REAL CIRCUS COMING TO TOWN

Hagenbeck-Wallace Shows Will Arrive Here Thursday June 24th.

Billboards and store windows are now heralding the glad tidings of the coming of the majestic Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus on Thursday, June 24th. Advance Car No. 1 has already been here and according to the men in charge, the exhibition this year will mark an epoch in trained animal feats and equestrian novelties. The trained animal program has received much attention this season, as it is the prominent portion of the exhibition. Billed trainers devoted the winter months to the teaching of new feats to the animals at winter headquarters in West Baden, Ind., and have perfected an astonishing program, which is promised to introduce feats never accomplished before. In the three big rings features of European fame and headliner acts of America are billed. Leading clowns have been contracted and much overtime was consumed in preparing new pantomime stunts assured to bring laughter from all. A jazz band composed of these nimble is only one of their many features. A menagerie containing practically a specimen of every living animal today is being carried. It is said to be attracting widespread attention, being beneficial from an educational viewpoint, as well as interesting. The doors are open one hour before every performance, so that spectators may enjoy a thorough viewing of this menagerie. MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Committee Authorized to Place Silent Policemen at All Dangerous Corners.

A meeting of the Town Council was held last evening, His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Counc. Ingram, Jamieson, Currie and Belle-lale. His Worship read a communication from Messrs. Fraser Ltd. asking if the Town could supply necessary water for their new mill and if so at what price. Councillor Currie moved that the matter of the water supply be referred to the Water & Sewerage Committee to report at an adjourned meeting of the Council to be held to-morrow evening. Coun. Currie reported that the assessors from Ward 1—Carried. Coun. Belle-lale moved that because of the fact that Victor Martin formerly appointed assessor refuses to act that Jas. D. Murray be appointed assessor from Ward 1.—Carried. Coun. Currie said while this was a special meeting of the Council and he did not think that general business should be taken up, yet there was a matter which should be attended to. That matter was the necessity of providing a suitable room in which to conduct the meetings of the Council. He felt that when the ratepayers had paid for a building at least some provision should be made for a place for the Council to meet. Coun. Belle-lale thought that the Town Council should have authority to use any section of the building and was sure the Council would not disturb the belongings of the Fire Brigade. He thought the Council should meet where they wished. Coun. Currie moved that a committee be appointed to procure a room for the Town Council to hold its meetings in and that that committee provide desks and chairs for the Council.—Carried. His Worship brought up the matter of the fire at the Post Office clock tower. The Building Inspector called his attention to the fact that this was not built in accordance with the building bylaw. Coun. Currie moved that His Worship and Town Clerk be authorized to write the caretaker of the Post Office and bring this matter to his attention so that the tower would be properly protected.—Carried. Coun. Jamieson of the Public Charities read a request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for an increase of salary to \$10,000 per month. On motion of Coun. Currie the increase was granted. The Council then adjourned.

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BASE BALL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Four Teams Enter the League—The Schedule—Interesting Ball Games.

