought by manufacturers.

An outline of the arrangements desired in the new government house to be erected on East Bloor-street are given in the instructions to those submitting a competitive design, for which prizes of \$1000 and \$500 are offered. The establishment will consist of residence, gardener's cottage, steward's cottage, coach house, garage, the disposition of the ground floor (containing vestibule, cloak room, hall (containing staircase), reception room (500 feet floor space), drawing room (1800 feet floor space), library, either ground or first floor, state dining room (900 feet floor space), private dining room, lieutenant-governor's office, secretary's office, ball room (500 feet floor space), kitchen, scullery, servants' quarters, conservatory and green house. Twelve bedrooms, with bathrooms, and a billiard room are asked for the first floor and a similar number for the second floor. Twelve bedrooms for servants are also to be provided on either floor. An elevator will be required. The cottages are to be two storeys high and are to have seven rooms each.

The government house property at King and Simcoe-streets was bought by the province in 1813. It originally belonged to Chief Justice Elmsley. The present building was erected about 38 years ago.

The First Reformed Presbyterian Church, on Carlton-street, has been purchased by the parties buying the Yonge, Carlton, Church, Wood and Alexander-streets block. The church officials have secured a site on the north side of Bloor-street, about 200 feet east of Sherbourne-street. This property has a frontage of 74 feet on Bloor-street and a depth of about 200 feet to the ravine drive. It was bought for \$125 per foot. The price received for the Carlton-street property is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$55,000. It has a frontage of 66 feet on Carlton-street and a depth of nearly 200 feet, and has on it two roughcast houses, as well as the church. There now remains only the Friends meeting house on Carlton-street to be disposed of.

After having stood vacant for several years, the former head office of the now defunct Sovereign Bank on King-street, just west of the Manning Arcade, is to have a tenant. The Elia Rogers Co., Limited, have taken a long term lease on the property and will occupy the premises as soon as alterations are completed. The new present office at No. 3 East King-street will be kept open for a few months yet, but finally the whole staff of the head office will be quartered in the new building.

G. A. Walton has taken out a permit for the erection of a four-storey brick apartment house on Hazelton-avenue near Yorkville. The building will cost in the neighborhood of \$22,500.

W. H. Carrick is erecting a 2 1/2 storey brick residence on a Chestnut St. road. It will cost \$18,000 and the plans have been prepared by Langley and Howland, architects.

The Star Publishing Co. have taken out a permit for the erection of a one-storey addition to their office and printing establishment. The new building will cost \$13,000. E. J. Lennox is the architect.

A building permit has been issued for the erection of a two-storey brick warehouse on Nos. 85-86-88 W. Adelaide-street, to cost \$16,000. J. L. Havill is the architect.

Western real estate is attracting a good deal of attention these days, and this is largely on account of the number of men who bought real estate in the west in the early days of that section of the country, and who are to-day, because of the turnover they have made, wealthy men. But the opportunities for making money in western real estate are not all gone by any means. People who buy property in the west to-day will in a few years get a splendid return for their money, as the west is rapidly populating, industries are coming into the country, and the wheat output is constantly on the increase, all of which mean that the demand for land will be constantly growing.

BRITISH TRADE RETURNS.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, June 2.—Trade returns for 1909 show that Britain's total trade with foreign countries amounted to £211,106,552; with the colonies, £283,123,571; imports from the colonies, £145,251,939; exports, £127,235,084.

Railroad's Funeral Largely Attended

LONDON, June 2.—The late W. R. Tiffin, one of the oldest employees of the Grand Trunk Railway, until recently superintendent of the Northern Division, who died at Barrie a few days ago, was buried here this afternoon. The funeral was one of the largest ever held here.

Government Wins Suit.

ST. CATHARINES, June 2.—In the surrogate court here, Judge Carman gave judgment in favor of the attorney-general of Ontario against the estate of the late Alexander Muir of Port Dalhousie on succession fees. The estate offered payment on \$31,151.4, but the judgment requires payment on \$75,321.04.

CANADIAN TRADE FIGURES

Aggregate for Year Ending March 31 Beat All Records. OTTAWA, June 2.—According to the weekly bulletin of the commerce department, the aggregate trade of Canada for the 12 months ended March 31, 1910, exceeded that of any previous 12 months period. For the 12 months ended March 31, 1910, the trade of Canada in merchandise was \$685,580,064, showing a betterment over the same period in 1909, which was the record year in the history of Canadian trade expansion, of \$82,338,088, a gain of about 8.7 per cent., but when compared with the figures for the same period in 1908, the betterment was \$120,472,348, a gain of about 22 per cent.

