Notes and Suggestions of Practical Utility FOR THE FARM, FIELD, GARDEN AND ORCHARD.

How to Save Your Butter. These elements of plants come from the soil: Phosphorus, sulphur, chlorine, silicon, calcium, iron, potassium, magnesium, and manganese.

The Dairy. How to Save Your Butter. John W. Decker, of the Wisconsin agricultural college, says: Suppose a farmer has 250 lbs. of milk a day as the product from his herd; 200 lbs. of this will be skimmed. If he loses 1 per cent of fat in the skimming, he will be losing over three pounds of butter per day.

Many of the sources of fertilizer contain more than one ingredient. Farmers must learn the sources of fertilizer and know how to use them.

Place the materials in the soil and nature will make the crop for you. Ignorance may be too confiding, but it is quite as apt to be suspicious.

It is often best to mix the manures of the farm with chemical ingredients. There is no profit in maintaining a beef carcass, even if it does give milk.

Wholesome surroundings are necessary to the production of wholesome milk. When a sheep leaves the flock there is usually something the matter with it.

Man is too much like the monkey—imitating instead of working understandingly. Plant foods from the atmosphere are carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and nitrogen—all gases.

With the exhaustion of the accumulated fertility of the soil, a new era in farming begins. To feed crops by enriching the soil is indirectly to feed ourselves and our domestic animals.

Every element of nature is found combined with one or more other elements, seldom alone. Learn to make your crops as the chemist learns to mix his ingredients for the desired product.

K. S. Carman, in his New Potato Culture, gives preference to halves and quarters for planting. Few farmers' boys learn the trade by working with their fathers. They generally become imitators.

The school is as necessary to the farmer's son as it is to the son of the man engaged in any other calling. Some think it best to feed off the grass that starts in moist places; if left it becomes tough and is rejected.

When soil is present in the soil, plants take it up; but it does not seem to be essential to their growth. The Illinois station recommends planting four kernels of corn in a hill and the hills three feet, eight inches apart each way.

THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.

The holiday generally observed in the city and suburbs was a most successful one. The weather was all that could be desired—the sun shining brightly in a clear sky, while a light southeast wind wafted the odor of the spring time through the streets of our beautiful city, all of which resonated with the freeters who were being continually set off.

The morning train from St. John brought quite a number up, and at about one o'clock the Flomenville arrived from Woodstock with upwards of half a hundred excursionists.

The Canadian School of Excursion was reviewed on the officers' parade in the morning by Lieut. Col. Maxwell, the troops being paraded through the drill by Capt. Hemming, many of the movements being heartily applauded by the numerous spectators. After the drill a salute was fired and three cheers given for the Queen.

The C. E. I. will hereafter be known as the Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry, Col. Maxwell having received a telegram from Ottawa stating that her majesty had conferred on the regiment the designation of "royal." The Colonel read the telegram to the corps the morning of the 24th.

There was a very large attendance at the university in the afternoon in witness of the annual amateur athletic sports on the college terrace. The R. S. I. band furnished music, and the buildings and grounds were gay with hunting and streamers. The sports were the most successful held for years, each event being hotly contested. A. F. Street, J. H. Hallowell and J. D. Fowler acted as judges. J. S. C. acted as starter, and H. C. Rutter timer. The following is a list of events, with the winners and prizes:

Standing broad jump—Helen, 1st, 12 ft. 6 in.; gold medal; Elliott, 2nd, 12 ft. 2 in.; silver medal; Malone, 3rd. The former record of 12 ft. 4 in. has been held by F. B. Maguire since 1878.

100 yards dash—Vesey, 1st, gold medal, 11 sec. McKee, 2nd, silver medal; Armstrong, 3rd, cuff buttons.

200 yards dash—Vesey, 1st, gold medal, time 25 sec; McKee, 2nd, revolver.

Running broad jump—Vesey, 1st, gold medal, 17 ft. 4 in.; Helen, 2nd, umbrella; Elliott, 3rd, Cooper's novels. Chas. McCallough, graduate of last year, at the close of this contest beat the former record of S. A. Skinner, 17 ft. 10 in., by scoring 18 ft. 10 in.

Running high jump—Helen and Burpee tied at 5 ft. 11 in. Agnes McCallough beat the former record by scoring 5 ft. 11 in.

Half mile walk—McLellan, 1st, medal; gold medal, 2nd, gold medal; McKee, 3rd, time, 4:29.

Hop step and jump—Vesey, 1st, gold medal, 36 ft. 11 in.; Elliott, 2nd, fishing rod; Helen, 3rd.

Quarter mile race—Vesey, 1st, gold medal; Mitchell, 2nd, dog photos; McKee, 3rd; time 1 min 2 sec.

Pole vault—Aiken, 1st, gold medal, 8 ft. 11 in.; Elliott, 2nd, silver cup; Powers, 3rd, pair slippers.

Hurdle race—Vesey, 1st, gold medal, 10 sec; Armstrong, 2nd, pocket pipe; McKee, 3rd, time, 1:15.

Half mile race—Mitchell, 1st, gold medal, 6 min 13 sec; Chesley, 2nd, cigar case; Aiken, 3rd, Pope's poems.

Vesey won the best general athletic belt presented by the class of 1880, and also the medal for the sophomore class, and Chesley gets the freshman medal.

At the conclusion of the sports the prizes were presented to the successful competitors by Mrs. Bridges.

A very limited number of excursionists came from St. John with the Y. M. C. A. orchestra. They arrived here shortly after seven o'clock, the orchestra immediately proceeding to the concert, where they held a grand concert, which was only fairly attended.

THE WORLD OVER.

The Spirit of the Press of all Countries.
A Synoptic History of the Times.

Remits and Arranged for every-day Convenience.

The two months drought in France is estimated to have destroyed 22,000,000 francs worth of crops.

William Sullivan, who murdered his employer, Layton, Leitch, at Newark, Mich., and assaulted Mrs. Leitch, was taken from jail Tuesday night by a mob.

Ephraim Muehler, who murdered J. J. Brown, a prominent business man of Nichols, Ga., and another negro who was quarrelling with Brown when he was killed, were taken from the officers by a mob and lynched.

Dr. Sophia C. Thomson of Boston, convicted of having performed a criminal operation upon Caroline S. Hopkins in June 1892 which caused the Hopkins woman's death, was sentenced Wednesday to five years in the woman's reformatory. The prisoner is 73 years of age.

The French public are charged and incensed by the meagreness of official news regarding the troubles between the French and Siamese in Nekong Valley. The newspapers accuse Great Britain of backing the Siamese in their hostile attitude toward the French.

Enrique Castelar, sometime director of Spain and for nearly 50 years conspicuous among Spanish republicans, announces he has retired from public life. He says that he is convinced that monarchy for the present is the only stable and progressive form of government possible in Spain.

The minister plenipotentiary of Brussels, Wednesday adopted a resolution in favor of an eight-hours working day in the mines. Supporters of the resolution represented 104,000 and its opponents 100,000 miners. The conference then proceeded to discuss the question of a universal strike to enforce the eight-hour system.

At the scene as this week a Paris despatch says—Mr. Arton, Panama lobbyist, was sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude for fraud in connection with the dynamite society and to five years civil degradation and the payment of 400,000 francs fine for unlawful and dishonest practices in his relations to the Panama Canal company.
