NEW PAY SCHEDULE.

Increased Rates Accorded to Employees of Electric Company.

The wage question between the British Columbia Electric Railway Company and their employees, as was expected from the good understanding which has always existed between the employers and employees, has been happily adjusted.

Motor men and conductors according to the new as well as the old schedule are to be paid on a sliding scale which is regulated according to their length of service in the company's employment.

The only point in dispute remaining to be settled is the rate for the first six months' service. The men claim an advance of 41-2 cents an hour, this being the rate which is given to the other classes.

The men endeavored to get a nine-hour day. The company pointed out that this was a question for the men themselves as they were paid upon an hourly basis.

The usual annual bonus will be continued as formerly to men of over a year's standing, this taking the form of a voluntary grant on the part of the directors.

CHAOS REIGNS IN GUATEMALA

WHOLESALE ARRESTS HAVE BEEN MADE

Many Prominent Men Sentenced to Death—Republic is Preparing For War.

Mexico City, July 2.—Word has been received in Mexico City that President Cabrera, of Guatemala, has caused the arrest of 160 citizens of that republic on a charge of alleged complicity in the recent attempt to assassinate him.

Among the imprisoned are some of the most wealthy and prominent men in the country.

The statement is made that these men have long been on Cabrera's black list, and the charges against them were trumped up for political reasons.

When the news of the wholesale arrests became generally known the diplomatic corps, with the exception of Philip A. Brown, the United States charge d'affaires, protested. No attention was paid to these protests by President Cabrera.

The dispatch says that absolute chaos reigns in Guatemala. Farm hands are pressed for military service, while crops are rotting in the fields.

The rich are threatened with ruin as they contribute to the war fund. Troops are being hurriedly rushed to the Mexican frontier and the Honduran border.

The report caused great excitement among central American residents in this city, and at a mass meeting held on Sunday the matter was discussed.

LOCAL COMPANY'S THIRD STATION MANY APPLICATIONS FOR WHALING SITES Applicants Must Prove They Can Comply With Severe Conditions of Canadian Act.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Several cases, among which is principally the pressure of business, have conspired to delay the selection of a third site for the Pacific Whaling company on the southeast of Vancouver Island.

Within a fortnight's time the new station, which was exclusively announced in the Times some months ago, is expected to be opened.

Pursuant to the provisions of the act which has followed the pursuit of whalers of the West Coast of Vancouver Island. Never in the history of the industry has such pronounced success attended the efforts of a company as that which has followed the pursuit of whalers from Sechart, during the present year.

Some time ago the Hon. Bjornsgaard applied for a license to hunt from Safety Cove, Calvert Island. The application was refused.

Mr. Bjornsgaard is palpably a newcomer to this continent, and is evidently entirely unacquainted with the laws in force on the coast. He is ignorant of the provisions in the fisheries act of the United States is to the effect that no whaling operations can be carried out from the United States seaboard in waters other than those built in the United States.

With regard to the non-granting of sites to the Norwegians on the British Columbia coast, it may be stated that they have no cause to complain. All the sites possible by the Whaling Act of Canada have been applied for by Canadians long since, and it is only just that those who apply first should be considered first.

Up to the present there have been no whaling licenses issued except to those who have been able to prove to the government that they are in a position to comply with the severe conditions of the Canadian Whaling Act. With reference to the whaling along this coast there is a spirit of speculation in the air.

MYSTERIOUS MURDER. Italian Girl Shot While She Was Combining Her Hair at Window—Several Arrests.

New York, July 4.—While combing her hair at the window of her room, Ninna Grazzani, 19 years of age, an Italian girl, was killed to-day by a bullet through the head, which the police are convinced was fired by some one who sought to conceal the source of the fatal shot in the noise of Fourth of July fire-works.

The tragedy occurred on Elizabeth street. Several arrests have been made of Italians living in the rear of the flat on Mott street, which is opposite the house where the girl was shot.

The police have so far been unable to find a motive for the shooting, as she was not known to have any enemies.

MOTORMAN KILLED. Bellingham, July 4.—Motorman Frank Hiecock was killed and one passenger fatally injured, while three others were seriously hurt in a head-on collision on the Whistler-Lake line. The accident was due to Hiecock having misread orders.

