Postponment of Injunction Hearing Asked for Buildings With Accommodation by Miners But Court Rules Against Them

ONE MAN WHO BOLTED.

Washington, Nov. 8—Injunction proceedings against officials of the United Mine Workers of America will be pressed at Indianapolis today, so Attorney-General Palmer announced. John L. Lewis, acting president of the miners' union, refused to accede to the governments' demand that the strike order be recalled pending mediation of the con-

recalled pending mediation of the controversy.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 8—The United Mine Workers of America, through their attorney, Henry Warrum, asked at the opening of the United States district court today that the proceedings be postponed a week or ten days in the hope that meanwhile the strike might be settled. The government, through C. B. Ames, assistant attorney-general, objected and the court thereupon took up the motion to dissolve the injunction. The government position was that the case was too important to unit delay. It was believed probable that Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, would seek another conference with Attorney-General Palmer in an effort to settle the strike prior to the opening of injunction proceedings. Numerous conferences already have been held but so far apparently without result.
