THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY BARGAIN NOW AGREED TO.

No recent municipal event has possessed so much importance for the people of Louidon as the electric street railway agree ment, completed by the aldermen last night. The contract is with the new company, but as the old company-that now operating on various streets-have, by the terms of the city bylaw, 30 days in which to accept the bargain, it will be some time yet before the citizens know whether or not they are to have two street railways, one operated by "horses or mules" only,

and the other by electricity, or one system, the motive power of which shall be partly horses and mules and partly electricity.

The original offer of the new company was to build a surface electric railway to be operated on the trolley system. It is by far the best system, but as experimented with until recently, it has been much too expensive, and all the electric street railways in Canada and nearly all the electric railways in the United States have chosen the unsightly and more dangerous trolley system with its poles and overhead wires. system with its poles and overhead wires.
Recently, however, experiments with a new storage battery at Boston, Detroit and elsewhere are said to have been most satisfactory, and a dispatch from New York states that various street car lines are about to befitted up with a storage battery that will leave the trolley utterly valueless beside it. If the claim of the inventor is made good, London may next year be able to travel by an electric railway operated by the storage battery—the first of the kind in the Dominion. It would be a change heartily welcomed by every citizen as well as by the promoters of the new system.

If the corporation fail to exercise this right the privileges granted by the agreement are to continue, but at the expiration of every five years the same right of assuming ownership may be claimed by the city. The arbitrators shall take cog-nisance of the actual value of the property only, without regard to its use or the revenue derived from it.



Nearly \$10,000,000 Spent and Contracts

Call for \$5,000,000 Mere.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 16.—Auditor Ackerman has sent his report of exposition finances to the directors. It covers the expenditures of the fair to Sept. 30, and shows that the total receipts have been \$10,634,866 98 and the total expenditures \$9.829,777 17, leaving a balance of \$805,598 81 in Treasurer S. E. Berger's hands.

According to Mr. Ackerman's report the obligations of the Exposition Company, as represented by contracts now being-carried out, are \$10,526,559 73. The amount paid on these contracts is \$5,900,251 28, leaving a balance yet to be paid of \$4,682,408 45. This indebtedness will be met by the proceeds from the sale of souvenir coins and by the issue of \$4,000,000 in exposition bonds, the first money from which will be received Nov. 1.

New Street Railway Company's Proposition Accepted.

The Council Will Offer the Option to the Old Company

A Prolonged Session of the City Fathers With Definite Results in Terms of the Agreement.

The hour hand on the clock was midway between 12 and 1 and the electric light had long before flickered away when the city fathers rose from their deliberations this morning and wended their several ways homeward. They had done a good night's work, for they succeeded at last in making some definite disposal of that civic bugbear—the electric street railway proposition.

Mossrs. Hellmuth and Ivey, solicitors for the new company, appeared with printed copies of their proposition as it had been jointly revised and amended by the city solicitor and themselves. Each clause was gone over and it was substantially adopted by the council though not without a good deal of council though not without a good deal of discussion, explanation and demurring. The amended proposition differs but little from the original, save of course that in the former are not included those portions of Dundsa and Rectory streets to which the right of the old company has been recently established by the courts.

The construction is to be commenced 60 days after the agreement is signed and seven miles are to be built within one year. The proposers agree to pay every year during the term covered by this agreement (except the first two years during which time the road is being built) to the corporation the sum of \$100 per annum per mile of couple track and \$200 per annum per mile of couple track and \$200 per annum per mile

tion the sum of \$100 per annum per mile of single track and \$200 per annum per mile of double track, provided always that the gross receipts of the proposers amount to \$60,000 per year. If not they will not be liable for this mileage rate. The company also agree to pay the city the following percentage on all gross receipts: Under ... \$100,000 and \$125,000 \$6 per cent.