At a meeting of those interested in base ball held last evening in the Curling Rink the following officers were appointed: President—M. M. Mowat. Vice-President—Jas. P. Jardine. Sec.-Treas.—G. F. Miles. Field Committee—Jas. P. Jardine, Dr. Joseph Price, A. H. Ingram, A. H. Troy and R. J. Lavoie. Umpires—D. K. Graham, Geo. Harding, G. F. Miles, Fred J. McEae. Official Scorers—P. H. Blyth, Gerald Wall, Ray Young and Chas. N. Smith. There will be four teams in the league, the G.W.V.A. represented by John Jardine, Town by A. H. Ingram, K. of C. by R. J. Lavoie and Shives Lumber Co. by William Milligan. The following rules and regulations were adopted: The name of the organization shall be the Campbellton Base Ball League. Time limit to submit list of names of eighteen players for each team to be played at end of the season, to be June 30th, after which date no new players can be listed. All names of those submitted must be residents of the Town of Campbellton or Athol, previous to the above date. All field rules to be arranged before games between Captains and the Umpire. All games to be started at 7 p.m. sharp. First game to be played on Monday night, June 14th, consisting of seven innings unless called by the Umpire on account of rain or darkness. Nothing less than three innings to constitute a game. If it occurs an extra inning will be played if the Umpire so desires. All tie games and postponed games to be played at end of the season, in the order of postponement. League games to be played on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Practice nights Tuesdays and Thursdays. All afternoons and Saturdays for the Juniors. All matters pertaining to the League shall be dealt with by the Executive, said Executive to be composed of the President of the League, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and one representative from each team. Not less than five of said Executive, composed of three officers and at least a representative from two of the teams, to constitute a quorum. Players are forbidden to indulge in abusive language and conversation with spectators during league games. No betting by players will be tolerated. Any team of the league violating the by-law, or refusing to abide by the decision of the Executive shall be expelled or suspended, such suspension or expulsion to carry with it forfeiture of all money due the said team or club, until such time as may be seen fit by the Executive to lift the ban. The next game receipt, less expenses, shall be divided equally among the competing teams or clubs of the league and the Executive; the settlement to be made at the end of the playing season. All protests arising out of any of the league games must be filed, in writing, with the Sec.-Treas. within 24 hours after the playing of the game on which the protest is based. All protests to be dealt with by the Executive within one week after such protest has been filed. A vote thanks was extended the Shives Lumber Co. for lumber to erect the back-stop and Chas. Alexander for wire.

FOR COLLECTION OF NEW TAXES

Department Has Issued Particulars for Guidance of Merchants.

The following instructions have been received from Ottawa:

Department of Customs and Inland Revenue, Inland Revenue Service.

Ottawa, May 29, 1920. I beg to advise you that until complete plans are matured, covering the collection and remittance of Excise Taxes under the resolutions now before the House of Commons, you will please be guided by the following instructions, viz.:

1. The taxes under the resolutions are to be classed as follows:—
Luxury Tax as per section 1 of the resolutions.

Manufacturer's Tax as per section 3 of the resolutions.

Sales Tax as per section 7 of the resolutions.

2. Luxury tax is payable on the first and fifteenth of every month. Manufacturer's tax and sales tax are payable on the first of every month.

3. Tax collected under each of the classes above mentioned shall be shown on separate entry forms, that is to say, no entry shall be accepted to cover more than one class of tax, even though the same person may be paying on two classes at the same time.

4. A temporary entry form (no number) is being sent to you forthwith to be used for the collection of all taxes under the resolutions and under the Special War Revenue Act and amendments thereto.

5. Entries for luxury tax must be sworn to, and shall be accompanied by (a) the duplicate sales slip or invoices to which the entry refers, and (b) an accepted cheque or cash for the full amount of the tax.

6. Entries for manufacturers' tax and for sales tax must be sworn to and shall be accompanied by (a) a sworn statement of the manufacturer or wholesaler as to the total amount of sales shown by his sales records, and the total amount of tax due on these sales, or a certified statement of the manufacturer or wholesaler to a like effect, and (b) an accepted cheque or cash for the full amount of the tax.

7. All entries are to be filled out, in duplicate, by the persons paying the tax.

8. The sworn declaration called for by these instructions may be made before any inland revenue officer (including temporary officers), officer in customs, commissioner of the high court of justice or justice of the peace, in duplicate, by the person paying the taxes.

FORMER KAISER'S RACING YACHT TO BE A TRADER

7 Bahabad, April 26—(Delayed)—William Hohenzollern's schooner yacht Hamburg, one of the fastest racing schooners at the Cowes and other regattas, has just been brought out of internment, and sold to a mercantile firm who will use her for trading between India and the Straits.

One of Canada's greatest sources of wealth is her fisheries, and you help develop the industry by eating fish, and also help to put Canada in a better financial position.

Probably you are not aware how little fish Canadian people use.

Great Britain is one of the greatest fish consuming countries in the world. During 1918 she had a per capita consumption of 58 pounds, and in 1919, it is believed, this was increased to 60 pounds. This means that each individual consumed at the rate of more than one pound per week.

