Mr. Sol White Comes In for a Scoring.

The Leader of the Opposition Criticises the Address-Reply of the Premier to Mr. Meredith-Mr. White Heard From-The Address in Reply to the Speech

TORONTO, Feb. 15.—The Legislative Assembly was occupied to day in discussing the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. An otherwise dull debate was enlivened by a reference of Mr. Biggar, the mover of the address, to the annexationist proclivities of Mr. Sol White. After referring to the different paragraphs of the address, he pointed out in reply to the charges made by Conservatives that debates were disloyal, that the only politician who had described himself as an annexationist was Mr. White, the lieutenant of the leader of the Opposition. 

The partially anticipated withdrawal of scretary James G. Blaine from the candidacy for the United States Republican Presidential nomination is the sequel for greatly increased activity on the part of other aspirants. It seems likely, under the other aspirants. It seems likely, under the circumstances, that the heated preliminary canvass which preceded the Republican convention of 1876, will be repeated this year. Between Alger and Cullum, of Illinois, Sherman and McKinley of Ohio, and Harrison fighting for a renomination, not to mention numerous and darker horses, matters at Minneapolis promise to be highly interesting. Ex-Governor Alger is one of the wealthiest citizens in the Wolverine State. Reign of Torture and Terror in Spain.

General Booth's Triumphal Entry Into Old London.

Over 2,000,000 Spectators View the Unique Demonstration.

The Kaiser Preparing for War While Talking Peace.

Talks Peace and Prepares to Fight. Berlin advices are to the effect that the Kaiser, however much he may talk peace, believes in no relaxation in getting ready believes in no relaxation in getting ready for war. Work on the additions to the fleet is being pushed with great activity, and if the Reichstag will consent Germany will have a navy in the course of a few years able to rank very near to that of France. The Kaiser is reported to have said that the next war would be conducted on sea as well as on land, and that Germany would not be driven from the sea by a power she had vanquished in the field. On the other hand, there is a strong opposition in the Reichstag to increase naval appropriations. The Social Democrats are opposed other hand, there is a strong opposition in the Reichstag to increase naval appropriations. The Social Democrats are opposed on principle to expenditure in preparing for ofcensive warfare; but, added to these, the representatives of Bavaria, and of South Germany in general, are jealous of Prussia, and think they see in a formidable navy only a weapon for Prussian aggrandizement. Having no seaports or ocean commerce, they are not willing to pay for building up the commerce and prestige of the north.

The monster procession of the Salvation Army on Saturday, upon the occasion of the "triumphal entry" into London of "General" Booth, was by far the greatest effort ever made by the Salvationists to attract attention to their work. There were 5,000 Salvation lads and lassies in line, the number being limited to that. There were fully 20,000 other Salvationists in the throngs which witnessed the show. Everything that paint, ink and canvas could do to attract attention was done by the army. There were 4,500 red, yellow, blue and white pennants in the process. LONDON, Feb. 15 .- In the House Commons to-night, Mr. Jackson, Chief Secretary for Ireland, stated that the Secretary for Ireland, stated that the whole sum of £1,000,000, assigned for the purchase of land in Ireland under the Ashebourne Act, had been absorbed. The pending applications for advances, he added, amounted to £301,584 above the sum provided by the act.

The Famous Death Valley of Galifornia.
The most fatally famous part of the great
American desert is Death Valley in California. There is on all the globe no other
spet more forbidding, more desolate, more
deadly. It is a concentration of the
horrors of that whole hideous area, and it
has a bitter history.

One of the most interesting and graphic stories I ever listened to was that related to me several years ago by one of the survivors of the iamous heath Valley party of 1849—the Rev. J. W. Brier, an aged Methodist clergyman now living in California. A party of 500 emigrants started on the last day in September, 1849, from the southern end of Utah to cross the desert to the, then new, mines of California. There were 105 canvas-topped wagons, drawn by sturdy oxen, beside which truiged the shagpy men, rifle in hand, while under the canvas awnings rode the women and children. In a short time there was a division of opinion as to the proper route across the pathless waste in front; and next day five wagons and their people went east to reach Santa Fe (whence there were dim Mexican trails to Los Angeles), and the rest plunged boldly into the desert. The party which want by way of Santa Fe reached California in December, after vast sufferings. The larger company traveled in comfort for a few days until they reached about where Pioche now is. Then they entered the land of thirst: and for more than three months wandered lost in that realm of horror. It was almost impossible to get wagons through a country furrowed with canyons; so they soon abandoned their vehicles, packing what they could upon the backs of the oxen. They struggled on to glittering lakes, only to find them deadly poison, or but a mirage on barren sands. Now and then a wee spring in the mountains gave them new life. One by one the oxen cumbered by families, reached Death Valley ahead of the others, and were lost. Their bones were found many years later by Governor Baisdell and his surveyors, who gave Death Valley its name.

The valley lies in in Inyo county, and is about 150 miles long. In width it tapers from 3 miles at its southern end to 30 at the northern. It is over 200 feet below the level of the sea. The m

miles wide, but suffered frightfully

The survivors were too weak to help the fallen.

The strongest of the whole party was nervous, little Mrs. Brier, who had come to Colorado an invalid, and who shared with her boys of 4, 7 and 9 years of age that indescribable tramp of 900 miles. For the last three weeks she had to lift her athletic husband from the ground every morning, and steady him for a few moments before could stand. She gave help to wasted giants any one of whom, a few months before, could have lifted her with one hand. At last the few survivors crossed the range which shuts off that most dreadful of deserts from the garden of the world, and were tenderly nursed to health at the hadenda, or ranch-house of a courtly Spaniard. Mr. Brier had lost 100 pounds in weight, and the others were thin in proportion. When I saw him last he was a hale old man of 75, cheerful and active, but with strange furrows in his face to tell of those bygone sufferings. His heroic little wife was still living and the boyer who had such a sufferings. But how is it that never before we have noticed him on the plain? Amid the rocks, high up on the mountain, Christ has passed the night; but now, at early dawn, he is coming down with some special friends, stepping from shelving to shelving, here and there a loosened stone rolling down the steep sides ahead of him, until he gets a level place, so that he can be approached without climbing from all sides. He is on the level. My text says;—"He came down with them and stood in the plain."

