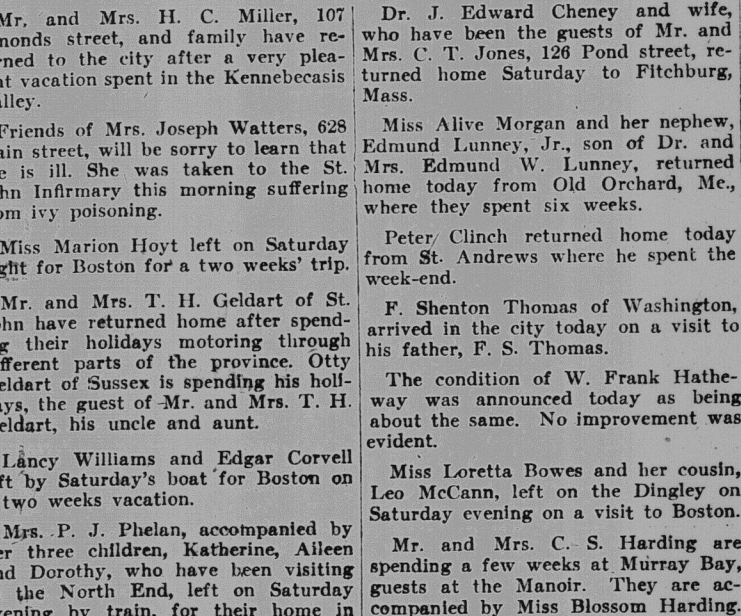

You know what manner of man Coolidge is, says the newspaper. If you see him with the New England landscape as a background, you will know that he is a New Englander.

PARIS AND WASHINGTON.

There is scuffling talk in Paris because of the intimation from Washington that President Coolidge is ready to give advice, if asked for it, concerning the European situation, but that he does not propose to commit his country to any form of intervention stronger than moral suasion. The British, in submitting the case against France to the court of world opinion before entering upon a separate course of action, have not concealed their opinion that the United States might do much to modify the French Ruhr policy.

ENGLAND BARS DIVORCE DETAILS London, Aug. 2.—(A. P. by Mail).—British newspapers soon will cease to carry detailed reports of evidence given in divorce cases. The House of Commons Committee, which has been considering this question some time, recommends that newspapers be permitted to publish only the statement of the petitioner, the defence, the judge's summing up, any points of law which may arise during trial and the jury's findings and judgment. The names of witnesses may be given, but not their evidence. The committee also recommends that the scope of a bill carrying these suggestions should be widened to include the prohibition of reports of matter that is indecent in all proceedings before a judicial bench.

SEA MONSTER FOUND IN FLORIDA THOUGHT TO BE A MOLA-MOLA

Weights 1,000 Pounds and Has a Semi-Circular Head.

Miami, Fla., Aug. 20.—A strange sea monster has drifted ashore on Key Biscayne, a few miles southeast of Miami.

About eight feet long it is four feet in depth and only a foot across. It has a head, if it can be called that, shaped in a semi-circle measuring from back to belly across the face.

Of particular curiosity is the tail fin, which seems to be hinged as a ship's rudder. There is a joint before this fin which permits it to swing back and forth.

Industrial Board Opposed to Bonus As "Unfair Burden"

New York, Aug. 20.—(By A. P.)—Opposition to the proposed bonus for World War veterans, on the grounds that it is economically unsound and would impose an unfair burden on taxpayers, is expressed in a report just made public by the National Industrial Conference Board.

The report is the outcome of researches conducted in anticipation of re-introduction of the bonus bills in Congress in December.

"The principle of granting special compensation to special social groups for losses or sacrifices incurred in a common emergency," says the report, "is unwise and anti-social, and fraught with dangerous possibilities."

"Direct comparison between servicemen and civilians is false," it asserts, "because the factors on which such a comparison must be made cannot be evaluated in economic terms. They were an inevitable consequence of war and were the result of the chance of selection for service. Those at home were equally subject to this chance by virtue of the selective draft."

