

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BYE-LAWS.

*Passed at the Ninth Annual Meeting of the Society, in
Charlottetown, December 28th, 1852, and since amended.*

1st. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for the time being, if a member of the United Church of England and Ireland, shall be respectfully requested to be joint Patron of this Society, as now incorporated by Act of Colonial Parliament, with the Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel and for promoting Christian Knowledge.

2d. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society; and his approval shall be necessary for the confirmation, revocation and alteration of any of the Bye-Laws, and for making any addition to them.

3d. All members of the Church are invited to unite with this Society as Subscribers. Any sum, however small, paid in advance, shall qualify a person to be a member for a year; and ten Pounds at one payment, shall entitle one to be a member for life.

4th. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall take place in Charlottetown, on the 4th Wednesday in January, when a Report of the proceedings of the past year, and the Treasurer's Account shall be presented, and all Officers chosen. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time, when the President,—or in his absence, two or more Vice Presidents,—or the Executive Committee, shall consider it desirable.

5th. The Committee Meetings shall be held on the 3d Tuesday and 4th Wednesday in January, and on the 3d Tuesdays in April, July and October,—seven members to constitute a Quorum; and Special Meetings on such other days as the President, or one of the Vice Presidents, and five members of the

Committee may deem advisable; and all applications for Money Grants shall be in writing, and sent to the Secretary a month previous to the Committee Meeting to be held on the 4th Wednesday in January, at which all appropriations shall be made.

6th. The Quarterly Meeting held in January, shall be open to the attendance of two Committee members of each Country Association; at which Meeting all Resolutions will be framed, and all notices of motions, about to be brought forward at the General Meeting, sent in.

7th. All Meetings of the Society, or its Committees, shall be opened with the form of prayer at present used by the D. C. S. of Nova Scotia.

8th. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of the Island, for the time being, shall be the First; and the others, with such Officers as may be required for the proper working of the Society, shall be nominated by the Executive Committee,—such nomination to be subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting.

9th. That where District Committees are formed in country parts of the Island, the Clergymen of those Districts be requested to furnish to the Secretary of this Society, one month previous to the Quarterly Meeting in January, all such matters as they may think advisable to be embodied in the Annual Report,—a draft of which shall be laid before the Committee for its approval.

10th. The Accounts of the Society shall be closed on the 1st of January, and be audited previous to the Annual Meeting.

11th. No change in the Bye-Laws of this Society shall be proposed at a General Meeting, unless the proposed alteration shall have been previously fully canvassed (at least) at two Quarterly Meetings of the Committee.

12th. The principal object which shall engage the attention of the Society, shall be as follows:

1. The employment of Missionary Clergymen in the Island.
2. Assistance to the Endowment of Parishes.
3. Assistance to the Erection or Enlargement of Churches or Chapels, or Parsonage-houses belonging to the United Church of England and Ireland.

4. Aid to Sunday, and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.

5. Aid to the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, such aid being afforded by persons contributing to that especial object.

To these purposes generally, the contributions will be applied; while those who desire it, may, have their subscriptions appropriated to any one or more of these objects, as they think fit.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Eighteenth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, was held in the School Room of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, on Wednesday evening the 22d January, and was numerous and respectably attended. The Chair was taken at 7 o'clock, by the Hon. the Chief Justice.

The Archdeacon commenced proceedings by giving out a hymn, which was followed by prayer. The Chief Justice, in his opening remarks, alluded with deep sympathy to the recent domestic affliction which prevented His Excellency the Lieut. Governor from occupying the Chair, a sentiment which was sincerely reciprocated by the meeting. His Honor then pressed the claims of the Society on the attention and benevolence of the members of the Church of England in this Colony, and suggested that if they would but follow the example of the Church people in New Brunswick, and double their contributions—which might be done without materially abridging their temporal comforts,—the Society would be enabled to fulfil its mission more efficiently, in extending the benefits of the Church to her people throughout the Island. The Rev. D. B. Parnter, Clerical Secretary, then read the report for the past year, and Theos. DesBrisay, Esq. made a financial statement of the Society's funds. The Report shewed that during the past year the sum collected for Church purposes in the various missions in the Island, amounted to £1500. It stated also, that the funds necessary for supplying missionaries to the vacant Churches, and also for a travelling missionary are available, so soon as the services of such can be procured.

The following resolutions were then passed unanimously, having been first ably and eloquently moved and seconded.