In the United States last year it is estimated by officials at Washington the per capita consumption was 19 pounds. Although this reference is made in this estimate, there is no doubt but that the local consumption in the United States has increased greatly in recent years.

A few years ago the per capita consumption in Canada per annum was a matter of ounces. Through the combined efforts of the Canada Food Board and the Fisheries Branch it is estimated that the local consumption at one time reached a point equal to 45 pounds per capita.

During 1919 it is estimated the per capita consumption was somewhere between 23 and 25 pounds per annum.

Canada is one of the greatest, if not the greatest, fish producing countries of the world. Why have our people so little faith in fish?

WHAT PEOPLE OF ST. QUENTIN WANT

C. B. Allan Returns to St. John After Trip of Investigation There.

The once prosperous town of St. Quentin has received a set back which will require a number of years to overcome, out the misadventures, instead of being discouraged, have set to work at once to rebuild their homes and already some temporary buildings are under construction, says C. B. Allan, government representative, who made an inspection of the town during his investigation. There is sufficient food available and all the residents are sheltered. The greatest needs of the people are clothing for women and children, boots for boys or seven to thirteen years old; blankets, pillows, roofing paper for temporary building, nails, stoves, kitchen utensils, dishes and other necessities. Mr. Allan reported seventy-one buildings destroyed in St. Quentin, besides farm buildings in the vicinity. Of the forty families without homes few carried much insurance. Twenty-one families are entirely without means of replacing their household goods and wearing apparel.

Soon after the fire \$2,000 worth of Provincial Government supplies, mostly provisions were taken from Campbellton and later supplies arrived from Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Fredericton, Sussex, Moncton, and other places.

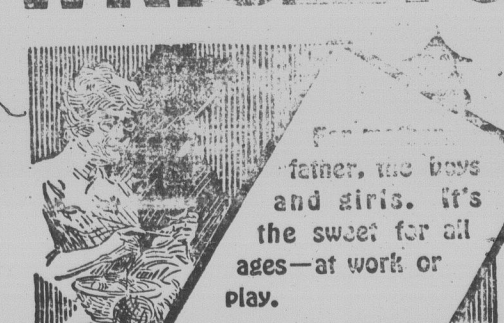

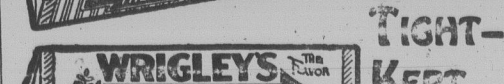

FOR COLLECTION OF NEW TAXES

Department Has Issued Particulars for Guidance of Merchants.

The following instructions have been received from Ottawa: Department of Customs and Inland Revenue, Inland Revenue Service: Ottawa, May 29, 1920.

1. I beg to advise you that until complete plans are matured, covering the collection and remittance of Excise Taxes under the resolutions now before the House of Commons, you will please be guided by the following instructions, viz.:

1. The taxes under the resolution are to be classed as follows:

2. Luxury Tax as per section 1 of the resolutions.

3. Tax collected under each of the classes above mentioned shall be shown on separate entry forms, this is to say, no entry shall be accepted to cover more than one class of tax, even though the same person may be paying on two classes at the same time.

4. A temporary entry form (no number) is being sent to you forthwith to be used for the collection of all taxes under the resolutions and under the Special War Revenue Act and amendments thereto.

5. Entries for luxury tax must be sworn to, and shall be accompanied by (a) the duplicate sales slip or invoices to which the entry refers, and (b) an accepted cheque or cash for the full amount of the tax.

6. Entries for manufacturers' tax and for sales tax must be sworn to and shall be accompanied by (a) a sworn statement of the manufacturer or wholesaler as to the total amount of sales shown by his sales records, and the total amount of tax due on same; or a certified statement of the chartered accountant in the employ of the manufacturer or wholesaler to a like effect, and (b) an accepted cheque or cash for the full amount of the tax.

7. All entries are to be filled out, in duplicate, by the persons paying the tax.

8. The sworn declaration called for by these instructions may be made before any inland revenue officer (including temporary officers), officers of customs, commissioner of the high court of justice or justice of the peace, in duplicate, by the person paying the taxes.

