APPRECIATIVE WORDS FOR CANADA

[From the Chicago Record Herald, July 2.]

During the last three days the Canadians have been preparing to celebrate their great holiday, Dominion Day, which is separated by a very short interval from our festival of firecrackers. The date is July 1, but this year the celebration will take place today, because the 1st fell on Sunday, and since Friday there has been a steady gathering of the clans. Railroads have offered a single fare for round-trip tickets between Canadian points, stations have been thronged, the whole population has seemed to be upon the

It is now thirty-nine years since the confederation of provinces was inaugurated to make a Dominion Day and a union that has been a blessing to the country, and in all that time there has probably been no year of greater fulfillment or greater promise than the present one. Certainly all the talk in Ontario is of unexampled prosperity. One hears the same tune north and south of the great lakes. Business is booming, cities are growing rapidly. Then, too, all Canada is full of the marvels of the Northwest. Men have visions of a vastly increased territory, and look for something resembling our own tremendous growth.

Their prophecies may never come true, but the richness of some portions of the country is proved, and immigration is already responding in a marked degree to the tales that are told. For the eleven months last reported the total came to some 155,000, which is undoubtedly a noteworthy figure. Though it looks small by comparison with our yearly records that exceed a million, it is relatively large in proportion to the population, and apparently the tide that way is setting in very strong.

Nor is there as yet any fear of serous immigration problems. The people for the most part are from the British Isles or from a farming population across the border, and are gladly welcomed to a share in the opportunities and in the general prosperity of the country.

It is a pleasure to add that the Canadians seem to have the best of feeling toward the United States, and the season of holidays is a good season for mutual congratulations. Canada gained much from the effect of the American revolution upon British policies; the United States is gaining every day through the growth of Canada. The enormous business between the two countries is in fact very beneficial to both, and the people have so much in common that they should feel closely united even without a political union.



LONG TRIP UNDER SEA

Submarine Cruiser Made Voyage of 300 Miles Under Surface.

New York, July 3.—One of the greatest feats of torpedo boat activity was accomplished when, after making a submerged voyage of 325 miles, the boat Lake, a submarine cruiser, anchored off Atlantic Highlands with all aboard safe and sound.

The Lake left Norfolk at 2:15 o'clock on the afternoon of June 25, and with the exception of a few moments off Cape Henry, when she stopped to signal Mr. Lake, the inventor, and again when off Barnegat the crew shut down for a time to watch a school of whales, the engines were kept going at a speed of seven knots. 

That Is Best Cleveland Will Say of Rock Ashpalt.

Ex-Ald. Stevely has returned from a visit to Cleveland. He brought back some valuable figures for the mayor, aldermen and City Engineer Graydon in regard to rock asphalt. Cleveland has found that rock asphalt is no good for repairing Trinidad

asphalt pavements. It will not wear. As to its use on a macadam roadway, Mr. Stevely says the best Cleveland 124% will say is that it makes a fair pavement.

Cleveland has its own asphalt repairing plant and repairs its pavements at a cost of only \$1 10 a yard, against \$1 75 charged by the contractors. Asphalt pavement is also being laid

on streets at a cost of \$1 35. One great benefit Cleveland finds in having its own plant is that it is possible to repair a hole the moment it is located, without having to wait until there is enough work to warrant a contractor taking hold of the job. Thus the streets are always in first-

class repair. The cost of the plant is only \$400. It has a capacity of 60 yards a day.


