## Rules and Regulations.

1. Exhibitors shall, if required by the directors, make a statutory declaration that the articles exhibited by them are exhibited in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Society; and in case any exhibitor refuses to make such declaration on being requested, all premiums awarded him, her or them shall be forfeited.
2. Any animal or article not deemed worthy of a prize, where there is no competition, shall not be entitled to it.
3. All Grains, Seeds, Roots, and Dairy Products must be the produce of the year 1899 and raised on the ground of the exhibitor.
4. For any Agricultural implements or Articles of Mechanical Manufacture of improved principle or superior workmanship; also for new or improved varieties of Grains, Seeds, Roots, &c., extra premiums will be awarded at the discretion of the Judges and Directors.
5. All articles shown must be the *bona fide* property of the exhibitor. No exhibitor will be allowed to compete in more than one class with the same animal or article, except brood mares which may be shown in teams.
6. Exhibitors of Agricultural Implements, articles of Mechanical Manufacture and Ladies' Work, must be the manufacturer of each article, or his or her authorized agent.
7. No exhibitor will be awarded more than one prize for the article of the same specimen, unless the additional article be of a distinct variety or pattern from the first. This rule not to apply to animals, but to Grain, Roots, Fruit, Manufactures, &c.
8. No persons will be allowed to interfere with the Judges while in discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their rights to any premiums to which they might otherwise be entitled.
9. Any article having been awarded a prize three years in succession, previous to this exhibition, will be barred from competing for a prize.
10. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing and it must be delivered to the Secretary or his assistant before the close of the Fair; it must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$1, which sum shall be forfeited to the Association if the protest be not sustained. The onus of proof shall rest with the protested party. The Board of Directors, however, earnestly hope that exhibitors will not enter protests without the strongest grounds for so doing, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
11. That tickets issued by the Secretary be attached to the different animals or articles within stated time and while the judges are inspecting the same every one not necessary will be required to withdraw from that part of the ground.

12. Membership will be retained for the next year ensuing from the parties obtaining prizes at this exhibition.

13. All articles of Mechanical Manufacture must be the production of the present year.

14. No exhibitor will be allowed to remove any article before 5 o'clock on the second day of show.

15. The colors to be, 1st prize, Red; 2nd, Blue; 3rd, White.

16. Grain, Seeds, Roots, Domestic, Ladies' Work, and all articles for inside department must be entered with the Secretary and placed in the hall before 6 o'clock p. m., on first day of show, as positively no entries in the above named department will be received after this time. Stock and outside departments may be entered on or before 10 o'clock a. m. of 2nd day.

17. Persons taking prizes must apply to the Secretary on or before November 30th, ensuing, or forfeit such prizes.

18. Any person may become a member of this Society by paying \$1 to the Secretary or any of the Directors. A member of this Society shall be entitled to two admission tickets.

19. While Directors of the Society agree to take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Exhibition, yet it must be distinctly understood that the owners are required to assume all risk, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will render all the assistance in their power for the recovery of the same, but will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or any portion thereof.

20. In addition to the stated premiums, the Judges may also distinguish such animals or articles as they consider worthy of notice, but which have not received prizes, by tickets, with the words "Highly Recommended," upon them. These tickets will not entitle the holder to any money payment.