1. Moved by the Ven. the Archdeacon, seconded by Rev. D. Fitz Gerald—

Resolved, That the Report now read, be adopted and printed under the direction of the Committee.

2. Moved by Rev. R. T. Roach, seconded by William Cundall, Esq.—

Resolved, That this Meeting recognizes in a spirit of thankfulness to Almighty God, the many temporal and spiritual mercies vouchsafed to this Island during the past year.

3. Moved by Hon. T. H. Haviland, seconded by Alfred Philips, Esq.—

Resolved, That this Meeting expresses the sentiments entertained by every member of the Diocesan Church Society, of deep and heartfelt sorrow for the irreparable loss sustained by Her Most Gracious Majesty, in the demise of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort.

4. Moved by Charles Palmer, Esq., seconded by Hon. John Aldous—

Resolved, That with gratitude to the Disposer of all events this Meeting rejoices in the fact, that the probabilities of War are now satisfactorily removed.

5. Moved by Captain Hancock, R. N., seconded by Mr. William Sinclair—

Resolved, That this Meeting records its regret at the removal of the Rev. William Meek from the Island, and bears in grateful recollection the name of that devoted servant of his Lord.

6. Moved by Hon. J. Longworth, seconded by Hon. J. Hensley—

Resolved, That the aid afforded to the Church in this Island by the liberality of the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel," and the 'Colonial and Continental Church Society,' demands the expression of the warmest thanks of this Meeting, and is a call on them to corresponding efforts to further the great work of religion throughout the Island.

7th. Moved by Rev. Mr Smith, seconded by Frederick Brecken, Esq.—

Resolved, That the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee during the ensuing year:—(See Executive Committee, 1st Page,) and that Theophilus DesBrisay, Esq., be the Treasurer, and that the Rev. D. B. Parnter and Mr H. J. Cundall be the Secretaries.

8. Moved by Dr. Kaye, seconded by H. Haszard, Esq.—

Resolved, That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the Lady Collectors, and the Officers of the Society.

9. Moved by Hon. Edward Palmer, seconded by the Archdeacon—

Resolved. That Rev. R. T. Roach, Hon. J. Hensley and Rev. D. Parnter, (the Secretary) be appointed a deputation from this Society to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and convey to him

the assurance of the heartfelt sympathy felt by every member of the "Diocesan Church Society," for the painful bereavement sustained in the loss of a beloved relative, and their sincere hope that he will be effectually supported by those consolations which the God of all Grace so liberally bestows.

There was very generally expressed by the speakers a sense of deep gratitude to Almighty God for our inestimable religious privileges.

The Archdeacon in his closing address said, that the prospect of obtaining three additional clergymen, should stimulate the members of the Church of England to increased liberality and thereby endeavour to secure a continuance of those spiritual advantages, which, under the Divine blessing, accompany a well supplied and efficient ministry.

The thanks of the Meeting were accorded to the Chief Justice for his kindness in presiding on this occasion, which was gracefully acknowledged by His Honor.

A collection was then made, which proved to be larger than usual, a hymn was sung, and the meeting dismissed with the benediction.

REPORT.

As the duty of presenting an annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society has again devolved on the Committee, they would preface the statements about to be submitted to this Meeting, by acknowledging the hand of that gracious God, who has hitherto prospered the operations of the Society.

From the Reports received from the Clergy in various parts, the Committee are rejoiced to find, that they have been spared to prosecute their many and arduous labors, among the Members of their respective flocks; and that a spirit of mutual esteem is still fostered between them, and those to whom in God's providence they are appointed, to minister in holy things. The Members of our Churches, also, are learning to appreciate more fully the Services of our scriptural Church, and to find in that Liturgy, in which our fathers worshipped, a means of grace which spiritualizes the affections, and excites the best desires of the heart towards Him who heareth and answereth prayer. The engagement of a travelling Missionary,—who should visit the remote places of the Island, and hold occasional *Services* in those parts where the Clergymen cannot regularly attend,—has been long felt to be desirable; and to *this*, the attention of the Committee has been directed. The means at their disposal, however, are too limited to carry out this arrangement; and they can only *wait*, in the hope that the day is not far distant, when, an Evangelist shall be ready (under the direction of the Society,) to visit the remotest portions of our Island, and preach to all, the glad tidings of the Grace of God.

