NOUNCED TO MARRY AGAIN.

Sultan of Morocco Was a British Soldier, But Sought Fortune Else-

The announcement of the engagement of Kaid Sir Harry Aubrey Mac-Lean to Miss Elia Prendergast, V.O., recalls the exploits of the Scottish chieftain in the Moorish Empire. chieftain in the Moorish Empire. Soldier of fortune and adventurer of the best type, his career has been as spectacular as it has been glorious. Forty years ago Harry Aubrey de Vere MacLean was an officer in her Majesty's Sirtyshinh Regiment of Foot, poor, but with the best blood of Scotland in his veins. He was too poor to 50 the pace with his brother officers, so eventually he resigned his commission and west to Tangier. He went to see the Sultan of Morocco, Moulai Hasan, a grim old warrior, strong lenough for himself, but worried about the succession of



heir, a puny, weak boy. There is pretenders to the throne who waiting for the old Sultan to die MacLean proposed hims. If to Moulai Hassan as commander and military instructor for the imperial bodyguard, who should be equipped with modern weapons. His proposal was accepted and MacLean soon knocked this thousand fighting men into good shape.

uprisings.

Raisuli had become world-famous in 4904, when he captured Ion Perdicaris, a wealthy American, and held him for ransom. Morocco, prodded by the United States, finally raised \$55,000 to free Perdicaris. Raisuli captured other foreigners and held them, and MacLean sent word to him that he would meet him in the desert alone. MacLean went alone, but Raisuli took some of his men, land made MacLean a prisoner. The bandit demanded \$200,000 for MacLean's freedom. He dropped this price several times, but no one would pay it, and after MacLean had been held prisoner for seven months he was turned free.

er for seven months he was turned free.

It was not long after this that MacLean returned to England and took a country home in Norfolk. MacLean's first wife was Miss Catherine Coe. He married her in 1832, and her social position was such that none of the European women at either Gibraltar of Tangier would consent to any social intercourse with her, in spite of her husband's influence and power. Sir Harry continued to live with her until 1905, when matters got so bad that he sued for a divorce.



Clergymen and Students.

It is generally supposed that money-tenders are a rapacious and usurious lot. Some, of course, are, but many are not, and there are a few cases where men can even borrow money free from all interest and charges.

A total sum of \$26,000 is available this year for loans in Leicestef Eng., to people under thirty-five years of age who fulfil certain specified conditions. They must be "of good name, good fame, and good condition, whatever is exactly signified by that clause; also they must not be "lipplers"! This large amount, available for Leicester residents to borrow comes from three old charities be queathed to the Midland town, and the money is lent for nine years in sums of \$125, \$150 or \$600. It is both interesting and surprising to learn that for the past forty years there has never been any borrower who failed to repay the loan fully and punctually.

The City of London also possesses similar bequests of money which it can lend to tradesmen within the famous square mile, in sums of \$50 to \$50, as agreed. This money comes,

The City of London also possesses similar bequests of money which it can lend to tradesmen within the fameus square mile, in sums of \$50 to \$150, or from old bequests left to certain City companies, of which the Skinners is one, for this express purpose, and it has many a time and oft served to keep an ambitious and hardworking, but temporarily hard-up tradesman from having to shut up his shop, owing to lack of capital at a critical moment. The times when these loans become open for tradesmen, and their amounts, are duly advertised in the chief newspapers.

Of similar nature, though for use in a rather different way, are many large sums of money held in trust by colleges and schools.

One or two well-known societies for helping candidates who wish to be ordained as clergymen in the Church of England have also money in hand which they lend without interest in similar fastion, to men requiring it for the purposes of study, maintenance, or for livelihood immediately after ordination. Indeed, it is surprising to those in the know about such things how many candidates for the ministry are thus financed. And the Church gains greatly thereby, for many an excellent young fellow would be precluded from entering its ministry, owing to lack of means when in college, were it not for the trust money thus available, from which he can borrow without interest.

One Cambridge college p quite famous for the extreme generosity of its chief Don in the matter of lending money free to men who have distinguished themselves at the university and need such useful and valuable assistance at, perhaps, the most crucial periods of their lives. This money comes from the Don's own private purse, and is neither a trust nor a right. It is simply a grand and splendid effort (wondrously appreciated by those who have profited from it, as so many havel) to assist the men of that college to high place, and work in the world.

Law For Tinkers.

What was known as the "Tinkers' Act" was passed during the latter part of the reign of Edward I., and was meant as a protection for the general public against the extortion ate charges of tinkers. The following is a translation of a portion of this peculiar measure from the Norman French of the period:

"All persons earning a livelihood of om the tinkering, mending, and dealing in all sorts of metal vessels, whether for use in cooking or as ornamental to the houses of the inhabitants of this country, are, by virtue of this law, sanctioned and approved of by his Majesty. 'dward I., to take warning that they must not under any pretext or excuse whatever charge more than is legally due for any work done. A LAND OF WHITE HOUSES. Buildings in Bermuda Are All

Whitewashed Coral.

The most striking things about a Bermudian house are til color and material. White does not begin to express the vivid, radiant, penetrating parity of its imooth, unbroken surfaces. In the intense sunlight the dassing roofs give forth a halo of redected light where the roof line instead of standing out sharply against the sky blends imperceptibly with it.

Bermudian houses are built today, as they were centuries ago, of coral blocks interally saved out of the hill-sides. A Bermudian quarry is a queen institution. For convenience it is usually located on the side of a hill where only a thin layer of soil covers the

only a thin layer of soil covers the coral. The blocks are sawed out by negroes with long, coarse toothed he sawg and cut in uniform sizes mes ing about two feet long, one foot wide and six inches thick. The roofs are covered with overlapping slabs an inch

oral blocks and slabs are very soft but after being plied up for a month or so and exposed to the air they be-come hard and firm. Even theo, howcome hard and firm. Seen their, how-ever, the coral is porous, so that all Bermudian housed are covered with a thick coat of whitewash or lime a quas-ter of an inch deep. This hides all cracks and joints and gives the sus-face a beautiful, smooth finish. To keep the houses in good condition a coat of whitewash is applied each year. What little wood is used for floors, verandas, interior trim and shatters can be obtained from the cedar trees can be obtained from the cedar trees that grow on the same fills where the stone is quarried. With material so handy and ready for use with so little work it does not cost much to build in IALIFAX & CANSO STEAMSHIP CO., work it does not core much to beam in Bermuda. In some of the older houses and churches the cedar beams are lock-ed into the masoury suncity as a hip-builder would do it. His chimneys, sloping roofs to catch the rainwater, stone porches and windows filed with green shutters that push outward are features common in many Bernaudian
