



> Letter of an English Visitor to the Miramichi.

The following letter appeared in the St. John Sun of Tuesday, and as it refers largely to Miramichi matters, it will, doubtless, sterest many of our readers :---

I have spent a month in the district of

Miramichi, and found in it much to interest one coming from the Old Country. It is interesting and instructive as a specimen, from which I imagine an opinion can be formed of New Brunswick generally, because, as I understand, it is neither the best nor the worst portion of that Province. and may, therefore, be regarded as an average specimen. 