MOANA HAS A FINE VOYAGE TITLED PASSENGERS ARRIVE IN PORT Australian Says Outlook for Emigrants is Hopeless Unless They Possess Capital.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The Canadian-Australian liner Moana, which reached quarantine last night and arrived in port this morning, passed through fair weather during her entire trip from the antipodes.

She had a long passenger list, more than one-third of whom embarked at this port. The following is the purser's report of the voyage: "Left Sydney June 10th, 11.30 a.m. via Suva, 17th, called at Fanning Island 22nd, Honolulu 26th, arrived at Victoria July 3rd, 11.30 p.m. Experienced fine weather from Sydney to Brisbane, thence moderate to fresh N. W. winds with moderate easterly sea to Suva, thence moderate easterly winds and sea to Fanning Island, then fresh N.E. winds and moderate sea to Suva, thence moderate easterly winds and smooth sea to Victoria.

The Moana's passengers included Lord Poulett, seventh earl of the name, who can date his title as far back as 1706. He is a Welsh peer and a second lieutenant in the 4th Buffs, the Royal Welsh Fusiliers. He is on a tour round the world.

Sir Brodrick and Lady Hartwell also accompanied the Moana. Sir Brodrick is a baronet and the fourth of the name, the family having received the title in 1805. He is in force on the 1st Battalion of the Buffs, and resides in the Channel Islands.

Among the other passengers, the majority of whom were tourists, was T. H. Rice, the Canadian Commissioner in charge of the Dominion exhibits at the New Zealand exhibition. A passenger on board who has come over here from Australia gave an interesting detail of the conditions of affairs there. His name is A. Rasmussen, and he has resided in the antipodes for some time.

Alluding to the question of agricultural land, he says: "All the good land in Australia has already been taken up, and there is only a very poor chance for emigration coming in at present. The land which is capable of cultivation is at a very high figure, and immigrants who do not possess money are almost hopelessly handicapped. In fact there is no scope for them, and the result is that very few are coming in at present."

NO SHORTAGE AT ELK LAKE WATER COMMISSIONER TELLS OF CONDITION Level is Seventeen Inches Higher Than Last Year at This Time.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The water commissioner, J. Raymur, sees no cause for alarm in connection with the water situation this season. There has been a growing impression among citizens that there might be a very serious shortage in the supply of water, but the water commissioner says this is not probable.

The situation at Elk lake is better than it was at this time last year. The water stands 17 inches higher than it was at this date last summer, so that with a limit put upon the amount which can be brought into the city outside the centre and beat everyone behind reached, there can be no shortage arising.

The use of water for city purposes and the loss by evaporation reduces the lake level by about nine or ten inches a month during July and August, so that the higher level this year, as compared with last, leaves no question as to supply remaining greater than last season.

Mr. Raymur, speaking of the loss last winter by water running over the dam, said that this was magnified. The amount which went to waste would have played little part in the supply. It would only have raised the lake about two inches and a half. Such an amount of water would have very little effect on the general supply.

With reference to the new hours for watering, the commissioner says it is too early yet to form an opinion. A longer period of trial will be required.

CASE ABANDONED. Lipinski, Who Shot Man in Seattle Hotel, Acquitted at Preliminary Hearing.

Seattle, July 3.—Albert Lipinski, who shot and killed E. F. Crueger, a wealthy mining man, in a hotel on the afternoon of June 20th, yesterday was acquitted on preliminary hearing. The prosecution abandoned the case for lack of evidence to convict. Hazel Wells, the woman in the case, whose testimony had been relied on by the defence, modified her story to the advantage of the defendant.

BURNS AND SQUIRES TO MEET TO-DAY Jeffries Announces That He Will Meet Australian Should He Win the Fight.

San Francisco, July 4.—One of the principal events in the sporting world this year is the 45-round glove contest between Bill Squires, the Australian champion, and Tommy Burns, of America, for the heavyweight championship of the world, the percentage of the gate receipts and a side bet of \$5,000 which will take place this evening at Colma. The fight is one of the most important events in pugilistic circles since the abdication of J. J. Jeffries, the undefeated heavyweight champion. What adds interest to the fight is the appearance in the arena of Jeffries and referee, and his declaration last night that he will re-enter the ring and fight the Australian if Squires is victorious.