Now, that is what the world wants today more than anything else—a Christ on the level, easy to get at, no ascending no decending, approachable from all sides—Christ on the plain. The question among all consecrated people to-day is what is the matter with the ministers? Many of them are engaged in picking holes in the Bible and apologizing for this and apologizing for this and apologizing for the tone, it is what is the matter with the ministers? Many of them are engaged in other to the Bible. They are building a fence on the wrong side of the road; not on the side where the precipice is and off which the multitudes are falling, but on the upper side of the road, so the people will not fall uphill, of which there is no danger. What a theological farce it is; ministers fighting against too much reverence for the Soriptures; ministers meking apology for the Sor than all the blatant infidels on all the earth. The trouble is our theologians are up in the mountains in a fight above the clouds about things which they do not understand. Come down on the plain and stand beside Christ, who never preached a technicality or a didacticism. What do you, O Wise-Headed Ecclesiastic, know about the decrees of God? Who cares a fig about your sublapsarinism or your supralaptarinism?

What a spectacle we have in our denomination to-day; committees trying to patch up an old creed made 200 or 300 years ago, so that it will fit on the nine-teenth century. To that creed I invite all mankind.—[T. DeWitt Talmage."

There are, I believe, to-day millions of good Christians who have never joined the church and are not counted among the Lord's friends, because they cannot believe all the things that they are required to believe. "Which means that by this firm dropping out of the wholesale grocers' guild the consumers in Kingston are able to buy sugar cheaper than before. But why should the refiners raise the price of sugar to Robertson & Son and not to the entire guild? Evidently these gentlemen were under the impression that when they bought sugar and paid their money for it, they had a right to sell it at any price they pleased; but it is equally evident that the guild and the refiners will allow no such privilege. Not much. The refiners stipulate the price at which the wholesale grocers may sell sugar, and the guild will grocer may sell sugar, and the guild will not allow a member to cut prices. If the price is cut, out goes the member; and if he can get any sugar at all from the refiners it is at an advanced price.

"Canada has no experience with any other such tyrannical combines as the sugal refiners and the wholesale grocers' guild. Perhaps these latter are in no condition to help themselves, for they must do just what the refiners say. The refiners Manufacturer on this incident:

The refiners are the masters of the situation, and this by the grace and goodness of the Canadian by the grace and goodness of the Canadian Government. Their industry is protected by the tariff, as it should be, but the Na by the tariff, as it should be, but the National Policy never contemplated giving them the power to be the tyrants they are. We are accustomed to viewing the McKinley tariff as the acme of protection, but that measure gives American refiners but \$10 per ton duty on sugar, while the Canadian tariff gives Canadian refiners \$16 per ton. And Canadian consumers are the sufferers. If our duty was no higher than the American duty, the wholesale grocers could protect themselves from the extortion of Canadian refiners by importing German or English sugar. As we have before shown, the Canadian Government in placing a duty of \$16 per ton on ernment in placing a duty of \$16 per ton on refined sugar, besides giving Canadian re-finers as much protection as American re-finers, gives them, in addition thereto, the finers, gives them, in addition thereto, the absolute power to squeeze and extort \$6 per ton on all the sugar they can produce out of Canadian consumers. The plaintiffs relied on this conduct as a waiver of Poole's right to insist on notice of dishonor, and the judge of the court below sustained this judge of the court below sustained this contention, holding that Poole's actions amounted to an express promise to pay. Held, that in order that the indorser may

Held, that in order that the indorser may be held to have waived his right to notice of dishonor, having once been discharged by the laches of the payee of the note, there must be an express promise on his part to pay the note. Appeal allowed; judgment of the court below set aside with costs, and (on account of the meagorness of the notes of the evidence taken at the trial) a new trial of the action directed. His Father Lived Here.

Rev. Donald Fraser, who died in London, Eng., on Saturday, was one of the most prominent Presbyterian divines in the old country. He was born in Inverness in 1826, and after attaining the degree of M.A. at an unusually early age, he came to Canada and studied divinity at Knox College, Toronto. In 1851 he was ordained and inducted into the charge of a congregation at Montreal. For the past twenty years he had taken a leading part in the Presbyterian Church in Englaud, and was twice moderator of the synod. While in this city he occupied the pulpit of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on different occasions.

It will be interesting to know that for a number of years the father of this celebrated divine, John Fraser, was a resident of this city, naving come from Inverness, Scotland. He was the first manager of the Bank of Montreal here, then a frame building on Dundas street nearly opposite where the Market Lane now is. Shortly after coming to Canada he married a daughter of the well-known Mr. Torrence, of Montreal. He always took an active part in the Liberal ranks. When Lord Elgin visited London Mr. Fraser was one of the delegates appointed to meet him at Nilestown, and drove from there in Lord Elgin's carriage. John Fraser was always a very pious man, and preached in Presbyterian churches in the city quite often. While driving friends out to London township one day a farmer's wagon and often. While driving friends out to London township one day a farmer's wagon and team, driven by a reckless driver, collided on the Proof Line near the old Montgomery House, upsetting it and breaking his leg. Death resulted from this accident. His remains were interred where St. Andrew's Church now stands, but were afterwards transferred to the Scotch Cemetery, Adelaide street north.