It is with feelings of deep regret, that the Committee have to announce the departure of the Rev. William Meek from the sphere of duty in which he so long and faithfully labored; and the Committee cannot allow this opportunity to pass without recording their esteem for that devoted servant of his Lord, and their sorrow that one who for upwards of 20 years had been so active and efficient a

Minister, should from failing strength, find it necessary to transfer his services to another portion of the missionary field. The Committee, however, are thankful to remark, that the probability exists, that his place will be supplied, as there is a grant of £100 stg. from the Colonial and Continental Church Society, to the Mission of New London.

The Mission of Crapaud is still vacant. Through the persevering efforts of His Lordship the Bishop of Nova Scotia, two grants of £50 stg. each, have been made by the Society for the propagation of the Gospel; and while the Committee would tender their thanks to the Bishop for his exertions on behalf of the Church in this Island, they are anxious that these grants should immediately be made available, and therefore would urge on those who are more particularly to be benefited by them, to respond with promptitude and liberality to the generous aid granted by the Society at home.

The receipts from the several parishes and Missionary stations, amount to £121,—as will appear from the Treasurer's Report, which will be submitted.

The Committee would now present abstracts from the Reports made by the several Clergy throughout the Island

CHARLOTTETOWN.

The Ministers of St. Paul's, Charlottetown, report that during the past year there have been 62 Baptisms, 21 Marriages and 27 Burials, upwards of 300 religious services have been held and 750 Pastoral visits paid. The attendance on the various means of grace has been generally good, and some of the prayer meetings have been largely attended. The Library contains some 1260 volumes, being an addition of 80 since last year. The morning and afternoon Sunday School numbering about 240 children has been regularly held, and upward of 170 scholars have received *rewards* for their diligence and good conduct. The pulpit and reading desk have been altered for the better, the expenses of which have been generously contributed by some unknown individual. The steeple has

been raised and improved in appearance, which has added also to the security of the Tower and the beauty of the Church.

There has been towards the close of the year, more than ordinary illness among the people, owing to the unusual wetness of the season. Many have to deplore the loss of relations and friends; not, however, without the hope of a joyful resurrection. The Church has been put in mourning, in testimony of the deep and heartfelt sorrow of the Congregation for the lamented death of His Royal Highness Prince Albert, who departed this life on 14th December last, much to the sincere regret of the whole Nation. The Congregation, in conjunction with their fellow subjects throughout the Empire, deeply sympathize with their Gracious Sovereign in her untimely loss, and fervently pray that she may be comforted in her deep afflictions, and strengthened for the discharge of her high and responsible duties.

ST. ELEANOR'S

The Venerable the Archdeacon and Rector of Saint Eleanor's feels thankful to report, that the prospects of the Church in his parish have been in some measure commensurate with the labor bestowed; penitents have been directed to the cross of Christ for pardon and salvation; believers have been strengthened and encouraged in the faith,

and sinners warned to flee from the wrath to come ; while, alas ! there are yet too many who are content to be hearers of the word only. During the last twelve months, the work of the Church has not abated, either in the accustomed duties of the sanctuary, or in going from house to house seeking the spiritual welfare of those committed to his care. The *three* sabbath services have been as well and regularly attended as circumstances would permit, and the Rector hopes that the *four* sunday schools have been beneficial to the young persons who have availed themselves of the religious privileges they offer. The number of religious services performed has been 236 ; and 601 pastoral visits have been paid to the whole and the sick.

Death has removed several of the parishioners since the last Report—respecting some of whom, it may be hopefully spoken, and may God grant that the bereaving providences which have been experienced, this year, may produce a salutary effect in the hearts and lives of survivors. The recent census has reported an increase of Church Members in this Parish of 35 per cent in the last five years. The amount subscribed by the Parishioners of St. Eleanor's for Church purposes affords some evidence of their love to the Redeemer. Through the indefatigable exertions of a member of the congregation who takes a warm interest in the prosperity of the Church, twelve pounds have been collected for repairing the organ, and forty pounds have been realised by a tea party got up a few kind and energetic Ladies to aid in completing the new Church at Summerside, which together with other contributions make up the sum of £115 10 11. Subscriptions to D. C. S., £24 10 11.

GEORGETOWN.

The Missionary at Georgetown, Rev. R. T. Roach, reports the steady and consistent attachment of his flock to the worship and sacraments of the Church, and also an increased attendance at the Friday evening lectures. At Harts settlement the little Church remains unfinished, the

people in the depth of their poverty and fewness, waiting for some favorable turn in their circumstances to start anew. At Mount Stewart, matters are slowly progressing, the Church is enclosed and will be ready for consecration on the next visit of the Bishop to our Island. During the past year there have been 16 public and 9 private Baptisms, 13 Marriages and 13 Burials. The offertory collections have exceeded the sum of £30, and various other sums for Church purposes have been raised in Georgetown, in addition to the liberal contributions which have been placed at the disposal of the Diocesan Church Society, amounting altogether to £98. The missionary adds that these contributions are exclusively made by the Members of Trinity Church, the out-stations being generally too poor to afford any aid to our Society.

