



by Coroner Geo. W. Graham's jury at the inquest last night. The jury further found that Dr. Faed believed he had received neodiarsenol from Dr. Abraham Brodey, the patholo-gist at Grace hospital, and that Dr. Brodey gave him diarsenol instead of what he asked for.

They completely exonerated Dr. Mc-Connell, who administered the drug, and further found that, in the sale of diarsenol and neodiarsenol, the pack-ages containing the drugs should be so different as to prevent further mis-