A large open air arena, having a seating capacity of 8,000, has been completed, and everything is in readiness for the men to enter the ring. Advance sales are in the neighborhood of \$12,000. Promoter James Coffill gave out a statement last night to the effect that he expected a \$20,000 house. This is based on the expectation that 7,000 people will attend the contest. Betting on the fight veered last night from 10 to 7, which has stood for some time, to 10 to 9. This was caused by the appearance of considerable Burns money, a little of which has heretofore been in sight.

A number of bets were registered at this figure and the prediction was made that when the men enter the ring this evening the betting would be at even money. This, however, has been somewhat overdrawn and the Antipodean will doubtless step into the ring a favorite. Squires, it is stated, will have an understanding with the referee in the ring to toss up the sponge for him. He gave the word to the referee and never will give anyone the right to stall defeat on his behalf. Both men are in excellent condition. Squires will enter the ring at 182 pounds, Burns at 178. Besides three pounds in weight, the Australian had advantage of three and a half inches in

Denver, Colo., July 4.—Frank Schmelzer, of Silverton, Colo., who on Tuesday was elected a member of the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners, jumped from a moving train last night and was killed. He was on his way for Spokane for a short visit prior to going to Boise to testify in the Haywood trial. In the suburbs of the city he discovered that he was on the wrong train and jumped off, calling to the conductor to throw his grip after him.

NEW SERVICE IS INAUGURATED BY THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY The First "Trans-Canada Limited" Left Montreal for the Coast Yesterday.

Montreal, July 3.—A new high-water mark was registered by the Canadian Pacific Railway passenger service yesterday when the magnificent Trans-Canada Limited, beating all records, was started by the company amid great enthusiasm, on its journey to the coast. The fast train of the Trans-Canada service left Windsor Street station at 12:30. It was in a measure an expression of advancement which seemed singularly appropriate in view of the fact that only three days ago the company had just in a way celebrated the 21st anniversary of the transcontinental service. The train was made up of the choicest examples of railway architecture that have yet been achieved on the American continent. The three sleeping cars, the Dixie, the Dalhousie and the Dauphin and the combination dining car were superb examples of railway accomplishment.

The train started on its long journey westward with expressions of enthusiasm on the part of a large gathering of spectators and the initial stop was inaugurated under the most favorable auspices. Among those on the platform were Mr. McNeil, vice-president and general manager, Mr. Leonard, assistant general manager, and Cooper, superintendent of sleeping and dining cars; Mr. Robson, advertising agent; Mr. Robert Kerr, passenger traffic manager.

The trip was as Ottawa was celebrated in an extremely enjoyable manner. Ex-Mayor Cook and a number of his newspaper friends assembled at the Central station and gave a most hearty greeting to a party of Montreal newspaper men who were the guests of the company upon this auspicious occasion. The cars were inspected and the highest encomiums were passed upon these magnificent specimens of workmanship. In the evening a party of guests assembled at the hotel where under the presidency of Mr. Wm. Wm. Stitt's Australian experience and his general knowledge of railway conditions interested in his remarks with regard to an "all rail line." He said that so far as the Canadian Pacific was concerned it would respond as it has responded in the past, to the varying conditions of an age which demanded advancement in every form, so far as transportation was concerned. The "Trans-Canada Limited" was the latest and the best thing that had been done in railroading on this continent and railroading in general. Nowhere else was there to be seen a train of such magnificence as that which left the station on Tuesday afternoon. All the resource of railway architecture had been obtained in this product of Canadian ingenuity. The Trans-Canada is not only expressive of Canadian sentiment but of Canadian capability. Since the Angus shops were established there have been many revelations of the highest standard of excellence that is attainable in railway equipment, but all most actual knowledge that nothing in the railway world today surpasses or equals the product of the express which is now on its western journey and which would surely be all records.

COURT OF REVISION. Appeals Heard Against City Assessor's Valuation—A Civic Protest.