WHAT PEOPLE OF ST. QUENTIN WANT

C. B. Allan Returns to St. John After Trip of Investigation There.

The once prosperous town of St. Quentin has received a set back which will require a number of years to overcome, out the immediate, instead of being discouraged, have set to work at once to rebuild their homes and having some temporary buildings are under construction, says C. B. Allan, government representative, who made an inspection and investigation. There is sufficient food available and all the residents are sheltered. The greatest needs of the people are clothing for women and children, boots for boys or men to tattered years old, blankets, pillows, roofing paper for temporary building, nails, stoves, kitchen utensils, dishes and other necessities. Mr. Allan reported seventy-one buildings destroyed in St. Quentin, besides farm buildings in the vicinity. Of the forty families without homes few carried much insurance. Twenty-one families are entirely without means of replacing their household goods and wearing apparel.

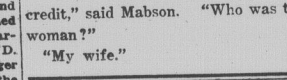

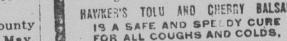

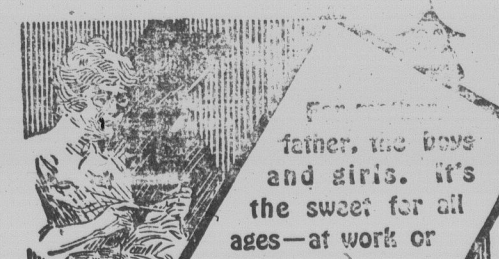

If they go away from us with a good impression it cannot help but be of great benefit to the North Shore and in fact to the whole province of New Brunswick.

EDITOR'S MAIL

Dear Editor:—

Will you permit me Sir, to voice my grievance and that of many others residing in the East end, over an incessant and thoughtless act on the part of one of the town employees, when he a few days ago, carted several loads or perhaps a ton of rubbish most of it waste paper, printed forms and books, all discarded by the town officials, to the Park grounds, and there dumped the same in the most exposed places, to be blown and scattered by the winds and children, along Water street, to the lawns, gardens and back yards, of every resident in that section. If this rubbish was ordered to be dumped there, as he claimed, this employee could have found holes where this matter would have been protected from the winds, or could have been covered with earth, with very little exertion. The residents are with patience trying to clear their grounds of this nuisance, but there is still sufficient evidence of this eye sore, along the streets, if our officials want to see it. This business youth may be indispensable to the town's management, but I know we who have suffered are fighting mad, and say, he should be taught a lesson, by instant dismissal. He should know, and the public should be made to know, that there is but one authorized dumping ground and that outside the town limit, and for which the rate payers are paying one hundred dollars a year rental, and besides this, paying a yearly salary to protect the same, and keep it in good order. Notice this, my long suffering public, that we have three dumping grounds, right in the heart of the town, and which have no care whatever. The result is there is little if anything to do for the man employed at the authorized dump.

How can we hope for a progressive town, and a healthy community spirit, when the management allows the so called Park grounds to be a dumping ground for all kinds of filth, and a disgraceful eye sore for all passers-by, in full view from the principal street, a town of seven thousand people, with all modern services in other respects, and this a menace to health as well. Let me name another place in even a worse condition. I refer the authorities to the O'Keefe lot on Ramsay street, where all kinds of filth is dumped to the great annoyance of residents, when the winds are from the east. This filthy place is twenty feet from the centre of the street, yet no official will take action. I hear you have a Board of Health but you cannot certainly have a Sanitary Inspector, or this condition could not exist. Why not appoint a good man at once? The third place of a similar nature, is at the south end of Sugar Loaf St. and the worst feature of this is that all material, filth and all, are dumped into that beautiful clear, unadorned stream the Walker Brook. And would you believe it, when I tell you, that all this material referred to, is daily carted by the door of one of the town policeman on Sugar Loaf St. If the town management cannot spare a few dollars to clean up those places on Water St, before the 16th inst., I would suggest the American visitors, who will be guests of the Town of Campbellton for a few hours, be taken on their trip to Dalhousie, by the back streets, which are at least free from eye sores.

