





LONDON, Ont., March 28.-"This thing of insanity pleas in murder trials is becoming a farce," declared Justice Lennox in his address to the grand jury at the opening of the Spring Assizes of the Supreme Court. 

The building stands in the midst of a spacious garden, the high wall of which hides from general view the artistic arrangement of trees and shrubs as well as the pools and fountains. These may be seen to best advantage from the gateway. This view is perhaps the most frequently photographed spot in all India.

The Taj Mahal was commenced about the year 1629 and was not completed until 1650. It is constructed entirely of white marble and the great dome, rising from the centre, which is of the same material, is the admiration of engineers and architects to this day. Years were lavished upon the

tion of engineers and architects to this day. Years were lavished upon the carving and inlaying of the interior, and thousands of precious and semi-precious stones were worked into the decoration. Dummy caskets are located in the spacious interior, but the real tombs are below, as a precaution against marauders.

MONTREAL, March 27-The Montreal Gazette, in its news nns tomorrow will carry a local news item which says the United States Railroads are planning a 36-cent drop in freight rates to hullify the Canadian budget provision increasing by 36 cents per ton the duty on American bituminous slack coal, according to a report current in Montreal coal circles.

The American roads, according to the information that has gained credence here, will shortly file at Washington an application for approval of a new tariff that would reduce the Pennsylvania-Montreal rate from \$4.40 per ton to \$4.13 on slack coal. This move is said to be inspired by a fear that the increase contained in the Canadian
