# Saint John Destined To Be Great and Lovely City, Says Visitor

interest by all our readers. The sincerity of the writer, Mr. L. R. Oates, of Lakeland, Florida, is strikingly attested by an accompanying letter in which he says: "Have been in your city now two weeks as a tourist, and am so greatly impressed with it that I am considering buying a summer home here, and have already come to feel interested in your community welfare and imagine myself one of the boys."

SIX years ago the average town of Florida was far worse financially than those today of New Brunswick; the homes of the natives were dreary in appearance,

often delapidated, while the streets were far inferior to those of Saint John. Many of the people who owned property, had not paid their taxes for years, while those who were fortunate enough to pay, often did so by the practice of self-denial of things necessary to their daily com-

things necessary to their daily comforts. Naturally, the old boys clamored Naturally, the old boys clamored for lower taxes, and if anyone had appeared about that time soliciting funds for publicity or improvements, they would have been received with contempt, and hooted away at a pace much greater than that of their arrival. To make matters worse, every-one sought the outside market, vainly searching for a better and

cheaper place to buy, often resort-

ing to the mail order houses of New York City, Chicago or one of our other great metropolises, seldom saving more than a few cents on the goods secured in this way, and often not getting the same good qualities as could have been had at home.

But to these narrow-minded people there was a touch of allure-ment to be had out of sending their ment to be had out of sending their money away; they did not realize it was gone forever; down in their hearts they reasoned that their home merchant could afford to sell much cheaper than he did, and it apparently gave them comfort to be able to keep their money out of his hands. This sort of practice, you will no doubt readily see, is commonly known as "cutting off your nose, to spite your face."







But my first impressions were good, as I scanned the horizon from the roof of the Admiral Beatty Hotel, viewing the natural beauty on all sides; while my second was not so good, as I drove over the streets and found many homes in need of paint and repair, but my third and lasting impressions are good, for I have learned that real people inhabit these homes, whether they be in need of paint or fresh from under the brush.

Everywhere I find nice clean-cut friendly people, extending the hand of good will. Whether they be bankers, merchants or common laborers they take a pride in telling you, what to see and how to get there; and that's the very thing that told me that I had gone far enough; that this was the place to spend the summer, and was the thing that I will remember Saint John by for many years to come. It was this same spirit, this same glad hand stuff that put Florida on the map, and made her the greatest of all our United States.

Saint John certainly has a drawing card in that she has these splendid spirited people, not educated to it, but who from their very nature are on the lookout for an opportunity to direct some stranger, or talk to him, if he appears a bit lonely. I will now like to mention a few of these people, who are doing great things for your city. for your city.

First I would mention the boys

at your post office. At the general delivery window I have reeral delivery window I have received every courtesy and attention, likewise at the registery window and at that of the customs department. Always a pleasant greeting from the boys up there, which you do not always get everywhere.

Then in the City Hall at the assessors' office, you have a man who goes about his business serving the public with pride and pleasure, I consider him a real asset to your city.

And the policeman at the corner hasn't the appearance of the bully, who wants to demonstrate bully, who wants to demonstrate his authority on the erring citizen. He is polite and gentle. I approached one inquiring for the car for Rockwood Park; he was apparently very glad to tell me, and walked at least a half block to show me and be certain I found the right car.

The bankers are very courteous and nice meet you as though you

and nice, meet you as though you were one of the home boys, and best of all are the splendid doctors you have who prescribe such palatable medicines for us boys from beyond the border. They are in-As stated above today the state of Florida is the most progressive of any in our United States. It has developed from the obscure little peninsula of dark, dingy huts, sandy roads and wilderness, into a great winter resort, into a great agricultural and man-ufacturing country, and is now practically covered with a net work of asphalt roads, 30 to 60 feet wide. That is what the new blood accomplished! That's what

1.—We learned the art of extending the glad hand. We formed clubs whose business it was to keep track of all new-comers who keep track of all new-comers who entered business in our city and send out a list of all these to the club members. The members in turn were pledged to do their trading with these new people until they were on sound legs. Try to imagine what effect it would have on you, should you make a change and go into a new country, reach there with very little money, open a business and find yourself doing a rushing trade almost from the first day. Wouldn't you at once feel loyal to the community and begin yourself doing all you could

begin yourself doing all you could for the place?
2.—Don't knock your town, move to some other if you must; don't look for perfection in your city or the governments, there is nothing perfect, neither you nor I.

3.—Don't kick on paying taxes, so long as you see reasonable re-sults from the expenditure of the money. Vote for all improve-ments. A man can not be greater

money. Vote for all improvements. A man can not be greater than his town.

4.—Buy at home, even though you can buy cheaper elsewhere.

5.—Build up a great chamber of commerce, keep a strong man at its head, and see that he has plenty of money to advertise. My town, Lakeland, Fla., has a population of \$28,000. We raised by public subscription \$115,000 each year for the last two years. At this rate you chould have not less than \$300,000 for your chamber.

Organize a club offering prizes to the parties who bring in the greatest number of souvenir cards of Saint John, each to be stamped and addressed ready to go to some friend of the party bringing in the cards, together with an invitation to these friends to visit Saint John. Our chamber of commerce appoints a committee to count these cards and deliver the prizes.



Non-regulated gas ovens should be pre-heated only for pies, quick breads and meats.

2—Cakes, unless baked in a regulated oven, should be put in a COLD oven. For a loaf or sheet cake, requiring approximately a one-hour baking period, the rack should be placed in the CENTRE of the oven. Turn ONE burner on slightly less than half-way for the first quarter of the baking period. Then turn gas down until burner is on about onequarter way. Leave at that height for the remaining three-quarters of the baking period.

Layer cakes, requiring approximately a thirty-minute baking period, should be placed in a cold oven and the burner turned on half-way for the first half of the baking period, at which time it should be lowered to one-quarter way.

This gives the gases in the leavening property (the eggs, soda or baking power) an opportunity to work gradually as the heat increases gradually. The heat reaches the maximum desired at the end of the first quarter of the baking period and the gases have, for the most part expended themselves before the batter actually started to each before the batter actually starts to cook.

The oven door SHOULD NOT BE OPENED during the SECOND and THIRD QUARTRS of the baking period, for the cells at that time are not firm and a slight jar may cause that to settle. The warm expended air which makes the cake light has already been evolved, and there is nothing present to lighten it again.

3-Angel-food cakes may be put into a cold oven and the heat allowed to come on very gradually, or should be put into a very slow oven that has not been pre-heated more than three or four

4—Quick breads should go to the top-most part of the oven, and a hot oven should be ready for them. Muffins, which require from twenty to thirty minutes for baking, should be placed in the top of the oven. Biscuits should not be in the oven more than twelve to fifteen minutes at the most, and should be baken with a very hot oven, at the topmost part.


5-Broiled meats must be handled very carefully. The oven should be pre-heated at least ten minutes before the meat is put in, but the broiling pan should be removed from the oven before the heat