AUSTRALIA TO INAUGURATE NEW FEDERAL CAPITAL

Melbourne, July 16.—(A. P. by Mail)—The next session of the Australian parliament will be in Canberra, the new Federal capital which, like Washington, D. C., is a city located and planned for the special purpose of being a national capital.

GERMANY GETS RUSSIAN GRAIN

Hamburg, July 30.—(A. P. by Mail)—Russia has exported 600,000 tons of grain so far this year, according to statistics compiled here, where Germany has taken over two-thirds.

SEAWEED FAR FROM HOME

Heligoland, July 28.—(A. P. by Mail)—Astic sea-weed has invaded the North Sea and crowded out nearly all other forms of marine vegetation.

London, Aug. 1.—(A. P. by Mail)—Prison reform is popular just now in England, where it used to be regarded

as purely an American notion. The latest thing in prison reform has been adopted in Wakefield Gaol, with excellent results, it is said.

**FRENCH ACADIANS HONOR
PREMIER VENIOT AND WIFE**

**Leaders of Church and State
Gather at Banquet Held
at Scoudouc**

Moncton, Aug. 19.—The French Acadians of the parish of Scoudouc gathered at the parish hall this evening to do honor to Premier and Mrs. Veniot. The occasion took the form of a banquet, and seldom, if ever, have a people lavished upon a public man such a wealth of faith, pride and affection as was demonstrated by these parishioners of Scoudouc, reinforced by Acadians from other parts of the province and having as guests Provincial Ministers of the Crown, the Secretary of State for Canada, distinguished members of the Catholic clergy and prominent professional and business men.

The people of Scoudouc, which is the girlhood home of Mrs. Veniot, whose father's house still stands near the centre of the village as it did thirty-eight years ago when she, Catherine Melanson, became the wife of the present Premier, chose this time to demonstrate their keen appreciation of the honor which the people of New Brunswick had conferred upon their gifted patriot when last February they bestowed upon him the highest office in their power.

The occasion was entirely non-political in complexion and was essentially the tribute of the people of Mrs. Veniot's old home to the high place won by the guests of honor in the life of this province.

Speeches Glow With Patriotism

Except for the speeches of the English-speaking guests the address was in French, the Premier himself speaking in both French and English. They were replete with a fine patriotism and love of King and country, a true pride of race and filled with eloquent tributes to the guest of honor. The banquet was unique for it was the first time that the Acadians have had the opportunity of extending to one of their race felicitations upon his elevation to the Premiership.

It is interesting to note that Premier Veniot also received an ovation today at Lewisville, a village on the outskirts of Moncton, when he addressed there a gathering of Acadians who were celebrating the Feast of the Assumption, their national feast day.

Met Wife in Lewisville

Premier Veniot first met his wife in Lewisville so that Lewisville and Scoudouc both hold tender places in his memory and it was fitting that they should both have a place in the day's celebrations.

Among the Guests

Among the distinguished guests were Hon. A. B. Copp, Secretary of State, Hon. C. W. Robinson, Hon. A. L. Estabrook, P. P. Melanson and Reid McManus, all members of the Provincial Legislature, Dr. E. A. Smith, Rev. A. D. Cormier, of Shediac, Rev. Father Tessier, of St. Joseph's University, Very Rev. Mr. Herbert, L. S. Brown, general manager Atlantic region of U. N. R. D. J. Doiron and others. There were about 125 in all at the banquet, which, singularly, was held in the hall formerly used as the church where Mr. and Mrs. Veniot were married.

successful Affairs

The chairman of the committee in charge of arrangements was the parish priest, Rev. J. A. Larcheveque whose untiring efforts were largely responsible for the great success of the affair. Dr. L. Larmony, of Shediac, was toastmaster. Space only permits a brief reference at present to the various addresses which followed the very excellent repast brightened by musical selections and a chorus of the young girls of the parish.

The Toast List

Dr. Larmony pointed out that the occasion was to do honor to a man who had risen from the people to the highest elective position in the gift of the people. 

