NEW YORK, Oct. 11. The schooner "Sophia Emily," from Lisbon for Halifax, was abandoned at sea. The captain and crew were brought here today.

A Spanish paper states that Minister Cabel Cushing, acting under instructions from the United States Government, has notified the Spanish secretary of State that if the Cuban rebellion is not quelled by the 1st January, the belligerent rights of Cubans will be recognized by the American Government.

Admiral Walsley gave a splendid entertainment on H. M. S. "Bellerophon" at Newport, on Saturday, the leading citizens of Rhode Island, New York and Massachusetts, and on Sunday at noon, both vessels sailed for Halifax.

THE DEBTS OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.—There is a pretty general impression that under his visit to the East Indies there lurks a scheme of putting about £100,000 at the very least into the Prince's pocket.

Some time ago repeated efforts were made to feel the pulse of the country to find if it would be safe to ask the House of Commons to pay the Prince's debt without shewing the vouchers. These efforts were successful; the pulse of the country was felt, and revealed plainly that it would not be safe.

It is plain we are separate, by a considerable moral interval, however brief in time, from the days when Parliament was so generous in paying the Prince of Wales' debts with public money. It seems like ancient history, rather than plain Parliamentary proceedings of sixty years ago.

SUDDEN DEATH.—John Tooker, Esq., departed this life very suddenly on Monday evening last. He had been busily engaged during the day in his office until nearly 5 o'clock, when he walked home, a distance of about half a mile.

A CHICAGO JURY.—A lawyer in Chicago brought suit in a Justice Court not long since on a clear and honest claim of \$60. The defendant's trumped up a counter-claim, and the conscientious jury brought in a verdict of \$160 against the plaintiff.

HEAVY FAILURE IN BOSTON.—Messrs. Shepard, Hall & Co., extensive lumber dealers in Boston, have suspended, with liabilities amounting to a million and a half of dollars. The failure is attributed to the protracted depression in the lumber trade.

The Prince of Wales was to leave on his visit to India on Monday last. The newspapers have some startling paragraphs on his extravaganza, as will be seen by reference to a short article in another column.

There are still failures taking place, the latest—J. S. Galath, of Bloomfield for \$750,000. The Sevan-Turkey difficulty is in a fair way of adjustment, both parties having agreed to withdraw their troops from the frontier.

Lieut. Gen. Sir F. P. Haines, is to succeed Lord Napier, as Commander in Chief. Holland and Venezuela are at swords points. What the end will be time will reveal.

ST. STEPHEN.—A flying visit to St. Stephen last week, impressed upon us the fact, that notwithstanding the exceedingly dull times, and consequent stagnation of trade, our enterprising neighbors are beating up manfully against the depression in business.

The new brick School Building is a fine edifice and admirably adapted for the purpose for which it was erected. The only department which time permitted us to visit was the High School, of which Mr. Brydges is master.

That fine old Charlotte institution, the St. Stephen Bank, which has done so much to promote the prosperity of St. Stephen and the adjoining country appears to be doing a safe business, and has no doubt aided in sustaining the energetic merchants and manufacturers in the dull times.

Our contemporaries of the Press, appear to be enjoying good health and are encouraging and promoting the material interests of the place. People there as in other places are looking forward to a revival of business, which we all hope may take place soon.

THE REV. JOHN WALLACE, A. B., of the Presbyterian Church at St. George, will preach in Greenock Church here on Sabbath next at the usual hour, morning and evening.

THE ALDINE.—The illustrations, in the October number, just received, fully sustain the high character attained by this Art and Literary journal, and it is pleasing to learn that its circulation is largely increasing.

THE BANK OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA has been victimized by forged drafts, on its branches at Halifax, St. John and at St. Stephen.

Scotland has been and is highly favored by Royalty. The Prince and Princess of Wales have made an extended visit to Abergeeld, and have now returned to London.

NEWS RESPECTING THE TURKISH DIFFICULTY in the Herzegovina is very conflicting, and is not much to be trusted. One thing is clear, there is no cessation of the insurrection; and according to present appearances, the insurgents are determined to obtain a redress of their grievances before they lay down their arms.

THE STATUE OF QUEEN ANNE, opposite St. Paul's Cathedral, London, is in such a dilapidated state that about £200 or £300 will be required to be appropriated for its restoration.

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