The court of revision on the civic assessment rolls held a short session this morning at which all the appeals, with the exception of one, were dealt with. The exception is the corporation's own appeal against the assessment on the wires, poles, and other overhead gear owned by the B. C. Electric Company and situated on the main streets of the city. The valuation of this gear is given by the assessor as \$250,000, and the city is making an application to have this amount increased, claiming that it is an undervaluation. As the appeal is likely to be contested by the company and will take a considerable length of time to deal with, the court will hold a sitting next Tuesday morning to deal with it.

A. B. Fraser, of Lee & Fraser, appeared on behalf of the board of management for the St. Andrew's Presbyterian church and appealed for a reduction of the assessment on the church site on the grounds that the land, although it had increased in value from a commercial standpoint, had not gained in value as far as church purposes were concerned. Mr. Fraser stated that the board of management did not dispute the valuation of the site which was given by the assessor as \$9,350, but thought that, as the church itself was exempted from taxation, the court should deal leniently with the congregation in the matter of assessing the site.

His Worship the Mayor pointed out that the court could not make a reduction from what might be called sentimental reasons, and, the rest of the court concurring, ordered the assessment to stand. His Worship explained that the question raised by Mr. Fraser was outside of the court's jurisdiction.

J. E. Painter, appearing on behalf of Alice S. Painter, asked for a reduction of the assessment on block 4, section 21. This assessment was also ordered to stand. The only reductions granted were: The assessments of William Peddie's property, block H, section 31, and lot 67, which was reduced by \$20, and lot 54, block 5, section 74, which was reduced by \$40, and lot 846, same block, in which case the assessment on the improvements was struck off in consequence of the original building having been pulled down. The assessor was also ordered to rectify a mistake in regard to the assessment of the improvements on Mrs. Lee's property. Only three of the appellants against the assessments were present at the court to state their cases.

DISABLED VESSEL OFF THIS COAST

Two Masted Steamer Believed to Be Ohio Fifteen Miles From Carmanah.

(From Thursday's Daily.) A dispatch received from Carmanah to-day states that early this morning a disabled steamer was sighted 15 miles from that point. She was a two-masted vessel with a black funnel, which was neither ringed with white or painted with a white ball. Two tugs were lying alongside, evidently tendering assistance.

The opinion among local shipping men is that the vessel is the steamer Ohio, of the White Star line, which was recently wrecked on a submerged iceberg off Nome. It will be remembered that the vessel was beached at that point and was temporarily repaired and then sailed southward bound for Seattle. It is not known whether she came south under her own steam or was towed by tugs. The theory is that the temporary repairs gave way, and she sprung a leak when off Carmanah and that tugs at the entrance to the straits went to her assistance.

The Ohio answers to the description of the vessel in distress as she is a two-masted vessel with a white ring around her black funnel. With the assistance of the tugs she will probably make the Sound some time this evening.

Locusts are proving hardly less destructive in German Southwest Africa than they were in the case of natives. A settler not long ago attempted to defend his little plot of land by digging all around it a ditch one yard broad and one inch deep, at the bottom of which he lighted a fire. But the insects swarmed into the ditch till the flames had been extinguished by their accumulated corpses.

WORK HAS BEGUN ON NEW FACTORY

T. Brayshaw Will Make Use of Electricity in Various Departments of Wagon Works.

(From Thursday's Daily.) T. M. Brayshaw on Tuesday commenced the excavations for his new Victoria wagon factory. The city is hauling away the soil, etc., of the excavation for the grounds of the new C. P. R. hotel. The dimensions of the factory will be 125 by 100 feet. The building will face Government street, the side will run along Chatham street, the structure will be entirely of iron, iron walls and an iron roof. Mr. Logan, a Fernie man, is the contractor, and \$5,000 is the estimate for the completion of the building. The top floor will consist of show rooms and paint and varnish rooms.

A competent staff of skilled workmen have already been engaged to undertake work at the opening of the new factory. They will be constantly employed during the whole year in carrying out orders and in keeping up the stock. There will always be stock on hand for purchasers to choose from for immediate use. (The local trade and the Island trade generally is sufficient in itself to keep the manufactory working at its full capacity.)

Electricity is to be used wherever possible in the factory. Electric forced draught blowers are to be used for the fires; electric welding machines for putting on the rubber tires, and a big electric motor for the woodwork machines, drills and emery wheels.