**JEKYLL AND HYDE
CASE IN NEW YORK**

**Prosperous Farmer Is Arrested
for Robbing Chain Store
Proprietor.**

Philadelphia, Aug. 20.—What police describe as a duplication of the strange dual personality of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde was revealed in the arrest of Nicholas Filpov. Filpov, a prosperous farmer, owning a \$20,000 140-acre tract of land at Nesham, in New York state, was held for a hearing by Magistrate Renshaw on charges of robbing Francis Brocico, a chain store proprietor of Desloges, Mo., of \$8,000.

Police allege Filpov had been for years a member of a robber gang operating in various parts of the country. A charge was made against him in St. Louis, where two of his alleged companions were shot in a running fight with police. From 1917 to 1919 he served a term in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta for robbery, police say.

Less than two weeks ago Filpov was arrested on a charge of swindling Mrs. Mary Matkowiak at Atlantic City out of \$3,200 in selling her a "money-making machine." When the case came before Magistrate Renshaw in central

police court it was found the statute of limitations had expired.

Edward Bryant, a private detective arrested Filpov at his farm. The detective was accompanied by Constables Boes and Brocico, of Desloges, Mo. Filpov's neighbors, the detective said, show he looks frequent trips away from home, but had always supposed they were concerning his produce. "He is a respected man in his county in New York," said the detective.

Police here identified him as a man known to them as Adolph Murawski, Burkowski and other names. The constable declared the evidence on which the warrant for his arrest was obtained in Missouri indicated he had come to Desloges for the robbery by a woman he had known years ago.

**FOUR DROWNED AT
PICNIC IN ONTARIO**

Kingston, Aug. 19.—Evelyn Gollery, Jessie Meitz, Isabel Turnbull and Joseph Sakell, were drowned at Collins Lake, northeast of here today about noon when boats in which they were sailing capsized. A picnic was being held at Collins Lake and two rowboats were used to take eight of the party to the opposite shore for a swim. In one of the boats were William Trenhale and his son, George, aged twelve

years, Hugh Thompson, and Joseph Sakell. In the other were the three girls who were drowned and William Karis. Karis, Trenhale, his son and Thompson were saved by other picnickers, who left the shore in boats to go to their rescue.

**Wife Tracks Husband
By Foot and by Auto**

St. Louis, Aug. 20.—A four years' search, conducted by Mrs. Sadie Scobel of New York City for her husband, Benjamin Scobel, President of the Obelisk Products Company of this city, has ended successfully. It became known that he had been arrested here on a charge of abandoning his wife and child. Mrs. Scobel arrived here from New York several days ago. She made the journey on foot and by occasional automobile lifts.

She told the police her home had been wrecked by her own cousin while she was nursing her sick child at a country resort near New York in 1918. She left her husband and worked to support herself and child, but her husband kidnapped their daughter. She later obtained legal custody of the girl, then 4 years old. Several months

later her husband and the cousin disappeared. Ever since then she had been trying to locate him.


Through an official letter sent by the patent office of the Belgian government she found the first trace of him. Because of the lack of money she decided to hike to St. Louis, but automobile tourists permitted her to ride most of the way.

According to the attorneys representing Mrs. Scobel here, Scobel has been living in East St. Louis, Ill., since

he established his business in St. Louis. Mrs. Scobel's cousin, the attorney said, also had been found in East St. Louis. Scobel is held under bond until extradition formalities have been completed with.



COMPLAINS OF LOQUACITY IN THE BUDGET DEBATES

British House of Commons Shuts Off the Long Talker.

Ottawa Lets Them Run On and On, Says-Critic Who Makes Comparisons.

Parliament might well paraphrase the popular song for its closing effort: "Three o'clock in the morning, we've talked the whole night through," says a writer in the Listening Post.

Much of this record of loquacity must be ascribed to the bad habit which has fixed itself upon parliament of spending the early part of the session in the discussion of resolutions introduced by private members.

probably half a dozen members took part in the debate at any length. Here there were sixty budget speeches, of which fifty consisted of vain repetitions.

The practice of permitting members to read their speeches which is contrary to the rules of the House, has much to do with long and frequent speeches. A strict adherence to the rule would probably cut down the length of Hansard by one-third.

In view of the constant complaints about the growing length of parliamentary sessions, which is largely attributable to the practices referred to in the preceding paragraphs, it would be desirable if all parties should get together and endeavor to effect some reform.