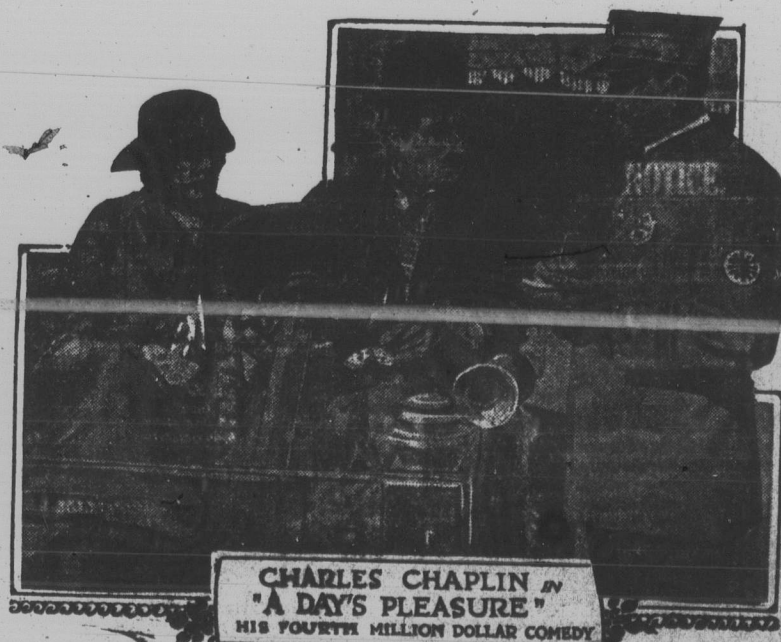

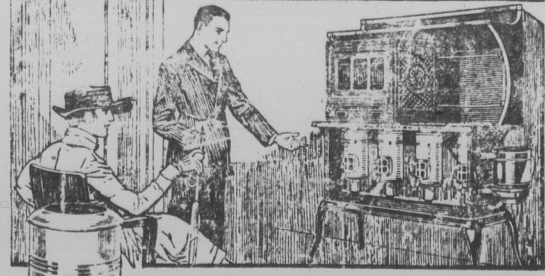

THE REAL THING IN
NEW BRUNSWICK

A Far and Wide Search for Wilderness Dwellers Found Here.

Under the title, Wilderness Dwellers, with the sub-head, Hunting Big Game with a Camera in the Heart of the New Brunswick wilds, Thomas Travis, in Forest and Stream, published in New York, tells how he had long dreamed about the real wilderness and genuine wilds, but always ever in his searches, the real thing eluded him. Mr. Travis says: "I would get to the place where the sure enough article was reported, only to find something lacking. Did I go for bear? Well all I saw was tracks. Was it the lordly moose I sought? I got as far as the place where someone shot a monster last season. If it was the salmon the water was wrong this year. Something had always kept me from it until I got this trip up the Tobique and Nepisiquit. Then I found it—found my fairland of the real wilds." At Fredericton Mr. Travis met Charlie Cremin, the well known and far-famed New Brunswick guide. He began to talk with Charlie and two other hunters about the wilderness. Although the writer had finished a five-hundred mile trip in the near-wilds that ended with disappointment, yet when Charlie said he'd take him to big game he looked into Charlie's eyes and knew there was no bluff. He answered "Right O." The trip into the wilds consisted of railway to station, a Ford car for forty miles to Millers, and then the trails the best of which was the river, with a guide to each canoe, Mr. Travis says, they poled up the river and "nearly had we set pole in the stream before we saw two deer just ahead of us." There were trout and salmon in the stream and scarcity had we rounded the first bend when a splendid grouse shot up from a clear pool, curved in the light and fell back with a resounding smack.

The article is accompanied with cuts taken by Mr. Travis camera while on his trip and enthusiastically the writer tells how he procured that shot. This article is but the first of a series to be written by Mr. Travis and appearing as it does in one of the foremost sporting publications in America must create widespread interest among sportsmen of the big American cities whose eyes are ever in search of the happy hunting grounds.

