There is a flavor of romance in the marriage of Princess Helene of Montenegro to Victor Emmanuel Ferdinand Maria Genaro, Prince of Naples and heir to the throne of Italy, that appeals to everyone.

The father of the future queen of Italy ruled over a territory exactly half the size of the principality of Wales, the population of which in 1891 barely exceeded 200,000.