Will Erect New Church.

WOODSTOCK, June 2.—(Special.)—Chalmers Church, of which Rev. H. M. Paulin is pastor, to-day secured a site on Vansittart-avenue, and will erect a new edifice thereon, to cost about \$40,000. Two-thirds of the necessary amount has already been subscribed.

Flower Thieves Busy.

Some one has been annoying residents of Gwynne-avenue, Parkdale, by stealing flowers, roots and all, from the lawn beds. One man who imported a special rose plant from New York and planted it, went to the backyard to get a watering can and when he returned the rose was gone.

Canadian Defence League.

To-night at St. George's Hall, Elm-street, the organization of the Canadian Defence League (Ontario Division), will be completed at a meeting in charge of the party, W. Corbett, general agent of the G.T.R. is guiding them to Montreal.

Another Labor Party Victory.

ADELAIDE, June 2.—In the local parliament, Verran, the leader of the Labor Party, submitted a motion of want of confidence in the government, which carried 22 to 19. The Peake cabinet then resigned. A labor ministry will be formed with Verran as premier and minister of works.

## RABIES STILL SERIOUS IN WESTERN ONTARIO

So Dr. Amyot Says in Addressing Physicians—Papers Read Before C.M.A. Delegates.

Dr. Amyot of the provincial board of health addressed the pathological section of the Canadian Medical Association yesterday on the rabies epidemic in Ontario, which he said was still serious.

"At present," he said, "it is confined to the western part of the province. The district extends from Hamilton to Essex Centre, right thru London, and the whole section between. It is to be found from London to Goderich, and there is some of it at Owen Sound. There has been one human death as the result of rabies, that of the boy who died at Dundas. I performed the post-mortem examination in the case and there is not the slightest doubt that the world as the cause. The disease was five deaths in Canada previous to this outbreak.

"There are cases of rabies in Manitoba and Saskatchewan now which were caused by the transportation of dogs to those provinces from Ontario."

During the recent season the brains of 125 dogs, cats, cattle and sheep had been examined in the provincial laboratory, besides one human brain. Sixty-one animals had been bitten by rabid dogs, but only one had been bitten by a rabid dog.

Dr. Amyot paid a great compliment to Prof. J. J. Mackenzie of the University of Toronto by saying that he had discovered the "negri bodies," or the rabies germs, in 1895, or about ten years before they were proclaimed to the world as the cause of the disease by the Italian, Negri.

In the surgical section Dr. Wood of Kingston spoke on "Appendicitis in Children." He said that there was an astonishing ignorance among medical men concerning appendicitis. That it differentiated in adults and in children, and that the diagnosis of the average practitioner was the same for both children and adults. It was high time the whole current literature of the profession regarding appendicitis was revised and brought up-to-date.

Dr. Wood ascertained that appendicitis was seven times greater among people before the age of 15 than it was between 15 and 30 years.

"Psycho-neurosis from the Standpoint of the Neurologist" was a paper by Dr. Joseph Collins of New York, followed by a general discussion led by Dr. D. C. Meyers of Toronto. About 90 per cent. of the people are afflicted in some way with neurosthenia. The reasons given are the mad rush and pressure of modern life in all its phases. It is not a question of physique. The rest cure is suggested by medical men in place of drugs and medicines, with plenty of sleep and easily digested food and plenty of fresh air. Dr. Meyers stated that so great had these nervous troubles become in recent years that a ward had been devoted to their treatment in the Toronto General Hospital, while the private hospitals are always taxed to their full capacity.

## Liquidation Again Stemmed But Rallying Power is Weak

Wall Street Still Nervous But Prices Steady Toward the Close—Local Market Inactive and Weaker.

The Toronto market continued in its regulation narrow state again to-day, the volume of transactions being quite small.

Transactions were somewhat influenced by the two days' break on the New York market, and here and there when selling orders presented themselves lower prices occurred.

The principal weakness to-day came in the newer issues, such as Quebec Light and Power and Porto Rico, the former selling as low as 43, while the bids on the latter were lowered a point from yesterday.

The declaration of the regular dividend on Twin City had no effect upon this stock and strangely neither bid nor offerings for the shares were made either to-day or yesterday at the close of the market.