N. D. FOREST AND
DEMAND FOR PULP.

In his last annual report Hon. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines, expressed the opinion that at the present rate of cutting the amount of timber taken off the forest lands of the province slightly exceeded the annual growth. Mr. Smith's statement demands serious attention; the forest survey has proceeded far enough to furnish data upon which to base such an opinion. The minister believed that the question of annual reforestation could not be considered as pressing at the present time, but that it would demand public and private attention in the near future, if lumbering operations continued to be conducted on the scale of the last few years. And that may very well be the case, for though the lumber cut in this province in the last few years has been larger than usual, the prospect is, in spite of the rather dull market in the United States just now—that the demand will be strong for some years, for the world has very considerable arrears of building to make up. There is also every probability that there will be an increasing demand upon our forests for pulp and paper making purposes.

Apparently Mr. Smith's statement applied mainly, if not entirely, to the lumber cut. While the cutting of pulpwood in the province is increasing the limit of pulpwood production is evidently far off. Some observations of Dr. Howe indicate that some areas might be weeded of pulpwood to the advantage of forest stands.

In view of the extraordinary demand for paper, and statements that the pulpwood resources of the United States will be exhausted in eight or ten years, it is interesting to note that Dominion Conservation Commission estimate that it would take 344 years to exhaust the Canadian pulpwood resources at the present rate of consumption. This period would seem to offer ample time for reforestation in so far as pulpwood is concerned.

However, Canada will evidently have to provide for a big increase in the rate of consumption. Ten years ago United States was able to supply pulpwood for all her paper mills. Now the United States buys from Canada one-third of the newsprint she uses or resells. In 1919 the United States imported from Canada 180,833 tons of mechanically ground pulp, 387,000 tons of chemically treated pulp, 12,536,000 cut of newsprint, and \$1,597,000 cords of pulpwood.—Ex.

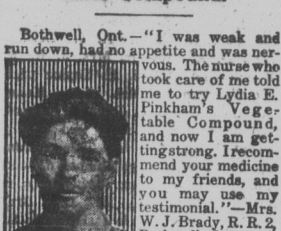

THE GASPE RAILWAY MATTER

Government Asked to Link Government Lines With Q-O and A. Q. W.

The Government of Canada are asked to link up the Quebec Oriental and the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railways extending from Matapedia to Gaspe with the Canadian National Railways.

It is urged that these two roads can be made profitable feeders to the National System and increase materially the production of the country at a time when it is so urgently needed.

Hon. Messrs. Lemieux and March representing Gens and Rouvestre Comites have forwarded to the Privy Council petitions signed in all the parishes from Matapedia to Gaspe, asking that this be done.

The sentiment of the people on this point is unambiguously expressed in the letter addressed by the Hon. Mr. Marvell to Mr. Hanna, Chairman of the Canadian National System, and of the petition signed in Bonaventure Co.

Ottawa, May 28th, 1920.
Re: Quebec Oriental Ry., Atlantic, Quebec & Western Ry.

I had the honour, a few days ago, of forwarding to the Privy Council a large number of petitions signed in all the parishes of Bonaventure Co., Que., along the line of the Quebec Oriental Railway, asking that that road be taken over by the Government of Canada and linked up with the Canadian National Railways.

I understand that Hon. Mr. Lemieux M.P., representing Gaspe County, has done likewise for the Atlantic Quebec & Western Railways, extending partly through his constituency.

There is an unanimous opinion in both Bonaventure and Gaspe Counties on this point. I have sent a copy of these petitions to the Hon. J. D. Reid, M.P., Minister of Railways and Canals, who has acknowledged receipt and promised consideration, and am enclosing one for your information.

I may say that, on April 6th, last, the Board of Railway Commissioners held a sitting at New Carlisle, Que., and investigated into the conditions of these two Railways. I understand that Hon. F. B. Carvell shares our views that these two Railways should be linked up with the Canadian National System by which both can be made most important feeders.

