"THE NEW EMPIRE."

Much talk has taken place in recent years about the constitution of the British Empire and the probable future of its constituent parts. Very little of the literature brought out on the subject will be aught but evanescent. This will necessarily be the case, because many discuss the subject from a partisan or prejudiced basis, and very soon writings of that description are of little value either as historic documents or aids to the teaching of history. "The New Empire," the most noted modern work dealing with the progress of the British nation, is fated to achieve more lasting fame. It is a fine volume of 600 pages, the work of Mr. A. O. Howland, a well-known Toronto barrister, who has brought to bear on his labors a keen, discriminating intelligence, and has produced a most valuable book. "The New Empire," whose past development, present standing and future possibilities are graphically set forth in this book, is the empire formed by the motherland and her colonial territories since the thirteen states across the border. goaded by maladministration, set up house for themselves. In a most interesting manner the author sketches the causes that led to the declaration of independence and the notable occurrences that have intervened in the history of Great Britain and the colonies since that great event. He is not an Imperial Federationist. It is hard to say how long much-needed reforms in the administration of public affairs would have been delayed if the king and his servile advisers had been victors instead of Washington. Yet it is made evident that it was more by chance-shall we say the decrees of Providence?—than by good management that the colonists succeeded in throwing off the yoke of those who refused to recognize the principles for which Washington and his coadjutors rightly contended.

The British statesmen at once gave the new republic control of the territory in the west that belonged to old Canada. With such writers as Mr. Howland in the midst of us, we need not fear for the future of native literature. Readers of this volume must be interested in the declaration of the author that it is likely to be followed by another (if life and leisure will permit) on "Our Future: Its Prospects and Its Duties," in which he will discuss what appears to him to be the common in terests of the English-speaking nations.

THE NEW EMPIRE: Reflections Upon Its Origin and Constitution and Its Relation to the Great Republic. By O. A. Howland, of Osgoode Hall, barrister-at-law. Toronto:

THE EAST END RESORT.

The Queen's Park is a charming retreat, and is thoroughly appreciated by citizens, but it might be better kept at comparatively small cost to the taxpayers. One of the first improvements that should be undertaken is the opening up of a roadway or two. Citizens do not half value this suburban retreat, but they are beginning to appreciate its merits. At the recent open air concert several thousand persons listened to the delightful music of the Seventh Band, demonstrating that the East End Park is a formidable rival to the central public resort. Let the esthetic surroundings of the Queen's Park pe enhanced in appearance by a little more attention from the aldermen and their caretaker. The Western Fair Board is doing its share by providing ample seating ecommodation. When a place with s many natural beauties can be improved at so small cost in effort and money there is no reason why it should be maintained in a slovenly condition.

THE WHEAT OUTLOOK. Though last week closed leaving many fields of hay ungathered through Middle sex and adjacent counties, the fall wheat harvest is now fully under way with continued prospects of a good yield. The hopeful view of probable prices taken by Mr. C. Wood Davis, as set forth in these columns, is corroborated by a sanguine article in the Cincinnati Price Current, a well posted and recognized authority on the subject. After going carefully over the whole field of wheat growing countries it says: "The logical deduction from this exhibit is that the world's wheat production in 1891 will be about 3 per cent. below the ordinary annual consumption, if present indications for European or An crops are maintained, or about 65,000,000 bushels. Aside from this moderate deficiency in wheat is the fact that rye which is of great importance in Russia and very considerably so in other continental countries, is understood to be quite decidedly short of the usual production this season. A further feature considered to be that the new crop, not only in this country but elsewhere, will more early than ordinarily begin to respond to the demands for consumption. The United States will by far be the most important wheat-exporting country this year—and if speculative opera-tions do not too seriously interfere with a free and steady movement of the surplus as it is called for by the importing countries it should be expected that the average of prices will be even better than for the past year, which shows a marked improvement over any previous year for quite a period-covering the years back to 1882-83."



THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS was interesting and comprehensive. The following are its more salient points:

Brethren of Grand Lodge,—The pleasure of meeting my brethren of Grand Lodge as they assemble in this their 36th annual communication is enhanced by a knowledge that the calendar of the craft year is marked by evidences of advancement and material progress.

The reports of the district deputy grand masters are an excellent narration of the details of craft work. Yet it may not be amiss for me to refer to these reports, which are most readable, in a few general observations, eleborated by the results of personal observation, consultations with W. M.s and P. M.s and friendly conversations with intelligent maps, in the sentence of the s intelligent men in the rank and file, whose practical ideas and anxiety to see the cause progress gave me an insight into the views of those who are the primal power which clothes with rank the representatives who deliberate in this the govering body of the craft

The incoming year brings with it the centennial of the craft in this jurisdiction. We receive about \$19,500 per annum, and by a careful revision of the yearly expenditure, making allowance for a due return of money expended for printing certificates and other items, you will find we pay over 30 per cent. for transacting this business, an amount that might be considerably curtailed, and that without the sightest injustice to any department of the work.

The expense of the grand secretary's office for the past 26 years amounts to \$70, 867 38. While my relations official and personal with that officer have been of the happiest character, a conviction presentsitself to me that Grand Lodge should so arrange that his entire time should be devoted to the work, and that the services of a stenographer should be paid either out of the amount allotted for the office or that an out allotte

range that his entire time should be devoted to the work, and that the services of a stenographer should be paid either out of the amount allotted for the office or that an increase should be provided to meet the expense. In these modern days, with the mass of correspondence connected with an office of this character, such an aid is indispensable. The experience of the past year convinced me that, with the clerical aid suggested, a large portion of my correspondence could have been transbmitted through the grand secretary's office. Another large expense is incurred in connection with the Board of General Purposes—in 26 years no less a sum than \$17,721 28. nection with the Board of General Purposes—in 26 years no less a sum than \$17,721 28. We all' recognize the work of the board, and as a directing body in the transactions of the Grand Lodge its services are invaluable. It is composed on an average of 50 members, all of whom are presumed to share in its deliberations and assist in the discharge of its work, and yet we know that the actual business of the board is practically accomplished by less than a dozen members.

While I quite recognize and appreciate the zeal, ability and worth of these officers, I fail to see the reason why the framers of our constitution should have considered that they were entitled to a seat upon the board, as they are in my opinion only the deputies of the grand master in their respective districts. If this reduction were made and payment granted the members of the board for only the two days preceding the meeting of the Grand Lodge, a material reduction would be made in our expenditure.


