The object is to take over and carry on the business of George McKean. The proposed capital stock is to be \$100,000 and St. John is to be the chief place of business.

GRAND TRUNK SURPLUS £355,300 FOR HALF YEAR

(Montreal Witness).

The appropriation of £40,000, to form the nucleus of a pension fund for employes is the feature of the half-yearly report of the Grand Trunk Railway that has attracted much unfavorable criticism everywhere. The accounts for the half-year to June 30, show gross receipts, £3,381,200; working expenses, £2,446,500; net receipts, £334,700; and net revenue charges for the half-year, less credits, £480,600, leaving a balance of £454,100. Deducting Canada Atlantic deficiency for the half-year, £87,800; and Detroit, Grand Haven & Milwaukee deficiency, £11,000, making £98,800, there is a surplus of £355,300, The above surplus of £355,300, added to the balance of £13,200 from December, 1906, makes a total of £368,500, out of which it is proposed to set aside £40,000 to form the nucleus of the pension fund referred to by the president at the last general meeting. The balance of £328,500 will admit of the payment of the dividends for the half-year on the 4 per cent. guaranteed stock, and first and second preference stocks, leaving about £14,600 to be carried forward. It is estimated that the future contributions to the pension fund will amount to £15,000 per annum. The accounts of the Grand Trunk Western Company for the year ended June 30, show a surplus sufficient to provide for the interest of the first mortgage bonds and leave a balance of about £18,200.