I am writing you to ask you to give the matter consideration. I have no hesitation in saying that, owing to the immense development of the Gaspe Peninsula, during the last few years, notwithstanding the war and the inefficient Railway service given it, it would be a sound business proposition for you to take over the operation of these two Railways on a fair and equitable basis to be decided upon. I am not making any proposal as to the terms but I claim that, in the public interest and in the interest of the Canadian National System, there are no feeders connecting with the Intercolonial Railway that can be compared to these two Railways.

You can easily ascertain the situation by the Railway Statistics which are available to you, and by the evidence adduced before the Board of Railway Commissioners at their New Carlisle meeting.

The Quebec Oriental Railway extends, as you are aware, from Matapedia, Que., to one mile beyond New Carlisle, Que., (a mileage of 100 miles) and is connected with the Atlantic Quebec & Western Railway at that point. The latter road extends to Gaspe, with deep water terminus, a distance of 102 miles, forming a total mileage of 202 miles.

As you are aware, the Gaspe Peninsula is fast becoming the mecca of tourists and could easily be made ten times more important in that regard, with proper Railway facilities and accommodation. The fisheries of the Baie des Chaleurs are among the most valuable on the North American Continent. The quantity of pulp wood and timber generally yet untouched is immense; the country is fertile and the returns from proper cultivation and exploitation are practically without limit. A mere fringe of the country has been opened up along the shore. An investigation will show you that in minerals, timber, pulpwood, farming, dairying, fishing and tourism, the Gaspe Peninsula is the most valuable part of Quebec, and the most valuable part of the Maritime Provinces.

Gaspe is the nearest Canadian Sea Port to Liverpool and is accessible for months longer than the St. Lawrence Route, and devoid of all the dangers of river navigation.

By the construction of a Railway bridge over the Restigouche River, between Cross Point, Que., and Camp-

bellton, N. B., these two Railways can be linked up with the I. C. R., East and West, and the International, bringing that immense country and its resources in touch with the whole of Canada, and Boston, and New England.

The Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway is a modern, well built road; the Quebec Oriental Railway is older, but it could be steadily improved with a reasonable outlay. Both roads are owned in England and are merely kept alive, no effort being made to develop business at a time when the country needs it so badly.

I should be glad of an opportunity of giving you any further information on this matter which I may be able to furnish.

To His Excellency the Governor-General in Council.

May it please your Excellency:

The petition of the undersigned citizens, resident in the Counties of Bonaventure and Gaspe, Province of Quebec, along the line of the Quebec Oriental Railway and the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway, humbly sets forth—

That this region is one of the oldest settled portions of Canada;

That it is peopled by a thrifty population of farmers, lumbermen, fishermen and sea going folk;

That its territory is immense, the Gaspe peninsula comprising 10,000 square miles;

That for generations the people have contributed their full quota to the upbuilding of Canada, and in the late war hundreds of young men served at the front;

That at all times they have been handicapped in the matter of transportation and easy access to markets for the products of the farm, the mine, the forest and the sea;

That since the outbreak of the war they have been deprived even of the advantages of water communication by suitable boats;

That as far back as 1884 the Parliament of Canada voted a sum of money to authorize the construction of a branch line of the Intercolonial Railway extending from Matapedia, Quebec towards Paspébiac and ultimately Gaspe, on the recommendation of Sir Charles Tupper then Minister of Railways and Sir Hector Langevin Minister of Public Works;

That unfortunately, this policy, which would have been of tremendous advantage for the opening up of the country, had it been pursued, was changed and the construction and operation of the railway handed over to private enterprise, devoid of the capital necessary to build and equip the road and develop it properly;

That since that time the service has been altogether inadequate, when not suspended, and has been a deterrent rather than an incentive to progress;

That many undertakings have been held up for years for want of a well constructed road, properly equipped and maintained;

That at the present time timber cut in the counties has to be rafted and carried by water to New Brunswick across the Baie des Chaleurs to be loaded for export; for want of a railway to carry it to the market;

That recently pulp mills have been erected, a large number of saw mills have been in operation, mines are be-

BOOM FOREMAN DROWNED HERE

Thos. McKenzie Lost Life At North Boom Early Sunday Morning.

