## NOTES AND NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

Rev. Miss Chapin has resigned her pastorate of the Universalist church at Iowa City.

The most unfeeling ghost never heard of maintains the semblance of existence in Buffalo. It seems that the departed man had contracted a bad habit of sitting on the bed to pull off his boots. That was his ruling passion, and it is now strong in ghostly form. He comes in ghostly form, at the witching hour, tramps, tramps, upon the stair, strikes into the bedroom and resting himself on the couch regardless of the terror of his material spouse, relieves himself of his boots in exactly the same manner. This is all wrong, and the good people of Buffalo are interested in the strange legend.

The New York Sun says it is established by vouchers in the department of Justice that on January 27, 1873, Attorney-General Williams took \$1,800 from the contingent fund of the department to pay for a landulet for wife; and that on July 29, 1873, he took \$750 to pay for a pair of carriage horses to draw the landulet. In July, also, he purchased a pair of stitched pole straps, a gold slip buckle, and a new silk lining for the landulet, and had it varnished and put other expenses upon it amounting in all to \$11,000. In November and December the same carriage was repaired again at the cost of the Department of Justice. One of whose contingent fund \$800 was taken for these repairs. It is also alleged that the same Attorney-General has bought with \$500 from the money of the contingent fund, but for his private business, one sidewalk glass and one base table with white marble top. Moreover, George Wilkinson is borne on the rolls of the department as a temporary clerk at \$50 a month, and Charles W. Lee as a messenger at \$50 a month, both of them being domestic servants of the Attorney-General, and performing no service whatever for the Department of Justice by which they are paid. This man Williams has been nominated by President Grant for Chief Justice of the United States.

Miss Nuttall believed this and was happy in the belief, as her darling George told her that he had an income of about seven thousand dollars a year. The usual burning epistles were written. Suddenly one fine morning the suitor met his divorced wife again, fell in love with her a second time and hastened away to have the nuptial knot tied. Miss Nuttall was duly informed of this melancholy proceeding, and she notified her solicitor, who began an action for breach of promise against the twice married George, and the jury three weeks ago found that Miss Nuttall has suffered to the extent of fifteen thousand dollars.

## A Wayward Girl.

The Chicago Times tells a sad story of the beautiful and accomplished daughter of a prominent financier of Cleveland, who two years ago graduated at a fashionable boarding-school in Philadelphia. In the summer following she strolled at Saratoga, led the German at the Branch, sang in public at Rye Beach, and was a very ardent at West Point. After a time, however, she began to lose caste. Her general visitors fall off, and their absence was supplied by adventuring and the reputable soldiers of fortune. The parlors of her elegant mansion, that had glittered with beauty and civility and resounded to the strains of Mozart and Haydn, gave place to the melodies of the cork-cra and after a time she secretly left her home and under a false name appeared upon the stage as a ballet girl. For a season she was oblivious to the view of the public, and her actions were being forgotten, until one evening she appeared in Chicago as a theatrical actress, and revived a knowledge of her footlights in a subordinate part in the tragedy 'Strong in Death.' Cesar, her lover, endeavored to persuade her to return to her home, and her grief-stricken father offered to settle \$50,000 on her, but she renounced her wayward life. She refused to listen to these entreaties, however, and she again disappeared at once, and nothing more was heard of her until last week, when a Chicago police man rescued her from a drunken brawl in which she was an active participant. Upon learning who she was, the girl's parents were promptly notified, and she will now be released from custody only on condition of returning to her family, and she still ready and willing to receive her.

## Suffering at Sea.

The London Telegraph tells a tale of suffering at sea endured by the crew of the North German brig Calow Steamer, which recently left New York for Southampton. When nearly a month out she was overtaken by a hurricane and went over on her beam ends, where she lay for an hour and a half, the crew lashed on her bulwarks, unable to convey the steamer to the shore. The vessel was righted, but she lay so low in the water that the crew had to climb to the head of the foremast to avoid drowning. Led with a heavy cargo, the brig did not founder, but wallowed in the trough of the sea, washed by the billows, so that the five hands surviving with the captain and mate, had to cling like to the fore-top. Six nights and five days the poor fellows were kept in their hand plights, without a morsel to eat or a drop to drink, the sea perpetually sweeping over their heads, and roaring certain death if they did not come down to find a scrap of nourishment. On the sixth evening the billows ceased, and the crew still crept down and rummaged for food. They found a case of preserved meat, some tinned fruit, and a tin of condensed milk to live." In spite of this and a little more which they afterwards extracted from the hold, the crew still died a dreadful time to pass. ## Effects of a Late Storm.

The Londoners having suffered the infliction of a dense and impenetrable fog, it was reserved for the provinces and other sections of the kingdom to weather the recent tremendous gale, which will probably rank among the most destructive with which England and Scotland have been afflicted for many years. Rising to a hurricane and sweeping onward with a broad front, it raged over a space stretching from Glasgow to Nottingham on one side, and from Aberdeen to Wash on the other. The loss of property was enormous, and deaths are reported from five widely separated towns. The worst results occurred at Sheffield, where no fewer than eight stacks of chimneys, one three hundred and eighty feet in height, were overthrown, a lofty column of brick falling upon shops crowded with workers. Five persons were killed and nine wounded seriously by the blow from a single chimney; while many others were injured in all parts of the town by missiles which the wind hurled through the streets. The effects were like a miniature bombardment, and quite as terrifying to the inhabitants. Although the gale did most mischief at Sheffield, other Yorkshire towns did not escape. In Durham and all along the coast northward through Berwick to Aberdeen, damage was done; while inland Perth, Ed.burgh and Glas.ow felt the force of the tempest. A boy at Glasgow caught in a gust was dashed against a gate and instantly killed. At Darlington the roof of a cab going from the railway station was blown off. An empty van standing on the metals at Barnsley was driven six miles by the wind before an engine, sent in pursuit, overtook the runaway. From all centres throughout the vast stretch of Great Britain traversed by the blast comes the same tale of suffering and disaster.