The day's operations left very little room for discussion in regard to the market. Public interest is at a low ebb, and fortunately for prices, the outside holders are content to retain their stocks.

The investment side of the market shows equal dulness, with the speculative, but good support is shown in most of the high grade securities.

Wall Street Pointers.

The neutral position is still advisable. We think purchases on declines and sales on rallies should be profited by stop loss orders, and moderate returns accepted for the present. There will be professional hammering again. The urgent liquidation was largely completed yesterday, but more of the slow kind may develop inasmuch as the situation has not cleared in the morning papers. Sentiment is less unsettled, however, that a radical cure will be necessary to restore buying confidence.—Financial Bureau.

There ought to be some further rally in the list, perhaps to discount railroad efforts to dissolve Tuesday's injunction, but there has been such a change in the technical situation, due to the new liquidation, that we feel it will be a wise policy to go slow about buying stocks, and especially to avoid bulges in buying. On the other hand, our bulges we believe that sales of such stocks as St. Paul, Amalgamated, Anaconda, Smelting, Colorado Fuel and the Denver issues should prove quite profitable in the near future.—Town Topics.

Natural to Follow New York.  
T. O. Anderson & Co. in their circular, say:

The leading stock markets have lapsed into one of their periodic spells of apathy and dullness. During the last two weeks the Wall-street market has been quieter than has been the case for more than two years, and naturally under conditions of this kind the fluctuations have narrowed down to very small dimensions.

It is natural that our own markets

should follow the lead of the American exchange, and this is exactly what has occurred. The only important movement in Canadian securities recently has been an advance of over 10 points in C. P. R. The enormous earnings of this road have had much to do with bringing about the demand for the shares. At its present dividend basis, of course, the stock is not attractive, but it is believed that a new stock issue will be announced and valuable rights will therefore accrue to the shareholders.

Twin City Dividend.  
Twin City declared regular quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 on common, payable July 1 to stock of record June 11.

Bank of England Statement.  
LONDON, June 2.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve, increase \$15,000; circulation, increase \$235,000; bullion, increase \$173,775; other securities, decrease \$1,495,000; other deposits, decrease \$277,000; public deposits, increase \$17,000; notes in circulation, increase \$1,448,000; government securities, increase \$1,490,000. The proportion of the bank's reserves to liability this week is 50.73 per cent; last week it was 46.66 per cent.

Bank of England's rate of discount was reduced from 4 to 3 1/2 per cent.

Listed on Exchange.  
The Toronto Stock Exchange has listed \$1,511,400 common and \$1,270,000 preferred stock of the British Columbia Packers' Association, also \$5,000,000 common stock, \$2,000,000 preferred and \$3,000,000 of the bonds of the Canadian Car and Foundry Co.

On Wall Street.  
Erickson Perkins & Co. say at the close: After the first hour the stock market was more orderly. At one time around midday it was extremely quiet. Prices gradually hardened during the afternoon, closing fairly firm, with numerous net losses. The leaders, such as Steel, Union Pacific and Reading, acted as the pivot of individual fairies by eastern railroads, advancing freight rates being filed, as we intimated at noon, what the western lines are likely to do. The injunction ought to be a thinning of the past in the near future. The outlook is clearer, and although we will have much irregularity stocks seem likely to do a little better, but they should be bought only on drives for moderate turns. Europe was credited with heavy purchases here. Money is plentiful on the other side, as is reported in the near future. The Bank of England rate to 3 1/2 per cent. Congress is making better progress with the railroad bill—a good sign. Adjustment of that body will be welcome news.

J. P. Bickell & Co. say at the close: Stocks hardened this afternoon when support became apparent in Steel, Amalgamated and St. Paul. The close was steady with but small net losses, also early in the day St. Paul made a new low record. It is possible that the stock market has become too much excited over the president's action, just as it did over the crop scare a month ago. While we believe that ultimately stocks are going very much lower and that we could not advise purchases for investment, the action of the market this afternoon suggests a rally of some importance.

Chas. Head & Co. to R. R. Bondard, Dominion Street, in their circular, say: The afternoon session of the market hardened and recovered a large part of its earlier loss. Closing was dull but firm at the recovery, but with no snap at the buying and no enthusiasm. Traders are clearly at sea as to future course of prices, but the feeling generally is not very hopeful.
