


CONFERENCE OF WORKMEN

CONFERENCE OF WORKMEN Paris, Aug. 18—The general federation of labor, the French revolutionary labor body, at a conference last night adopted a resolution appealing to the in-ternational working classes to work "so that peace may represent the triumph of right over might, and that through the acceptance by all countries of obliga-tory arbitration, the suppression of secret diplomacy and of the burdens of armament may arise the possibility of a federation of nations, assuring to all peoples the right to dispose freely of themselves, and safeguarding the inde-pendence of all nationalities." With the object of affirming the above point of view, the conference urg-ently invited all organized workmen to accept the proposal of American labor organizations to hold an international congress at the time and plazed fixed upon by international diplomats for the establishment of peace terms.


FRENCH KEEP TIGHT GRIP

PRENCH KREP HGHI GRIP Paris, Aug. 12—The French whr office this afternoon gave out a statement on the progress of hostilities reading as follows— "Last night passed in relative quiet along the greater part of the front. There has been reported only artillery engagements in the sectors to the North of Arms and between the river Somme and the river Oise, in the region of Roye, and in the vicinity of Lassigny. "There was fighting yesterday with bombs and hand grenades in the Ar-gonne at Haute Chevauchee, at Fontaine Aux Charmes, and in the forest of Cheppy. Our bombardment yesterday of the German positions near the Linge destroyed two heavy batteries and caused the explosion of several depoits of armsentition