In every way T. M. Brayshaw is determined to have a manufactory capable of meeting the requirements of all classes of customers, and of turning out really first class work.

MOTOR CLUB MEETS. Pronounces Alberti Run a Success and Discusses the Want of New Road. The Victoria Motor Club held a meeting in the Garechek block last night for the purpose of discussing the recent run to Alberti and also general business. A. E. Todd presided. The three-day run was pronounced a great success, and as an outcome of it the question of the new road from Goldstream Road to Mill Bay came on the table. The manufactory of those present was that the new road could be constructed without much difficulty, the work to commence from the second or third bench up from the water.

A committee was appointed to look into the advisability of making some slight alterations in the by-laws, this committee to report to a subsequent general meeting. The following were added to the membership of the club: A. W. Bridgeman, Fred Pemberton, L. Elford, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gray, T. L. Mackay, J. M. Woods, and R. H. Sperling, the general manager of the B. C. Electric railway in Vancouver.

A general meeting of the club will be held on Wednesday, the 10th July, in the rooms at the Garechek block.

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CONSTRUCTION OF WIRELESS STATIONS

Dominion Government Commissioner Will Rush Work as Quickly as Possible.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Cecil Doutré, commissioner of wireless telegraphy and superintendent of wireless stations for the Dominion, who is now on the Pacific Coast establishing stations, says that the only delay which he is meeting with arises from the inability to get the work done owing to the difficulty in obtaining labor.

The Shoemaker system, manufactured by the International Wireless Construction Company, is to be installed. That the best has been decided, and some time after the fullest consideration. As far as the government is concerned it is denied that there is any breaking of contracts with the Marconi company. The government is not bound to use that system, and have adopted for the Pacific Coast the system which it is felt will serve the purposes intended better than any other.

The stations which the government are establishing are to be aids to navigation. It is essential that a system should be adopted which is able to communicate with vessels which carry different equipments. The Marconi company refuses to interchange messages with other systems, a serious drawback when used as aids to navigation. The Shoemaker system, in addition to other excellencies which it possesses, permits the interchanging with all other systems provided other companies do not object.

The Marconi company is the only one which refuses to interchange messages. The fact that the government has seen fit to adopt the Shoemaker as the one to be installed by them would indicate that it has special features which make it superior to others for the purposes intended.

The stations on this coast will be erected just as quickly as the work can be done. In a few weeks some of them will be working. The site for the Victoria station will be finally decided upon, probably to-day. It is quite possible it may be located at Shotbolt's Hill.

Capt. Troup says he knows of no hitch in connection with the installation of the wireless system on the C. P. R. steamers. He says the work of installation will not begin at once. If the Marconi company will not interchange with the Dominion government system, the Shoemaker, which is to be installed on this coast, the C. P. R. will then have another system put on its steamers which will permit communication with the government stations.

TEA TRUST STORY DENIED. San Francisco, July 4.—The Japanese government has cabled acting consul K. Matabara, to deny the story that it is fostering and financing a gignito tea trust.

A KLOOTCHMANS' RACE. Attraction Secured for the Fall Fair by J. E. Smart.

A galloping race between klootchmans riding in true Indian bare-back fashion will be a special feature of the coming fair in this city. J. E. Smart, secretary of the local Agricultural Association, has made arrangements whereby four Klootchmans will be brought down from Savona, B. C., for this purpose.

These klootchmans are said to be among the most expert horsemen, or rather horsewomen, in the West, and seen as they will be in characteristic costume, riding in the true old-fashioned manner, will be a most interesting and unique appearance. It is expected that this innovation in the racing line in the city will be one of the greatest drawing cards of the fair.

The horses used will be the bronchos brought for the bustling contest.

RICE MILLS READY TO BEGIN WORK

Newly Equipped With Machinery the Handling of Grain Will Commence at Once.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Within a week's time the old Victoria rice mills on Store street will be in running order and an industry which has been absent from Victoria for over ten years will be in active operation. The Mount Royal Milling & Manufacturing Company, of Montreal, which has taken over the mills, has made arrangements to supply a large market in the prairie provinces from the local plant, and will commence operations with a daily output of from 10 to 15 tons of the finished product, which is valued at nearly \$75 per ton.