Thomas McKenzie, aged 34 years, one of the foremen of the North boom of the Restigouche Boom Co. lost his life by drowning at an early hour Sunday morning.

At day-light Sunday morning Foreman McKenzie, with Albert Sherar, took a light canvas canoe and proceeded to make an inspection of the boom to see that everything was secure. They paddled to the head of the boom, and were returning when the canoe was upset by the heavy waves, as it was blowing a heavy easterly gale at the time. Both men

clung to the canoe for a time but as it was early no one saw their predicament. Sherar could swim, and as the canoe was drifting off shore, he concluded to swim ashore and get help. This he did, but Mr. McKenzie was nowhere in sight when he reached safety. The alarm was at once given but the unfortunate man had gone down. The body was later recovered and was forwarded to home of deceased at Boom Road, Northumberland.

Deceased was a very popular employee of the Boom Co. and his tragic death has cast a gloom over the whole community. He was unmarried and is survived by four sisters and six brothers.

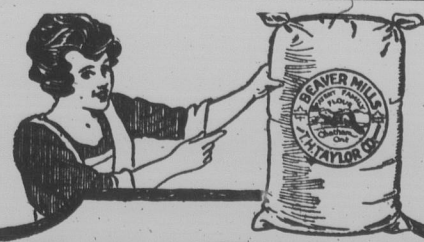

That these two roads would be important feeders for the National System and if properly exploited would be of incalculable benefit to the country at a time when production is so essential.

That for these reasons the undersigned voicing the sentiment of the entire population pray Your Excellency in Council to take immediate action to annex these roads by purchase, lease or otherwise as may deem best to Your Excellency in Council and made part and parcel of the National System, for which your petitioners will ever pray.

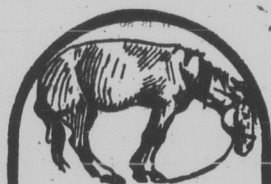

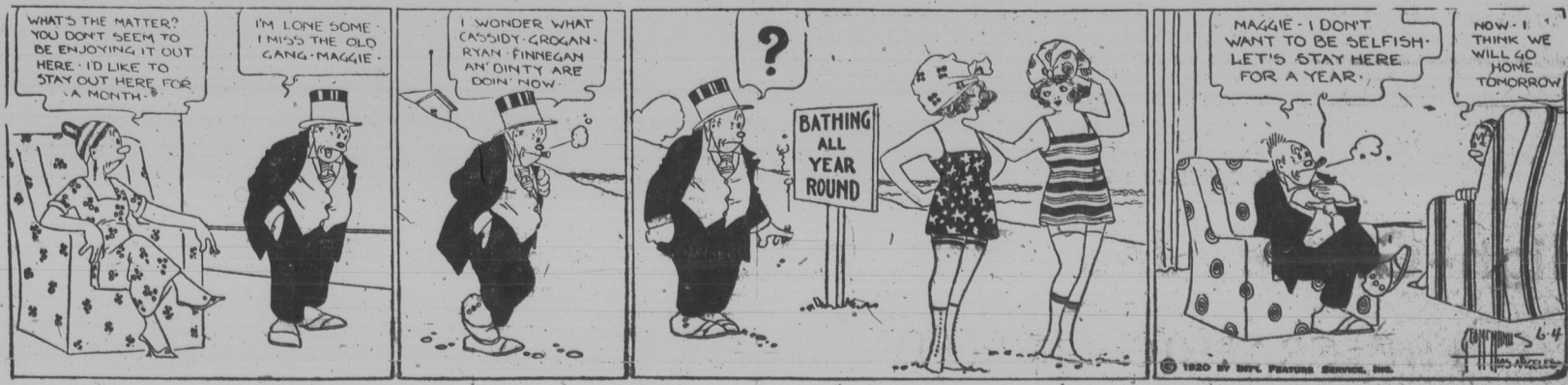

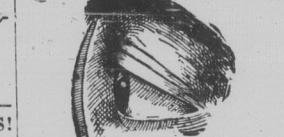