MILTON.

The Rev. Mr Smith, the Missionary at Milton, reports that the usual Sunday services were well attended during the greater part of the year, but the inclement weather of the fall produced some diminution in the members who generally attend.

To gratify the wishes of several who hoped for beneficial result, the Sunday School was removed from the Church to the school house near the parsonage. The number of children has, in consequence, been somewhat less than in previous years; but it is with satisfaction that the missionary is able to state, that those who availed themselves of the opportunity, have made more than ordinary progress in the knowledge of scriptural truth. The Thursday evening lectures were resumed in May, and were continued until the busy season of harvesting commenced. The parsonage-house, which was completed a little more than a year ago, is free from debt, excepting the small sum of £5 which it is hoped will be soon realized. The loss by death, and other causes, of several valuable members, has proved a source of trial to the missionary at Milton; but he feels that good has been done, and trusts that, under the divine blessing, all things—whether trials or encour-

agements—may yet work together for greater good. The contributions for Church purposes are £16—exclusive of a sum raised towards minister's stipend.

PORT HILL.

Rev. Mr Swabey, reports that during the past summer, a public tea party was given at New Bideford, for the purpose of putting the glebe school house in a proper state of repair for divine service; that it will be shortly occupied, and thus become a valuable addition to the Church buildings of the Parish, the seats will be open and free. In lieu of a bell, the plan adopted here (as it is believed is the case in Newfoundland,) is to hoist a flag on the day appointed for divine service, and for this emblem of unity and peace, they are indebted to a Lady in Charlottetown. The appearance and the comfort of the Churches at Port Hill, and Lot 11, respectively have been much improved by the addition of vestries. The parsonage house is still unfinished, and as the original design was bad, it will probably never become a comfortable house. The Sunday Schools, at Port Hill, and Lot 11, particularly the former are tolerably well sustained, and many of the children manifest a laudable desire for instruction, while their biblical knowledge is proceeding; this desirable end has been attained by the self denying efforts of several lay coadjutors, to whom the missionary is under great obligation. The interest in the Society remains unabated. Subscription to D. C. S. £8.

CASCUMPEC AND KILDARE.

The Rev. Mr Dyer, reports with thankfulness the steady progress of the Church's work in this extensive mission, and that, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, he has been enabled to attend at all the stations, and has performed divine services twice on every Lord's-day throughout the year. He would wish that these services were more numerous attended, but under all the circumstances of the case, the average attendance has been grat-

fyng. The missionary has good reason to believe that the word preached has not returned void; it has been the means of adding one, if not more to the Church. A Roman Catholic at Kildare, renounced the errors and all connection with the Church of Rome, and was publicly received in the protestant Church, of which he is now a consistent member. May grace be given him to continue in the faith. Besides the regular Sunday services, two week day lectures with prayers, have been established one on Tuesday evenings, at Cascumpec, and the other on Wednesday evenings at Kildare Bridge; these are pretty well attended, and are calculated to be of great spiritual benefit to the people. During the past summer he has succeeded in establishing a sabbath school in connection with the Church, which has been kept in the Temperance Hall, at Cascumpec, and has numbered over 40 children and adults; and the missionary is glad to state that some have offered themselves as teachers, and at the same time have used influence in inducing many children to attend the school.

The parsonage house is now completed, (except the painting,) and the missionary and his family have resided there since last October, and find it a comfortable and commodious abode; some portion of the debt on it, however, remains unliquidated.

The undermentioned sums have been subscribed for Church purposes. Colonial & Continental Church Society. £38; Parsonage house, £45 17s; D. C. Society, £5 14s,

CHERRY VALLEY.

The Rev. W. Stewart, reports that upon the whole, the subscriptions this year exceed those of last, and that the sum of £4 10s has been raised for the objects of the Society. He trusts that there is a feeling of seriousness awakened among the young people of Cherry Valley, through the means of the religious books that they have read; a Sunday School library (consisting of some excellent religious books,)—was purchased by a sum of money received from the Glebe Funds, and these were read eagerly by the young. Sermons especially adapted to that class