The mill has been equipped with new machinery and an electric motor of 75 horse-power has been installed to run the plant. The mill is already in operation, and during the past few days about three tons have been put through the cleaning process in a highly satisfactory manner. It is intended to handle rice alone for the first few months after opening, but as soon as it is found possible the flour mill, which will be placed up on the second floor, will be placed in thorough working order, and will be operated. The company intends to utilize the wharf belonging to the mills for the purpose of shipping and receiving grain cut and carry away from the mill.

The warehouse has been connected to the mill by a bridge, and the grain will be trucked straight from the mill to the head of the plant.

Over 100 tons of rice are at present in the warehouse awaiting the completion of about six months of the season's shipments, amounting to 500 tons, at present, about 20 tons of rice a day, but should the market warrant it, the plant will be extended to meet the demand for shipping and receiving a trial of the rice-cleaning equipment has been made, and during the past few days about three tons have been put through the cleaning process in a highly satisfactory manner. 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


WHAT THE C. P. R. HAS ACCOMPLISHED

Transcontinental Service Reaches Majority--Reduction in Time From Montreal to Coast

Twenty-one years ago to-day, says Friday's Winnipeg Free Press, the first trans-continental train of the Canadian Pacific railway steamed out from the old Dalhousie station, Montreal, and amidst the enthusiastic cheers of a vast assemblage, the history-making train speeded away on the initial journey to the far off Pacific coast. There was then no palatial Windsor street or Place Victoria depot. The road itself had only a mile or 4.51--a big thing in those days. And one trans-continental train a day, six days in the week, more than met the actual requirements of the travelling public. In the journey between Montreal and Vancouver, five days and a half were consumed--the first train leaving Montreal on the morning of June 28th, and reaching Winnipeg on the morning of July 1st, and Port Moody, then the Pacific terminus, at noon on July 4th. To-day there is a double daily trans-continental service, with the "Over-

seas mail" special every four weeks in each direction, carrying the mails between the Orient and the Mother Country in less than a month, and in a few days will be inaugurated another fast trans-continental service--the "Trans-Canada Limited," running three times a week during July and August, which will cover the distance between Montreal and Vancouver in ninety hours--almost two days quicker than was done 21 years ago--and in the fastest time made by any regular trans-continental train in America. This will make four trans-continental train services on the C. P. R. where in 1886 one more than sufficed. The first train across Canada traversed many miles of unknown and uninhabited country. There were dreary stretches of rock and forest, and the great fertile prairies were but sparsely settled even within the limits of Manitoba. To-day the silence that then enveloped the land is almost everywhere broken by the loud hum of industry. Cities have grown up, settlements appeared, farms supplied--the buffalo has vanished to be replaced by sleek stock, which fills Johnny Bull's huge lair; the Indian brave has disappeared, except at a few stations--where they are curiously looked at by passing strangers--and a vast domain whose No. 1 hard wheat is making it known as the great granary of the world now looms largely on the map. To-day after this lapse of time, the C. P. R. has become one of the world's greatest railway systems. It is the longest line of continuous railway under one management. It has a steamship service on two oceans, with an extensive coastwise service supporting the longest unbroken line of transportation in the world. Along its rails is an endless chain of elevators, grain fields, the richest prairie, the finest fields of the universe. This railway also possesses a hotel system which has made the road a host of princes and potentates of all climes, for at populous

points from St. Andrews-by-the-Sea to Victoria, in British Columbia, hand-some structures are to be found. There are, too, extensive express and telegraph services operated in conjunction with the railway. Marconigrams make possible communication with friends while leagues from shore. Besides being a transportation company, the C. P. R. owns and operates coal, gold, copper and silver-lead mines, has its own smelters and re-refractory works. It is one of the largest of the world's land owners, has even a floral department supplying thousands upon thousands of packages of flower seeds to the different railway employees along its lines every spring. One and twenty years ago, as has been stated, the C. P. R. mileage was 4,551. To-day it is, including the Soan and Marquette lines, over 13,000, and the mileage is yearly being added to.
