# LITTLE FIGHTING IN EUROPE DURING CHRISTMAS SEASON

## ROUMANIANS YIELD IN HUN DRIVE

Heavy Fighting in Dobrudja--Russians Obliged to Fall Back Under Heavy Pressure -- Austro-Germans Making Last Stand--Heavy Casualties Suffered by Turks.

MACEDONIA EXCEPT FOR AN ARTILLERY EN-BITTER ATTACK ITY-TWO BRITISH DESTROYERS SUNK IN NORTH SEA.

The third Christmas of the European war passed without much fight-on the British and French fronts, where virtually only the artillery was active and the men were feasted and entertained as far as was compatible with the sterner business of war.

Roumania's first Christmas as a participant in the war witne heavy fighting on the Roumanian front. Ground was yielded by the Roumanians at some points under the pressure of the Germans, and north of the Buzeu-Rimnik road a height was lost by the Russians.

In addition to announcing the evacuation of Isakishe, the Rus ians admit the occupation of Tultchs.



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

In the Central Gold Reserve established under authority of the Minister of Finance the bank had deposited \$6,000,000. It has also deposited \$6,000,000 as a year ago. In the Circulation Fund at Ottawa.

The statement shows profits for the past year of \$2,439,415 against \$2,352,035 in 1915. Earnings thus were \$.56% on the combined capital and reserve. 

Hardial, and a second revolutionary
society known as the Hindi Association of the Pacific Coast was formed
to further the idea of revolt in India.
"It was devided to establish the
Ohadr newspaper in San Francisco,
and Hardiai went to that city to orsanize the undertakins. The first issue of the paper was dated November
1, 1913, the organ was violently antiBritish and preached murder and
mutiny in every sentence. All
Indians were urged to go home with
the express purpose of committing
murder, causing revolution and expelling the British government. These
facts we know not only from reading
copies of the paper which subsequentty fell into our hands, but from evidence brought out at the trials here
in India of the ring leaders of the
couspfiracy.


